

A *Contracts Supplement* is published every Thursday and contains additional state contracts and advertised bids, and the most complete source of state contract awards available in one source.

*Deadline extensions may be possible at the editor's discretion; however, none will be made beyond the second Wednesday (12 calendar days) preceding the issue date for rules, proposed rules and executive orders, or beyond the Wednesday (5 calendar days) preceding the issue date for official notices. Requests for deadline extensions should be made only in valid emergency situations.

**Notices of public hearings on proposed rules and notices of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing are published in the Proposed Rules section and must be submitted two weeks prior to the issue date.

Instructions for submission of documents may be obtained from the *State Register* editorial offices, 504 Rice Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55103, (612) 296-4273.

The *State Register* is published every Monday (Tuesday when Monday is a holiday) by the State of Minnesota, Department of Administration, Print Communications Division, 117 University Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota 55155, pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes* § 14.46. A *State Register Contracts Supplement* is published every Thursday. The Monday edition is the vehicle for conveying all information about state agency rulemaking, including official notices; hearing notices; proposed, adopted and emergency rules. It also contains executive orders of the governor; commissioners' orders; state contracts and advertised bids; professional, technical and consulting contracts; non-state public contracts; state grants; decisions of the supreme court; a monthly calendar of scheduled cases before the supreme court; and other announcements. The Thursday edition contains additional state contracts and advertised bids, and the most complete listing of contract awards available in one source.

In accordance with expressed legislative intent that the *State Register* be self-supporting, the following subscription rates have been established: the Monday edition costs \$140.00 per year and includes an index issue published in August (single issues are available at the address listed above for \$3.50 per copy); the combined Monday and Thursday editions cost \$195.00 (subscriptions are not available for just the *Contracts Supplement*); trial subscriptions are available for \$60.00, include both the Monday and Thursday edition, last for 13 weeks, and may be converted to a full subscription anytime by making up the price difference. No refunds will be made in the event of subscription cancellation.

Both editions are delivered postpaid to points in the United States, second class postage paid for the Monday edition at St. Paul, MN, first class for the Thursday edition. Publication Number 326630 (ISSN 0146-7751).

Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific *Minnesota Rule* chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the *Minnesota Rules* are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. Adopted Rules

The adoption of a rule becomes effective after the requirements of Minn. Stat. §14.14-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule.

If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed.

If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

An emergency rule becomes effective five working days after the approval of the Attorney General as specified in Minn. Stat. §14.33 and upon the approval of the Revisor of Statutes as specified in §14.36. Notice of approval by the Attorney General will be published as soon as practicable, and the adopted emergency rule will be published in the manner provided for adopted rules under §14.18.

Critical care services (codes 99160-00 to 99173-00) apply to a provider licensed as a doctor of medicine or a doctor of osteopathy, and include the care of critically ill patients in a variety of medical emergencies that require the constant attention of the physician, for example, cardiac arrest, shock, bleeding, respiratory failure, postoperative complications, or critically ill neonate. Critical care is usually, but not always, given in a critical care area, such as the coronary care unit, intensive care unit, respiratory care unit, or the

emergency care facility. The critical care services include, but are not limited to, cardiopulmonary resuscitation and a variety of services attendant to this procedure as well as other acute emergency situations. Separate procedure codes for services performed during this period, such as placement of catheters, cardiac output measurement, management of dialysis, control of gastrointestinal hemorrhage, or electrical conversion of arrhythmia, are not permitted when critical care services are billed on a per hour basis.

Commissioner's Order No. 2417: Regulations for Hunting and Trapping in Wildlife Management Areas, State Game Refuges, Controlled Hunting Zones, State and County Parks, National Wildlife Refuges and Federal Waterfowl Production Areas; Superseding Commissioner's Order No. 2384

PURSUANT TO AUTHORITY vested in me by *Minnesota Statutes* § 97A.091 and other applicable law, I, Rodney W. Sando, Commissioner of Natural Resources, hereby prescribe the following regulations for hunting and trapping in wildlife management areas, state game refuges, controlled hunting zones, state and county parks, national wildlife refuges, and federal waterfowl production areas.

Section 1. WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS.

(a) All public hunting grounds on state-owned wildlife management areas are open to the hunting and trapping of all species of wild animals during the established seasons therefor in the zones in which they are located, except as otherwise indicated in this section.

(b) Trapping is authorized by permit only, issued by the area manager, on the following public hunting grounds: Carlos Avery in Anoka and Chisago Counties; Hubbel Pond in Becker County; Red Lake in Beltrami and Lake of the Woods Counties; Talcot Lake in Cottonwood and Murray Counties; Mille Lacs in Mille Lacs and Kanabec Counties; Lac qui Parle in Big Stone, Lac qui Parle, Swift and Chippewa Counties; Orwell in Otter Tail County; Roseau River in Roseau County; Thief Lake in Marshall County; Rothsay in Wilkin County; and Whitewater in Olmsted, Wabasha, and Winona Counties. If the area manager determines that the number of trapping permits issued must be limited in order to avoid undue depletion of the furbearer resources or to prevent excessive crowding

of trappers, the manager may establish any practicable method, including a drawing, for impartially determining the persons who may trap. The area manager may reject the application for a trapping permit from any trapper who has failed to submit a trapping report for the previous trapping season. Permits may be revoked at any time if the permittee violates any law or regulation or otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of the permit.

(c) The Gordon F. Yeager Wildlife Management Area in Olmsted County and the Carl Schmidt Wildlife Management Area in Morrison County are closed to the taking of migratory waterfowl.

(d) The Bayport Wildlife Management Area in Washington County and the Raguet Wildlife Management Area in Scott and Carver Counties are closed to the trapping of unprotected mammals except when there is an open trapping season for any protected species, and are closed to the possession of all firearms unless unloaded and contained in a case, except for designated hunting areas during the season for the taking of small game when shotgun with No. 4 buckshot or smaller diameter shot only is permitted. Possession and use of bow and arrow is limited to the designated hunting areas during established hunting seasons. In the Bayport Wildlife Management Area, all firearms will be allowed on the specified rifle range when supervised by the controlling state agency.

(e) There are additional regulations applying to the trapping of beaver on wildlife management areas. These regulations are set forth in the commissioner's orders regulating the taking of beaver and otter.

(f) The Boerner Wildlife Management Area in Sibley County, the Buelow Wildlife Management Area in Steele County, the Bryson Wildlife Management Area in Freeborn County, and the Hutchinson Wildlife Management Area in McLeod County are closed to the hunting and trapping of all species.

(g) Hunting on certain portions of Lac qui Parle, Thief Lake, Elm Lake, Roseau River, and Talcot Lake Wildlife Management Areas is controlled as specified in Sec. 3.

(h) The Hearing Island Wildlife Management Area in St. Louis County is closed to the hunting of all species.

(i) The Gold Portage Wildlife Management Area in Koochiching and St. Louis Counties is open to waterfowl hunting during the established season. It is closed to all other hunting and all trapping.

(j) The Uppgaard Wildlife Management Area in Crow Wing County is open to hunting and trapping beginning on the opening date of waterfowl hunting or on the second Saturday in October, whichever comes first. Unprotected species may only be taken during the same time and by the same methods that it is legal to take protected species.

Sec. 2. STATE GAME REFUGES.

(a) *Lac qui Parle and Whitewater Game Refuges.*

(1) The Lac qui Parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties is open as follows:

(A) Those portions of the refuge within the Lac qui Parle Recreation Reserve, Lac qui Parle Mission Site, or those which are posted with "Do Not Trespass" signs, except as otherwise permitted by this order or otherwise specifically authorized, are closed to hunting or the carrying or possession of firearms or bows and arrows unless the firearm is unloaded and completely encased or unloaded and contained in the trunk of the car and the trunk door closed and the bow is unstrung or completely contained in a case or contained in the trunk of the car with the trunk door closed. The remainder of the refuge is open to the hunting of deer during the established seasons. The remainder of the refuge is also open to small game hunting during the established seasons, except that during the goose season in the Lac qui Parle Goose Zone, small game hunting is allowed only at designated hunting stations as described in Sec. 3.

