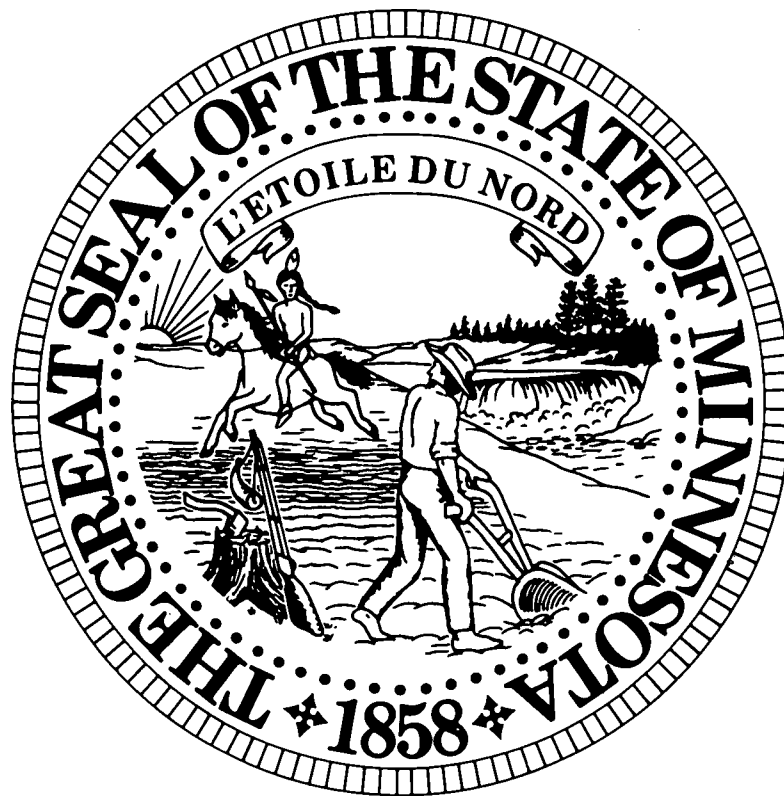

The Thursday edition contains additional state contracts and advertised bids, and the most complete listing of contract awards available in one source.

In accordance with expressed legislative intent that the *State Register* be self-supporting, the following subscription rates have been established: the Monday edition costs \$150.00 per year and includes an index issue published in August (single issues are available at the address listed above for \$3.50 per copy); the combined Monday and Thursday editions cost \$195.00 (subscriptions are not available for just the *Contracts Supplement*); trial subscriptions are available for \$60.00, include both the Monday and Thursday edition, last for 13 weeks, and may be converted to a full subscription anytime by making up the price difference. 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NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the *State Register*

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific *Minnesota Rule* chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the *Minnesota Rules* are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. 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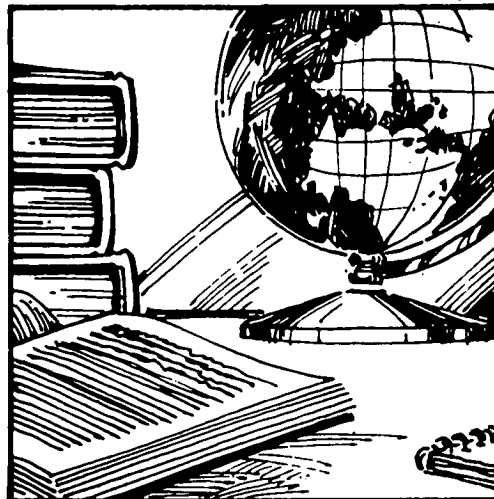

Proposed Rules

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§ 14.22, an agency may propose to adopt, amend, suspend or repeal rules without first holding a public hearing, as long as the agency determines that the rules will be noncontroversial in nature. The agency must first publish a notice of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing, together with the proposed rules, in the *State Register*. The notice must advise the public:

1. that they have 30 days in which to submit comment on the proposed rules;
2. that no public hearing will be held unless 25 or more persons make a written request for a hearing within the 30-day comment period;
3. of the manner in which persons shall request a hearing on the proposed rules; and
4. that the rule may be modified if the modifications are supported by the data and views submitted.

If, during the 30-day comment period, 25 or more persons submit to the agency a written request for a hearing of the proposed rules, the agency must proceed under the provisions of §§ 14.14-14.20, which state that if an agency decides to hold a public hearing, it must publish a notice of intent in the *State Register*.

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§ 14.29 and 14.30, agencies may propose emergency rules under certain circumstances. Proposed emergency rules are published in the *State Register* and, for at least 25 days thereafter, interested persons may submit data and views in writing to the proposing agency.

Proposed Permanent Rules Relating to Nonferrous Metallic Mineral Mineland Reclamation

Notice of Intent to Adopt a Rule With a Public Hearing

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Department of Natural Resources intends to adopt the above-entitled rule, with a public hearing in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes*, Chapter 14, the Administrative Procedure Act. The hearing will be held as follows:

All interested or affected persons will have an opportunity to participate, through direct testimony at the hearing, or by written comment directed to the Administrative Law Judge presiding over the administrative hearing.

The proposed rules will direct and regulate the extent of reclamation that will be required of the operators of metal mines, where the metals mined are those other than iron ore and taconite. Currently in Minnesota the only metal mines that are active, or that have been proposed, are those for iron ore and taconite. These are currently regulated by existing reclamation regulations that will not be changed as a result of the proposed rules. The proposed rules will deal with all the major aspects of mining including: planning and siting; construction and operation; and closure, deactivation, reclamation, and any necessary post closure maintenance that the mine site may require. Statutory authority for the adoption of the rules is *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 through 93.51, and for mining operations that impact wetlands; *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222.

The proposed rule may be modified as a result of the hearing process, based on testimony presented at the public hearing, or by testimony presented in writing to the Administrative Law Judge during the period that the record of hearing is held open. The department intends to provide additional public notice relating to:

- (1) the availability of the rules and the statement of need and reasonableness; and
- (2) the public hearings that will be conducted.

Notices will be placed in the State Planning Agency's publication, the EQB Monitor, and in a publication with national distribution, called Skilling's Mining Review, a trade publication of the mineral industry. In addition, the Department will place a summary of the proposed rules, and a notice of the hearing, in its DNR—news release document. The information will be distributed by fax and mail to every news outlet in Minnesota. Publication in local newspapers, or presentation via the electronic media, is enhanced as a result of the department's news release procedure, but is not assured. Actual publication or presentation is dependent on how noteworthy each news outlet finds the information to be.

Minnesota Statutes, chapter 10A, requires each lobbyist to register with the state Ethical Practices Board within five days after he or she commences lobbying. A lobbyist is defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 10A.01, subdivision 11 as any individual:

(1) engaged for pay or other consideration, or authorized by another individual or association to spend money, who spends more than five hours in any month or more than \$250, not including travel expenses and membership dues, in any year, for the purpose of attempting to influence legislative or administrative action by communicating or urging others to communicate with public officials; or

(2) who spends more than \$250, not including traveling expenses and membership dues, in any year for the purpose of attempting to influence legislative or administration action by communicating or urging others to communicate with public officials.

The statute provides certain exceptions. Questions should be directed to the Ethical Practices Board, 1st Floor, Centennial Office Building, 658 Cedar St., Saint Paul, Minnesota 55155, telephone: (612) 296-5148.

Written material may be submitted and recorded in the hearing record for five working days after the public hearing ends. The comment period may be extended for a longer period not to exceed 20 calendar days if ordered by the administrative law judge at the hearing. The comments received during the comment period shall be available for review at the office of administrative hearings. The Department of Natural Resources and interested parties may respond in writing within five business days after the submission period ends to any new information submitted. No additional evidence may be submitted during the five-day period.

NOTICE: Any person may request notification of the date on which the administrative law judge's report will be available, after which date the agency may not take any final action on the rules for a period of five working days. If you desire to be so notified, you may so indicate at the hearing. After the hearing, you may request notification by sending a written request notification of the date on which the rules were adopted and filed with the secretary of state. The notice must be mailed on the same day that the rules are filed. If you want to be so notified you may so indicate at the hearing or send a request in writing to the Department of Natural Resources at any time prior to the filing of the rules with the secretary of state.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a **STATEMENT OF NEED AND REASONABLENESS** is now available for review at the Department of Natural Resources and at the Office of Administrative Hearings. This statement of need and reasonableness includes a summary of all the evidence and argument which the agency anticipates presenting at the hearing justifying both the need for and the reasonableness of the proposed rules. Copies of the statement of need and reasonableness may be reviewed at the Department of Natural Resources or the Office of Administrative Hearings and copies may be obtained from the Office of Administrative Hearing at the cost of reproduction.

Adoption of the proposed rule is not anticipated to result in the significant expenditure of public money by local public bodies. The rules do establish the requirement that a public information meeting be held shortly after a potential mine operator decides to proceed with an application for a permit to mine. This meeting requirement does include the voluntary involvement of the local governmental units, whose involvement may merely extend to supplying a place to conduct the meeting and having local officials available to express local concerns. If a mining operation is ultimately conducted, the local involvement, associated with planning and zoning decisions that are currently the obligations of local public bodies, might be extensive. However, such obligations, and associated expenses, would not be a direct result of the adoption of the proposed reclamation rules.

The Department of Natural Resources has determined that complying with the provisions of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.115, relating to methods for reducing the impact of the rule on small businesses, would be contrary to the statutory objectives that are the basis for the proposed rulemaking. Based on site visits, conducted by the department, to nonferrous metallic mining operations located outside Minnesota, and discussions with regulators in other states and Canada, the Department has determined that the potential for environmental concern is independent of the size of the business conducting the mining operation. Regulators from other states have reported numerous environmental problems at small, often under-capitalized, mining operations. If such situations were to occur in Minnesota, the intent of the reclamation statute, that requires the maintenance of satisfactory environmental control, could be defeated if the rules incorporated provisions that would lessen the requirements for mining operations conducted by small businesses.

Adoption of the proposed rule is not anticipated to have a direct and substantial adverse impact on agricultural lands in Minnesota.

The rule hearing procedure is governed by *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.14 to 14.20 and by parts 1400.0200 to 1400.1200 of *Minnesota Rules*, and any questions about procedure may be directed to the administrative law judge. The administrative law judge conducting the hearing will be:

Proposed Rules

Rules as Proposed (all new material)

GENERAL PROVISIONS

6132.0100 DEFINITIONS.

Subpart 1. **Scope.** The terms in parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 have the meanings given them in this part.

Subp. 2. **Acceptable research.** "Acceptable research" means research approved by the commissioner that is site-related and is reasonably designed for the purpose of demonstrating that reclamation can be achieved by alternative methods.

Subp. 3. **Adversely impact natural resources.** "Adversely impact natural resources" means an unacceptable level of impact on the natural resources as determined by the commissioner based on an evaluation which considers the value of the resource and the degree of impact.

Subp. 4. **Auxiliary facilities.** "Auxiliary facilities" means all permittee-owned stationary physical property used in a mining operation, including but not limited to: power plants and associated facilities; transmission lines; pipelines; roads; railroads; docks and associated facilities; borrow areas and leased borrow areas and associated facilities; blasting agent and fuel production or preparation facilities; and parking areas, shops, offices, buildings, structures, and storage facilities located within the area where mining is conducted. This does not include common carrier transportation facilities.

Subp. 5. **Beneficiating plants.** "Beneficiating plants" means all metallic mineral processing plants, such as crushers, mills, concentrators, agglomerating facilities, smelters, refineries, and other metal-producing facilities.

Subp. 6. **Closure.** "Closure" means the process of terminating and completing final steps in reclaiming any specific portion of a mining operation. Closure begins when, as prescribed in the permit to mine, there will be no renewed use or activity by the permittee.

Subp. 7. **Commissioner.** "Commissioner" means the commissioner of natural resources, or the commissioner's designated representative.

Subp. 8. **Goals.** "Goals" means reclamation targets of achievement toward which the specific requirements of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 are directed.

Subp. 9. **Heap and dump leaching.** "Heap and dump leaching" means a hydrometallurgical process that extracts metals from broken rock piles, called heaps or dumps, by application of leaching solutions.

Subp. 10. **Heap and dump leaching facilities.** "Heap and dump leaching facilities" means all land forms, structures, equipment, and material that contact, process, contain, collect, or confine leaching solutions associated with the hydrometallurgical processing of heaps and dumps.

Subp. 11. **In-situ leaching.** "In-situ leaching" means a hydrometallurgical process that extracts metals from rock formations that have not been removed from the ground, using leaching solutions that are applied to and collected from wells or mine workings that have been developed within the metal-bearing rock formations.

Subp. 12. **Leached ore.** "Leached ore" means the rock mass that remains after metals have been removed by heap and dump leaching.

Subp. 13. **Leaching solutions.** "Leaching solutions" means hydrometallurgical processing fluids that extract metals from mineralized rock.

Subp. 14. **Lean ore.** "Lean ore" means rock containing metallic mineralization that is not profitable to process using technologies that exist at the mining operation.

Subp. 15. **Metallic mineral.** "Metallic mineral" means a naturally formed chemical, element, or compound having a definite chemical composition and, usually, a characteristic crystal form, from which a metal, metals, or metal oxides can be extracted by metallurgical processes.

Subp. 16. **Mine waste.** "Mine waste" means a material, such as surface overburden, rock, lean ore, leached ore, or tailings that in the process of mining and beneficiation has been exposed or removed from the earth.

Subp. 17. **Minimize to the extent practicable.** "Minimize to the extent practicable" means minimize through application of technologies and practices including methods, specifications, guidelines, standards, and engineering safety factors, developed for and commonly used in mining or in reasonably similar activities. These technologies and practices shall be determined by the commissioner, based on problem assessment, examination of alternative practices, and input from appropriate regulatory authorities, to be the most effective and workable means of achieving reclamation, including being technologically, economically, and practically applicable.

Subp. 18. **Mining.** "Mining" means the process of removing; stockpiling; processing; storing; transporting, excluding use of common carriers and public transportation systems; and reclaiming a material in connection with the commercial production of metallic minerals.

Subp. 19. **Mining area or area subjected to mining.** "Mining area" or "area subjected to mining" means an area of land from

which material is removed in connection with the production or extraction of metallic minerals; the lands on which material from the mining is deposited; the lands on which beneficiating plants, heap and dump leaching facilities, and auxiliary facilities are located; lands on which the water reservoirs used in the mining process are located; and auxiliary lands that are used or intended to be used in a particular mining operation.

Subp. 20. **Mining operation.** "Mining operation" means all of a mining project without regard to political, administrative, or ownership boundaries, which includes all of the facilities used in mining as defined in subpart 18.

Subp. 21. **Natural resources.** "Natural resources" means all mineral, animal, botanical, air, water, land, timber, soil, quietude, recreational, historical, scenic, and aesthetic resources in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes*, section 116B.02, subdivision 4.

Subp. 22. **Nonferrous metallic mineral.** "Nonferrous metallic mineral" means a metallic mineral from which iron is not the predominant metal extracted.

Subp. 23. **Passive reclamation methods.** "Passive reclamation methods" means techniques or practices that require minimal maintenance to sustain reclamation.

Subp. 24. **Permit to mine.** "Permit to mine" means legal approval issued by the commissioner to conduct a mining operation.

Subp. 25. **Person.** "Person" means a firm, partnership, corporation, joint venture, or other legal entity.

Subp. 26. **Postclosure maintenance.** "Postclosure maintenance" means an activity that may be required to sustain reclamation after cessation of a mining operation.

Subp. 27. **Progressive reclamation.** "Progressive reclamation" means mining in a manner that creates areas that can be reclaimed as soon after initiation of the operation as practical and as continuously as practical throughout the life of the operation.

Subp. 28. **Reactive mine waste.** "Reactive mine waste" means waste that is shown through characterization studies to release substances that adversely impact natural resources.

Subp. 29. **Reclamation.** "Reclamation" means the activities that successfully accomplish the requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200.

Subp. 30. **Reference area.** "Reference area" means a vegetated land unit approved by the commissioner for comparatively measuring reclamation vegetation success.

Subp. 31. **Storage pile.** "Storage pile" means a land form used for the disposal of material generated during mining, such as surface overburden, rock, lean ore, and leached ore. It does not include tailings basins, fossil fuel, finished product, or surge piles.

Subp. 32. **Surface overburden.** "Surface overburden" means naturally occurring unconsolidated material overlying bedrock, consisting of broken rock fragments or organic material.

Subp. 33. **Tailings.** "Tailings" means waste by-products of mineral beneficiating processes other than heap and dump leaching, consisting of rock particles, which have usually undergone crushing and grinding, from which the profitable mineralization has been separated.

Subp. 34. **Waste rock.** "Waste rock" means rock that may or may not contain metallic mineralization, but that is in either case not profitable to process using known technologies.

6132.0200 PURPOSE AND POLICY.

The purpose of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 is to implement *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, to control possible adverse environmental effects of nonferrous metallic mineral mining, to preserve natural resources, and to encourage planning of future land utilization, while at the same time promoting orderly development of nonferrous metallic mineral mining, encouragement of good mining practices, and recognition and identification of the beneficial aspects of nonferrous metallic mineral mining.

To accomplish the purposes of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, it is the policy of the Department of Natural Resources that mining be conducted in a manner that will reduce impacts to the extent practicable, mitigate unavoidable impacts, and ensure that the mining area is left in a condition that protects natural resources and minimizes to the extent practicable the need for maintenance. This shall be accomplished according to parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 through the use of mining, mine waste management, and passive reclamation methods that maximize physical, chemical, and biological stabilization of areas disturbed by mining, as opposed to the use of ongoing active treatment technologies. The department recognizes that in some cases passive treatment alone will not entirely

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meet all reclamation goals. In these cases, active treatment technologies may be necessary and provisions for continued maintenance of the treatments will be required.

Because of the unique character of each mining operation and the extreme diversity of the possible types and sizes of operations, specific permit requirements shall be established within the framework established by parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300. Permit terms and conditions shall be directed toward attaining the goals while fulfilling the requirements described in parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300.

6132.0300 SCOPE.

Subpart 1. **Permit required.** No person shall conduct a mining operation for nonferrous metallic minerals in this state without first obtaining a permit to mine from the commissioner. For the purpose of this subpart, a person must possess adequate capital and provide financial and operational decision making necessary to conduct the mining operation.

Subp. 2. **Joint applications.** When two or more persons are or will be engaged in a mining operation, all persons shall join in the application, and the permit to mine shall be issued jointly.

Subp. 3. **Term of permit to mine.** The term of a permit to mine shall be the period determined necessary by the commissioner for the completion of the proposed mining operation including postclosure maintenance, based on information provided under part 6132.1100.

Subp. 4. **Applicability.** Parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 apply to nonferrous metallic mineral mining operations, except where iron is the predominant metal extracted, as follows:

A. to all portions of a mining operation initiated after the effective date of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, including new operations and reactivated inactive operations; and

B. until adequate studies are completed to determine the extent to which regulation may be necessary and rules are adopted, no permit to mine shall be issued under parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 to a mining operation that includes:

(1) the mining of radioactive ores for the commercial production of uranium, thorium, or any other material that is determined by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to be essential to the production of fissionable materials; or

(2) in-situ leaching as part of the beneficiating process.

Subp. 5. **Other rules, statutes, or ordinances.** Nothing in parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 waives the requirements of other applicable rules, statutes, or ordinances of a state or federal agency or political subdivision.

PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

6132.1000 MINE WASTE CHARACTERIZATION.

Subpart 1. **Mine waste characterization conference.** Persons intending to submit an application for a permit to mine shall meet with the commissioner to outline chemical and mineralogical analyses and laboratory tests to be conducted for mine waste characterization. This characterization will be used by the commissioner in the evaluation of the applicant's mining and reclamation plan.

