#### NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The State Register is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the State Register. Published every Monday, the State Register makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific Minnesota Rule chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the Minnesota Rules are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the State Register.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as **Proposed Rules**. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for  $1_{-3}$ 9; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. 

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# **Adopted Rules**

Subp. 4-3. Parliamentary procedure. Except as specifically provided by statute or negotiation, Robert's Rules of Order shall govern questions that may arise at a meeting of the board.

#### 2890.0100 REVIEW AND DETERMINATION.

Subp. 3. **Board determination.** The board shall determine the amount of the reimbursement based on those costs it finds are eligible, actually incurred, and reasonable. The determination shall be made on the basis of the written record. The board may also allow supplemental information explaining the application to be presented orally. The board may establish a fair and reasonable limit on time allowed for oral testimony presentation.

# **Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission**

### **Request for Proposal to Host the 1989 Winter and Summer Minnesota State Games**

The Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission is requesting proposals from any city in Minnesota interested in hosting the 1989 ('90) Winter or Summer Minnesota State Games ("Star of the North" State Games). The Games will be regulated by the "Star of the North" State Games Board.

The Minnesota State Games is an Olympic-style sports festival created for Minnesota's amateur athletes. (The Games are designed for Minnesota residents only.) Patterned after the Olympics, the 1989 Minnesota State Games will likely consist of ten (10) or more different sporting events for many age levels. The sports may include: speedskating, ski competitions and figure skating as Winter Game events; and basketball, baseball, bowling, canoeing, cycling, soccer, softball, swimming, track & field and wrestling as Summer Game events. There will also be several competitions for the physically disabled. The host city will have the option to work in cooperation with the State Games Board to add sports or, in some cases, to delete sports that are not suitable for the particular host city.

This will be the second annual formal Minnesota State Games instituted by the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission. The Games will provide the incentive for Minnesota athletes of all ages and skill levels to develop their physical talent and competitive abilities. The Games present an opportunity for amateur athletes to compete within their sport to win the prestigious Minnesota State Games title and the statewide recognition they deserve.

Any Minnesota city interested in bidding for the 1989 Winter or Summer State Games should realize that hosting statewide competitions in the previously mentioned sports will have a significant economic impact to their host community. The inaugural State Games to be held in the summer of 1988 should have approximately 3,000 to 5,000 athletes and an equal number of friends, families and spectators. Host cities can expect a significant number of visitors, some of whom may desire housing in the dormitory facilities (as space permits) or in the hotels, motels or resorts of the area.

The host city must provide and guarantee the availability of suitable sport facilities for the previously mentioned sports. A key facility for the Games is a stadium with approximately 5,000 seats that could host opening and closing ceremonies. Another important requirement for the host city is that it must provide a qualified number of housing opportunities for competitors and officials. <u>Note</u>: The State Games Board will determine the exact requirements for this provision. The host city will provide a limited number of dormitory rooms and meals on a cost-free basis to the State Games (for officials, etc.) and the majority at provider cost for athletes.

The host city must demonstrate that the total community, including media, educational institutions, business and government agencies, will be supportive and cooperate with the State Games.

Host cities are encouraged to identify potential financial sponsors for their community for State Games and to include as a selling point for their bid.

Scheduled Dates for '89 Winter and Summer State Games: The Winter Games dates should fall in the range from January 15 to March 15, 1989. The 1989 Summer Games will be a two-weekend event, and the time is the last weekend in June and the first weekend in July.

**Determination:** The State Games Board is expected to name the host city by May 5, 1988 for the winter '89 and Summer '89 State Games. The State Games Board will make its recommendation to the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission which has final authority as to the State Games Program. The State Games Board has final authority over the policy, scheduling and jurisdiction for State Games in Minnesota upon final approval of the Commission. It is important to note that the State Games Board will assume total financial responsibility for the Games. The host city has a specific responsibility for the physical elements and a portion of the financial equation.

#### 8a) **PROJECT—11-88**

Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Research Facility University of Minnesota—Minneapolis

The University of Minnesota intends to construct a Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) Research Facility on the Minneapolis campus. The facility will consist of approximately 14,000 gsf to house four magnetic resonance imaging machines which will be used for research and diagnostic purposes. The site for the facility is underground and northwest of the University Hospital. The facility will be in space mined in the St. Peter sandstone immediately below the Plattville limestone layer. The floor level will be approximately eighty feet below grade.

The facility has a construction budget of approximately \$2.5 million. In addition to spaces for the magnetic resonance imaging equipment, the project includes two laboratories, an animal holding and operating room, an office and clerical suite, conference room, and a service dock. Also required will be shafts and connections to existing buildings. The facility is to be designed with an expansion capability of approximately 5,000 gsf.

The University retained a special mining consultant, CNA Consulting Engineers of Minneapolis, Minnesota, to investigate the feasibility of constructing the facility in mined space.

8b) PROJECT—12-88 Community University Health Care Center University of Minnesota—Minneapolis

The University of Minnesota Hospital and Clinic (UMHC) is planning to build a new clinic facility for the Community University Health Care Center (CUHCC), an outpatient clinic of UMHC located in south Minneapolis. The plan is to locate the new facility on Bloomington Avenue, just south of Franklin Avenue, on what is presently the parking lot for Heller's Grocery Store. The current CUHCC site, at 2016 16th Avenue South, will be razed and converted into a parking lot.