(B) From September 20 to December 1, both dates inclusive, no unauthorized person shall trespass for any purpose whatsoever on any part of the refuge which is posted with signs prohibiting trespass during this period, except that, beginning the day after the goose season closes within the Lac qui Parle Goose Zone, fishing is permitted in the posted area.

(C) No unauthorized person shall trespass on Rosemoen Island at any time during the year.

(2) In the Whitewater Game Refuge, Winona County, no person with a bow and arrow deer license or with a Zone 3 firearms deer license may hunt or trap during the dates the license is valid except by permit. The refuge is open as described in Sec. 2(b) of this order, and may be entered to retrieve a deer shot outside the refuge only if:

(A) No firearm or bow is taken into the refuge; or

(B) A firearm taken into the refuge is unloaded and completely encased and a bow taken into the refuge is unstrung or completely encased.

(b) Additional regulations which apply to hunting deer in the Camp Ripley State Game Refuge are set forth in the commissioner's order regulating hunting in Camp Ripley. No person shall trap beaver or otter within any state-owned game refuge without first obtaining a permit from the appropriate wildlife manager. The following game refuges are open as indicated to the hunting and trapping of wild

Commissioners' Orders

(c) Within each state game refuge, unprotected wild animals may be taken when there is an open season therein for any protected species, but only during such hours and dates and by the same methods allowed for the protected species. Within the Rochester Refuge in Olmsted County unprotected wild animals may be taken at any time and by any legal method.

(d) The hunting of migratory waterfowl adjacent to certain segments of the Rochester, Roseau River, Lac qui Parle, and Talcot Lake Game Refuges is controlled as specified in Sec. 3. In addition, in an area adjacent to the Talcot Lake Waterfowl Refuge, all waterfowl hunting is prohibited upon or from the 1.5 mile segment of State Trunk Highway 62 and its right-of-way between the Cottonwood-Murray county line on the west and its junction with County State Aid Highway 7, Cottonwood County, on the east.

(e) The Douglas County Goose Refuge in Douglas County, the Fox Lake Game Refuge in Martin County, the Otter Tail County Goose Refuge in Otter Tail County, the St. James Goose Refuge in Watonwan County, and the Sauk Rapids-Rice Goose Refuge in Benton County are open to the taking of geese as prescribed by commissioner's orders regulating the taking of geese.

Sec. 3. CONTROLLED HUNTING ZONES.

(a) *Zone Description.* Controlled hunting zones with designated hunting stations are hereby established on portions of or adjacent to certain wildlife management areas and game refuges as described in this subdivision.

(1) *Thief Lake Zone.* On the Thief Lake Wildlife Management Area in Marshall County, the controlled hunting zone shall include the following areas:

The Southwest Quarter of Section 8, the Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (NW 1/4 SW 1/4) of Section 9, the Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (NW 1/4 SW 1/4) of Section 11, the West Half (W 1/2) of Section 17, and the Northwest Quarter (NW 1/4) of Section 20; as well as portions of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S 1/2 SE 1/4) of Section 8, the South Half of the South Half (S 1/2 S 1/2) of Section 9, the South Half (S 1/2) of Section 10, the South Half of the South Half (S 1/2 S 1/2) of Section 11, the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (NW 1/4 SE 1/4) of Section 20, Township 158 North, Range 41 West.

(2) *Lac qui Parle Zone.*

(A) On the Lac qui Parle Wildlife Management Area in Chippewa, Swift, Big Stone, and Lac qui Parle Counties, the controlled hunting zone shall include the following areas:

The Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (NW 1/4 SW 1/4) and the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SE 1/4 SW 1/4) of Section 32, Township 119 North, Range 42 West, and the Northwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter (NW 1/4 NE 1/4) and the East Half of the Northwest Quarter (E 1/2 NW 1/4) of Section 5, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, all in Lac qui Parle County.

And also the East Half of the Northwest Quarter (E 1/2 NW 1/4), the East Half of the Southwest Quarter (E 1/2 SW 1/4) and the West Half of the West Half of the Southeast Quarter (W 1/2 W 1/2 SE 1/4) of Section 12, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter (SE 1/4 SW 1/4), the Northeast Quarter (NE 1/4) except that part lying northeasterly of State Hwy. 7, the Northeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (NE 1/4 SE 1/4), and those parts of the Northwest Quarter (NW 1/4) owned by the state and posted as "Wildlife Management Area, Controlled Hunting Zone," all in Section 1, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, all in Chippewa County.

And also all state owned land posted as "Wildlife Management Area, Controlled Hunting Zone" located between U.S. Hwy. 59 and County State Aid Highway 33, Chippewa County, in Sections 6 and 7, Township 118 North, Range 41 West, all in Chippewa County.

And also the West Half of the Northwest Quarter (W 1/2 NW 1/4), the Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4), the West Half of the Southeast Quarter (W 1/2 SE 1/4) and the Southeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4 SE 1/4) of Section 36, Township 119 North, Range 42 West, all in Chippewa County.

(B) On the Lac qui Parle Game Refuge in Chippewa and Lac qui Parle Counties, the controlled hunting zone shall include the 200 yard wide zone which is outside of and immediately adjacent to the area within the following described boundary:

Beginning at the intersection of County State Aid Highway 13, Chippewa County, and CSAH 33, Lac qui Parle County, thence East along CSAH 13 to the southeast corner of Section 13, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, thence North along the Township road to the northeast corner of said Section 13, thence West along the township road to the southeast corner of the West Half of the West Half of the Southeast Quarter (W 1/2 W 1/2 SE 1/4) of Section 12, Township 118 North, Range 42 West; and beginning at the northeast corner of the West Half of the Southwest Quarter (W 1/2 SW 1/4) of Section 12, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, thence West along the North side of said West Half of the Southwest Quarter (W 1/2 SW 1/4) of Section 12, Township 118 North, Range 42 West, to County Road 32, Chippewa County, thence North along County Road 32 to the intersection of CSAH 12, Chippewa County, thence West along CSAH 12 to the intersection of County Road 31, Chippewa County, thence along County Road 31 to State Trunk Highway 40; and beginning at the intersection of State Trunk Highway 40 and CSAH 33 in Lac qui Parle County, thence southeasterly along CSAH 33 to the intersection with CSAH 13, Chippewa County, the point of beginning.

(C) Designated hunting stations are also established in Lac qui Parle State Recreation Area, Lac qui Parle County, where waterfowl hunting is permitted subject to the Lac qui Parle controlled hunt regulations.

(3) *Elm Lake Zone.* On the Elm Lake Wildlife Management Area in Marshall County, the controlled hunting zone shall include the following areas:

The North 200 yards of Sections 1 and 2, Township 155 North, Range 41 West, adjacent to the South boundary of the Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge.

(4) *Roseau River Zone.*

(A) On the Roseau River Wildlife Management Area in Roseau County, the controlled hunting zone shall include the following areas:

The South Half of the South Half (S 1/2 S 1/2) of Section 12, and the South Half of the South Half (S 1/2 S 1/2) of Section 11, Township 163 North, Range 42 West.

(B) On the Roseau River Game Refuge in Roseau County, the controlled hunting zone shall include the 200 yard wide zone which is east of and immediately adjacent to the following described portion of the refuge boundary:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Section 1, Township 163 North, Range 42 West; thence South 1-3/4 miles along CSAH 3 to the southeast corner of the North Half of the Southeast Quarter (N 1/2 SE 1/4) of Section 12, Township 163 North, Range 42 West.