Subp. 2. **Mine waste characterization.** Mine waste characterization shall be conducted by an independent party with demonstrated proficiency in such analysis and approved by the commissioner. The characterization shall be based on chemical, physical, and mineralogical analyses and laboratory tests of material generated by exploration, preproduction sampling, and process testing.

A. The mine waste characterization shall include:

(1) chemical analysis of mine waste;

(2) mineralogical and petrological analysis of mine waste; and

(3) laboratory tests describing acid generation and dissolved solids release from mine waste.

B. For reagents associated with tailings or leached ore materials, the following information shall be provided:

(1) chemical composition;

(2) mass of chemical used;

(3) degradation and transport characteristics; and

(4) effects on mineral dissolution as measured in item A, subitem (3), or item C, subitem (3).

C. Based on the results of the analyses and tests of items A and B, the commissioner may require additional mine waste characterization including, but not limited to, the following:

(1) particle size distribution;

(2) chemical composition, mineralogical composition, and specific surface area as a function of particle size; and

(3) laboratory dissolution tests to describe the effect of rock composition, in particular, acid-producing and acid-consuming mineral content, on acid generation and dissolved solids release.

Subp. 3. **Results of characterization.** The results of the mine waste characterization shall be submitted as follows:

A. to the commissioner as a part of the permit to mine at the following times:

(1) on submission of an application for a permit to mine under part 6132.1100, subpart 6, item B, subitem (1); and

(2) throughout the life of the operation as part of the annual report under part 6132.1300, subpart 2, item E; and

B. to regulatory agencies establishing water quality and compliance monitoring standards.

6132.1100 PERMIT APPLICATIONS.

Subpart 1. **Preapplication conferences and site visits.** Before the preparation of an application for a permit to mine, persons intending to submit an application shall meet with the commissioner for a preapplication conference and site visit. The purpose is to review the proposed mining operation and to provide direction on the preparation of an application for a permit to mine. In conjunction with the preapplication conference, the commissioner shall hold a public informational meeting with the assistance of the applicant and invite the participation of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, the Environmental Quality Board, and the local unit of government. A notice of the meeting shall be published once at least 30 days before the meeting as follows:

A. by the commissioner in the *State Register* and the EQB Monitor; and

B. by the applicant in a qualified newspaper under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 331A.02, that is circulated in the locality of the proposed operation.

Subp. 2. **Application.** An application for a permit to mine shall be submitted in duplicate by the applicant to the commissioner.

Subp. 3. **Documents.** To comply with statutory requirements, the applicant shall submit:

A. the advertisement and affidavit of publication according to parts 6132.4000, subpart 1, and 6132.4900;

B. a copy of the certificate of authority to transact business in Minnesota if the applicant is a foreign corporation as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 300.02 and 303.02;

C. a certificate issued by an insurance company authorized to do business in the United States under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.481, subdivision 1, clause (b), confirming that the applicant has a public liability insurance policy in force for the mining operation for which the permit is sought or evidence that the applicant has satisfied other state or federal self-insurance requirements, to provide personal injury and property damage protection in an amount adequate to compensate persons who might be damaged as a result of the mining operation or any reclamation or restoration connected with the operation; and

D. documents relating to financial assurance under part 6132.1200.

Subp. 4. **Organizational structure.** The applicant shall submit the following information on organizational structure:

A. the post office address of the applicant;

B. the organizational structure of the applicant including, but not limited to, parent companies, owners, principal stockholders, partners, and joint venturers;

C. managing agents or subsidiaries that are or may be involved in the mining operation; and

D. organizational relationships between or among joint applicants.

Subp. 5. **Environmental setting.** To describe the environmental setting of the proposed mining area, the applicant shall submit:

A. a copy of the draft environmental impact statement and all environmental reports prepared relative to the mining operation; and

B. environmental setting maps prepared as overlays to 7-1/2 minute United States Geological Survey quadrangle maps or other maps of the same scale delineating the mining area and adjacent lands as required by the commissioner to show the areas directly or indirectly affected by mining. The following information as it exists at the time of application shall be submitted on the overlays:

(1) bedrock geology, including the general shape of the ore body and appropriate cross sections that show the horizontal and vertical relationships;

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- (2) water basins, water courses, and wetlands that are or could be affected by mining;
- (3) boundaries of watersheds that are or could be affected by mining;
- (4) identification and description of hydrogeologic information including, but not limited to:
 - (a) plan view and cross section maps of overburden and rock features; and
 - (b) description of features on maps including, but not limited to, well locations, uses, well logs, pumping rates, and capacities;
- (5) surface water and groundwater compliance monitoring sites as well as water quality and toxicity standards established by other regulatory authorities;
- (6) a soil inventory including soil type, extent, and thickness;
- (7) recorded locations of rare, endangered, and threatened species;
- (8) past mining facilities including storage piles, tailings basins, mines, and beneficiating plants;
- (9) recorded archeological or historic sites;
- (10) all known surface and subsurface uses, such as pipelines and cables;
- (11) areas identified as sites under part 6132.2000;
- (12) zoning ordinances and associated land use plans applicable to the proposed mining area; and
- (13) surface and mineral rights ownership within the mining area based on information of record in the county recorder's office. An owner's agent may be identified in place of the owner.

Subp. 6. Mining and reclamation plan. The mining and reclamation plan shall be based on discussions between the applicant and the commissioner at the preapplication conference and on results from the mine waste characterization. The mining and reclamation plan shall describe:

- A. the operating life of the mine, including the rate of mining and anticipated changes in that rate;
- B. the mining activities to be conducted, including:
 - (1) the types, amounts, sequence, and schedule for mining the ore body and storage piling materials, including the distinctions among ore, lean ore, and waste rock; and
 - (2) the ore beneficiating process, including a discussion of the type and amount of chemicals to be added and the types, amounts, sequence, schedule, and means of tailings disposal;
- C. the engineering design, methods, sequence, and schedules of reclamation including closure and postclosure maintenance that address the goals and meet the requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200, including anticipated reclamation research; and
- D. the mine waste characterization.

Subp. 7. Mining and reclamation maps. The applicant shall submit maps and cross sections containing all features normally found on a United States Geological Survey quadrangle map, at a scale that is normally used by the operator for mine planning purposes, that:

- A. define the shape and extent of the ore body that will support the operating life of the mine;
- B. identify lands proposed for use as vegetative reference areas;
- C. show the detailed drainage patterns for waters that may contact reactive mine wastes; and
- D. show, at intervals during mining approved by the commissioner based on the preapplication conference, the status of:
 - (1) mining the ore body;
 - (2) watershed and hydrogeologic modifications; and
 - (3) construction, including shape, extent, and content, and reclamation, including contouring, covering, temporary stabilization, vegetation, closure, and postclosure maintenance, of each of the following: storage pile, tailings basin, mine, reservoir, dam, diversion channel, drainage control, settling basin, heap and dump leaching facility, and auxiliary facility.

Subp. 8. First year of operation. A detailed plan for the activities planned during the first year of operation shall be submitted as part of the permit application. The plan shall include all of the information required by part 6132.1300, subparts 3 to 6.

6132.1200 FINANCIAL ASSURANCE.

Subpart 1. Purpose. The purpose of financial assurance is to ensure that there is a source of funds to be used by the commissioner if the permittee fails to perform:

A. reclamation activities including closure and postclosure maintenance needed if operations cease; and

B. corrective action as required by the commissioner if noncompliance with design and operating criteria in the permit to mine occurs.

Subp. 2. **Contingency reclamation cost estimates.** Persons intending to conduct a mining operation shall submit, as part of the application for a permit to mine, a documented estimate of costs necessary to implement the contingency reclamation plan under part 6132.1300, subpart 4. This estimate shall include closure and postclosure maintenance activities required if operations cease within the first calendar year.

A. The permittee shall annually adjust the contingency reclamation cost estimate under part 6132.1300, subpart 4.

B. Cost estimates shall be based on the following:

(1) current dollar value at the time of the estimate; and

(2) the cost to the commissioner of administering and hiring a third party to implement the contingency reclamation plan.

C. No salvage value attributed to the sale of wastes, facility structures, equipment, land, or other assets shall be used for estimating purposes.

Subp. 3. **Corrective action cost estimates.** When the commissioner determines that a corrective action plan is required under part 6132.1300, subpart 2, item B, subitem (2), the permittee shall submit a documented estimate of costs to perform the corrective action before implementation.

A. The permittee shall annually adjust cost estimates for corrective action undertaken according to an approved corrective action plan under part 6132.1300, subpart 5.

B. Cost estimates shall be based on the following:

(1) current dollar value at the time of the estimate; and

(2) the cost to the commissioner of administering and hiring a third party to conduct corrective action activities.

Subp. 4. **Management of financial assurance.** Financial assurance shall be managed according to items A to H.

A. The commissioner shall evaluate all financial assurance cost estimates and adjustments to cost estimates using individuals with documented experience in material handling and construction and mining costs. Costs incurred by the commissioner in hiring third parties to perform the evaluation must be paid by the applicant.

B. Financial assurance in the amount equal to the contingency reclamation cost estimate under subpart 2 shall be:

(1) submitted to the commissioner for approval before issuance of a permit to mine and before granting an amendment to the permit;

(2) continuously maintained by the permittee; and

(3) annually adjusted as follows:

(a) if the new cost estimate approved by the commissioner is greater than the amount of the existing financial assurance, the permittee shall provide additional financial assurance in an amount equal to the increase; or

(b) if the new cost estimate approved by the commissioner is less than the amount of existing financial assurance, the permittee shall be released from maintaining financial assurance in an amount equal to the decrease.

C. Financial assurance in the amount equal to the corrective action cost estimate under subpart 3 shall be:

(1) submitted to the commissioner for approval as part of the corrective action cost estimate under subpart 3;

(2) continuously maintained by the permittee until the commissioner determines it is no longer necessary; and

(3) annually adjusted as follows:

(a) if the new cost estimate approved by the commissioner is greater than the amount of the existing financial assurance, the permittee shall provide additional financial assurance in an amount equal to the increase; or

(b) if the new cost estimate approved by the commissioner is less than the amount of existing financial assurance, the permittee shall be released from maintaining financial assurance in an amount equal to the decrease.

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D. Financial assurances may be canceled by the permittee, on approval by the commissioner, only after it is replaced by an alternate mechanism or after the permittee is released from financial assurance according to item H.

E. The permittee must ensure that the provider of financial assurance gives the commissioner 120 days' notice prior to cancellation of the financial assurance mechanism. Upon receipt of this notice, the commissioner shall initiate a proceeding to access the financial assurance according to part 6132.1300, subpart 6.

F. If the permit to mine is assigned under part 6132.4700, the new permittee must be in compliance with requirements of this part before the commissioner approves the assignment. On the assignee's demonstration of compliance with this part, the former permittee shall be released from the requirements of this part.

G. Financial assurance must meet the criteria of subpart 5.

H. The commissioner shall release the permittee from the responsibility to maintain financial assurance when the commissioner determines, through inspection of the mining area, that:

- (1) all reclamation activities have been completed according to this part and the permit to mine;
- (2) conditions necessitating postclosure maintenance no longer exist and are not likely to recur; and
- (3) corrective actions have been successfully accomplished.

Subp. 5. **Criteria for financial assurance.** Financial assurance for reclamation and for corrective action must meet the following criteria:

- A. assurance of funds sufficient to cover the costs estimated under subparts 2 and 3;
- B. assurance that the funds will be available and made payable to the commissioner when needed;
- C. assurance that the funds will be fully valid, binding, and enforceable under state and federal law;
- D. assurance that the funds will not be dischargeable through bankruptcy; and

E. all terms and conditions of the financial assurance must be approved by the commissioner. The commissioner, in evaluating financial assurance, shall use individuals with documented experience in the analysis. The reasonable cost of the evaluation shall be paid by the applicant.

Subp. 6. **Forfeiture of financial assurance.** Financial assurance must be made available to the commissioner under items A to C when the operator is not in compliance with either the contingency reclamation plan or the corrective action plan.

A. A proceeding to access financial assurance shall be commenced by:

- (1) serving an order to forfeit the financial assurance on the institution or trustee holding the financial assurance; and
- (2) serving a notice of measures required to correct the situation and the time available for correction on the permittee.

B. If conditions that provided grounds for the order are corrected within a period established by the commissioner and if measures approved by the commissioner are taken to ensure that the conditions do not recur, the proposed order shall be canceled.

C. If the conditions that provided grounds for the order are not corrected, the commissioner shall proceed with accessing and expending the funds provided by this part to implement the contingency reclamation or corrective action plans.

Subp. 7. **Failure to comply.** The commissioner may take one or more of the following actions if failure to comply with any portion of this part occurs:

- A. deny the permit to mine;
- B. suspend the permit to mine under part 6132.4500;
- C. assess civil penalties under part 6132.5100;
- D. revoke the permit to mine under part 6132.4600; or
- E. modify the permit to mine under part 6132.4300.

6132.1300 ANNUAL REPORT.

Subpart 1. **Purpose.** The purpose of the annual report is to describe actual mining and reclamation completed during the past year, the mining and reclamation activities planned for the upcoming year, and a contingency reclamation plan to be implemented if operations cease in the upcoming year. The permittee shall submit an annual report, in duplicate, to the commissioner by March 31 of each year.

Subp. 2. **Preceding calendar year.** For the preceding calendar year, the report must include:

A. a description of actual mining activities, including:

(1) the types, amounts, sequence, and schedule for mining the ore body and storage piling materials, including the distinction among ore, lean ore, and waste rock; and

(2) changes in the beneficiating process, including a discussion of the type and amount of chemicals added and their effect, if any, on the types, amount, and means of waste disposal;

B. a description of actual reclamation activities and corrective actions;

C. a description of the status of ongoing postclosure maintenance activities;

D. a discussion of items A to C differ in scope and schedule from the approved mining and reclamation plan under part 6132.1100, subpart 6;

E. a characterization of new rock types or formations encountered during mining that have not been previously characterized under part 6132.1000, subpart 2;

F. a discussion of changes in ownership or organizational structure of the permittee; and

G. a description of actual wetland replacement activities, in the manner prescribed by the monitoring section of the "Standards and Procedures for Evaluating Wetland Replacement Plans" pursuant to chapter 8410, wetland rules.

Subp. 3. Upcoming calendar year. For the upcoming calendar year, the report must include:

A. the anticipated rate of mining;

B. the anticipated mining activities, including:

(1) the types, amounts, sequence, and schedule for mining the ore body and storage piling materials, including the distinctions among ore, lean ore, and waste rock; and

(2) changes in the beneficiating process, including a discussion of the type and amount of chemicals to be added and their effect, if any, on the types, amount, and means of waste disposal;

C. the anticipated reclamation including methods, schedules, and research;

D. notification of intent to close a mining area or portion of an area;

E. a discussion of how anticipated activities will differ in scope and schedule from the approved mining and reclamation plan under part 6132.1100, subpart 6;

F. evidence that the liability insurance policy submitted with the permit application under part 6132.1100, subpart 3, item C, is in force, or that self-insurance requirements are being met;

G. a discussion of anticipated changes in ownership and organizational structure of the permittee; and

H. a wetland replacement plan approved pursuant to part 6132.5300.

Subp. 4. Contingency reclamation plan. A contingency reclamation plan including closure and postclosure maintenance shall be submitted with the annual report to identify reclamation activities that would be implemented by the permittee if operations cease in the upcoming calendar year. The plan shall include the following:

A. methods, sequence, and schedule of reclamation that address the goals and meet the requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200;

B. maps and cross sections at a scale approved by the commissioner that depict the construction, including shape, extent, and content, and reclamation, including contouring, covering, vegetation, closure, and postclosure maintenance, of each area affected by mining; and

C. cost estimates and financial mechanisms under part 6132.1200 necessary to implement the contingency reclamation plan if operations cease in the upcoming calendar year.

Subp. 5. Corrective action for upcoming calendar year. When a corrective action plan has been required under part 6132.3100, subpart 2, the report shall include:

A. a description of actual corrective action conducted in the preceding calendar year;

B. a description of anticipated corrective action for the upcoming calendar year; and

C. a corrective action cost estimate for the upcoming year under part 6132.1200, subpart 3.

Subp. 6. Maps. For the preceding and upcoming year, the report shall contain a map in the form prescribed by part 6132.1100,

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subpart 7, that shows the status of mining, construction, reclamation including closure and postclosure maintenance, and watershed modifications.

6132.1400 REQUEST FOR RELEASE FROM PERMIT.

Subpart 1. **Purpose.** The purpose of the request for release is to provide the commissioner with information on the final reclamation status of the mining area or a specific portion of the area. The request shall be submitted by the permittee when the permittee has concluded that all reclamation has been satisfactorily accomplished and that release from the permit or portion of it should be granted.

Subp. 2. **Contents.** The request for release shall include the following:

A. a declaration by the permittee of how each portion of the mining area for which a release is requested has been made to comply with the requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200 and the permit to mine;

B. identification of:

- (1) the ownership of the mining area;
- (2) all remaining structures and auxiliary facilities; and
- (3) all locations at which postclosure maintenance is necessary;

C. a discussion of all areas excluded from release because of the necessity of conducting postclosure maintenance under part 6132.3200, subpart 2, item E, subitem (7);

D. a copy of the record filed in the county recorder's office advising future owners of the mining area that it has been mined; and

E. a map in the form prescribed by part 6132.1100, subpart 7, which shows the following:

- (1) the location and status of all mining land forms and facilities created or used during the mining operation;
- (2) the areas for which release is being requested;
- (3) the areas on which postclosure maintenance is being conducted;
- (4) the final topography of all mining land forms;
- (5) the location, type, and extent of vegetation that has been established under part 6132.2800;
- (6) the existing and ultimate anticipated level of open pit and underground mine water, and the year in which the ultimate level is expected to be reached;
- (7) the locations of the safe accesses to the bottom of an open pit;
- (8) the location of all sealed access points to underground mine workings;
- (9) the location of fences and other access barriers; and
- (10) the location of areas prone to subsidence.

RECLAMATION STANDARDS

6132.2000 SITING.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Mining shall be conducted on sites that minimize adverse impacts on natural resources and the public. Separations shall be maintained between mining areas and adjacent conflicting land uses. All sites shall incorporate setbacks or separations that are needed to comply with air, water, and noise pollution standards; local land use regulations; and requirements of other appropriate authorities.