Total building size is estimated at 16,000 square feet and will include medical, dental and mental health clinics. Approximately eighty-five parking spaces are needed for staff and patients. Building alternatives include constructing a totally new facility or reusing and adding to the existing grocery store. Site area is 46,034 square feet.

Reversed and judgment of conviction reinstated. Amdahl, C.J.

#### C8-87-1694 City of Minnetonka, Appellant v. Paul Cummings Shepherd. Court of Appeals.

Police officer properly stopped motor vehicle in reliance on telephone tip from person who identified himself as attendant at nearby gas station and said that driver of vehicle in question had just been in station and was intoxicated.

Reversed and remanded for trial. Amdahl, C.J.

Amendments to *Minnesota Statutes* § 65B.49, subd. 3a(6) (1986), precluding the stacking of underinsured motorist coverages and *Minnesota Statutes* § 65B.49, subd. 4a (1986), requiring the reduction from underinsured motorist limits of amounts paid by a negligent tortfeasor, apply to all new insurance policies providing benefits for injuries arising out of the maintenance or use of a motor vehicle or motorcycle that are executed, issued, issued for delivery, or delivered after September 30, 1985, and to existing policies that are continued or renewed at the end of the policy period current on September 30, 1985.

Certified question answered in the negative. Coyne, J.

# C6-87-365 Kenneth Cornelius Osterdyke v. State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company, petitioner, Appellant. Court of Appeals.

When underinsured motorist coverage is imposed by operation of law for failure to make a mandatory offer of such coverage under *Minnesota Statutes* § 65B.49, subd. 6(e) (1978) (repealed 1980), an amount equal to the insured's residual liability limits is available when such limits are greater than the minimum liability coverage required by statute.

Affirmed. Popovich, J.

Took no part, Coyne, J.

#### C4-87-719 State of Minnesota v. John Kevin David Scruggs, Appellant. Hennepin County.

There is sufficient evidence to sustain appellant's conviction of murder in the first degree.

Testimony stemming from plea agreements entered into between the state and its chief witnesses did not violate appellant's right to a fair trial.

Evidence of appellant's participation in a gun store burglary was properly admitted to show motive.

The prosecutor's improper comment during closing argument was harmless error.

The admissible evidence before the grand jury was sufficient to support the indictment.

Affirmed. Popovich, J.

# C0-82-1654 In the Matter of the Application for the Discipline of Paul L. Simonson, an Attorney at Law of the State of Minnesota. Supreme Court.

#### Environmental Quality Board (EQB): Environmental Assessment Worksheets (EAWs) and the regional governing unit accepting

### Forestry Makes Predictions for 1988 Insect and Disease Season: Following are summaries of expected forest insect and disease

conditions this season reported by the Department of Natural

#### Resources (DNR) Forestry:

• Bark Beetles—Bark beetle activity should be increasing during 1988 because of continuing drought conditions and the large bark beetle population built up during 1987. If spring precipitation is normal or below normal, bark beetle activity will be serious. The bark beetles do not respect ownership or political boundaries and will be serious in stands where the spacing factor is less than 19 percent if the spring is dry. They will be active in well-spaced forests, although their impact will be much less. Particularly in central Minnesota, 1988 could be a banner year for bark beetles. The counties of Pine, Kanabec, Aitkin, Isanti, Mille Lacs, Crow Wing, Morrison, and Benton will have the most serious problems, but the bark beetle problem is likely to exist anywhere red pine are growing on sandy soils and where 1987 precipitation is 6 inches or more deficient.

• Gypsy Moth—No outbreaks or major defoliation are predicted. Small numbers of male moths will continue to be recovered from new and existing introductions. The rate of new introductions will decrease given the collapse of the general infestation in the eastern United States. This trend will continue for the next several years but will eventually reverse. Within 15 years, a general infestation of gypsy moth will result in Minnesota as the moth completes its current movement throughout Michigan and across Wisconsin. In May, eradication treatments will begin on a 40-acre infestation in Oak Grove township in Anoka County. Possible additional infestations exist at Delano in Wright County and Minnetonka. Statewide detection trapping will continue in July and August.

• Forest Tent Caterpillar-The populations in northern counties seem to be in the building and expanding phase of their cycles, which means that the populations will expand into surrounding areas previously free of forest tent caterpillar activity. In the southern counties, the natural parasites are now increasing and in 1988, the amount and intensity of defoliation should decrease. These populations continue to defy the more predictable cycles of FTC common in the uniform aspen stands of northeastern Minnesota. This may be due in part to the diversity of hardwoods that makes up these southern stands. Oak will has been present in Minnesota for many years. Incidence of the disease seems to be on the increase, and this may be due to the great disturbance of the woodlands during urban encroachment. New overland spread of oak wilt is directly related to the amount of wounding and disturbance that takes place on and around oak trees between April 15 and July 1 each year. In early spring, wilting trees are evident by mid-June, in average years, wilting trees are evident after July 1. In 1988, a statewide survey will be completed on the occurrences of oak wilt disease.