(5) *Rochester Zone.* On the Rochester Game Refuge in Olmsted County, the controlled hunting zone shall include the 200 yard wide zone lying outside of the refuge and immediately adjacent to the following described portion of the refuge boundary:

Beginning at the intersection of County State Aid Highway 117 and County Road 8; thence along the southern, western and northern boundaries of the refuge to the center of Section 18, Township 107 North, Range 13 West.

(6) *Talcot Lake Zone.* On the Talcot Lake Game Refuge and Sanctuary in Cottonwood County, the controlled hunting zones shall include:

(A) *East Side Zone:* The 200 yard wide zone which is outside of the Talcot Lake Game Refuge and Sanctuary and immediately adjacent to the following described boundary as posted:

Beginning along County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 7, Cottonwood County at the center of Section 17, Township 105 North, Range 38 West; thence South along CSAH 7 to State Trunk Highway (STH) 62.

(B) *West Side Zone:* The 200 yard wide zone which is west and north of and immediately adjacent to the following described boundaries:

Starting at a point on the north shore of Talcot Lake 600 feet east of the west line of Section 19, Cottonwood County, Township 105 North, Range 38 West; thence North to the north line of Section 19, Township 105 North, Range 38 West; thence North to a point 325 feet north of the south line and 600 feet east of the west line of Section 18, Cottonwood County, Township 105 North, Range 38 West; thence due East to the north-south refuge line.

(b) *General Regulations.* Within all controlled hunting zones described in (a) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to all persons. These are in addition to the regulations for specific zones listed in (c) through (g) of this section.

(1) The hunting and taking of migratory waterfowl shall be limited to the area within 10 feet of each designated hunting station, except that hunters may retrieve downed birds from other areas provided they comply with all other refuge and trespass regulations.

(2) No more than one hunting party, consisting of no more than three hunters, shall occupy any designated hunting station at one time.

(3) All persons occupying a hunting station must fulfill all license requirements to hunt waterfowl in the State of Minnesota. Licenses or certificates must be valid, legible and indicate that the hunter is eligible to occupy a station.

(4) No person shall leave any refuse, offal, or feathers in the controlled hunting zone or any parking lot or designated campsite on the management area.

(5) No alcoholic beverages may be consumed or possessed at any of the hunting stations.

(6) No person shall loiter in areas between the designated hunting stations.

(c) *Thief Lake (Early) and Lac qui Parle Regulations.* Within the Thief Lake and Lac qui Parle controlled hunting zones, in addition to the regulations in (b) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to all persons. In the Thief Lake controlled hunting zone, the regulations in this subdivision shall apply during the period from the opening day of the waterfowl season to the Monday nearest October 22, both dates inclusive. In the Lac qui Parle controlled hunting zones, the regulations in this subdivision shall apply during the open season for taking geese in the Lac qui Parle Goose Zone.

Commissioners' Orders

(1) Waterfowl and small game hunters shall reserve designated hunting stations in accordance with rules available at the Thief Lake and Lac qui Parle Wildlife Management Area Headquarters.

(2) No person shall hunt migratory waterfowl or small game in the controlled hunting zone without first registering at the check station and obtaining a back tag permit. Hunters age 18 or older will be charged a \$3.00 fee for the Lac qui Parle back tag permit.

(3) Hunting station occupancy is limited to the successful applicant and no more than two guests.

(4) Transfer of back tag permits to other hunters is prohibited.

(5) Reservation dates will not be changed.

(6) Only hunters shall be allowed to bring shotgun shells into the controlled hunting zone, and no waterfowl or small game hunter shall bring in more than six shells per day or have in possession more than six shells at any one time. All persons entering the controlled hunting zone shall, upon entry and while within the zone, be subject to search by means of electronic metal detector by agents of the commissioner. All persons refusing to be so searched, all persons refusing to reveal items detected, all hunters possessing more than six shells, and all non-hunters possessing any shells shall, in addition to any other penalties provided by law, be refused entry to the controlled hunting zone, or if already within the zone, shall immediately cease hunting, and any special permit required for hunting in the controlled hunting zone shall immediately become void for that day.

(7) Waterfowl and small game hunters must have guns unloaded and cased except within 10 feet of assigned hunting stations.

(8) Dogs must be under control at all times and must be on a leash except within 10 feet of assigned stations or while retrieving.

(9) After each party member has bagged his/her limit of Canada geese or expended his/her limit of six shells, the party is required to promptly leave the station and within one hour each party member is required to personally return his/her entry permit to the check station and submit any geese taken for inspection.

(10) Waterfowl and small game hunters shall be limited to three trips to the stations per season either as a guest or a successful applicant except when vacant stations exist.

(d) *Thief Lake (Late) Regulations.* Within the Thief Lake controlled hunting zone, in addition to the regulations in (b) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to waterfowl hunters during the period beginning the day after the Monday nearest October 22, to the close of the goose season, both dates inclusive.

(1) Waterfowl hunters shall use designated hunting stations and on a first come first served basis.

(2) Waterfowl hunters are subject to the provisions of (c)(6) of this section.

(3) Waterfowl hunters shall have their guns unloaded and cased except within 10 feet of their designated hunting station.

(4) Waterfowl hunters shall have their dogs under control at all times and on a leash except within 10 feet of their designated hunting stations or while retrieving.

(e) *Elm Lake Regulations.* Within the Elm Lake controlled hunting zone, in addition to the regulations in (b) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to all persons during the period from the opening date of the waterfowl season to the Monday nearest October 22, both dates inclusive.

(1) No persons shall enter the controlled hunting zone except when their vehicles are occupying numbered parking stalls in the designated parking lot in the controlled hunting zone. No persons other than those hunting at a designated station in the controlled hunting zone shall occupy a numbered stall in a designated parking lot.

(2) Hunters shall hunt only at the designated hunting stations having numbers corresponding to their parking stall number.

(3) All guns must be unloaded and cased except within 10 feet of a hunting station.

(4) No person shall park in or otherwise occupy any parking stall in the designated parking lot or occupy any designated hunting station during any two consecutive days or from one hour after the close of daily waterfowl shooting hours to 8 p.m.

(5) No trailers of any kind shall be allowed in the designated parking lot.

(f) *Roseau River and Rochester Regulations.* Within the Roseau River and Rochester controlled hunting zones, in addition to the regulations in (b) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to all persons during the open goose seasons.

(1) The resident wildlife manager or the area wildlife manager may limit all persons hunting at all hunting stations within a controlled hunting zone or at any hunting station within a zone to one day of hunting in every eight if he/she determines that such is necessary to provide for the equitable allocation of hunting opportunities. After making such a determination, the manager shall daily stamp the small game hunting license or firearms safety certificate of every person at each restricted hunting station with the date of such person's hunt. Persons with licenses stamped pursuant to this paragraph may hunt at any restricted station on the day stamped but shall not occupy any such station for the next seven days. Stations subject to the restrictions imposed by this paragraph

shall be so posted. The manager shall remove any such restriction when he/she determines that it is no longer necessary for the purpose specified above.

(2) No person shall occupy a hunting station or a designated parking lot from one hour after the close of daily waterfowl shooting hours to 8 p.m.

(3) A waterfowl hunting party shall vacate its hunting station and leave the controlled hunting zone after the daily limit of Canada geese has been taken.

(4) Waterfowl hunters shall have guns unloaded and cased except within 10 feet of their hunting station.

(g) *Talcot Lake Regulations.* Within the Talcot Lake controlled hunting zones, in addition to the regulations in (b) of this section, the following regulations shall apply to all persons during the open Canada goose season.

(1) Hunting station occupancy is limited to no more than three persons.

(2) Small game hunting, other than waterfowl, is prohibited in the west side controlled hunting zone.

(3) The resident wildlife manager or the area wildlife manager may limit all persons hunting at all hunting stations within a controlled hunting zone or at any hunting station within a zone to one day of hunting in every three if he/she determines that such is necessary to provide for the equitable allocation of hunting opportunities. After making such a determination, the manager shall daily stamp the small game hunting license or firearms safety certificate of every person at each restricted hunting station with the date of such person's hunt. Persons with licenses stamped pursuant to this paragraph may hunt at any restricted station on the day stamped but shall not occupy any such station for the next two days. Stations subject to the restrictions imposed by this paragraph shall be so posted. The manager shall remove any such restriction when he/she determines that it is no longer necessary for the purpose specified above.