Subp. 2. **Mining excluded.** Except as allowed under state and federal laws, no mining shall be conducted within the following:

A. the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, as legally described in the *Federal Register*, volume 45, number 67 (April 4, 1980), with state restrictions specified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.523, subdivision 3;

B. Voyageurs National Park, with state restrictions specified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84B.03, subdivision 1;

C. state wilderness areas, with restrictions specified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 86A.05, subdivision 6;

D. Agassiz and Tamarac National Wilderness areas, and Pipestone and Grand Portage National monuments;

E. state scientific and natural areas;

F. within state peatland scientific and natural areas where such activities would significantly modify or alter the peatland water levels or flows, peatland water chemistry, plant or animal species or communities, or natural features of the peatland scientific and natural areas, except in the event of a national emergency declared by Congress;

G. calcareous fens identified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.223; and

H. a state park, except if the park has been established as a result of its association with mining.

Subp. 3. **Surface disturbance prohibited.** No mining activities that disturb the surface shall be allowed within or on the following:

A. within the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness Mineral Management Corridor, identified on the Department of Natural Resources map entitled "Minnesota Department of Natural Resources B.W.C.A.W. Mineral Management Corridor," dated February 1991, which map is hereby incorporated by reference, is not subject to frequent change, and is available through the State Law Library;

B. within one-fourth mile of Voyageurs National Park;

C. within one-fourth mile of state wilderness areas;

D. within one-fourth mile of Agassiz and Tamarac National Wilderness areas, and Pipestone and Grand Portage National monuments;

E. within one-fourth mile of state scientific and natural areas;

F. within one-fourth mile of state parks, except surface disturbance shall be allowed if the park has been established as a result of its association with mining;

G. within one-fourth mile of calcareous fens identified under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.223;

H. on sites designated in the National Register of Historic Places, except that surface disturbance shall be allowed if the sites have been established as a result of their association with mining;

I. on sites designated in the Registry of State Historic Sites, except surface disturbance shall be allowed if the sites have been established as a result of their association with mining;

J. within national wild, scenic, or recreational river districts of a national wild, scenic, or recreational river, and within the areas identified by the document, "A Management Plan for the Upper Mississippi River," produced by the Mississippi Headwaters Board, dated January 1981, which document is hereby incorporated by reference, is not subject to frequent change, and is available through the State Law Library, except underground mining may be permitted in accordance with the management plans developed for specific national wild, scenic, or recreational river districts;

K. within designated state land use districts, of a state wild, scenic, or recreational river, except underground mining may be permitted in accordance with the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act and the rules adopted under it;

L. within the area adjacent to the north shore of Lake Superior identified in the document entitled, "North Shore Management Plan," produced by the North Shore Management Board, dated December 1988, which document is hereby incorporated by reference, is not subject to frequent change, and is available through the State Law Library; and

M. on the following areas, provided they were in existence before the issuance of a permit to mine:

(1) within 500 feet of an occupied dwelling, public school, church, public institution, or county or municipal park, unless allowed by the owner; and

(2) within 100 feet of a cemetery, or the outside right-of-way line of a public roadway, except where mine access or haul roads cross the right-of-way.

Subp. 4. **Mining restricted.** Mining shall be conducted in the following areas only if there is no prudent and feasible siting alternative. If mining is proposed, the commissioner shall base siting approval decisions on the specific characteristics and qualities of the natural resources for which the area has been designated, and the potential impacts that are likely to result. Mining shall be allowed only if there will be either no adverse impacts on the natural resources, or provisions acceptable to the commissioner are proposed to either mitigate adverse effects, or replace, reroute, or in some other manner reclaim the affected natural resources:

A. within a national wildlife refuge, a national waterfowl production area, or on a national trail;

B. within a state wildlife management area, or on a state designated trail either listed in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 85.015, or acquired under the authority of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.029, subdivision 2;

C. in peatlands identified as peatland watershed protection areas in the Department of Natural Resources report entitled "Protection of Ecologically Significant Peatlands in Minnesota," dated November 1984, which report is hereby incorporated by reference, is not subject to frequent change, and is available through the State Law Library; and

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D. within waters identified in the public waters inventory, conducted under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.201, that have not been created or substantially altered in size by human activities, and within the adjoining shorelands, as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103F.205, subdivision 4, of the unaltered waters.

Subp. 5. **General siting criteria.** Portions of a mining operation for which there is flexibility in site selections, such as storage piles, tailings basins, water reservoirs, processing plants, offices interconnecting roadways, and auxiliary facilities, shall be sited to the extent practicable so that:

- A. impacts on the public and natural resources due to wind erosion, noise, and air emissions are minimized;
- B. potential injury to life due to floods, caving, or slope failure is minimized;
- C. potential damage to property and natural resources due to floods, caving, or slope failure is minimized;
- D. major modifications of watersheds, including diversions of surface water and alterations of groundwater levels, are minimized;
- E. runoff and seepage can be managed to minimize water impacts on surface water and groundwater;
- F. conflicts with natural and historical heritage sites, identified during environmental review, are minimized; and
- G. former mining areas are used in preference to areas undisturbed by mining.

Subp. 6. **Wetland conservation.** Mining activities that result in the draining or filling of wetlands, identified pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.005, subdivision 19, shall not be conducted unless the wetlands are replaced by restoring or creating wetland areas under a replacement plan approved pursuant to part 6132.5300. It must be noted that the replacement plan requires an evaluation of the affected wetland, including consideration of avoidance and mitigation techniques, before replacement by restoration or creation can even be considered.

6132.2100 BUFFERS.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** A mining operation shall be designed, constructed, and maintained so that it is compatible with surrounding nonmining uses.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** A mining operation must meet the requirements in items A and B.

A. Existing terrain and vegetation, or revegetated berms, must be used to diminish impacts of the mining activities.

B. Buffers must be constructed before beginning operations and may be located within the areas described in part 6132.2000, subpart 3, item M.

6132.2200 REACTIVE MINE WASTE.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Reactive mine waste shall be mined, disposed of, and reclaimed to prevent the release of substances that result in the adverse impacts on natural resources.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** A mining operation must meet the requirements in items A to D.

A. Chemical and physical characterization of mine waste must be conducted before the submission of an application for a permit to mine and continuously after that during the process of mining under part 6132.1000.

B. A reactive mine waste storage facility must be designed by professional engineers registered in Minnesota proficient in the design, construction, operation, and reclamation of facilities for the storage of reactive mine waste, to either:

- (1) modify the physical or chemical characteristics of the mine waste to the extent that the waste is no longer reactive; or
- (2) during construction to the extent practicable, and at closure, permanently prevent substantially all water from contacting the mine waste and provide for the collection and disposal of any remaining residual waters that come into contact with the mine waste in compliance with federal and state standards.

C. The reactive mine waste storage facility design shall:

(1) describe all materials, construction, and operating performance specifications and limitations that must be maintained to ensure protection of natural resources;

(2) include a schedule for inspection of the reactive mine waste storage facility construction, operation, and reclamation including closure and postclosure maintenance, by the design engineers, to ensure compliance with the design; and

(3) identify monitoring locations to ensure compliance with the design.

D. The commissioner may allow variance from specific reclamation requirements of parts 6132.2100 and 6132.2300 to 6132.2700 if their use would inhibit designs necessary to meet the requirements of this part.

6132.2300 OVERBURDEN PORTION OF PITWALLS.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** The overburden portion of pitwalls shall be designed, developed, and reclaimed to be structurally sound and

promote progressive reclamation.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Surface overburden portions of pitwalls shall be designed and constructed to the following standards in items A and B.

A. The final slopes shall consist of benches and lifts as follows:

(1) the toe of the surface overburden portion shall be set back at least 20 feet from the crest of the rock portion of the pitwall;

(2) lift heights shall be no higher than 60 feet and shall be selected based on the need to protect public safety, the location of the pitwall in relation to the surrounding land uses, the soil types and their erosion characteristics, the variability of overburden thickness, and the potential uses of the pit following mining;

(3) the sloped area between benches shall be no steeper than 2.5:1; and

(4) runoff water shall either be temporarily stored on benches or removed by drainage control structures.

B. When acceptable research demonstrates that the goals are satisfied, the commissioner shall approve other measures that satisfy subpart 1.

6132.2400 STORAGE PILE DESIGN.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Storage piles must be designed and constructed to minimize hydrologic impacts, enhance the survival and propagation of vegetation, be structurally sound, control erosion, promote progressive reclamation, and recognize the conservation of the mineral resources.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Storage piles must meet the requirements in items A to D.

A. General design: All storage piles shall be designed and constructed according to the standards in subitems (1) to (4).

(1) When mine waste is deposited on areas with unstable foundations such as peat, muskeg, bedded lacustrine deposits, karst topography, active seismic and flood zones, and areas above or within a mine, a professional engineer, registered in this state and proficient in the design, construction, operation, and reclamation of facilities on unstable foundations, shall examine the foundation and design the storage piles to ensure stability.

(2) Practices such as the use of vegetated buffer strips, hay bale dikes, silt fences, or settling basins shall be used to control erosion.

(3) Rills or gullies shall be observed to determine dominant runoff flow paths, which shall be stabilized to control runoff.

(4) Storage piles containing reactive mine waste must also comply with the requirements of part 6132.2200.

B. Rock storage piles: The final exterior slopes of lean ore, waste rock, and leached ore storage piles shall consist of benches and lifts as follows:

(1) no lift shall exceed 40 feet in height;

(2) no bench shall be less than 30 feet, measured from the crest of the lower lift to the toe of the next lift;

(3) the sloped area between benches shall be no steeper than the angle of repose; and

(4) when vegetation is required under part 6132.2700, subpart 2, item A, subitem (13), the sloped areas between benches shall be prepared to support vegetation.

C. Surface overburden: Surface overburden shall be disposed of according to subitems (1) and (2).

(1) When surface overburden is generated, it shall be placed in layers on the completed tops and benches of lean ore and waste rock storage piles to enhance reclamation potential.

(2) If no completed tops or benches are available, or if such sites are not within economic haul distances of surface stripping activities, surface overburden storage piles shall be created so that the final exterior slopes shall consist of benches and lifts as follows:

(a) no lift shall exceed 40 feet in height;

(b) no bench width shall be less than 30 feet wide, measured from the crest of the lower lift to the toe of the next lift;

(c) the sloped area between benches shall be no steeper than 2.5:1; and

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(d) runoff water shall either be temporarily stored on benches or removed by drainage control structures.

D. Mixed storage piles: Lean ore and waste rock shall not be used to cover surface overburden storage piles to avoid compliance with sloping and vegetation requirements. This shall not preclude the abutting of lean ore or waste rock storage piles with surface overburden storage piles or the placement of lean ore or waste rock lifts on top of surface overburden pads or lifts.

E. Alternative design: Based on acceptable research, the commissioner shall approve other measures that satisfy subpart 1.

6132.2500 TAILINGS BASINS.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Tailings basins shall be designed, constructed, and operated to be structurally sound, control air emissions, minimize hydrologic impacts, promote progressive reclamation, and enhance the survival and propagation of vegetation.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Tailings basins must meet the requirements in items A to C.

A. Tailings basins shall be designed by professional engineers, registered in this state, who are proficient in the design, construction, operation, and reclamation of tailings basins.

B. The tailings basin design shall:

- (1) provide rationale for site selection, with regard to dam safety and characteristics of the site that could affect, or could be affected by, the tailings basin;
- (2) describe materials, construction, and operating performance specifications and limitations that must be maintained to ensure protection of natural resources;
- (3) ensure that precipitation events do not result in overtopping the basin;
- (4) describe the specific steps that must be taken to achieve reclamation on tailings and dam surfaces;
- (5) include a schedule for the design engineers to inspect the construction, operation, and reclamation of the tailings basins, including closure and postclosure maintenance, to assure compliance with the design;
- (6) identify monitoring locations to ensure compliance with the design; and
- (7) comply with the requirements of part 6132.2200, if the tailings basin contains reactive mine waste.

C. During the mining operation, dust generation shall be reduced by maximizing progressive reclamation, or controlled by the application of dust suppression techniques under part 6132.2800, subpart 2.

6132.2600 HEAP AND DUMP LEACHING FACILITIES.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Heap and dump leaching facilities shall be designed and constructed to be structurally sound, minimize hydrologic impacts, minimize the release of substances that adversely impact other natural resources, and promote progressive reclamation.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Heap and dump leaching facilities must meet the requirements in items A to C.

A. Heap and dump leaching facilities shall be designed by professional engineers, registered in this state, who are proficient in the design, construction, operation, neutralization, detoxification, and reclamation of heap and dump leaching facilities.

B. The heap and dump leaching facility design shall:

- (1) provide rationale for site selection with regard to characteristics of the site that could affect, or be affected by, the heap and dump leaching facilities;
- (2) ensure that only leaching solutions that meet all state and federal water quality standards will be released to the environment;
- (3) include means of detecting and retrieving leaching solutions which might be released if leakage occurs;
- (4) describe all materials, construction, and operating performance specifications and limitations that must be maintained to ensure protection of other natural resources;
- (5) ensure that precipitation events do not result in overtopping ponds;
- (6) describe the specific steps that must be taken to neutralize and detoxify residual leaching solutions within leached ore and sediments;
- (7) include a schedule for the design engineers to inspect the construction, operation, and reclamation of the facility, including closure and postclosure maintenance, to assure compliance with the design; and
- (8) identify monitoring locations to ensure compliance with the design.

C. Leached ore and sediments from leaching ponds shall be reclaimed according to part 6132.2200 or 6132.2400 based on the results of mine waste characterization.

6132.2700 VEGETATION.

Subpart 1. **Goals.** Vegetation shall be established to control erosion, screen mining areas from noncompatible uses, and provide for subsequent land uses such as wildlife habitat or timber production.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Vegetation must meet the requirements in items A to C.

A. Vegetation shall be established on the following areas:

- (1) surface overburden storage piles;
- (2) exposed soils along diversion channels and roads;
- (3) cuts, pits, trenches, and other areas disturbed during the process of obtaining borrow materials;
- (4) benches and tops of lean ore, waste rock, and leached ore storage piles;
- (5) tailings basins;
- (6) heap and dump leaching facilities;
- (7) dikes and dams;
- (8) exposed soils adjacent to water reservoirs;
- (9) areas exposed or disturbed through the activities associated with the reclamation of building sites, parking lots, pipeline routes, storage areas, transmission routes, and roads not used for subsequent access;
- (10) surface overburden portions of pitwalls;
- (11) buffers;
- (12) subsided areas not permanently covered by water; and
- (13) lean ore, waste rock, and leached ore storage pile slopes, within one-fourth mile of residential and designated public use areas, except designated trails.

B. The establishment of vegetation shall be initiated during the first normal planting period following the point when according to the permit to mine, a surface, structure, facility, or element is no longer scheduled to be disturbed or used in a manner that would interfere with the establishment and maintenance of vegetation, or after the establishment of vegetation has otherwise been required.

C. The standards in subitems (1) and (2) apply to the areas listed in item A.

(1) After three growing seasons following initiation of vegetation, a 90 percent ground cover within a 90 percent statistical confidence interval, consisting of living vegetation and its litter, must exist on all areas, except slopes that primarily face south and west. Such sloped areas shall attain the 90 percent ground cover requirement within five growing seasons following the point when initiation of vegetation is required. If this standard is not met, or if unvegetated rills or gullies more than nine inches deep form and erosion is occurring, the surface shall be repaired and replanted during the next normal planting period.

(2) Within ten growing seasons following initiation of vegetation, an area shall have a vegetative community with characteristics similar to those of an approved reference area. The vegetation on a reference area may be either planted or naturally occurring. For the purpose of controlling erosion, it shall be self-sustaining, regenerating, or a stage in a recognized vegetation succession that provides subsequent land uses such as wildlife habitat or timber production. Reference areas must be representative of the site conditions and possible uses that might exist on mining land forms. No release under part 6132.4800 shall be granted until the area has these characteristics.

6132.2800 DUST SUPPRESSION.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** Areas disturbed by mining shall be managed to control dust.

Subp. 2. **Requirement.** Dust shall be controlled by techniques approved by the commissioner such as water spray, anchored mulches, vegetation, enclosure and containment, and limited chemical binders as last alternatives.

6132.2900 AIR OVERPRESSURE AND GROUND VIBRATIONS FROM BLASTING.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** Effects of air overpressure and ground vibrations from production blasts shall be kept at levels that will not be injurious to human health or welfare and property outside mining areas.

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Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Air overpressure standards must meet the requirements in items A and C. Ground vibration control must meet the requirements in items B and C.

A. Air overpressure standards must meet the requirements in subitems (1) to (5).

(1) Air overpressure on lands not owned or controlled by the permittee shall not exceed 130 decibels as measured on a linear peak scale, sensitive to a frequency band ranging from six cycles per second to 200 cycles per second.

(2) All open pit blasts shall be monitored by the operator. Monitoring stations shall be located adjacent to the nearest structure located on lands not owned or controlled by the permittee, and where the commissioner considers necessary to investigate complaints.

(3) All open pit mining operators shall keep a blaster's log of production blasts, which shall be retained for at least six years, containing the following:

(a) date and time of blast;

(b) type of explosive used;

(c) ignition layout with locations of blast holes and time intervals of delay;

(d) pounds of explosives per each delay of eight milliseconds or more;

(e) total pounds of explosives;

(f) type of material blasted;

(g) monitoring locations and results of monitoring when conducted;

(h) meteorological conditions, including temperature inversions, wind speed, and directions as can be determined from the United States Weather Bureau, and ground-based observations;

(i) directional orientation of free faces of bench to be blasted; and

(j) other information that the commissioner finds necessary to determine if the standards of this subpart and subpart 1 are achieved.

(4) If a focusing condition is detected that could cause the blast to adversely affect populated areas, blasting shall be postponed until the condition is no longer present.

(5) Blasting in open pits shall take place only during daylight hours unless a hazardous condition requires blasting at another time.

B. Ground vibration control must meet the requirements in subitems (1) to (4).

(1) The maximum peak particle velocity from blasting shall not exceed one inch per second at the location of a structure located on lands not owned or controlled by the permittee.

(2) The permittee shall monitor production blasts for peak particle velocity using a seismograph capable of measuring three mutually perpendicular peak particle velocities, with the peak particle velocity being the largest of these measurements.

(3) Seismic measurements shall be conducted adjacent to the nearest structure located on lands not owned or controlled by the permittee and where the commissioner considers necessary to investigate complaints.

(4) If a complaint is received, or when ground vibrations have or are likely to exceed the one inch per second standard, the commissioner shall require permittees using underground mining methods to maintain a blaster's log for the purpose of assessing ground vibration control.

C. All monitoring data collected shall be made available to the commissioner on request.

6132.3000 SUBSIDENCE.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** Mining shall be conducted in a manner that will minimize hazardous conditions that result from subsidence.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Mining techniques must meet the requirements in items A to C.

A. Mining techniques shall be used that minimize subsidence to the extent practicable.

B. If actual or likely subsidence occurs, the permittee shall establish ground control survey locations and conduct surveys to document the extent of ground movement.

C. Areas affected by subsidence shall be contoured or filled to protect public health and safety or natural resources.

6132.3100 CORRECTIVE ACTION.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** On the observation of violations of the permit to mine, immediate actions shall be taken to correct the violation.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Corrective action requirements include those in items A to D.

A. When the permittee is aware that requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200 are not being met, or if facilities constructed are not in compliance with the permit to mine, the permittee shall immediately notify the commissioner.

B. On notification or observation of violations of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 or conditions not meeting the permit to mine, the commissioner shall order the permittee to:

(1) immediately take corrective action; or

(2) submit, within two weeks, a corrective action plan for approval before the permittee implements corrective action that includes:

(a) cause for failure to comply;

(b) methods, sequence, and schedule of corrective action activities that will result in compliance with the permit to mine;

(c) corrective action cost estimates under part 6132.1200, subpart 3; and

(d) maps and cross sections at an appropriate scale.

C. If there is an immediate threat to human safety or natural resources resulting from the mining operation, the permittee shall take immediate corrective action and report to the commissioner.

D. The commissioner may take one or more of the following actions if the permittee fails to comply with any portion of this part:

(1) suspend the permit to mine under part 6132.4500;

(2) assess civil penalties under part 6132.5100;

(3) revoke the permit to mine under part 6132.4600; or

(4) modify the permit to mine under part 6132.4300.

6132.3200 CLOSURE AND POSTCLOSURE MAINTENANCE.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** The mining area shall be closed so that it is stable, free of hazards, minimizes hydrologic impacts, minimizes the release of substances that adversely impact other natural resources, and is maintenance free.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** Closure and postclosure maintenance must meet the requirements in items A to E.

A. When the permittee is aware of a temporary or permanent shutdown, the permittee shall immediately notify the commissioner.

B. For a temporary shutdown, the permittee shall:

(1) document the reason for temporary shutdown;

(2) project when the temporary shutdown will end;

(3) submit a maintenance plan for the temporary shutdown period to ensure that the facility will remain stable and hazard free;

(4) document how all permit standards will be complied with during the shutdown;

(5) maintain full financial assurance;

(6) complete all corrective action requirements as scheduled; and

(7) comply with all reporting requirements.