(4) No persons shall occupy a hunting station within the controlled hunting zone except when their vehicles are occupying numbered parking stalls in a designated parking lot in the controlled hunting zone. No persons other than those hunting at a designated hunting station shall occupy a numbered stall or park in a designated parking lot.

(5) Waterfowl hunters shall hunt only at the designated hunting stations having numbers corresponding to their parking stall number.

(6) No person shall park in or otherwise occupy any parking stall in the designated parking lot or occupy any designated hunting station from 10 p.m. to 5 a.m.

(7) No trailers of any kind shall be allowed in the designated parking lot.

(8) Waterfowl hunters must have all guns unloaded and cased except within 10 feet of their hunting station.

(9) A waterfowl hunting party shall vacate its hunting station and leave the controlled hunting zone after the daily limit of Canada geese has been taken.

Sec. 4. STATE AND COUNTY PARKS.

(a) The following county parks and lands administered by the commissioner within the posted statutory boundaries of the following state parks are opened to the taking of protected wild animals as specified below:

(1) Lac qui Parle State Recreation Area in Lac qui Parle County is open to the taking of waterfowl at designated hunting stations in accordance with the regulations in Sec. 3 of this order.

(2) Itasca State Park in Becker, Clearwater and Hubbard Counties is open to the firearms hunting of deer, except where posted as closed, during the established firearms season therefor in the zones in which it is located.

(3) The following state parks and state waysides are open to the hunting of deer by firearms, but by permit only: Forestville State Park in Fillmore County; Frontenac State Park in Goodhue County; Lake Bronson State Park in Kittson County; O. L. Kipp State Park in Winona County; St. Croix State Park in Pine County; Wild River State Park in Chisago County; Belle Plaine State Wayside and Lawrence State Wayside in Scott County; Maplewood State Park in Otter Tail County; and Zippel Bay State Recreation Area in Lake of the Woods County. Carver Park Reserve in Carver County is open to the hunting of deer by firearms, by permit only. Fort Snelling State Park in Hennepin and Dakota Counties is open to the hunting of deer by firearms by permit only and subject to all local ordinances.

(4) Carver Rapids State Wayside in Scott County is open to the hunting of deer by bow and arrow in accordance with state and special regulations. Crow-Hassan Park Reserve in Hennepin County, Murphy-Hanrehan Park Reserve and Cleary Lake Regional Park in Scott County, Lake Louise State Park in Mower County, and Brainerd-Crow Wing County Airport in Crow Wing County are open to the hunting of deer by bow and arrow, by permit only.

(5) Lake Shetek State Park in Murray County, Helmer Myre-Big Island State Park in Freeborn County, Lake Louise State Park in Mower County, Garvin County Park in Lyon County, and Nerstrand Woods State Park and Game Refuge in Rice County are

open to the hunting of deer by muzzleloader during the special muzzleloader season, by permit only.

(6) Forestville State Park in Fillmore County is open to the taking of raccoons during the established season, by permit only.

Additional regulations which apply to state and county parks are set forth in the commissioner's orders establishing the regulations for taking deer.

Sec. 5. NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES AND FEDERAL WATERFOWL PRODUCTION AREAS.

(a) The following national wildlife refuges, waterfowl production areas, and federal lands are open to hunting and trapping of protected wild animals in accordance with the state seasons and special federal regulations, but only during the established seasons therefor in the zones in which they are located or during such seasons as are otherwise prescribed in this subdivision. Hunting maps and regulations are available through each refuge or wetland management district office or by writing to: Regional Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Building, Ft. Snelling, Twin Cities, MN 55111.

(1) Portions of Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge in Marshall County are open to firearm hunting of deer and moose. Areas closed to hunting are posted as "Area Beyond This Sign Closed," or as shown on maps available at Refuge Headquarters, Middle River, MN 56737.

(2) Portions of Big Stone National Wildlife Refuge in Big Stone and Lac qui Parle Counties are open to firearm and archery hunting of deer, muzzleloader hunting of deer by permit, and firearm hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack rabbit, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, red and gray fox, Hungarian partridge, and pheasant in areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as shown on maps available at parking areas and Refuge Headquarters, 25 N.W. 2nd Street, Ortonville, MN 56278.

(3) Portions of Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Aitkin County are open to firearm hunting of deer by permit, cottontail rabbit, snowshoe hare, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, ruffed grouse, and spruce grouse in areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as shown on maps available at Refuge Headquarters, Route 2, Box 67, McGregor, MN 55760.

(4) Portions of Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge in Sherburne County are open to firearm and archery hunting of deer and firearm hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack rabbit, snowshoe hare, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, ruffed grouse, pheasant, woodcock, Wilson's snipe, sora rail, and Virginia rail. Hunting in closed areas and target shooting are prohibited. Maps of hunting areas are available at Refuge Headquarters, 17076 293rd Ave., Zimmerman, MN 55398.

(5) Portions of Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge in Becker County are open to firearm and archery hunting of deer and firearm hunting of cottontail rabbit, jack rabbit, snowshoe hare, gray squirrel, fox squirrel, ruffed grouse, duck, snipe, woodcock, rails, coots, and geese in areas posted as "Public Hunting Area" or as shown on maps available at Refuge Headquarters, Rural Route, Rochert, MN 56578.

(6) Portions of the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge located in Wabasha, Winona, and Houston Counties are open to hunting except as follows: Hunting is prohibited between March 1 and the opening of the state fall hunting seasons, except that hunting of wild turkey is permitted during the spring turkey seasons. In posted closed areas, hunting for all legal species except geese is permitted beginning the day after the close of the duck hunting season. For more information contact Refuge Headquarters, 51 East 4th Street, Room 101, Winona, MN 55987.

(7) Portions of the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge known as: Louisville Swamp, located near Carver in Scott County; and the Wilkie Unit in Scott County, are open to hunting of deer in accordance with state and special regulations. Maps of the open areas and copies of the special regulations are available at Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center, 3815 East 80th Street, Bloomington, MN 55425. Portions of the refuge in Hennepin, Scott, Carver, and Dakota Counties may be open to waterfowl hunting. Areas open will be posted with signs saying "Open to Waterfowl Hunting - Special Regulations in Effect - Consult Refuge Manager." Other areas may be open to waterfowl hunting by special permit for the Young Waterfowlers Program.

(8) Except where posted otherwise, waterfowl production areas are open to hunting and trapping. Overnight camping and overnight parking are prohibited on all waterfowl production areas, including designated parking areas. Additional information including maps of open and closed areas is available from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Route 1, Box 26A, Fergus Falls, MN 56537.

(b) No person shall trap in a national wildlife refuge without first obtaining a permit issued by the refuge manager. National wildlife refuges are closed to the taking of otter.

(c) Motorized vehicles and motorized watercraft are prohibited on national wildlife refuges and waterfowl production areas except: (1) on access roads and parking areas designated by sign; (2) on public roads; or (3) by permit obtained from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Refuge and Wetland Management District offices. Motorized watercraft are allowed without permit on the Tamarac and Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife Refuges.

(d) Additional regulations which apply to these areas are set forth in the commissioner's orders establishing the regulations for taking deer.

Sec. 6. No person shall take or attempt to take any wild animals in any wildlife management area, state game refuge, controlled hunting zone, state or county park, national wildlife refuge, or federal waterfowl production area except in accordance with the provisions of this order and all other applicable orders of the commissioner.

Sec. 7. This order shall remain in effect until amended, superseded, or rescinded.

Sec. 8. Commissioner's Order No. 2384 is hereby superseded.

Commissioner's Order No. 2420: Regulations for the Use of Traps and for the Taking of Certain Furbearers; Superseding Commissioner's Order No. 2390

PURSUANT TO AUTHORITY vested in me by *Minnesota Statutes* §§ 97B.605, 97B.621, 97B.625, 97B.631, 97B.635, 97B.901-97B.945 and other applicable law, I, Rodney W. Sando, Commissioner of Natural Resources, hereby prescribe the following regulations for the use of traps and for the taking of mink, muskrat, raccoon, opossum, lynx, bobcat, red fox, gray fox, badger, pine marten, fisher, beaver, and otter. All dates and time periods specified in this order are inclusive, unless otherwise noted.

Section 1. FURBEARER ZONES.

(a) *Forest Furbearer Zone.* That portion of the state lying within the following described boundary shall be known as the Forest Furbearer Zone.

Beginning on U.S. Highway 59 at the north boundary of the state; thence along U.S. Highway 59 to U.S. Highway 10; thence along U.S. Highway 10 to State Trunk Highway (STH) 210; thence along STH 210 to STH 18; thence along STH 18 to U.S. Highway 169; thence along U.S. Highway 169 to STH 23; thence along STH 23 to STH 65; thence along STH 65 to STH 70; thence along STH 70 to the east boundary of the state; thence along the east and north boundaries of the state to the point of beginning.

(b) *Farmland Furbearer Zone.* That portion of the state lying outside of the Forest Furbearer Zone shall be known as the Farmland Furbearer Zone.

(c) *North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* That portion of the state lying within the following described boundary shall be known as the North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.

Beginning on State Trunk Highway (STH) 200 at the west boundary of the state; thence along STH 200 to U.S. Highway 2; thence along U.S. Highway 2 to STH 73; thence along STH 73 to STH 27; thence along STH 27 to Interstate Highway 35 (I-35); thence along I-35 to the Carlton-Pine County line; thence east along the Carlton-Pine County line to the east boundary of the state; thence along the east, north, and west boundaries of the state to the point of beginning.

(d) *South Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* That portion of the state lying outside of the North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone shall be known as the South Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.

Sec. 2. MINK AND MUSKRATS.

(a) *Season in North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Mink and muskrats may be taken by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 26 to December 31.

(b) *Season in South Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Mink and muskrats may be taken by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 30 to December 31.

(c) *Bag Limits.* Mink and muskrats may be taken and possessed without limit.

(d) *Special Provisions.*

(1) The taking of mink with the use of dogs or by digging in any manner whatsoever is prohibited.

(2) Traps may be set at natural entrances to muskrat runways and bank burrows.

(3) Openings can be made in any muskrat house for the purpose of trapping provided that they are plugged by replacing all materials removed and wetting said materials down in order to prevent freezing within the structure.

(4) No person may damage any muskrat house, muskrat runway, or muskrat bank den, except as herein authorized.

Commissioners' Orders

Sec. 3. RACCOON.

(a) *Season.* Raccoons may be taken statewide with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 15 to December 31.

(b) *Bag Limits.* Residents may take and possess raccoons without limit. Nonresidents may not take more than 20 raccoons per season, or possess more than 20 raccoons at any time.

(c) *Special Provisions.*

(1) A person may use dogs to pursue and tree raccoons without killing or capturing the raccoons from:

(A) January 1 to April 15 and from July 15 to October 14 without a permit; and

(B) From April 16 to July 14 in raccoon dog field trials by special permit issued to the sponsoring organization.

(2) Each raccoon or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof taken by a nonresident must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag furnished with the license. These tags must be fastened to the raccoon or its pelt in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order.

(3) To take raccoons between sunset and sunrise, a person: (a) must be on foot; and (b) may use an artificial light to locate, attempt to locate, or shoot a raccoon only if the raccoon has been treed or put at bay by dogs.

Sec. 4. RED FOX AND GRAY FOX.

(a) *Season.* Red fox and gray fox may be taken statewide with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest September 16 to March 15.

(b) *Bag Limits.* Residents may take and possess red fox and gray fox without limit. Nonresidents may not take more than an aggregate of five red and gray fox per season, or possess more than an aggregate of five red and gray fox at any time.

(c) *Tagging.* Each red or gray fox or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof taken by a nonresident must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag furnished with the license. These tags must be fastened to the fox or its pelt in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order.

(d) *Special Provisions.* Fox may be run without being taken by the use of dogs at any time during the year except from March 16 to July 14. Dogs may be used in taking fox during the open season.

Sec. 5. BADGER AND OPOSSUM.

(a) *Season.* Badgers and opossums may be taken statewide with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Friday nearest October 22 to the last day in February.

(b) *Bag Limits.* Badgers and opossums may be taken and possessed without limit.

(c) *Special Provisions.* Badgers and opossums may be taken by hunting from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset daily.

Sec. 6. LYNX AND BOBCAT.

(a) *Lynx.* The taking of lynx is prohibited statewide.

(b) *Bobcat.* Bobcats may be taken with legal firearms, bow and arrow, and by trapping from the Saturday nearest December 1 to the Sunday nearest January 6.

(c) *Open Area.* Bobcats may be taken only in that area of the state lying north of U.S. Highway 10.

(d) *Bag Limits.* No person may take more than five bobcats per season by either hunting or trapping or both. No person may possess more than five bobcats at any time, except that a person may possess additional pelts which he or she lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous seasons.

(e) *Tagging.* Pelts and skinned carcasses are subject to the provisions of Sec. 11(c) of this order. Each bobcat or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof, taken by a nonresident must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag furnished with the license. These tags must be fastened to bobcats or their pelts in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order.

(f) *Special Provisions.* Bobcats may be taken by hunting from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset daily.

Sec. 7. FISHER.

(a) *Season.* Fisher may be taken only in the Forest Furbearer Zone by trapping from the Saturday nearest December 1 to the Sunday nearest December 16.

(b) *Bag Limits.* No person may take more than one fisher per season or possess more than one fisher at any time, except that a person may possess additional pelts which he/she lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous seasons.

(c) *Tagging.* Each fisher or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof, must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag issued by the state. All fisher trappers, regardless of age, must use the state-supplied possession tags. No tags will be issued to persons under five years of age. These tags must be obtained prior to the season according to the procedure in Sec. 11(a) of this order. These tags must be fastened to fisher or their pelts in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order. Pelts and skinned carcasses are subject to the provisions of Sec. 11(c) of this order.

Sec. 8. PINE MARTEN.

(a) *Season and Zone.* Pine marten may be taken by trapping from the Saturday nearest December 1 to the Sunday nearest December 16, only in the following described area:

Beginning at the north boundary of the state at the point due north of the junction of State Trunk Highway (STH) 11 and STH 72; thence due south to said junction; thence south along STH 72 to STH 1; thence east along STH 1 to STH 65; thence south along STH 65 to U.S. Highway 169; thence east along U.S. Highway 169 to STH 37; thence east along STH 37 to U.S. Highway 53; thence south along U.S. Highway 53 to the north shore of Lake Superior; thence along the north shore of Lake Superior to the north boundary of the state; thence along the north boundary of the state to the point of beginning.

(b) *Bag Limits.* No person may take more than one pine marten per season or possess more than one pine marten at any time, except that a person may possess additional pelts which he/she lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous seasons.

(c) *Tagging.* Each pine marten or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof, must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag issued by the state. All marten trappers, regardless of age, must use the state-supplied marten possession tags. No tags will be issued to persons under five years of age. These tags must be obtained prior to the season according to the procedure set forth in Sec. 11(a) of this order. These tags must be fastened to the marten or their pelts in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order. Pelts and skinned carcasses are subject to the provisions of Sec. 11(c) of this order.

Sec. 9. BEAVER AND OTTER.

(a) *Beaver.*

(1) *Season and Bag Limits in North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Beaver may be taken and possessed without limit by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 26 to the last day in April.