C. The commissioner, after review of the requirements in item B, may either:

(1) approve the temporary shutdown;

(2) request more information to make a decision; or

(3) deny the temporary shutdown and direct the permittee to implement a contingency reclamation plan under part 6132.1300.

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D. In evaluating a request for an extension of a temporary shutdown, the commissioner shall:

- (1) evaluate compliance with all state and federal permits;
- (2) evaluate safety and stability of all mining facilities; and
- (3) evaluate the need to implement corrective action procedures.

E. For a permanent shutdown, the permittee must implement the contingency reclamation plan under part 6132.1300 and comply with subitems (1) to (7).

- (1) Accesses to underground mines shall be promptly sealed as approved by the commissioner and the county mine inspector.
- (2) Within six months after closure of a mine begins, the permittee shall:
 - (a) provide at least one safe access to the bottom of an open pit; and
 - (b) construct fences or other access barriers for safety under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 180.
- (3) Within one year after closure begins, or within a longer period if approved by the commissioner, debris and mobile equipment that will not be used for reclamation shall be removed from the area being closed.
- (4) Within three years after closure begins, or within a longer period if approved by the commissioner, the following shall be accomplished:
 - (a) roads, parking areas, and storage pads except those the commissioner considers necessary for access shall be removed;
 - (b) permittee-owned power plants and associated facilities except public utilities, transmission lines, pipelines, docks and associated facilities, and railroads except common carrier transportation facilities shall be removed or provisions made for continued subsequent use; and
 - (c) all other equipment, facilities, and structures shall be removed and foundations razed and covered with a minimum of two feet of surface overburden.
- (5) Within three years after the start of the closure of basins constructed for the purpose of mining or processing, or within a longer period if approved by the commissioner, the permittee shall drain the basins and reintegrate the area into the natural watershed.
- (6) If, following closure, continued compliance with parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200 cannot be achieved without continued maintenance of the facilities, the permittee shall:
 - (a) implement postclosure maintenance techniques designed to ensure that the requirements of parts 6132.2000 to 6132.3200 will continue to be met following closure;
 - (b) identify specifically how, when, and by whom the active techniques will be conducted or managed;
 - (c) identify performance levels or limitations that would have to be achieved before the techniques could be considered successful; and
 - (d) provide for financial assurance under part 6132.1200, subpart 1, item A.
- (7) No release from the permit to mine under part 6132.1400 shall be granted for those portions of the mining area that require postclosure maintenance.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

6132.4000 PROCEDURES FOR OBTAINING A PERMIT TO MINE.

Subpart 1. **Application and publication.** The process for requesting a permit to mine begins with a preapplication conference and site visit under part 6132.1100, subpart 1, followed by the submission of an application to the commissioner under parts 6132.1000 to 6132.1400. After the commissioner determines the application is complete, the commissioner shall publish a notice in the *State Register* and the EQB Monitor stating the department has received an application for a permit to mine. The applicant shall also publish an advertisement as required by part 6132.4900. Within seven days after the last date of publication, the applicant shall submit to the commissioner a copy of the advertisement and an affidavit from the printer verifying publication. The application shall then be considered filed.

Subp. 2. **Objection to proposed mining operations.** Objection related to a proposed mining operation may be filed with the commissioner according to *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51.

A. Written objections to a proposed mining operation and permit may be filed with the commissioner no later than 30 days following the last date of publication of an applicant's newspaper advertisement required under part 6132.4900.

B. A person submitting an objection to the commissioner shall include the following information:

- (1) a statement of the person's interest in the proposed mining operation and permit;

(2) a statement of the action that the person wants the commissioner to take, including specific references to applicable sections of *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, or the permit application; and

(3) the reasons supporting the person's position, stated with sufficient specificity to allow the commissioner to investigate the merits of the person's position.

C. Within ten days after the receipt of the objection, the commissioner shall determine whether the person filing the objection meets one of the following criteria:

(1) owns property that will be affected by the proposed operation;

(2) is a federal, state, or local governmental agency having responsibilities affected by the proposed operation; or

(3) raises a material issue of fact, relating to the proposed operation, for which the commissioner has jurisdiction under *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, and there is a reasonable basis underlying the issue of fact such that holding a hearing would allow the presentation or introduction of relevant information that would aid the commissioner in resolving the issues and in making a final determination on the issuance of the permit to mine.

D. If objections were filed by a person meeting one of the criteria in item C, the commissioner shall attempt to resolve the issue by:

(1) allowing the applicant to change the operation to the mutual satisfaction of the objector and the commissioner, provided that a substantial change to the operation may necessitate republication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement, with an explanation of the proposed change; or

(2) proceeding with a hearing under subpart 3.

E. If objections were filed by a person not meeting the requirements of item C, the commissioner shall inform the person of that fact, stating reasons for the decision, and proceed with processing the application as if no objection had been received.

Subp. 3. Determination with hearing. Hearings shall be held by the commissioner according to items A to C.

A. The commissioner shall conduct a hearing if:

(1) objections are received from a person meeting the requirements of subpart 2, item C, and the commissioner is unable to resolve the issue to the satisfaction of that person and the applicant under subpart 2, item D, subitem (1);

(2) the commissioner determines it will be necessary to require additional provisions or conditions not contained in the permit application before approval of the application; or

(3) the commissioner determines the application should be denied.

B. To conduct a hearing, the commissioner shall:

(1) select a hearing date no more than 30 days after the last date of opportunity to object;

(2) serve an order for hearing in the form and manner required by part 1400.5600, except that part 1400.5600, subpart 3, does not apply, and in no event shall such an order be served less than 20 days before the hearing;

(3) mail a copy of the order for hearing to the applicant, all persons who filed objections, and all local units of government in which all or a part of the operation is located; and

(4) publish notice of the subject, time, date, and place of the hearing at least once before the hearing in a newspaper that must be both a qualified newspaper under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 331A.02, and circulated in the locality of the proposed mining operation.

C. Within 120 days after the close of the hearing record or 90 days after service of the hearing examiner's report, whichever comes later, the commissioner shall grant the permit with or without modifications or conditions or deny the permit stating reasons for the denial.

Subp. 4. Determination without hearing. The commissioner shall process the permit without a hearing according to items A and B.

A. No hearing is required if the commissioner determines that the proposed operation can be permitted without provisions or conditions and if within 30 days following the last date of publication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement:

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- (1) no objections were filed;
- (2) objections were filed, but the person objecting did not meet the requirement of subpart 2, item C; or
- (3) objections were filed but were resolved under subpart 2, item D, subitem (1).

B. Within 120 days after the last date on which a person can object to the proposed mining operation, the commissioner shall approve the application.

Subp. 5. **Review of annual report.** Each year following the granting of the permit to mine, the commissioner shall review the annual report required under part 6132.1300 to determine whether it complies with the provisions of the permit to mine. On completion of this review, the commissioner shall inform the permittee of the compliance determination.

A. If the annual report complies, the commissioner shall direct the permittee to implement the reclamation plan proposed for the upcoming year.

B. If the annual report does not comply, the commissioner shall:

(1) require the permittee to prepare an explanation of why the report does not comply with the permit to mine, and what is proposed to achieve compliance;

(2) direct the permittee to take corrective action under part 6132.3200 to address the violations, deficiencies, or inadequacies that are reported to have occurred during the past year; or

(3) require the permittee to develop a new plan for activities to be conducted during the upcoming year that will comply with the permit to mine.

6132.4100 VARIANCES.

Subpart 1. **Application for variance.** A proceeding for requesting a variance from parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 begins when the permit applicant or permittee files an application for a variance with the commissioner. The application shall include information necessary for the commissioner to determine that the proposed variance is directed toward the attainment of the goals of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 and is consistent with the general public welfare including, but not limited to:

A. how the alternative measure proposed is equivalent to or superior to that prescribed in the rule; and

B. how strict compliance with the rule will impose an undue burden on the applicant.

Under no circumstances will a variance be granted that varies a statutory standard.

Subp. 2. **Determination by commissioner.** Within 30 days after receipt of the application, the commissioner shall determine whether the proposed variance constitutes a substantial change from the requirements of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300.

A. If the commissioner determines that a substantial change would result, the applicant shall follow the procedures for permit to mine applications as provided in part 6132.4000.

B. If the commissioner determines that there would be no substantial change, and that the variance is in the public interest and meets the goals of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, the variance shall be granted.

Subp. 3. **Simultaneous filing of applications.** Applications for variance from parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 may be filed simultaneously with an application for a permit to mine, provided that the advertisement contains all information required for applications for permits to mine and for variance.

6132.4200 AMENDMENT OF PERMIT TO MINE.

Subpart 1. **Application for amendment.** A proceeding for requesting an amendment of a permit to mine begins when the permittee files an application for an amendment with the commissioner. The application shall include information the commissioner requires to determine that the proposed amendment meets the requirements of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 and state law.

Subp. 2. **Determination by commissioner.** Within 30 days after receipt of the application, the commissioner shall determine whether the proposed amendment constitutes a substantial change from the permit to mine.

A. If the commissioner determines that a substantial change would occur, the applicant shall follow the procedures for obtaining a permit to mine provided in part 6132.4000.

B. If the commissioner determines that there would be no substantial change, the amendment shall be granted.

6132.4300 MODIFICATION OF PERMIT TO MINE.

Subpart 1. **Conditions authorizing.** The commissioner may order the modification of a permit to mine when:

A. it is necessary to correct conditions that jeopardize public health or safety or that could result in injury to persons or property;

B. there is a violation of terms of the permit to mine or parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300; or

C. new information related to reclamation becomes available that needs to be addressed and incorporated into the permit to mine.

Subp. 2. **Beginning of proceedings.** A proceeding to modify a permit to mine begins by serving on the permittee:

- A. a notice of hearing under part 6132.5000; and
- B. the proposed modification order.

6132.4400 CANCELLATION OF PERMIT TO MINE.

If within three years following the issuance of a permit to mine no substantial construction of plant facilities or actual mining has begun and no reclamation of the site is necessary, the commissioner may, with the consent of the permittee, cancel the permit to mine.

6132.4500 SUSPENSION OF PERMIT TO MINE.

Subpart 1. **Procedure.** If an emergency situation arises that results in imminent danger to the public, the commissioner, by written order to the permittee, may at that time suspend any portion or portions of operations as necessary to protect:

- A. public health and safety;
- B. public interests in lands and waters; or
- C. individuals and property.

Subp. 2. **Requirements.** The commissioner shall require the permittee to take all measures necessary to prevent or remedy the emergency situation.

Subp. 3. **Duration.** No suspension under this part shall be in effect more than 30 days without giving the permittee at least ten days' written notice of the order and an opportunity to be heard under part 6132.5000.

6132.4600 REVOCATION OF PERMIT TO MINE.

Subpart 1. **Conditions authorizing.** The commissioner may order the revocation of a permit to mine when:

- A. it is necessary to stop conditions that jeopardize public health and safety or that could result in injury to persons or property; or
- B. there is a violation of terms of the permit to mine or parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300.

Subp. 2. **Beginning of proceedings.** A proceeding to revoke a permit to mine begins by serving on the permittee:

- A. a notice of hearing under part 6132.5000; and
- B. the proposed revocation order.

6132.4700 ASSIGNMENT.

Under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.481, subdivision 5, the commissioner shall allow the assignment of a permit to mine only if the commissioner determines that the assignee will perform all outstanding obligations of law, parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, and the permit to mine.

6132.4800 RELEASE OF PERMITTEE.

Subpart 1. **Procedure.** The procedure to release the permittee from responsibility on a reclaimed portion of the mining area begins when the permittee submits a request for release under part 6132.1400.

Subp. 2. **Determination by commissioner.** The commissioner shall review the request for release and inspect the site to be released to determine whether all terms and conditions of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 and the permit to mine have been satisfied.

A. If the commissioner determines that the terms and conditions of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 and the permit to mine have not been satisfied, the permittee shall follow the procedures for obtaining a permit to mine described in part 6132.4000.

B. If the commissioner determines that the terms and conditions of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 and the permit to mine have been satisfied, the commissioner shall release the permittee from further responsibility for the reclaimed portion.

Subp. 3. **Postclosure maintenance.** No release from a permit to mine shall be approved for a portion of the mining area requiring postclosure maintenance until the necessity for maintenance ceases.

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6132.4900 PUBLICATION.

Subpart 1. **Newspaper; contents.** When an advertisement is required relating to the issuance, amendment, variance, or release from a permit to mine, it shall be published by the permittee once each week for four successive weeks in a qualified newspaper under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 331A.02, that is circulated in the locality of the proposed mining operation. The advertisement must contain:

- A. a statement and map indicating the locations and boundaries of the mining area;
- B. surface and mineral ownership within the mining area based on information of record in the county recorder's office. An owner's agent may be identified in place of the owner;
- C. the schedule for accomplishing what is being proposed;
- D. a notice of the deadline date for filing objections; and
- E. the following information:
 - (1) if application is made for a permit to mine, a description of the proposed mining operation including the general kinds of reclamation or restoration measures to be undertaken according to the reclamation plan;
 - (2) if an amendment to a permit to mine is requested, a description of the purpose and nature of the proposed amendment;
 - (3) if a variance from parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300 is requested, a description of the purpose and nature of the requested variance and a description of the proposed alternative means that will be used to meet the goals and comply with the requirements of parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300; or
 - (4) if a release from the permit to mine is requested, a description of the status of reclamation that has been performed, a discussion of planned uses for the land, and identification of how the land is intended to be managed.

Subp. 2. **Revocation; modification; suspension of permit.** When an advertisement is required under part 1400.5600, subpart 4, relating to the revocation, modification, or suspension of a permit to mine, or relating to the assessment of civil penalties, a notice of hearing and the commissioner's proposed order shall be published by the commissioner as follows:

- A. once in the *State Register* and the EQB Monitor at least 30 days before the scheduled date of hearing; and
- B. once each week during the four weeks preceding the scheduled date of hearing, in a qualified newspaper according to *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 331A, that is circulated in the locality of the proposed mining operation.

6132.5000 HEARING PROCEDURES.

Procedures established by parts 1400.5100 to 1400.8500 apply to a contested case hearing under parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, except as otherwise provided in *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, and parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300.

6132.5100 CIVIL PENALTIES.

Subpart 1. **Violation.** If a permittee violates any provision of *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300, or a permit to mine issued under them, the commissioner may order imposition of a civil penalty.

Subp. 2. **Beginning of proceedings.** A proceeding to assess civil penalties begins by serving on the permittee:

- A. a notice of hearing under part 6132.5000; and
- B. the proposed civil penalty imposition order.

Subp. 3. **Determining the amount.** In determining the amount of a penalty, the commissioner shall consider the severity of the violation, the need to deter future violations, and the magnitude of potential or actual gains resulting from the violation.

Subp. 4. **Duration.** The assessment of the civil penalty shall remain in effect until the violation that necessitated the penalty is corrected.

Subp. 5. **Collection.** The commissioner shall collect an assessed civil penalty in the same manner as any other debt owed the state.

6132.5200 INSPECTION OF MINING AREA.

The permittee shall allow the commissioner to inspect all mining operations and records needed to monitor compliance with the permit to mine and parts 6132.0100 to 6132.5300.

6132.5300 WETLAND MITIGATION AND REPLACEMENT PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. **Authority.** In accordance with *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, no draining or filling of wetlands resulting from mining shall occur unless a wetland replacement plan, approved by the commissioner, is incorporated into the mining and reclamation plans of a mining operation for which a permit to mine is required. The replacement plan shall apply the principles and standards contained in the section entitled "Standards and Procedures for Evaluating Wetland Replacement Plans" of chapter 8410, wetland rules, adopted pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2242.

Subp. 2. **Procedure.** The procedures for replacement plan approval shall be those contained in chapter 8410, wetland rules, adopted pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2242, with the commissioner acting as the approving authority. Upon the receipt of an approved replacement plan, the plan shall be incorporated into the permittee's mining and reclamation plan by inclusion in the annual report, pursuant to part 6132.1300, subpart 3, item H.

Because of the time necessary to process wetland replacement plans, it is advisable to initiate this process well in advance of the point when any given annual report is required to be submitted, if the permittee wants to initiate wetland replacement during the upcoming year described in that annual report.

DUAL NOTICE—Notice of Intent to Adopt a Rule Without a Public Hearing Unless 25 or More Persons Request a Hearing and Notice of Hearing if 25 or More Requests for a Hearing are Received

You are hereby notified that the State of Minnesota Department of Revenue intends to adopt the above-entitled rule without a public hearing following the procedures set forth in the Administrative Procedure Act, *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.22 to 14.28. If, however, 25 or more persons request a hearing on this rule by December 2, 1992, a public hearing will be held on December 14, 1992. To find out whether this rule will be adopted without a hearing or if the hearing will be held, you should contact the Department of Revenue between the end of the 30 day comment period and the scheduled hearing date.

Subject of Rule and Statutory Authority. Through this rule, the Commissioner seeks to clarify the scope of the sales tax exemption for materials used or consumed in production. See *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 9. The rule provides definitions and explanations of key terms found in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 9. The statutory authority to adopt the rule is *Minnesota Statutes*, section 270.06, subdivision 13 (1990). A copy of the proposed rule is attached to this notice. A free copy of the rule is available upon request from Susan E. Fremouw, Attorney, Appeals, Legal Services, and Criminal Investigation Division, 10 River Park Plaza, Mail Station 2220, St. Paul, Minnesota 55146-2220, (612) 296-1022, Extension 128.

Comments. All persons have 30 days in which to submit comment in support of or in opposition to the proposed rule or any part or subpart of the rule. The 30 day comment period runs through 4:30 p.m., on December 2, 1992. Comment is encouraged. Each comment should identify the portion of the proposed rule addressed, the reason for the comment, and any change proposed.

Modifications. The proposed rule may be modified if the modifications are supported by data and views submitted to the agency or as a result of the rule hearing process if they do not result in a substantial change in the proposed rule as noticed. Persons potentially affected in any manner by the substance of the proposed rule are encouraged to participate in the rulemaking process.

Request for a Hearing. In addition to submitting comments, any person may make a written request for a public hearing on the rule. The hearing will be held at the Minnesota Department of Revenue, Skjeggstad Seminar Room, 8th Floor, 10 River Park Plaza, St. Paul, Minnesota 55107, on December 14, 1992, commencing at 9:00 a.m. and continuing until all interested persons and groups have had an opportunity to be heard concerning adoption of this rule by submitting either oral or written data, statements, or arguments. Statements, briefs or written material may be submitted within the comment period described in this notice without appearing at the hearing by sending them to Administrative Law Judge, Howard Kaibel, 100 Washington Square, Suite 1700, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55401-2138, (612) 341-7608. Questions regarding procedure may be directed to Judge Kaibel at the above-listed address.

Hearing Procedure. All interested or affected persons will have an opportunity to participate by presenting oral and/or written evidence at the hearing. All evidence presented should relate to the proposed rule. Questioning of agency representatives or witnesses, and of interested persons making oral statements will be allowed in order to explain the purpose or operation of the proposed rule or a suggested modification, or for other purposes material to the evaluation or formulation of the proposed rule. As a result of the hearing process, the proposed rule may be modified.

Written material may be submitted to the Administrative Law Judge and recorded in the hearing record for five working days after the public hearing ends. The comment period may be extended for a longer period not to extend 20 calendar days if ordered by the Administrative Law Judge at the hearing. The written materials must be received at the Office of Administrative Hearings no later than 4:30 p.m. on the last day for submission of written materials. Comments received during the comment period will be available for review at the Office of Administrative Hearings. Following the five to twenty-day comment period, there will be a five-day period in which the commissioner and interested persons may respond in writing to any new information submitted. The written materials must be received at the Office of Administrative Hearings no later than 4:30 p.m. on the last day for submission of written materials. During the five-day period, the agency may indicate in writing whether there are any amendments suggested by other persons which the agency is willing to adopt. Additional evidence may not be submitted during the five-day period. The written responses will be added to the record of the proceedings.