(2) *Season and Bag Limits in South Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Beaver may be taken and possessed without limit by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 30 to the last day in April.

(b) *Otter.*

(1) *Season in North Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Otter may be taken by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 26 to the Sunday nearest January 6.

(2) *Season in South Mink/Muskrat/Beaver/Otter Zone.* Otter may be taken only in that portion of the zone lying north of U.S. Highway 10 by trapping from 9 a.m. on the Saturday nearest October 30 to the Sunday nearest January 6.

(3) No person may take more than three otter per season, or possess more than three otter at any time, except that a person may possess additional pelts which he/she lawfully took, tagged, and registered during previous seasons.

(4) Each otter or, if the pelt is removed, the pelt thereof, must be tagged by the person taking it at the time and place where taken with a locking possession tag issued by the state. All otter trappers, regardless of age, must use the state-supplied possession tags. No tags will be issued to persons under five years of age. These tags must be obtained according to the procedure set forth in Sec. 11(a) of this order. These tags must be fastened to otter or their pelts in the manner prescribed by Sec. 11(b) of this order. Pelts are subject to the provisions of Sec. 11(c) of this order.

(c) *Special Provisions.*

(1) No traps of any kind may be set inside any beaver house or above the water line upon the outside of any beaver house.

(2) No person may molest or damage any beaver house or dam.

(3) Snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles may be used statewide to transport or check beaver or otter traps and to transport beaver or otter carcasses.

(4) Beaver and otter may be taken within wildlife management areas in the respective open areas of the state by licensed trappers provided they have a permit issued by the appropriate state wildlife manager.

(5) No person may take beaver and otter in any state park or other areas under the administration of the Division of Parks and Recreation.

(6) Federal waterfowl production areas which are located in the open zones of the state are open to the trapping of beaver.

(7) Within the Agassiz, Minnesota Valley, Rice Lake, Sherburne, Tamarac, and Upper Mississippi National Wildlife

Refuges, beaver may be taken by licensed trappers provided they have a permit issued by the appropriate refuge manager. All other national wildlife refuges are closed to beaver trapping. All national wildlife refuges are closed to otter trapping.

Sec. 10. USE OF TRAPS.

(a) *Tagging.* A person may not place, set, operate, possess, or transport any trap in the field unless the following information is etched legibly onto the trap or onto a metal tag no less than 30 gauge (0.012 inch) in thickness that is welded, brazed or soldered to the trap or affixed to the trap with a tightly twisted wire or solid metal ring: (1) the person's name and Minnesota driver's license number; or (2) the person's name and mailing address sufficiently complete to individually identify the person.

(b) *Trap-tending Hours.* No person shall set or tend any trap for any wild animals between the hours of 7 p.m. and 5 a.m.

(c) *Use of Lights.* During legal trap-tending hours, a person on foot may use a portable artificial light to tend traps. While using a light in the field, the person may not possess or use a bow and arrow or a firearm other than a handgun of .22 caliber with .22 short, long, or long rifle rimfire ammunition.

(d) *Trap-tending Interval: Non-drowning Sets.* Any trap capable of capturing a protected wild animal and not capable of drowning the animal must be tended at least once each calendar day and any animal captured must be removed from the trap.

(e) *Trap-tending Interval: Drowning Sets.* Except for traps set under the ice, any trap capable of drowning the captured animal must be tended at least once each third calendar day and any animal captured must be removed from the trap.

(f) *Placement.*

(1) No person may set or maintain any leghold trap within 20 feet of bait located in such a manner that it may be seen by soaring birds. Bait is defined as any animal or parts thereof, including live or dead fish, except that small aggregates of fur and feathers may be used for flagging purposes.

(2) No person may set, place, or operate, except as a waterset, any body-gripping or "conibear" type trap that has a maximum jaw opening, when set, of greater than seven and one-half inches measured from the inside edges of the body-gripping portions of the jaws.

(3) No person may set, place, or operate in or within three feet of a culvert, except as a completely submerged waterset, any body-gripping or "conibear" type trap that has a maximum jaw opening, when set, of greater than six and one-half inches measured from the inside edges of the body-gripping portions of the jaws.

(4) A waterset is defined as any body-gripping trap or snare set in which the body-gripping portion of the jaws or the snare loop, when set, is at least half-submerged in water. A completely submerged water set is any set in which the body-gripping portions of the jaws or the snare loop, when set, is completely submerged in water.

(5) The setting of any trap within 50 feet of any water other than temporary surface water within 30 days prior to the open season for trapping mink and muskrat in the respective zones is prohibited, except by permit issued by the commissioner.

(6) No person may set, place, or operate any leghold trap that has a maximum jaw opening, when set, of greater than eight and three-quarter inches measured from the inside edges of the jaws.

(g) *Multiple-Catch Traps.* Traps capable of taking more than one animal at a time may not be used.

(h) *Pre-emption.* Prior to the opening of the trapping season for any protected species of wild animal, no trap, either set or un-set, may be placed or staked and no flag, stake or other device may be placed for the purpose of marking or pre-empting a trapping site.

(i) *Picking Up Traps.* No trap placed for a protected wild animal may be left in place, either set or un-set, after the close of the applicable trapping season.

(j) *Dogs.* No person may be accompanied by a dog or dogs while engaged in tending or setting traps for protected wild animals, unless such dog or dogs are harnessed and attached to a sled or securely tethered to a tree or other permanent device with a leash of no more than 15 feet in length.

(k) *Snares.* Snares may be used for taking protected furbearers pursuant to this order and the provisions of Commissioner's Order No. 2352 or superseding orders to the extent that such provisions are consistent with this order.

(l) *Authorized Agent.* A trapper may authorize, in writing, an agent who possesses all necessary licenses to check, pick up, or reset at the same set, traps set by the trapper. The agent may remove trapped animals and, if any animal removed from the trap is required to be tagged as specified in Sec. 11(b) of this order, the agent must affix his or her own tag to the animal as prescribed. Furbearer tags are not transferable.

Sec. 11. PELT TAGGING AND REGISTRATION.

(a) *Possession Tag Application.*

(1) Application for fisher, otter, or pine marten possession tags must be made on an official possession tag application form.

No person who has reached his or her 13th birthday by the Friday nearest October 29 may apply for possession tags without first purchasing a valid trapping license. A person who has not yet reached his or her 13th birthday by the Friday nearest October 29 may apply for possession tags by supplying his or her birth date in lieu of trapping license number, except that no possession tags will be issued to persons born less than five years prior to the application deadline.

(2) No person may submit more than one application for a legal allotment of fisher, otter, and pine marten possession tags. Any application that is not completed in accordance with the instructions on the application may be rejected.

(3) Completed applications must be either mailed or delivered to:

(4) Applications that are mailed must be postmarked no later than the Friday nearest October 29. Applications that are delivered must be delivered no later than 4:30 p.m. on the Friday nearest October 29.

(5) The possession tag application stub will be completed by the Department of Natural Resources and returned to the applicant. This stub is a part of the trapper's licensing to take fisher, otter, and pine marten and must be in the trapper's possession while taking or transporting these species. This stub must be presented on request of any Department of Natural Resources enforcement officer.

(b) *Possession Tagging.* Any possession tag or seal required by this order to be affixed to a pelt at the time and place where taken must be fastened through the mouth and one eye opening. Any seal furnished by the commissioner must be affixed so that such seal cannot be removed without breaking the lock.

(c) *Registration.* The pelt of each bobcat, fisher, pine marten, and otter and the whole carcass of each bobcat and pine marten must be presented, by the person taking it, to a conservation officer for registration before the pelt is sold and before the pelt is transported out of the state, but in no event more than 48 hours after the season closes. The entire carcass of bobcat and pine marten and the lower jaw or head of fisher must be surrendered to the conservation officer. The pelt of bobcat, fisher, and pine marten must have been removed from the carcass.

(d) No person may affix any tag, seal, or label required by this order to the pelt or carcass of any animal which he or she did not take.