Statement of Need and Reasonableness. A Statement of Need and Reasonableness has been prepared and is now available for review at the Department of Revenue and is also available for review at the Office of Administrative Hearings and may be obtained at the cost of reproduction. This document describes the need for and reasonableness of each part of the rule, identifies the information relied upon to support the proposed rule, and includes a summary of the evidence and argument which the Department of Revenue anticipates presenting at the hearing.

Small Business Considerations. The statement of need and reasonableness also addresses small business considerations in rulemaking, as required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.115 (1990). "Small business" means a business entity, including farming and other agricultural operations and its affiliates, that (a) is independently owned and operated, (b) is not dominant in its field, and (c) employs fewer than 50 full-time employees or has gross annual sales of less than \$4,000,000. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.115, subd. 1 (1990). The proposed rule is not expected to place any additional financial or administrative burden on small businesses.

Expenditure of Public Money by Local Public Bodies and Impact on Agricultural Lands. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.11, subdivision 1, does not apply because the proposed rule will not require the expenditure of public monies by local units of government. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 14.11, subdivision 2, does not apply because the proposed rule will not have any direct adverse effects on agricultural lands in the state.

Lobbyist Registration. *Minnesota Statutes* chapter 10A requires each lobbyist to register with the State Ethical Practices Board within five days after he or she commences lobbying. Rules as Proposed

8130.5500 ~~PROPERTY USED IN AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION.~~

Subpart 1. **Agricultural and industrial production.** Agricultural and industrial production includes, but is not limited to, the following: manufacturing; farming; processing of agricultural products either vegetable or animal (other than by restaurants or consumers); commercial fishing; refining; smelting or reducing minerals, ores, petroleum products, etc.; brewing and distilling of alcoholic beverages and products; printing; mining; quarrying; lumbering; generating electricity; horticulture; floriculture; raising of pets or fur-bearing animals or research animals or horses on a commercial basis. In addition, There is a sales and use tax exemption for materials used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production of personal property intended to be sold ultimately at retail. This exemption is found in Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9. The provisions of this part apply to those persons engaged in agricultural or industrial production. Agricultural and industrial production includes any step or steps in the production process ~~and~~. It also includes the production, fabrication, printing, or processing of tangible personal property for consumers for consideration, defined as a sale under Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.01, subdivision 3, paragraph (b).

Materials that are used or consumed in providing a service other than production, fabrication, printing, or processing of tangible personal property for retail sale are taxable.

Generally, the production process begins with the removal of raw materials from stock for the purpose of commencing activities effecting changes thereon in the course of development of producing the intended product. The production process ends when the completed state is achieved; except that materials used in packaging finished goods shall be regarded as used or consumed in the production process. The completed state includes the packaging of the individual product, but not palletizing or otherwise preparing the packaged product for shipment. If the product is not packaged, the process ends when it is placed into finished goods inventory. If the package is not placed into finished goods inventory prior to shipment, the process ends when the last process prior to loading for shipment has been completed.

In the case of mining, the production process shall be deemed to begin with the removal of overburden from the site of the ore deposit and to end when the last process prior to stockpiling is performed. If the product is not stockpiled prior to shipment, the production process shall be deemed to have ended when the last process prior to loading for shipment has been completed.

Quality control, testing, design, and research and development activities are regarded as part of the production process. The production process does not include the storage and preservation of raw materials prior to commencement of the production process; the handling, movement, storage, and preservation of completed goods; or the painting, cleaning, repairing, and maintenance of equipment and facilities. Agricultural and industrial production does not include the preparation, cooking, mixing, or furnishing meals. "Meals" means food which will ordinarily be consumed without delay and without further preparation or storage.

Effective January 1, 1974, the exemptions for industrial and agricultural production, provided for under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 1, paragraph (h), have been amended to include accessory tools, equipment and other short lived items, which are separate detachable units used in producing a direct effect upon the product, where such items have an ordinary useful life of less than 12 months. Therefore, any reference, direct or indirect, to accessory tools, equipment, and other short-lived items in subparts 1 to 3, should be construed to apply to the period of August 1, 1967 through December 31, 1973. Information concerning the additional exemptions allowable as of January 1, 1974, may be found in subpart 4.

In the case of mining or quarrying, the production process begins with the removal of overburden from the site of the ore, mineral, peat deposit, or surface materials and ends when the last process before stockpiling is performed. If the product is not stockpiled before shipment, the production process ends when the last process before loading for shipment has been completed.

Subp. 2. **Exempt materials.** Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 1, paragraph (h) 2, provides exemption for all materials used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production of personal property intended to be sold ultimately at retail, whether or not the item so used becomes an ingredient or constituent part of the property produced. Items included in the exemption are chemicals, fuels, petroleum products, lubricants, packaging materials, feeds, seeds, fertilizers, electricity, gas, and steam. Also exempt are All materials that are ingredients or component parts of the product, and materials that act on or come in contact with the product but that are not machinery, equipment, implements, tools, accessories, appliances, contrivances, furniture, or fixtures, are within this exemption. Examples of such exempt materials are grinding compounds, polishing compounds, and lithographic printing plates. The phrase "used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production" also includes materials that are only used once in production and even though they have not been physically consumed ~~they~~ will not be used again. Examples of such exempt materials that could qualify for this exemption are keylines, typeset used for printing, and paper pan; and cake liners used for baking goods.

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Also exempt are all forms of animal life of a kind the products of which ordinarily constitute food for human consumption.

Subp. 3. [See repealer.]

Subp. 3a. Chemicals and fertilizers. The purchase or use of chemicals or fertilizers for use or consumption in agricultural or industrial production is not taxable.

The purchase of chemicals and fertilizers for application to agricultural crops to achieve soil fertilization, weed control, or elimination of crop disease, or to prevent or destroy pest infestation of growing crops is not taxable. The agricultural crops must be grown for sale or as feed for use or consumption in agricultural production.

The purchase of chemicals for the control or eradication of pests is exempt if used for the health and protection of those animals whose feed is exempt under subpart 11. For purposes of this subpart, "pest" means an insect, rodent, nematode, fungus, weed, terrestrial or aquatic plant, animal life, virus, bacteria, or other organism. Pest control chemicals include insecticides (fly sprays, fly tapes, louse killers), pesticides, and rodenticides (mouse, rat, and gopher poison).

Chemicals and fertilizers that are purchased for nonproduction use such as lawn fertilizers, weed control chemicals used in a lawn or garden, or insect spray for home use, are all taxable.

Herbicides and fertilizers that are purchased by farmers for use on land that is part of the Conservation Reserve Program or other specifically enumerated government program are exempted under Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9.

Detergents or other cleaning chemicals used in cleaning factory or farm buildings, including buildings used to house animals, are taxable. However, disinfectants that are not merely detergent additives and that are applied to agricultural animals, or used to disinfect their surroundings to control or eradicate animal disease or pests, are not taxable.

Chemicals used for cleaning food processing machinery and equipment are also exempt. However, the chemicals used to clean the area surrounding the food processing machinery and equipment are taxable.

Chemicals that are used to clean tooling or equipment that is used in production are taxable because the chemicals are not used or consumed in the production process.

However, if applying the chemical to the tooling or equipment, other than for ordinary cleaning and maintenance, is required to manufacture the particular product, the purchase of that chemical is exempt.

Subp. 4. [See repealer.]

Subp. 4a. Fuels, electricity, gas, and steam. The purchase of fuel, electricity, gas, and steam that is used or consumed directly in agricultural or industrial production is not taxable. If these items are used for space heating or lighting, however, they are taxable.

The purchase of fuel, electricity, gas, or steam to power a machine or fixture that controls the lighting or climate of a building is taxable, unless the lighting or climate control is a special requirement necessary to produce that particular agricultural or industrial product. If the lighting or climate control is a special requirement, then the amount of fuel, electricity, gas, or steam used for that lighting or climate control is not taxable. The amount used must be determined by deducting the amount of fuel, electricity, gas, or steam used to maintain average lighting or climate control from the total amount used for lighting or climate control. "Average climate control" means a summer temperature range of 73 to 79 degrees Fahrenheit and a winter temperature range of 68 to 74.5 degrees Fahrenheit. "Average lighting" means the amount of wattage per square foot necessary to adequately light the area if lighting is not a special requirement necessary to produce a particular agricultural or industrial product.

There is a separate statutory exemption for electricity used to make snow for certain ski areas. See Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9.

Subp. 5. [See repealer.]

Subp. 5a. Petroleum products and lubricants. The purchase of petroleum products such as gasoline, diesel fuel, propane, grease, oil, or radiator antifreeze used or consumed in the operation of equipment used in the production of agricultural or industrial products, is exempt from the sales and use tax. Also exempt are lubricants such as penetrating oil, pulsator oil, and surge oil, and fuels such as propane, as long as they are used or consumed in the production process.

There is a separate statutory exemption for petroleum products used in the improvement of agricultural land by constructing, maintaining, and repairing drainage ditches, tile drainage systems, grass waterways, water impoundment, and other erosion control structures. See Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 7.

Subp. 6. Packaging materials. Sales of materials to persons engaged in agricultural or industrial production for use in packaging, shipping, or delivering tangible personal property produced or manufactured by them are exempt. Packaging material includes nonreturnable containers, but does not include returnable containers except as otherwise specified in this subpart.

Packaging materials do not include containers or other packaging materials that are used to pack tangible personal property for shipment between production facilities.

“Container” means the articles in which tangible personal property is placed for shipment and delivery, such as cartons, cans, and bags. Container does not include items that are used primarily to facilitate loading, unloading, handling, transportation, or storage of products, such as bakery delivery carts, bread trays, milk carts, milk crates, and pallets.

Items A to L govern the tax status of specific packaging materials and containers.

A. Price tags, shipping tags and address labels, packing slip envelopes, invoices, and advertising matter to be used in connection with the sale of property or to be enclosed with property sold are not packaging materials.

B. Labels that are used to identify the contents of a package are exempt. For example, a grocery store is engaged in production when it cuts and wraps meat or produce. The content labels that are used on the meat or produce are not taxable because they are packaging material. Price labels that do not contain any content information are not packaging materials and are taxable.

C. Returnable containers constitute equipment and generally are not within the scope of the exemption provided under Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9. However, purchases of returnable containers for use in packaging food and beverage products are within the exemption by specific statutory authorization. See Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9.

D. Returnable containers are designed and ordinarily used for more than one-time use as containers. They are customarily expected or required to be returned by customers to the vendor of the contents for reuse. Vendors commonly require a deposit or payment by the customer with the understanding that the amount of the deposit will be refunded either in cash or in credit when the container is returned to the vendor. Regardless of the condition or appearance of the container, it is a returnable container if the vendor requires a deposit or payment from the customer and if there is an express or implied agreement that the deposit will be refunded upon return of the container.

E. Deposits that are charged to customers as security for the return of containers are not subject to tax if separately stated on the invoice or billing.

F. Purchases of materials used to repair or recondition taxable returnable containers by the owners of those containers are taxable.

G. Nonreturnable containers are considered packaging material. The sale of nonreturnable containers used to package an article of tangible personal property for sale is exempt.

H. Internal packaging materials are those used inside of packages and containers in order to shape, form, preserve, stabilize, or protect the contents. All internal packaging materials purchased for use in packaging food and beverage products are exempt.

I. If the internal packaging materials are not being used to package food and beverage products, then the taxability of those packaging materials depends on whether they are returnable to the vendor. If the materials are returnable, then they are treated as machinery or equipment and are taxable. If the materials are not returnable, then they are not taxable.

J. External packaging materials are those used under, outside of, and among packages and containers to protect, brace, pad, or cushion the packages or containers against damage, motion, shock, or breakage while being shipped. These materials are commonly known as dunnage and are exempt when purchased for use in industrial or agricultural production of tangible personal property and used to ship products to customers. However, sales of these same items to vendors of transportation services are taxable unless otherwise exempted by Minnesota Statutes, sections 297A.01 to 297A.45. If the external packaging materials are not being used to package food and beverage products, then the taxability of those packaging materials depends on whether they are returnable to the vendor. If the materials are returnable, they are equipment and are taxable. If the external packaging materials are not returnable, they are not taxable.

K. External packaging materials do not include items that are used primarily to facilitate loading, unloading, handling, transportation, or storage of products, such as bakery delivery carts, bread trays, milk carts, milk crates, and pallets.

L. Sales of packaging materials, such as bags, wrapping paper, boxes, and clothes hangers, to vendors of services are not exempt under Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9. Meat locker operators are vendors of services when they cut meat furnished by their customers into smaller pieces, which they wrap and place in cold storage for the customers' convenience. Sales of wrapping paper, tape, and other materials to vendors for this purpose are taxable. However, meat locker operators who also make retail sales as well as cutting meat furnished by their customers may purchase wrapping materials exempt for resale and report and pay use tax on the portion of the wrapping materials used in performing the cutting service.

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Subp. 7. Road building materials. The definition of production found in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 9, includes the production of road building materials. When a manufacturer of road building materials purchases materials that will be used or consumed in the manufacturing of asphalt, bituminous mix, or other road building materials to be sold at retail, those purchases are not taxable. For purposes of this exemption, it does not matter that the road building materials will ultimately be sold for use in building parking lots and driveways. When that person sells the road building materials to someone who will use them to build or repair roads, or for any other nonexempt purpose, the entire sales price of the road building materials is subject to tax.

When a person produces road building materials for the person's own use in building or repairing roads, including a contract to build or repair roads for others, the materials used to produce the road materials are not exempt as materials used or consumed in industrial production. Because the person puts them to that person's own use in building, improving, or repairing roads, that person is not selling the road building materials at retail, as required for the exemption, but is engaged in improving real property. That person must pay sales or use tax on any materials used to make the road building materials that the person is going to use.

Subp. 8. Taxable equipment. The exemption provided by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 9, does not include machinery, equipment, implements, tools, accessories, appliances, contrivances, furniture, or fixtures used in production, or fuel, electricity, gas, or steam used for space heating or lighting. Accordingly, a sales or use tax is imposed on not only a machine itself but on any repair parts for it. The tool or accessory that performs the work of the machine, including saw blades, grinding wheels, cutters, files, molds, dies, patterns, jigs, printing plates, and similar items, are also taxable unless exempted under subpart 9 as short-lived separate detachable units.

Materials or fabrication labor purchased by a person engaged in agricultural or industrial production to manufacture or fabricate equipment, tools, or similar items for the person's own use in the production process and not intended for resale, are taxable. Examples of materials are plastic, metal, or wood used in making patterns or jigs, and sand used in making molds.

Subp. 9. Separate detachable units. The exemption for industrial and agricultural production, provided under the provisions of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 9, includes accessory tools, equipment, and other short-lived items that satisfy the following conditions: (1) they are separate detachable units; (2) they are used in producing a direct effect upon the product; and (3) they have an ordinary useful life of less than 12 months.

All three conditions must be satisfied before an item is exempt. The item must be used to produce a product for sale. If the item is used for maintenance purposes, or to produce other tooling for in-house use, it is not exempt. For purposes of this exemption, the words "separate detachable units," "used in producing a direct effect," and "ordinary useful life," have the meanings given them in items A to C.

A. "Separate detachable units" means accessory tools, equipment, or short-lived items that are attached to machinery when being used. These items are generally purchased separately from the purchase of the basic machine and do not include the basic machine and its component parts such as belts, pulleys, gears, shafts, and bearings. Examples of items considered to be separate detachable units include, but are not limited to, drill bits, cutting tools, grinding wheels, abrasive and polishing belts, sheets and discs, taps, reamers, printing plates, saw blades, and certain dies, jigs, patterns, and molds; however, if these items are included in the purchase price of the basic machine, and their cost is not separately stated, they are considered as part of the basic machine and taxable. Subsequent replacement of these items is exempt. Hand tools such as hammers, pliers, clamps, wrenches, screwdrivers, crowbars, soldering irons, knives, and power hand tools, are not separate detachable units and are not exempt. Attachments to hand tools are considered separate detachable units only if similarly functioning items attached to machinery would be considered separate detachable units. Examples of hand tool attachments considered to be separate detachable units include drill bits, grinding wheels, sandpaper disks, and sawblades.

B. "Used in producing a direct effect" means accessory tools, equipment, and other short-lived items that are used or consumed in industrial or agricultural production in a manner that directly causes a physical or chemical change upon or within the materials being processed. Examples of items within this exemption include, but are not limited to, drill bits, cutting tools, grinding wheels, abrasive and polishing belts, sheets and discs, taps, reamers, printing plates, saw blades, and certain dies, jigs, patterns, and molds. Examples of items not exempt under this provision are conveyor belts and rollers that only serve to move the product from place to place.

The phrase "used in producing a direct effect upon the product" does not require a direct physical contact with the product. Items that do not come into contact with material being processed, and that are not the agents that by direct contact with the product produce physical or chemical changes, are considered to be used in producing a direct effect upon the product if their use serves the purpose of determining the shape, contour, configuration, content, or arrangement of content of the product, or any part of the product, being produced.

Such items are considered to be used in producing a direct effect since the desired change in the material being acted upon is accomplished only by the combined effect of the items acting in conjunction with other items that actually have the direct physical contact with the product.

Items that are used in creating and/or maintaining a condition that must prevail before a desired physical or chemical change can

be effected on a product are not considered as being used to produce a direct effect; i.e., the physical or chemical change sought in the material being processed.

To illustrate the application of this rule, the following examples of qualifying and nonqualifying items are given in subitems (1) and (2).

(1) Qualifying items: Master tapes from which copies are made are the media that determine the arrangement of the magnetic materials on the copy and therefore qualify as "used in producing a direct effect" resulting in the reproduction; and photographic transparencies that are used in conjunction with light to produce a desired effect that the light alone would not produce. These transparencies qualify as "used in producing a direct effect upon the product."

(2) Nonqualifying items: Drill extension bars, drill chucks, and burner tips. These items might be considered separate detachable units, but they neither cause the physical or chemical change that might be associated with their use, nor is their use for the purpose of determining the shape, contour, configuration, content, or arrangement of content of the product, or any part of the product, being produced. They are used merely to hold or guide the item or process.

C. "Ordinary useful life" means accessory tools, equipment, and other short-lived items that, when used continuously in production under normal conditions of the user, have a life of less than 12 months. "Ordinary useful life" can be shown by providing evidence that prior purchases of similar items had useful lives of less than 12 months.

Junking, scrapping, wearing out, or disposing of the item is conclusive evidence of the end of its ordinary useful life. Keeping an item after it has been used is not evidence of continued useful life unless the item is reused or is held for reuse in the taxpayer's ordinary production process. Repair (as defined in part 8130.0700) of an item is not evidence of the end of that item's ordinary useful life. For example, when an item that has an ordinary useful life of two years needs a repair six months after it has been purchased, the repair does not mean the item's useful life is six months.

Subp. 10. Building materials. The purchase of materials or supplies used to construct, repair, or maintain agricultural or industrial buildings is taxable.

Subp. 11. Feeds. The purchase of feed, feed additives, and feed supplements for use or consumption in agricultural or industrial production is exempt. Such feeds are used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production if they are fed to (1) agricultural animals raised for sale; (2) animals kept for use in agricultural production; (3) farm work stock; and (4) the following animals while they are being raised for sale on a commercial basis: fur-bearing animals, animals used as a source of wool, pets, and research animals. "Agricultural animals" means cattle, sheep, swine, goats, horses, mules, dairy animals, poultry, honey bees, fish, or other animals that are commercially raised for sale. "Farm work stock" means animals, such as draft horses, mules, oxen, and herd dogs, which are used exclusively for farming. "Fur-bearing animal" means a fox, mink, fitch, chinchilla, karakul, marten, nutria, or fisher that is second or later generation raised in captivity. "Pet" means any domesticated animal normally maintained in or near the household of the owner and kept for affection and pleasure rather than for utility or profit. The purchase of feed is subject to tax if it is to be fed to animals that are not used or consumed in agricultural production, or to those animals, such as a pet or a riding horse, that are not being raised for sale on a commercial basis.

Subp. 12. Seeds. The purchase of seeds or plants to be used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production is not taxable. The purchase of lawn seeds or plants, flower seeds or plants, vegetable seeds or plants, or other similar seeds or plants, for nonproduction use, is taxable. Generally, tree seedlings purchased for windbreaks are not used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production and are taxable. Seeds and trees purchased by farmers for use on land that is part of the Conservation Reserve Program or other specifically enumerated government program are exempted under Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9.

Subp. 13. Agricultural production.

A. Under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.01, subdivision 13, the term "agricultural production," as used in Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.25, subdivision 9, includes, but is not limited to, the terms "horticulture," "floriculture," and "raising of pets, fur-bearing animals, research animals, and horses." Agricultural production also includes "aquiculture."

(1) "Horticulture" means the cultivation of a garden or an orchard; the science of growing fruits and vegetables and flowers or plants.

(2) "Agriculture" means the art or science of cultivating the soil, especially in fields or in large quantities, including the preservation of the soil; the planting of seeds; the raising and harvesting of crops; the rearing, feeding, and management of livestock; tillage; husbandry; and farming.

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(3) "Floriculture" means the cultivation of flowering plants.

(4) "Aquiculture" means the cultivation of plants and animals in water for harvest, including hydroponics and raising fish in fish farms.

The activities defined in this item are agricultural production to the extent that the "person" as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.01, subdivision 2, commercially engages in the activities so described, or if the product of the activities is on a scale comparable with that of a commercial producer. The agricultural activity must result in the production of personal property intended to be sold ultimately at retail.

B. Generally, the sale of an animal is taxable because it is the sale of tangible personal property. However, there are some exceptions for certain animals associated with agricultural production. See item C. The purchase of animals for use as pets is taxable. The purchase of animals for use as breeding stock is taxable unless the offspring of that animal, if purchased separately, would otherwise be exempt under this subpart.

C. The purchase of animals that will be used or consumed in agricultural or industrial production is exempt. This includes animals used in research and development. It also includes domesticated animals that are purchased solely as a commercial source of wool, and domesticated fur-bearing animals purchased as a commercial source of pelts. "Solely as a commercial source of wool" means the animals are purchased for use other than as work animals, as pets, for show or exhibition, or for any purpose other than the processing or selling of the wool for profit. The purchase of animals which will be used as food for humans is exempt. The purchase of animals for the purpose of using them as an ingredient in a manufacturing process, such as for the production of food for animals or poultry, is exempt. Game animals and game birds, as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 97A.015, constitute food for human consumption.

D. Generally, charges for breeding animals are not taxable. However, fees for the breeding of certain racing horses are taxable. See the provisions of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.01, subdivision 3, clause (h).

The purchase of veterinarian services or drugs and medicines used in agricultural or industrial production is not taxable. See part 8130.8700 for more detail regarding veterinarian services. The purchase of semen to be used and consumed in agricultural production is exempt. The initial sale and subsequent refills of liquid nitrogen are treated as a sale of a chemical used in the processing of an agricultural product and are exempt. The sale or lease of liquid nitrogen tanks is taxable. Also taxable are semen supplies such as charts, office records, inseminating gloves, and inseminating catheters.

E. The purchase of farm machinery and equipment such as tractors, combines, corn pickers, milking machines, and other equipment used directly and principally in agricultural production is subject to sales tax at a statutorily reduced rate. See *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 297A.01, subdivision 15, and 297A.02, subdivision 2, for more details on farm machinery.

F. Equipment and machinery that do not qualify for the farm machinery reduced rate, such as trucks, trailers, air compressors, and ventilator fans, are subject to tax at the general rate. "Farm machinery" does not include repair or replacement parts. See *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.01, subdivision 15. Therefore, it is the general rule that repair or replacement parts of farm machinery are subject to tax at the general rate. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 29, however, specifically exempts the gross receipts from the sale of repair and replacement parts, except tires, which are assigned a specific or generic part number by the manufacturer of farm machinery that qualifies for the reduced rate referred to in item E. To qualify for this exemption, the purchaser must be in the business of agricultural production. See *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.25, subdivision 29.

G. The purchase of aquaculture production equipment such as automatic feed systems, net pens, fish counting equipment, oxygen generators, water diversion devices, and other new or used machinery, equipment, implements, accessories, and contrivances used directly and principally in aquaculture production is subject to sales tax at the reduced rate imposed by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.02, subdivision 2. Repair or replacement parts for aquaculture production equipment are subject to tax at the general rate. See *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 17.47, subdivisions 2 and 7, and 297A.01, subdivision 19, for more details on aquaculture and aquaculture production equipment.

REPEALER. *Minnesota Rules*, parts 8130.2000 and 8130.5500, subparts 3, 4, and 5, are repealed.

Each hearing will begin at 1:00 p.m., and reconvene at 7:00 p.m. for those who prefer to come in the evening.

All interested persons will have an opportunity to participate by presenting evidence and argument orally, or at their option in writing. The hearing record will be held open for written comments for at least five days after the close of the last hearing, and up to 20 days if the administrative law judge so orders. Comments submitted during the comment period will be available for review at the office of administrative hearings, and the agency and interested persons may respond to new information in them in writing within five business days after the submission period ends. No additional evidence may be submitted during the five day period. To be on time, submissions must be received by the office of administrative hearings by 4:30 p.m. on the last day for submission.

The rules are being adopted under the statutory authority in *Minnesota Statutes* sections 14.06, 03B.101 subdivision 7, 103B.3355, 103F.612, and 103G.2242.

The rules implement the Wetlands Conservation Act of 1991, *Laws of Minnesota 1991*, chapter 354. The central provision of the act is that all wetlands of all sizes and types that are not already regulated by the commissioner of natural resources, cannot be drained or filled, except in certain circumstances spelled out in the act, without the lost wetland being replaced. The rule provides definitions of terms used in the act and in the rules, interprets the exemptions and describes documentation which will establish qualification for exemptions, set out procedures for local governments and landowners and the board of water and soil resources to follow, gives standards for acceptable replacement of lost wetlands, sets up a wetland banking system, and gives standards and procedures for calcareous fens and for draining and filling of wetlands as part of mining operations.

Notice is hereby given that a statement of need and reasonableness is now available for review at the Board office and at the Office of Administrative Hearings. This statement of need and reasonableness includes a summary of all the evidence and argument which the agency anticipates presenting at the hearing justifying both the need for and the reasonableness of the proposed rules. Copies of the statement of need and reasonableness may be reviewed at the Board office or the Office of Administrative Hearings. A copy may be obtained from the Office of Administrative Hearings at the cost of reproduction, or from the Board at no cost.

The Board of Water and Soil Resources is interested in public testimony on every element of the rule, and is particularly interested in input on five specific issues:

- Whether the definitions of "agricultural land" and "introduced hayland" and "introduced pasture" given in the rule, are appropriate, and if not, how they should be changed. The definitions effect the extent of the application of exemptions 7 and 8 (type 1 wetlands and type 2 wetlands on agricultural land), and which lands get the benefit of the one to one (rather than two to one) acreage replacement ratio.
- Whether, when a wetland is drained or filled without replacement under an agricultural exemption, the notice of agricultural use should be required to be recorded with the deed only when the land is in a city, or in all cases.
- Whether the technical panel should provide the local government with its determinations of wetland values, location, size and type for every replacement plan submitted, or only when the local government has questions concerning any of those four technical factual issues, or when the landowner or others participating in the replacement plan proceeding raise questions.
- Whether wetlands which have been drained or filled under an exemption can be restored for use as a replacement wetland ten years after the draining or filling occurred, or should never be allowed to be used for replacement.
- Whether the rule as proposed is correct in limiting banking to restored wetlands, or whether and in what circumstances created wetlands should also be allowed to be banked.

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Since the purpose of the hearing is to improve the rule as proposed, interested persons must understand that the final rule may differ from the rule as it is now proposed.

Persons participating in the hearing who are lobbyists must register with the state Ethical Practices Board. Questions regarding this should be directed to the Board, whose address and phone number are 1st floor Centennial Office Building, St. Paul, MN 55155, (612) 296-5148.

Notice: any person may request notification of the date on which the administrative law judge's report will be available, after which date the agency may not take any final action on the rules for a period of five working days. If you desire to be so notified, you may so indicate at the hearing. After the hearing, you may request notification by sending a written request to the administrative law judge. Any person may request notification of the date on which the rules are adopted and filed with the secretary of state. The notice must be mailed on the same day that the rules are filed. If you want to be so notified, you may so indicate at the hearing or send a request in writing to the agency at any time prior to the filing of the rules with the secretary of state.

Judge Klein will conduct the hearing in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes* sections 14.14 to 14.20 and *Minnesota Rules* parts 1400.0200 to 1400.1200. Questions regarding procedure may be directed to Judge Klein.

The Board of Water and Soil Resources estimates that adoption of the rule may require local public bodies to spend up to \$8,000,000, depending on their administrative approach, in the two years after the rule is adopted. The rules may affect small businesses which drain or fill wetlands. The rule will not have a direct and substantial adverse effect on agricultural land under the state agricultural land preservation and conservation law. Analyses of fiscal impact and of effect on small businesses and on agricultural land preservation and conservation are contained in the statement of need and reasonableness.

Rules as Proposed (all new material)

8420.0100 PURPOSE.

This chapter implements the Wetland Conservation Act of 1991, *Laws of Minnesota 1991*, chapter 354. This chapter shall be interpreted to implement the purpose of the act, which is to:

- A. achieve no net loss in the quantity, quality, and biological diversity of Minnesota's existing wetlands;
- B. increase the quantity, quality, and biological diversity of Minnesota's wetlands by restoring or enhancing diminished or drained wetlands;
- C. avoid direct or indirect impacts from activities that destroy or diminish the quantity, quality, and biological diversity of wetlands; and
- D. replace wetland values where avoidance of activity is not feasible and prudent.

8420.0105 SCOPE.

After the effective date of this chapter, wetlands must not be drained or filled wholly or partially unless replaced by restoring or creating wetland areas of at least equal public value.

This chapter does not prevent the use of the bed of wetlands for pasture or cropland during dry periods if dikes, ditches, tile lines, or buildings are not constructed and the agricultural use does not result in the drainage of the wetlands. This chapter does not prevent filling a wetland to accommodate wheeled booms on irrigation devices if the fill does not impede normal drainage. This chapter does not prevent control of noxious weeds if the control does not drain or fill the wetland.

This chapter does not apply to the public waters and public waters wetlands as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.005, subdivisions 15 and 18, which have been inventoried by the commissioner according to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.201. This chapter is in addition to other regulations including those of the United States Army Corps of Engineers, United States Department of Agriculture, Minnesota state agencies, watershed districts, and local governments.

This chapter does not apply to peat mining as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.461, which is subject to the permit to mine and reclamation requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, and the rules of the commissioner adopted under those sections.

This chapter does not require state agencies to obtain local government unit approvals. However, state agencies shall coordinate with local government units when conducting activities in wetlands within the jurisdiction of the local government unit. The state agencies shall follow the same sequencing and replacement requirements as prescribed by this chapter.

In addition to the provisions of this chapter, governmental decisions on draining and filling of wetlands are subject to *Minnesota Statutes*, chapters 116B and 116D, which provide that an action which is likely to have material adverse effects on natural resources must not be allowed if there is a feasible and prudent alternative consistent with the requirements of the public health, safety, and welfare and the state's paramount concern for the protection of its natural resources. Economic considerations alone do not justify adversely effective actions.

8420.0110 DEFINITIONS.

Subpart 1. **Scope.** The terms used in this chapter have the meanings given them in this part.

Subp. 2. **Act.** "Act," when not used in reference to a specific state or federal act, means the Wetland Conservation Act of 1991, *Laws 1991*, chapter 354.

Subp. 3. **Activity.** "Activity" means draining or filling a wetland wholly or partially.

Subp. 4. **Agricultural land.** "Agricultural land," for use in part 8420.0120, subparts 7 and 8, means land devoted to the production of horticultural, row, close grown, introduced pasture, introduced hayland crops, and growing nursery stock.

For use in determining replacement ratios, agricultural land means land devoted to the production of horticultural, row, close grown, introduced pasture, and introduced hayland crops, and to the pasturing of livestock and dairy animals, growing nursery stock, and animal feedlots.

Subp. 5. **Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.** "Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service" means an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Subp. 6. **Aquaculture.** "Aquaculture" means to cultivate plants and animals in water for harvest, including hydroponics and raising fish in fish farms.

Subp. 7. **Best management practices.** "Best management practices" means state-approved construction practices associated with draining, filling, or replacing wetlands that are capable of preventing and minimizing degradation of surface water and groundwater.

Subp. 8. **Board.** "Board" means the board of water and soil resources under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.101.

Subp. 9. **City.** "City" means a home rule charter or statutory city.

Subp. 10. **Commissioner.** "Commissioner" means the commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources.

Subp. 11. **Creation.** "Creation" means construction of wetlands in an area that was not wetlands in the past.

Subp. 12. **Day.** "Day" means working days when used in a time period of 15 days or less and calendar days when used in a time period greater than 15 days. The day of the event shall not be used in counting any period of time.

Subp. 13. **Department.** "Department" means the Department of Natural Resources.

Subp. 14. **Ditch.** "Ditch" means an open channel to conduct the flow of water, as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103E.005, subdivision 8.

Subp. 15. **Drain or drainage.** "Drain" or "drainage" means any method for removing or diverting waters from wetlands. The methods shall include, but are not limited to, excavation of an open ditch, installation of subsurface drainage tile, filling, diking, or pumping.

Subp. 16. **Drainage system.** "Drainage system" means a system of ditch or tile, or both, to drain property, including laterals, improvements, and improvements of outlets.

Subp. 17. **Excavation.** "Excavation" means the displacement or removal of the sediment or other materials by any method.

Subp. 18. **Fill.** "Fill" means any solid material added to a wetland that would alter its cross-section or hydrological characteristics, obstruct flow patterns, change the wetland boundary, or convert the wetland to a nonwetland. It does not include posts and pilings for linear projects such as bridges, elevated walkways, or powerline structures, or structures traditionally built on pilings such as docks and boathouses. It does include posts and pilings that result in bringing the wetland into a nonaquatic use or significantly altering the wetland's functions and values, such as the construction of office and industrial developments, parking structures, restaurants, stores,

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hotels, multifamily housing projects, and similar structures. It does not include slash or woody vegetation, if the slash or woody vegetation originated from vegetation growing in the wetland and does not impair the flow or circulation of water or the reach of the wetland.

Subp. 19. **Floodplain wetland.** "Floodplain wetland" means a wetland located in the floodplain of a watercourse, with no well defined inlets or outlets, including tile systems, ditches, or natural watercourses. This may include the floodplain itself when it exhibits wetland characteristics.

Subp. 20. **Flow-through wetland.** "Flow-through wetland" means a wetland with both a well defined outlet and one or more well defined inlets, including tile systems, ditches, or natural watercourses.

Subp. 21. **Hydric soils.** "Hydric soils" means soils that are saturated, flooded, or ponded long enough during the growing season to develop anaerobic conditions in the upper part.

Subp. 22. **Hydrophytic vegetation.** "Hydrophytic vegetation" means macrophytic plant life growing in water, soil, or on a substrate that is at least periodically deficient in oxygen as a result of excessive water content.

Subp. 23. **Impact.** "Impact" means a loss in the quantity, quality, or biological diversity of a wetland caused by draining or filling.

Subp. 24. **Impacted wetland.** "Impacted wetland" means a wetland that has been drained or filled, partially or wholly, and is subject to replacement.

Subp. 25. **Infrastructure.** "Infrastructure" means storm water and sanitary sewer piping, outfalls, inlets, street subbase, roads, and ditches, culverts, bridges, and any other work defined specifically by a local government unit as constituting a capital improvement.

Subp. 26. **Introduced hayland.** "Introduced hayland" means an area devoted to the production of forage and cultivated in a rotation of row crops or small grains or interseeded with introduced or native species at least once during the 20-year period before January 1, 1991. These areas must be harvested by mechanical methods at least two years during the period January 1, 1981 to January 1, 1991. These areas are considered to be in agricultural crop production.

Subp. 27. **Introduced pasture.** "Introduced pasture" means an area devoted to the production of forage and cultivated in a rotation of row crops or small grains or interseeded with introduced species at least once during the 20-year period before January 1, 1991. These areas must be harvested by grazing at least two years during the period January 1, 1981 to January 1, 1991. These areas are considered to be in agricultural crop production.

Subp. 28. **Isolated wetland.** "Isolated wetland" means a wetland without well defined inlets or outlets, including tile systems, ditches, or natural watercourses.

Subp. 29. **Landowner.** "Landowner" means a person or entity having the rights necessary to drain or fill a wetland, or to establish and maintain a replacement or banked wetland. Typically, the landowner is a fee title owner or a holder of an easement, license, lease, or rental agreement providing the necessary rights. The right must not be limited by a lien or other encumbrance that could override the obligations assumed with the replacement or banking of a wetland.

Subp. 30. **Local government unit.** "Local government unit" means:

A. outside of the seven-county metropolitan area, a city council or county board of commissioners;

B. in the seven-county metropolitan area, a city council, town board, or watershed management organization under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.205, subdivision 13; and

C. in those cases where an activity or replacement will occur on state land, the agency with administrative responsibility for that land.

Subp. 31. **Mining.** "Mining" means the removal of peat and metallic minerals as provided in *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.461 and 93.481.

Subp. 32. **Nondegraded wetland.** "Nondegraded wetland" means a wetland that has not been partially drained or filled by human activities.

Subp. 33. **Pasture.** "Pasture" means land used for grazing by domestic livestock.

Subp. 34. **Peace officer.** "Peace officer" has the meaning given it in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 626.84.

Subp. 35. **Project.** "Project" means an action or series of actions necessary to accomplish an ultimate purpose and that will cause a physical manipulation of the environment, directly or indirectly. Draining or filling of wetlands may be a component of a project.

Subp. 36. **Project-specific.** "Project-specific" means the applicant for the replacement plan approval will construct the replacement as part of the project, rather than obtain the replacement from a wetland bank.

Subp. 37. **Public transportation project.** "Public transportation project" means a project conducted by a public agency involving transportation facilities open to the public.

Subp. 38. **Public waters wetlands.** "Public waters wetlands" means all types 3, 4, and 5 wetlands, as defined in United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition), that were inventoried by the department as public waters under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.201.

Subp. 39. **Replacement wetland.** "Replacement wetland" means a wetland restored or created to replace public values lost at an impacted wetland.

Subp. 40. **Restoration.** "Restoration" means reestablishment of an area that was historically wetlands but currently provides no or minimal wetland functions due to alteration such as filling or drainage.

Subp. 41. **Right-of-way acreage.** "Right-of-way acreage" has the meaning given it in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103E.285, subdivision 6.

Subp. 42. **Riverine wetland.** "Riverine wetland" means a wetland contained within the banks of a channel that may contain moving water or that forms a connecting link between two bodies of standing water.

Subp. 43. **Set aside.** "Set aside" means the cropland acreage annually retired as a condition to landowner participation in United States Department of Agriculture commodity programs.

Subp. 44. **Silviculture.** "Silviculture" means the scientific management of forest trees.

Subp. 45. **Soil and water conservation district.** "Soil and water conservation district" means a legal subdivision of state government under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 103C.

Subp. 46. **Soil Conservation Service.** "Soil Conservation Service" means an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Subp. 47. **Tributary wetland.** "Tributary wetland" means a wetland with a well defined outlet, including tile systems, ditches, or natural watercourses, but without a well defined inlet.