(e) Any possession and registration tags or seals required by this order must remain affixed to the raw pelt until the pelt is tanned or mounted.

Sec. 12. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

(a) *Possession of Live Animals Prohibited.* All animals taken pursuant to this order must be killed before being removed from the site where taken.

(b) *Accidental Captures - Possession and Transport.*

(1) No person may possess or transport a fisher, otter, pine marten, fox, bobcat, lynx, or timber wolf which was accidentally killed or was lawfully killed while causing or threatening injury or damage until such person notifies the local conservation officer, other authorized department employee, or regional enforcement office, of the killing and receives authorization to possess, transport, or pelt the animal.

(2) A person may possess or transport mink, muskrat, beaver, badger, opossum, or raccoon accidentally killed or lawfully killed while causing or threatening injury or damage only if the local conservation officer or other authorized employee of the department is notified within 24 hours of such killing and before any pelting is begun.

(3) Regulations governing payment of pelting fees are set forth in Commissioner's Order No. 2117 or superseding orders.

(c) *Electronic Devices.* No person shall use any unattended electronic device for the purpose of taking wild animals.

(d) *Handguns.* Except as provided in Sec. 10(c), all species of small game which may lawfully be taken with a rifle may also be taken with a handgun, subject to the same caliber restrictions that apply to rifles.

(e) *Red/Orange Requirement.* A person may not hunt or trap during the open season in a zone or area where deer may be taken by firearms, unless the visible portion of the person's cap and outer clothing above the waist, excluding sleeves and gloves, is bright red or blaze orange. Blaze orange includes a camouflage pattern of at least 50 percent blaze orange within each foot square.

(f) None of the provisions of this order shall be construed as modifying or superseding any order establishing game refuges within the state nor as permitting the taking of any wild animals within such refuges or within state parks.

Commissioners' Orders

(g) This order shall not be construed to limit the number of any furbearing animals that may lawfully be possessed, transported, or sold by any licensed fur dealer.

(h) This order shall remain in effect until amended, superseded or rescinded.

Sec. 13. Commissioner's Order No. 2390 is hereby superseded.

Commissioner's Order No. 2421: Regulations for the Taking of Certain Upland Game; Superseding Commissioner's Order No. 2319

PURSUANT TO AUTHORITY vested in me by law, I, Rodney W. Sando, Commissioner of Natural Resources, hereby prescribe the following regulations for the taking of upland game birds, rabbits, hares, and squirrels, and for the taking of non-migratory small game by falconry.

Section 1. RUFFED GROUSE AND CANADA SPRUCE GROUSE.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Ruffed grouse and Canada spruce grouse may be taken from the Saturday nearest September 16 to December 31, both dates inclusive, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than an aggregate of five ruffed grouse and Canada spruce grouse per day nor have in possession an aggregate of more than 10 ruffed grouse and Canada spruce grouse at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide.

Sec. 2. WHITEBREASTED (SHARP-TAILED) GROUSE.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Whitebreasted (sharp-tailed) grouse may be taken from the Saturday nearest September 16 to November 30, both dates inclusive, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than three whitebreasted (sharp-tailed) grouse per day nor have in possession more than six whitebreasted (sharp-tailed) grouse at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide except in that portion of the state lying within the following described boundary:

Beginning on U.S. Highway 2 at the west boundary of the state; thence along U.S. Highway 2 to Cass Lake; thence along State Trunk Highway (STH) 371 to Little Falls; thence along STH 27 to the west boundary of the state; thence along the west boundary of the state to the point of beginning.

Sec. 3. PHEASANTS.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Cock pheasants only may be taken from the Saturday nearest October 15 to the Sunday nearest December 11, both dates inclusive, from 9 a.m. to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than two cock pheasants per day nor have in possession more than six cock pheasants at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide.

(d) *Pheasant stamp required.* No person who is otherwise required to possess a Minnesota small game license shall hunt or take pheasants within this state without first purchasing a pheasant stamp and having the stamp in possession while hunting or taking pheasants, except for: (1) residents under the age of 18 years or over the age of 65 years; or (2) persons hunting only on licensed commercial shooting preserves. Each stamp shall be validated by the signature of the licensee written across its face.

(e) *Rifle restriction.* No person shall take pheasants with a rifle or handgun other than a .22 caliber rimfire using short, long, or long rifle ammunition.

Sec. 4. HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Hungarian partridge may be taken from the Saturday nearest September 16 to December 31, both dates inclusive, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than five Hungarian partridge per day nor have in possession more than 10 Hungarian partridge at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide.

(d) *Rifle restriction.* No person shall take Hungarian partridge with a rifle or handgun other than a .22 caliber rimfire using short, long, or long rifle ammunition.

Sec. 5. JACK RABBITS, COTTONTAIL RABBITS, AND SNOWSHOE HARES.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Jack rabbits, cottontail rabbits, and snowshoe hares may be taken from the Saturday nearest September 16 to the last day in February, both dates inclusive, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than 10 cottontail rabbits per day nor have in possession more than 20 cottontail rabbits at any time. No person shall take more than 20 jack rabbits and 20 snowshoe hares per day nor have in possession more than 20 jack rabbits and 20 snowshoe hares at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide.

Sec. 6. GRAY SQUIRRELS AND FOX SQUIRRELS.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Gray squirrels and fox squirrels may be taken from the Saturday nearest September 16 to the last day in February, both dates inclusive, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than an aggregate of seven gray squirrels and fox squirrels per day nor have in possession more than an aggregate of 14 gray squirrels and fox squirrels at any time.

(c) *Open area.* Statewide.

Sec. 7. FALCONRY.

(a) *Season dates and hours.* Notwithstanding the seasons, bag limits, or zones established by any other section of this order, non-migratory small game may be taken by falconry from September 1 to the last day in February, both dates inclusive. Hawking hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day except pheasants may not be taken before 9 a.m. each day.

(b) *Bag limits.* No person shall take more than three animals per day in the aggregate nor have in possession more than six animals in the aggregate, except no more than one hen pheasant may be taken daily and no more than two hen pheasants may be in possession at any time. No falconer who also hunts with firearms or bow and arrow shall exceed the daily and possession limits established by statute for any species.

(c) *Firearms and bows and arrows.* No person shall hunt by falconry while in possession of, or having under control, any firearm or bow and arrow.

(d) *Open area.* Statewide.

Sec. 8. No person shall have in possession on the opening day of each of the above established seasons more than a single daily limit. Thereafter the possession limits shall apply.

Sec. 9. All species of small game which may lawfully be taken with a rifle may also be taken with a handgun, subject to the same caliber restrictions that apply to rifles.

Sec. 10. No person shall use any unattended electronic device for the purpose or intent of taking wild animals.

Sec. 11. All animals taken pursuant to this order must be killed before being removed from the site where taken.

Sec. 12. At all times until delivery to the taker's residence or a commercial processing facility, upland game birds must be transported in an undressed condition. An undressed game bird is a bird, excluding migratory waterfowl, with feet and feathered head intact.

Sec. 13. None of the provisions of this order shall be construed as modifying or superseding any order establishing game refuges within the state nor as permitting the taking of any wild animals within such refuges or within state parks.

Sec. 14. This order shall remain in effect until amended, superseded, or rescinded.

Sec. 15. Commissioner's Order No. 2319 is hereby superseded.

Executive Order 91-17: Providing for the Implementation of Pollution Prevention by State Government

I, ARNE H. CARLSON, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the applicable statutes, do hereby issue this Executive Order:

WHEREAS, Minnesota state agencies release pollution into the environment through their operations, regulate activities in the state that release pollution, and purchase items and set specifications that may lead to the release of pollution; and

WHEREAS, pollution prevention reduces pollution at its source rather than treating or controlling pollution after it has been created; and

WHEREAS, pollution prevention often results in cost savings and increased efficiencies as well as enhanced environmental protection; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Toxic Pollution Prevention Act, *Minnesota Statutes*, Chapter 115D, specifies that it is the policy of the state to encourage pollution prevention; and

WHEREAS, there is considerable potential for pollution prevention in state government;

NOW, THEREFORE, I hereby order state departments and agencies to take additional steps to prevent pollution:

1. All departments and agencies of the State of Minnesota shall give priority to preventing pollution at its source of generation.