Subp. 48. **Utility.** "Utility" means a sanitary sewer, storm sewer, potable water distribution, and transmission, distribution, or furnishing, at wholesale or retail, of natural or manufactured gas, electricity, telephone, or radio service or communications.

Subp. 49. **Watershed.** "Watershed" means the 81 major watershed units delineated by the map "State of Minnesota Watershed Boundaries - 1979" as produced by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Office of Planning and Research, Water Policy Planning Program, with funding from the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources.

Subp. 50. **Watershed management organization.** "Watershed management organization" means a watershed district wholly within the metropolitan area or a joint powers entity established wholly or partly within the metropolitan area by special law or by agreement that performs some or all of the functions of a watershed district for a watershed and that has the characteristics and the authority specified under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.211. Lake improvement or conservation districts are not watershed management organizations.

Subp. 51. **Wetlands, a wetland, the wetland, or wetland area.**

A. "Wetlands" means lands transitional between terrestrial and aquatic systems where the water table is usually at or near the surface or the land is covered by shallow water.

For purposes of this subpart, wetlands must:

(1) have a predominance of hydric soils;

(2) be inundated or saturated by surface water or groundwater at a frequency and duration sufficient to support a prevalence of hydrophytic vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions; and

(3) under normal circumstances, support a prevalence of hydrophytic vegetation.

B. "A wetland" or "the wetland" means a distinct hydrologic feature with characteristics of item A, surrounded by nonwetland and including all contiguous wetland types, except those connected solely by riverine wetlands. "Wetland area" means a portion of "a wetland" or "the wetland."

C. Wetlands does not include public waters wetlands and public waters that are designated on the public waters inventory maps prepared under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.201.

Subp. 52. **Wetlands in a cultivated field.** "Wetlands in a cultivated field" means a wetland where greater than 50 percent of its boundary abuts land that was in agricultural crop production in six of the ten years before January 1, 1991.

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Subp. 53. **Wetlands located on agricultural land.** "Wetlands located on agricultural land" means a wetland where greater than 50 percent of its boundary abuts land that was in agricultural crop production in six of the ten years before January 1, 1991.

These documents are available through the Minitex interlibrary loan system, except the National Wetland Inventory maps, which are available at Minnesota soil and water conservation district offices. None of the documents are subject to frequent change.

8420.0115 SCOPE OF EXEMPTION STANDARDS.

When considering if a drain or fill activity qualifies for an exemption listed in a specified clause of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2241, subdivision 1, the exemption standards in part 8420.0120 apply.

An activity is exempt if it qualifies for any one of the exemptions, even though it may be indicated as not exempt under another exemption.

These exemptions do not apply to calcareous fens as identified by the commissioner.

No exemptions apply to wetlands that have been previously restored or created as a result of an approved replacement plan. All such wetlands are subject to replacement on subsequent drainage or filling.

In cases where drain or fill activities convert only a portion of a nonexempt wetland to nonwetland, no exemptions or no-loss determinations can be applied to the remaining wetland that would not have been applicable before the impact.

A person conducting an activity in a wetland under an exemption in part 8420.0120 shall ensure that:

A. appropriate erosion control measures are taken to prevent sedimentation of the water;

B. the activity does not block fish activity in a watercourse; and

C. the activity is conducted in compliance with all other applicable federal, state, and local requirements, including best management practices and water resource protection requirements established under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 103H.

8420.0120 EXEMPTION STANDARDS.

Subpart 1. **Exemption (1).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(1) activities in a wetland that was planted with annually seeded crops, was in a crop rotation seeding of pasture grasses or legumes, or was required to be set aside to receive price support or other payments under United States Code, title 7, sections 1421 to 1469, in six of the last ten years prior to January 1, 1991.

Documentation, such as Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service aerial photographs, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service form 578 or equivalent, United States Department of Agriculture records, or affidavit of landowner must be required by the local government unit to show and use as evidence for this exemption.

Set aside land used for this exemption must be wetland types 1 and 2.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless it is first replaced under the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

Subp. 2. **Exemption (2).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(2) activities in a wetland that is or has been enrolled in the federal conservation reserve program under United States Code, title 16, section 3831, that:

(i) was planted with annually seeded crops, was in a crop rotation seeding, or was required to be set aside to receive price support or payment under United States Code, title 7, sections 1421 to 1469, in six of the last ten years prior to being enrolled in the program; and

(ii) has not been restored with assistance from a public or private wetland restoration program.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless it is first replaced under the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

Federal documentation that the wetland is or has been enrolled in the federal conservation reserve program may be used as evidence for the exemption. The landowner must also meet the same requirements of subpart 2 for the exemption stated in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2241, subdivision 1, clause (1), except that the years required are at least six of the ten years preceding the year of enrollment in the conservation reserve program. The landowner must also state in writing that the wetland was not restored with assistance from a public or private wetland restoration fund, or that the restoration was done under a contract or easement providing the landowner with the right to drain the restored wetland.

Subp. 3. Exemption (3). A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(3) activities necessary to repair and maintain existing public or private drainage systems as long as wetlands that have been in existence for more than 20 years are not drained.

This exemption allows maintenance which fills wetlands that have been in existence for more than 20 years when the wetlands are located within the right-of-way acreage of the ditch and the filling is limited to the side casting of spoil materials resulting from the maintenance.

The owner must provide documentation that the wetlands which will be partially or completely drained by the maintenance have not existed for more than 20 years.

Aerial photographs from two years of normal or wetter than normal water level conditions showing no wetland are one form of acceptable documentation. If aerial photographs are unavailable, a sworn affidavit may be submitted. Otherwise, the landowner must show that the maintenance will not reduce the wetland from what it was 20 years ago or more.

This exemption includes lowering the elevation of previously placed tile when made necessary by land subsidence provided the lowering does not drain wetlands.

Subp. 4. Exemption (4). A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(4) activities in a wetland that has received a commenced drainage determination provided for by the federal Food Security Act of 1985, that was made to the county agricultural stabilization and conservation service office prior to September 19, 1988, and a ruling and any subsequent appeals or reviews have determined that drainage of the wetland had been commenced prior to December 23, 1985.

The landowner must provide Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service documents confirming that the county agricultural stabilization and conservation service office determined before September 19, 1988, that drainage had begun before December 23, 1985, and that the determination has not been overturned by subsequent appeal or review and is not currently under administrative review.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless it is first replaced under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

Subp. 5. Exemption (5). A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(5) activities exempted from federal regulation under United States Code, title 33, section 1344(f).

The local government unit may certify the exemption only if the landowner furnishes proof of qualification for one of the exemptions from the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

This exemption does not apply when the activity is part of an activity with the purpose of converting a wetland to a nonwetland,

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either immediately or gradually, or converting the wetland to another use, or when the fill will result in significant discernible change to the flow or circulation of water in the wetland, or partly draining it, or reducing the wetland area.

Subp. 6. **Exemption (6).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(6) activities authorized under, and conducted in accordance with, an applicable general permit issued by the United States Army Corps of Engineers under section 404 of the federal Clean Water Act, United States Code, title 33, section 1344, except the nationwide permit in *Code of Federal Regulations*, title 33, section 330.5, paragraph (a), clause (14), limited to when a new road crosses a wetland, and all of clause (26).

This exemption is for nationwide permits 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 20, 21, 22, 23, and 25 issued under *Code of Federal Regulations*, title 33, section 330.5. The local government unit may certify such an exemption only if the applicant furnishes proof of qualification for one of these nationwide permits from the United States Army Corps of Engineers. Nationwide permit 14 for a new road does not qualify for this exemption, nor do nationwide permits under numbers not listed in this exemption.

To qualify for a nationwide permit, the applicant for a United States Army Corps of Engineers permit must meet any regional conditions imposed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and must obtain from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency an individual section 401 certification when required.

Subp. 7. **Exemption (7).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(7) activities in a type 1 wetland on agricultural land, as defined in United States Fish and Wildlife Circular No. 39 (1971 edition) except for bottomland hardwood type 1 wetlands.

The landowner must provide the same proofs required by the first paragraph of subpart 1, for lands abutting at least 50 percent of the wetland's boundary. The local government unit may seek the advice of the technical panel as to whether the wetland is a type 1 wetland not of the bottomland hardwood type.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless it is first replaced under the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

The type of the wetland must be determined according to United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition). Alternatively, the type of the wetland can be determined from the Cowardin classification shown on the National Wetland Inventory map: PEM1A and PEM1J may be considered to be a type 1 wetland.

This exemption applies if the wetland is all type 1 wetland, or is a combination of types 1 and 2 wetlands, on agricultural land, and the type 2 wetland area is less than two acres.

Subp. 8. **Exemption (8).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(8) activities in a type 2 wetland that is two acres in size or less located on agricultural land.

The landowner must provide the same material as required from the landowner by subpart 7. The local government unit may seek the advice of the technical panel as to whether the wetland is a type 2 wetland, two acres or less in size.

The wetland size is the area within its boundary. The boundary must be determined according to the "Federal Manual for Identifying and Delineating Jurisdictional Wetlands" (January 1989). The type of the wetland must be determined according to United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition). Alternatively, type can be determined from the Cowardin classification shown on the National Wetland Inventory map: PEM1B may be considered to be a type 2 wetland.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless it is first replaced under the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

This exemption applies if the wetland is a type 2 wetland, or is a combination of types 1 and 2 wetlands, on agricultural land, and the type 2 wetland area is less than two acres.

Subp. 9. **Exemption (9).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(9) activities in a wetland restored for conservation purposes under a contract or easement providing the landowner with the right to drain the restored wetland.

The landowner must provide a contract or easement conveyance or affidavit demonstrating that the landowner or a predecessor restored the wetland for conservation purposes but retained the right to subsequently drain the restored wetland.

Subp. 10. **Exemption (10).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(10) activities in a wetland created solely as a result of:

- (i) beaver dam construction;
- (ii) blockage of culverts through roadways maintained by a public or private entity;
- (iii) actions by public entities that were taken for a purpose other than creating the wetland; or
- (iv) any combination of (i) to (iii).

Wetland areas created by beaver activities may be drained by removing those materials placed by beaver. Drainage is permitted by removing or moving materials blocking installed roadway culverts and drainage structures. Additional excavation or removal of other materials is not permitted unless it can be shown by aerial photographs that the proposed activity will not drain or fill wetland that was there before the beaver dam was built or the culvert became plugged.

Wetlands may be drained or filled if the landowner can show that the wetland was created solely by actions the purpose of which was not to create the wetland and were approved, permitted, funded, or overseen by a public entity.

Impoundments or excavations constructed in nonwetlands solely for the purpose of effluent treatment, storm water retention, soil and water conservation practices, and water quality improvements, and not as part of a compensatory wetland mitigation process that may, over time, take on wetland characteristics, are also exempted.

Subp. 11. **Exemption (11).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(11) placement, maintenance, repair, enhancement, or replacement of utility or utility-type service, including the transmission, distribution, or furnishing, at wholesale or retail, of natural or manufactured gas, electricity, telephone, or radio service or communications if:

(i) the impacts of the proposed project on the hydrologic and biological characteristics of the wetland have been avoided and minimized to the extent possible; and

(ii) the proposed project significantly modifies or alters less than one-half acre of wetlands.

For new replacement and enhancement of existing facilities, the utility must demonstrate that the character and extent of the impacts of the proposed project on the wetlands have been minimized and that the entire project will, cumulatively, drain or fill less than one-half acre of wetland.

For maintenance, repair, and replacement, the local government unit may issue a seasonal or annual exemption certification or the utility may proceed without local government unit certification if it is carrying out the work according to best management practices. Work of an emergency nature may proceed as necessary and any drain or fill activities shall be addressed with the local government unit after the emergency work has been completed.

Subp. 12. **Exemption (12).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(12) activities associated with routine maintenance of utility and pipeline rights-of-way, provided the activities do not result in additional intrusion into the wetland.

This exemption is for maintenance, but not expansion, of the rights-of-way in which utilities are located. Spill remediation is not routine maintenance.

The local government unit may issue a seasonal or annual exemption certification or the utility may proceed if it is carrying out the work according to best management practices. Work of an emergency nature may proceed as necessary and any drain or fill activities shall be addressed with the local government unit after the emergency work has been completed.

Subp. 13. **Exemption (13).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(13) alteration of a wetland associated with the operation, maintenance, or repair of an interstate pipeline.

This exemption includes construction activities.

Subp. 14. **Exemption (14).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(14) temporarily crossing or entering a wetland to perform silvicultural activities, including timber harvest as part of a forest management activity, so long as the activity limits the impact on the hydrologic and biologic characteristics of the wetland; the activities do not result in the construction of dikes, drainage ditches, tile lines, or buildings; and the timber harvesting and other silvicultural practices do not result in the drainage of the wetland or public waters.

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This exemption is for temporary-use roads constructed for the primary purpose of providing access for the conduct of silvicultural activities.

Subp. 15. **Exemption (15).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(15) permanent access for forest roads across wetlands so long as the activity limits the impact on the hydrologic and biologic characteristics of the wetland; the construction activities do not result in the access becoming a dike, drainage ditch or tile line; with filling avoided wherever possible; and there is no drainage of the wetland or public waters.

This exemption is the same as the exemption in subpart 14, except that it is for permanent forest roads.

This exemption is for roads constructed for the primary purpose of providing access for the conduct of silvicultural activities.

Subp. 16. **Exemption (16).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(16) activities associated with routine maintenance of existing public highways, roads, streets, and bridges, provided the activities do not result in additional intrusion into the wetland and do not result in the draining or filling, wholly or partially, of a wetland.

This exemption does not prevent repairing washouts or adding material to the driving surface provided the road's occupancy of the wetland does not increase.

Subp. 17. **Exemption (17).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(17) emergency repair and normal maintenance and repair of existing public works, provided the activity does not result in additional intrusion of the public works into the wetland and do not result in the draining or filling, wholly or partially, of a wetland.

This exemption applies to public works other than roads, such as buildings and bridges.

Subp. 18. **Exemption (18).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(18) normal maintenance and minor repair of structures causing no additional intrusion of an existing structure into the wetland, and maintenance and repair of private crossings that do not result in the draining or filling, wholly or partially, of a wetland.

This exemption applies to private structures, such as buildings and road crossings.

Subp. 19. **Exemption (19).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(19) duck blinds.

This exemption allows floating duck blinds and blinds on poles or pilings. This exemption does not allow fill other than poles or pilings.

Subp. 20. **Exemption (20).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(20) aquaculture activities, except building or altering of docks and activities involving the draining or filling, wholly or partially, of a wetland.

Subp. 21. **Exemption (21).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(21) wild rice production activities, including necessary diking and other activities authorized under a permit issued by the United States Army Corps of Engineers under section 404 of the federal Clean Water Act, United States Code, title 33, section 1344.

Documentation demonstrating that the exemption applies may include showing possession of a United States Army Corps of Engineers permit for the project.

Subp. 22. **Exemption (22).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(22) normal agricultural practices to control pests or weeds, defined by rule as either noxious or secondary weeds, in accordance with applicable requirements under state and federal law, including established best management practices.

This exemption does not allow diking, ditching, tiling, or filling, or other control practices that would result in the conversion of wetlands.

Subp. 23. **Exemption (23).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(23) activities in a wetland that is on agricultural land annually enrolled in the federal Food, Agricultural, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990, United States Code, title 16, section 3821, subsection (a), clauses (1) to (3), as amended, and is subject to sections 1421 to 1424 of the federal act in effect on January 1, 1991, except that land enrolled in a federal farm program is eligible for easement participation for those acres not already compensated under a federal program.

Documentation such as a written statement from the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office that the proposed activity would not result in loss of eligibility for benefits under the farm program may be used as evidence for this exemption. If the activity would result in loss of eligibility, the landowner cannot qualify for the exemption by withdrawing from the program.

Present and future owners can make no use of the wetland area after it is altered, other than as agricultural land for ten years, unless

it is first replaced under the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.222, paragraph (g). If the local government unit approves an exemption, the landowner must execute and the local government unit must record a notice of this restriction if the wetland is in a city.

Subp. 24. **Exemption (24).** A replacement plan for wetlands is not required for:

(24) development projects and ditch improvement projects in the state that have received preliminary or final plat approval, or infrastructure that has been installed, or having local site plan approval, conditional use permits, or similar official approval by a governing body or government agency, within five years before July 1, 1991. In the seven-county metropolitan area and in cities of the first and second class, plat approval must be preliminary as approved by the appropriate governing body.

Subdividers who obtained preliminary plat approval in the specified time period, and other project developers with one of the listed approvals timely obtained, provided approval has not expired and the project remains active, may drain and fill wetlands, to the extent documented by the approval, without replacement. Those elements of the project that can be carried out without changing the approved plan and without draining or filling must be done in that manner. If wetlands can be avoided within the terms of the approved plan, they must be avoided.

For county, joint county, and watershed district ditch projects, this exemption applies to projects that received final approval in the specified time period.

PROCEDURES

8420.0200 DETERMINING LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNIT.

The local government unit responsible for making exemption and no-loss determinations and approving replacement plans shall be determined according to items A to C.

A. Outside the seven-county metropolitan area, the local government unit is the county or city in which the drain or fill activity is located, or its delegate.

B. In the seven-county metropolitan area, the local government unit is the city, town, or water management organization regulating surface-water-related matters in the area in which the drain or fill activity is located, or its delegate. The watershed management plan adopted under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.231, and related board rules will normally indicate the appropriate local government unit. Lacking an indication, the local government unit must be the city, town, or its delegate.

C. If the activity in a wetland is located in two jurisdictions, the local government unit shall be the one exercising zoning authority over the project or if both have zoning authority, the one in which most of the wetland loss will occur. If no zoning permits are required, the local government unit shall be the one in which most of the wetland loss will occur. If an activity will affect wetlands in more than one local government unit, the board will coordinate the project review to ensure consistency and consensus among the local government units involved.

The board will resolve all questions as to which government entity is the responsible authority, applying the guidelines in items A to C.

Notwithstanding items A to C, the department shall be the approving authority for activities associated with projects requiring permits to mine under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.481.

8420.0210 EXEMPTION DETERMINATIONS.

A landowner intending to drain or fill a wetland without replacement, claiming exemption under part 8420.0120, may contact the local government unit before beginning draining or filling activities for determination whether or not the activity is exempt. A landowner who does not request a determination may be subject to the enforcement provisions in part 8420.0290 and *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2372. The local government unit must keep on file all documentation and findings of fact concerning exemption determinations.

Local government units may offer exemption certificates as part of the wetland program within their jurisdiction. An exemption applies whether or not the local government unit chooses to issue certificates of exemption. If the wetland qualifies for an exemption, and the landowner requests a certificate of exemption, then the local government unit must issue one.

The landowner applying for exemption is responsible for submitting the proof necessary to show qualification for the particular exemption claimed.

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The local government unit may place the decision authority for exemption applications with the zoning administrator, or establish other procedures it considers appropriate.

The local government unit decision shall be based on the exemptions standards in part 8420.0120. If the decision requires a finding of wetland size or type, the local government unit should seek the advice of the technical panel as described in part 8420.0240.

A landowner draining or filling a wetland under an exemption shall ensure that appropriate erosion control measures are taken to prevent sedimentation of the water, the drain or fill does not block fish passage, and the drain or fill is conducted in compliance with all other applicable federal, state, and local requirements, including best management practices and water resource protection requirements established under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 103H.