2. An Interagency Pollution Prevention Advisory Team shall be established to:

- (a) promote regular communication and cooperation between state agencies in preventing pollution;
- (b) provide guidelines for state agencies in meeting the requirements of (4) through (6) below;
- (c) review state agency progress reports;
- (d) serve as a clearinghouse of information on progress made by state agencies in preventing pollution;
- (e) encourage the implementation of pilot projects in which state government can serve as a model;
- (f) promote efficiency in governmental efforts by reducing overlap of activities and by encouraging the sharing of innovative ideas; and
- (g) make recommendations for enhancing pollution prevention in state government.

3. The Interagency Pollution Prevention Advisory Team shall be chaired by a representative of the Office of Waste Management. All state agencies shall cooperate with the team in the execution of this order. The team shall include but not be limited to representatives of the departments of Administration, Agriculture, Corrections, Health, Human Services, Military Affairs, Natural Resources, Public Safety, Public Service, Transportation, Pollution Control Agency, Office of Strategic and Long-Range Planning, Community College System, State University System, Technical College System, University of Minnesota, Metropolitan Airports Commission, Metropolitan Council, Metropolitan Mosquito Control Commission, Metropolitan Transit Commission, and Metropolitan Waste Control Commission. The team shall meet regularly.

4. Heads of state agencies that generate significant quantities of hazardous waste or use significant quantities of toxic chemicals shall develop policy statements indicating that pollution prevention is a priority. These agencies shall also undertake activities to reduce their generation of hazardous waste and use of toxic chemicals.

5. Heads of state agencies that regulate activities in the state which generate significant quantities of hazardous waste or use significant quantities of toxic chemicals, or whose policies have important effects upon such activities, shall develop policy statements indicating that pollution is a priority. These agencies shall also undertake efforts to integrate pollution prevention into their regulatory and policy activities.

6. State agencies, subject to (4) and (5) above, shall prepare summary reports annually on their progress in preventing pollution with the first reports to be completed by July 1, 1992. At a minimum, these reports shall include a description of steps taken to integrate pollution prevention into agency activities, a summary of plans for future activities to prevent pollution, and an estimate of environmental and economic benefits, when applicable, which have resulted from preventing pollution.

7. State agencies whose purchasing policies or specifications result in the generation of significant quantities of hazardous waste or the use of significant quantities of toxic chemicals shall, in cooperation with the Department of Administration, investigate opportunities to encourage pollution prevention through their purchasing policies and specifications.

8. Information on progress of state agencies in preventing pollution shall be included in the Pollution Prevention Evaluation Report to the Legislature required by Section 115D.10 of the Minnesota Toxic Pollution Prevention Act.

9. State agencies are encouraged to apply for the annual Governor's Award for Excellence in Pollution Prevention, as authorized by Section 115D.06 of the Minnesota Toxic Pollution Prevention Act. A special award category for excellence in pollution prevention shall be established for state agencies.

10. The Office of Waste Management shall provide technical assistance to state agencies in the implementation of this order.

Pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes* 1990, Section 4.035, subd. 2, this Order shall be effective fifteen (15) days after publication in the *State Register* and filing with the Secretary of State and shall remain in effect until rescinded by proper authority or it expires in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes* 1990, Section 4.035, subd. 3.

Executive Order 91-18: Creating a Governor's Policy for Interstate Cooperation on Waste Management

I, ARNE H. CARLSON, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the applicable statutes, do hereby issue this Executive Order:

WHEREAS, interstate cooperation on waste management is essential to protecting the environment of Minnesota and the entire country; and

WHEREAS, the policies and procedures for waste management in neighboring states may affect Minnesota and vice-versa; and

WHEREAS, it is advantageous for the State to receive early notification and the opportunity to comment on neighboring states' decisions regarding waste management that may effect Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, it is also incumbent upon the State of Minnesota to provide neighboring states who may be affected by our decisions regarding waste management with the opportunity to provide us with their comments on impending state decisions; and

WHEREAS, the sharing of information will serve to protect the environment of Minnesota and the entire country;

NOW, THEREFORE, I hereby order that agencies in the state that are responsible for waste management shall cooperate with the Western Governors' Association, its member states, and other states on interstate waste management issues. Minnesota's cooperation shall be achieved by the following actions:

1. Dottie Rietow is named as Minnesota's contact for the Western Governors' Association's Waste Impact Network. Ms. Rietow's name will be forwarded to the Western Governors' Association along with a copy of this Executive Order.


2. The attached Regional Waste Protocol, which has been signed by my hand, will be distributed to staff of the state's agencies handling waste management issues.

3. State agencies and personnel will regularly review pending state decisions regarding waste management for their potential affect on other states as outlined in Principle 2 of the Regional Waste Protocol. When potential affects on other states are identified, agency staff will notify the state's contact named above. It is then the contact's responsibility to inform the Western Governors' Association of the potential affect.

4. Minnesota's contact person must ensure that all relevant state agencies are notified when she is informed of other state's waste actions which might affect the state.

Executive Order 91-19: Providing for the Establishment of a Governor's Council on Geographic Information

I, ARNE H. CARLSON, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the applicable statutes, do hereby issue this Executive Order:

WHEREAS, the management of geographic information about the character and location of the state's natural and cultural resources, and the human and economic activities that affect and are affected by those resources, is essential to all levels of government, state, local, and federal, in the State of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to coordinate the various activities in geographic information systems (GIS) and land information systems (LIS) in order to better exchange and share information and to enhance the stewardship of geographic information in the management of public resources; and

WHEREAS, the current Minnesota GIS/LIS Consortium, a volunteer organization, has been engaged in a variety of educational, communications, and information sharing activities but lacks explicit authority to recommend standards, policies, and guidelines; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to recommend standards, policies, and guidelines to the Information Policy Office and other units of government for developing and sharing geographic information; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to avoid duplication of effort so as to reduce the costs that would otherwise be involved if each organization developed its own GIS capabilities independently; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to establish a formal forum in order to discuss, debate, and decide issues related to geographic information; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to prioritize and schedule the development of public-funded data programs, define the roles and responsibilities for data stewardship, and formulate the policies for the access, distribution, and pricing of data; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to initiate a geographic information clearinghouse in order to consolidate data into libraries, integrate data into common formats, and distribute data to users; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to provide organizational structure, financial support, and personnel direction to a statewide approach for developing and managing geographic information; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to provide education, training, and support for users of geographic information toward their better management of public resources;

NOW, THEREFORE, I hereby order that:

1. The Governor's Council on Geographic Information (hereinafter referred to as Council) shall be formally established.
2. The Council shall be appointed by the Commissioner of Administration who shall solicit nominations from the Minnesota GIS/LIS Consortium and other interested groups, and shall be composed of not more than 15 members with knowledge and interest in the GIS field representing state government, higher education, local government, federal government, and GIS user(s) in the private sector. The Council shall elect a chair.
3. The Council shall formulate and adopt a charter for its own operation and the formation of topical advisory committees.
4. The Council shall receive administrative staff support from the Information Policy Office, technical staff support from the Land Management Information Center, and advice from the Minnesota GIS/LIS Consortium.
5. The Council's first annual report on June 30, 1992 shall include recommendations for legislation to establish a permanent organization to supersede this Council and recommendations for addressing the needs described in this executive order.
6. Until such time that a permanent organization is established to supersede this Council, it shall prepare an annual report by June 30th of each year for the Governor, to be submitted through the Commissioner of Administration, describing accomplishments from the previous year and plans and recommendations for the future.