8420.0220 NO-LOSS DETERMINATIONS.

A landowner unsure if proposed work will result in a loss of wetland may apply to the local government unit for a determination. The local government unit shall issue a no-loss certificate if either:

- A. the work will not drain or fill a wetland;
- B. water level management activities will not result in the conversion of a wetland to another land use;
- C. the activities are in a surface impoundment for containment of fossil fuel combustion waste or water retention, and are not part of a compensatory wetland mitigation program;
- D. the activity is being conducted as part of an approved replacement plan or is conducted or authorized by public agencies for the purpose of wetland restoration and the activity is restricted to placing fill in a previously excavated drainage system to restore a wetland to its original condition; or
- E. the draining or filling will be minimal and not warrant replacement. This item is applicable if the total wetland loss will be less than 100 square feet per year per landowner, and the cumulative impact on a wetland over time without replacement after January 1, 1992, of draining and filling by all persons does not exceed five percent of the wetland's area.

8420.0230 REPLACEMENT PLAN DETERMINATIONS.

A landowner intending to drain or fill a wetland who does not qualify for an exemption or no-loss determination shall obtain approval of a replacement plan from the local government unit before beginning draining or filling. A person who does not do so is subject to the enforcement provisions in this chapter and *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2372.

The local government unit may use its usual notice and comment procedures on the application for approval of a replacement plan if, within ten days of receipt of the application, the local government unit mails a copy of the application and an invitation to submit comments to the board, which will publish it in the Environmental Quality Board Monitor; members of the public who have requested a copy; the soil and water conservation district; the watershed district or water management organization, if there is one; the county board; mayors of cities within the watershed; and the commissioners of agriculture and natural resources. At the same time, the local government unit shall publish notice of the application with an invitation for comment in a general circulation newspaper in the area affected.

The local government unit shall not make its decision before 30 days and not more than 60 days have elapsed from the mailing of notice, publication in the Environmental Quality Board Monitor, or publication in the newspaper, whichever is later. The local government unit decision shall not be effective until 30 days after a copy of the decision has been mailed to the Environmental Quality Board Monitor for publication, and mailed to the same list specified above for notice of the application, and to the applicant. The mailing to the applicant shall be by registered mail and must advise that the decision is not effective for 30 days, and is stayed if it is appealed.

The local government unit decision shall be based on the replacement standards in parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630, and on the determination of the technical panel concerning the public values, location, size, and type of the wetland being altered. The local government unit shall consider the recommendation of the technical panel to approve, modify, or reject the proposed replacement plan.

For wetland replacement plans involving more than one local government unit, approval of all local government units involved or as specified in part 8420.0200 shall constitute final approval of the replacement plan and is required before the project may proceed. The local government unit with jurisdiction for the impact site must approve all components of the replacement plan, following the procedures in parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630. The local government unit with jurisdiction for the replacement site shall limit the review to evaluation of the replacement site as in parts 8420.0540 to 8420.0630 and make a decision accordingly.

As part of the approval of the replacement plan, the local government unit with jurisdiction for the replacement site assumes responsibility for ensuring compliance with monitoring provisions according to parts 8420.0600 to 8420.0630. The local government unit with jurisdiction for the replacement site may enter into joint powers agreements with a local government unit with jurisdiction for the impact site, assess fees, or develop other procedures considered necessary to facilitate the process.

8420.0235 WETLAND BANKING PROCEDURES.

For wetland banking procedures, refer to parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760. Appeals of the local government unit banking decisions are taken according to part 8420.0250.

8420.0240 TECHNICAL PANEL PROCEDURES.

For each local government unit, there is a technical panel of three persons: a technical professional employee of the board, a technical professional employee of the soil and water conservation district of the county in which the local government unit is located, and an engineer for the local government unit. The soil and water conservation district member shall act as the contact person and coordinator for the panel. Two members of the panel must be knowledgeable and trained in applying methodologies of the "Federal Manual for Identifying and Delineating Jurisdictional Wetlands" (January 1989), and evaluation of public values. The technical panel may invite additional wetland experts to help the panel in its work.

The panel shall make determinations of public values, location, size, and type for all wetlands for which an application for replacement plan approval has been submitted to the local government unit. The panel shall review replacement plans and recommend to the local government unit either approval, approval with changes or conditions, or rejection. The panel shall make no determinations or recommendations without at least one member having made an on-site inspection. Panel determinations and recommendations must be endorsed by at least two of the three members.

If the local government unit has a comprehensive wetland management plan that delineates location, size, and type for all wetlands, approved by the technical panel, and subsequently incorporated into local ordinance, then the local government unit can make determinations in place of the technical panel.

The panel, or one of its members when so authorized by all of the members, may assist the local government unit in making wetland size and type determinations when asked to do so by the local government unit as part of making an exemption or no-loss determination.

The panel shall monitor replacement wetlands as provided in parts 8420.0600 to 8420.0630, and shall review and monitor banked wetlands as provided for in parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760.

8420.0245 OTHER LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNIT WETLAND RULES AND ORDINANCES.

This chapter and the act provide minimum standards. Local government units may require more procedures and more wetland protection, but not less.

8420.0250 APPEAL OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNIT DECISIONS.

The decision of a local government unit to approve or deny a certificate of exemption or no-loss, or to approve with conditions or reject a replacement plan, becomes final if not appealed to the board within 30 days after the date on which the decision is mailed to those required to receive notice of the decision.

Appeals of decisions arising from provisions of a local ordinance that are more restrictive than these standards, shall be taken to the district court in the same manner as an appeal of a zoning decision.

Before an exemption or no-loss determination may be appealed to the board, it must first be appealed to the local government unit's board of adjustment and appeals, if there is one, or otherwise to the governing body. If the governing body made the initial decision, the landowner must ask the governing body to reconsider before appealing to the board.

Appeal may be made by the landowner, by any of those required to receive notice of the decision, or by 100 residents of the county in which a majority of the wetland is located.

Appeal is effective upon mailing of the notice of appeal to the board with an affidavit that a copy of the notice of appeal has been mailed to the local government unit. The local government unit shall then mail a copy of the notice of the appeal to all those to whom it was required by part 8420.0230 to mail a copy of the notice of decision.

The appeal will be decided by the board within 60 days after receiving the notice of appeal and affidavit. Parties to the appeal are the appellant, the local government unit, and all those required to receive notice of the local government unit decision.

Upon appeal, the local government unit shall forward to the board the record on which it based its decision. The board will make its decision on the appeal after hearing. Thirty days' notice of the hearing shall be given by the board to the parties. The parties may present written and oral argument. When the local government unit has made formal findings contemporaneously with its decision and there is an accurate verbatim transcript of the proceedings and the proceedings were fairly conducted, the board will base its review on the record. Otherwise it may take additional evidence, or remand the matter.

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The board will affirm the local government unit's decision if the local government unit's findings of fact are not clearly erroneous; if the local government unit correctly applied the law to the facts, including this chapter; and if the local government unit made no procedural errors prejudicial to a party. Otherwise, the board will reverse the decision, amend it, or remand it with instructions for further proceedings.

8420.0260 PENALTY FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNIT FAILURE TO APPLY LAW.

The board shall send copies of this chapter to all local government units at least 60 days before July 1, 1993. By July 1, 1993, each local government unit of the state, except tribal lands, shall acknowledge to the board that it is assuming its responsibilities under this chapter and the act. Local government units from which an affirmative response is not received will be given notice by the board that there is a 60-day moratorium in the local government unit's jurisdiction on exemption, no-loss, replacement plan, and banking determinations. The board will end the moratorium within the 60 days upon agreement by the local government unit that it will assume its duties under this chapter and the act.

If the board has information that a local government unit is not following this chapter or the act in making exemption, no-loss, replacement plan, or banking determinations, the board shall notify the local government unit of its concerns. If not satisfied with the local government unit's response, the board shall ask the local government unit to appear at a hearing before the board to discuss the matter. After the hearing, the board shall write the local government unit asking for specific corrective action within 60 days. The notice shall explain the reason for the action.

If, after the 60-day period described in this part the local government unit has not corrected the problem to the satisfaction of the board, the board shall take appropriate legal action to ensure compliance.

8420.0270 COMPENSATION.

Replacement plan applicants who have completed the local government unit process and the board appeal process, and the plan has not been approved as submitted, may apply to the board for compensation under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.237.

The application must identify the applicant, locate the wetland, and refer the board to its appeal file in the matter.

The application must include an agreement that in exchange for compensation the applicant will convey to the state a perpetual conservation easement in the form required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103F.516. The applicant must provide an abstract of title demonstrating the ability to convey the easement free of any prior title, lien, or encumbrance. Failure to provide marketable title negates the state's obligation to compensate.

The applicant must submit official documentation from the United States Army Corps of Engineers, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, the watershed district or water management organization if any, the county, and the town or city, as applicable, that the proposed drain or fill activity and the proposed subsequent use of the wetland are lawful under their respective legal requirements.

The landowner must demonstrate that the proposed drain or fill is a feasible and prudent project and that the replacement plan as proposed is a reasonable good faith effort to fulfill the replacement requirements of parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630 and the act.

If the plan was approved, but with conditions or modifications, the applicant must show that the conditions or modifications make the replacement unworkable or not feasible. A plan is unworkable or not feasible if the replacement must be on land that the applicant does not own, the applicant has made good faith efforts to acquire a replacement site and not succeeded, and there is not a qualifying replacement available in a wetland bank. A plan is also unworkable or not feasible if it is not possible to carry out for engineering reasons. The applicant must show that not going ahead with the proposed project will cause the applicant damages and that disallowing the proposed use will enhance the public values of the wetland.

The applicant must submit the requirements in this part in writing, by certified mail, to the board. If the applicant wants to make oral argument to the board, it must be indicated as part of the application. The board may require that the applicant appear before the board.

If the board finds that the applicant has submitted a complete application and proved the requirements in this part, the board shall compensate the applicant as required by law within 90 days after the board received a completed application, provided that within the same time period the applicant must convey to the board a conservation easement in the form required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103F.516. If the board does not provide the required compensation in exchange for the conservation easement, the applicant may drain or fill the wetland in the manner proposed, without replacement.

8420.0280 APPEAL FROM BOARD DECISIONS.

An appeal of a board decision is taken to the state court of appeals and must be considered an appeal from a contested case decision for purposes of judicial review under *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.63 to 14.69.

8420.0290 ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. **Enforcing authorities.** The commissioner, conservation officers, and other peace officers issuing authorities may issue cease and desist orders and restoration and replacement orders.

Subp. 2. **Cease and desist orders.** Site-specific cease and desist orders may be issued when the enforcement authority has probable cause that a drain or fill activity is being or has been conducted in a wetland and does not qualify for an exemption or a no-loss determination under parts 8420.0210 and 8420.0220 and is being or has been conducted without prior approval of a replacement plan by a local government unit under part 8420.0230.

A cease and desist order must not be issued if the landowner has a valid certificate of exemption or no-loss from the local government unit, or has evidence to support an exemption. Otherwise:

- A. the enforcement authority may issue a cease and desist order upon discovery of the drain or fill activity;
- B. the order may be withheld to give the landowner time to produce the evidence required by part 8420.0120 to the enforcement authority of qualification for an exemption or no-loss determination; or
- C. a cease and desist order may be issued with an effective date three weeks from the date of issuance. The enforcement authority shall exercise this option when the enforcement authority cannot readily make a determination on the facts and circumstances to deny a landowner's claim of exemption or no-loss, and continued drain or fill activity would not cause irreparable harm to the wetland.

The enforcement authority shall advise the landowner that the landowner's application, if any, for an exemption or no-loss determination, should be made immediately to the local government unit and that whatever drain and fill work the landowner has done may require restoration according to a restoration plan designed by the soil and water conservation district, if the application for exemption or no-loss determination is denied.

The enforcement authority issuing a cease and desist order shall promptly submit copies to the soil and water conservation district, local government unit, and department.

If an application for an exemption or no-loss determination is triggered by a cease and desist order, the local government unit or the technical panel shall make a decision within three weeks from the date of the application or sooner if the landowner requests. The local government unit or technical panel shall review evidence of exemption or no-loss produced by the landowner, inspect the site if necessary, and determine:

- (1) if the area in question is a wetland; and
- (2) if the activity qualifies for an exemption or no-loss determination under parts 8420.0210 and 8420.0220.

In cases where the cease and desist order has been issued to a local government unit, the determination of exemption or no-loss shall be made by the board.

If the decision is that the activity is exempt or results in a no-loss determination, the decision maker shall issue a certificate of exemption or no-loss, request that the enforcement authority rescind the cease and desist order, and notify the soil and water conservation district, the department, and the landowner.

If the application is denied, the decision-maker shall immediately notify the soil and water conservation district, the department, the enforcement authority, and the landowner.

Subp. 3. **Restoration and replacement orders.** The enforcement authority shall issue a restoration order or replacement order when the drain or fill has already been completed when discovered, or after a cease and desist order has been issued and the landowner does not seek an exemption or no-loss determination within three weeks, or the local government unit denies the application.

Promptly upon being informed by the enforcement authority of the need, the soil and water conservation district staff person shall inspect the site and prepare a plan in consultation with the local government unit for restoring the site to its prealtered condition, unless the soil and water conservation district person concludes that restoration is impossible. The soil and water conservation district shall incorporate its plan into a restoration or replacement order and send it to the enforcement authority for service in person or by certified mail to the landowner.

The restoration order must specify a date by which the landowner must either:

- A. restore the wetland according to the soil and water conservation district plan and obtain a certificate of satisfactory restoration from the soil and water conservation district; or
- B. submit a replacement plan to the local government unit.

The order shall state that it will be canceled when the landowner obtains a certificate of exemption or no-loss from the local

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government unit, or a certificate that restoration has been completed according to an approved restoration plan. Otherwise, the landowner must restore the wetland in the manner required by the restoration order.

If the soil and water conservation district determines that restoration will not restore all the loss caused by the drain or fill activity, the enforcement authority may order a combination of restoration and replacement, or may order replacement rather than restoration, as determined by the soil and water conservation district. The order must direct the landowner to obtain replacement plan approval from the local government unit. The order must specify that if replacement plan approval is not obtained, the landowner must restore the wetland in a manner determined by the soil and water conservation district.

Each cease and desist, restoration, and replacement order shall tell the landowner that violation of the order is a misdemeanor.

If, as part of a misdemeanor proceeding, the court orders restoration or replacement, the soil and water conservation district shall determine which is appropriate, and if it is restoration, the method of restoration. If the court orders replacement, the landowner must follow the replacement plan process in parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630 unless the court orders otherwise.

MINING

8420.0300 MINING.

Wetlands may not be drained or filled as part of a project for which a permit to mine is required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.481, except as approved by the commissioner. Draining or filling of wetlands created by pits, stockpiles, or tailing basins by actions whose purpose was not to create the wetland are exempt under part 8420.0120, subpart 10.

A. For new mining operations that are permitted and initiated after July 1, 1993:

(1) mining shall not be conducted without first receiving a permit to mine issued under chapter 6130 for iron ore and taconite or chapter 6132 for nonferrous metallic minerals; and

(2) the mining and reclamation operating plans or annual reports submitted by the applicant as required in the permit to mine shall include an approved wetland replacement plan that meets the same principles and standards for replacing wetlands under parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630.

B. For mining operations in existence before July 1, 1993, and operated on or after that date under a permit to mine issued under chapter 6130 for iron ore and taconite or chapter 6132 for nonferrous metallic minerals:

(1) no draining or filling activities shall be conducted within wetlands for which these activities were approved but not initiated before July 1, 1993, until the operating plan or annual report as required in the permit to mine includes an approved wetland replacement plan for the undisturbed wetlands. The wetland replacement plan shall meet the same principles and standards for replacing wetlands under parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630;

(2) for filling activities that were approved and initiated before July 1, 1993, the placement of fill atop a stockpile, roadway, or other mining-related facility that occupies a wetland filled before July 1, 1993, shall be allowed to continue within the areal extent, as it existed on July 1, 1993, of the stockpile, roadway, or other mining-related facility without the requirement of a replacement plan or amendment of the permit to mine. An expansion of the areal extent of the fill in the wetland requires an approved replacement plan in the operating plan or annual report as required in the permit to mine, according to subitem (1);

(3) for draining activities that were approved and initiated before July 1, 1993, the draining of a wetland to facilitate mining, using ditches and other drainage facilities that existed on July 1, 1993, shall be allowed to continue without the requirement of a replacement plan or amendment of the permit to mine. Maintenance of the ditches and structures shall be allowed without the requirement of a replacement plan or amendment of the permit to mine, provided that as a result of the maintenance, wetlands are not drained beyond the extent that existed as of July 1, 1993. Otherwise, the permit to mine must be amended to provide for replacement according to subitem (1).

C. Applicable procedures are those required for permits to mine.

D. This part shall not apply to peat mining as defined under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 93.461, that is subject to the mine permit and reclamation requirements under *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51 and the rules of the commissioner adopted under those sections.

E. Mining that is not subject to the permit and reclamation requirements under *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 93.44 to 93.51, must replace drained and filled wetlands according to parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630.

HIGH PRIORITY REGIONS AND AREAS

8420.0350 HIGH PRIORITY REGIONS AND AREAS.

Subpart 1. **High priority regions.** Parts of the state that are high priority regions for preservation, enhancement, restoration, and establishment of wetlands include all of the counties that have lost 50 percent or more of their presettlement wetland base, which are those listed in part 8420.0540, subpart 5, item B.

In all other counties of the state, high priority regions are high priority areas approved as such by the board according to subpart 2.

Subp. 2. High priority areas.

A. Water management plans prepared by water management organizations in the metropolitan area under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.231, by counties outside the metropolitan area under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.311, and by watershed districts outside the metropolitan area under *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 103D.401 and 103D.405, must identify those areas that qualify as high priority areas for wetland preservation, enhancement, restoration, and establishment. These priority areas shall be included in the next scheduled water management plan update.

B. Plans should give strong consideration to identifying as high priority areas minor watersheds having less than 50 percent of their original wetland acreages, and intact wetlands, diminished wetlands, and the areas once occupied by wetlands that have been diminished or eliminated and could feasibly be restored taking into account the present hydrology and use of the area. Plans should give strong consideration to identifying as high priority areas all type 1 or 2 wetlands, and other wetlands at risk of being lost by permanent conversion to other uses. When individual wetlands are identified as high priority for preservation and restoration, the high priority area shall include the wetland and an adjacent buffer strip not less than 16.5 feet wide around the perimeter of the wetland and may include up to four acres of upland for each wetland acre.

C. In all counties, plans may identify additional high priority areas where preservation, enhancement, restoration, and establishment of wetlands would have high public value by providing benefits for water quality, flood water retention, public recreation, commercial use, and other public uses. High priority areas should be delineated by minor or major watershed. For the purposes of this part, "watershed" means major or minor watershed or subwatershed. To identify high priority areas, the local government unit shall consider at least the landscape characteristics in subitems (1) to (11).

(1) Land use and cover types. Wetlands located in watersheds having a high proportion of cultivated land, developed areas, or other intensive land use are likely to have high value for water quality, flood water retention, and public recreation. Watersheds with high proportions of intensive land use should be considered as priority preservation and restoration areas.

(2) Wetland and watershed ratio. Wetlands located in watersheds having a low proportion of wetlands relative to the size of the watershed are likely to have high value for water quality, flood water retention, and public recreation. Watersheds with a low wetland and watershed ratio should be considered as priority preservation and restoration areas.

(3) Soil erosion rates. Wetlands located in watersheds where erosion rates are high are likely to have high value for water quality. Watersheds with high erosion rates should be considered as priority preservation and restoration areas.

(4) Watershed gradient. Wetlands in watersheds where the difference between the highest and lowest points of the watershed is great are likely to have high value for flood water retention and water quality. Watersheds with a high gradient should be considered as priority preservation and restoration areas.

(5) Surface water retention. Wetlands in watersheds where direct runoff is high are likely to have high value for flood water retention and water quality. Watersheds with high levels of direct runoff should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

(6) Soil fertility. Wetlands in watersheds where soil fertility is high are likely to have high value for wildlife habitat and commercial uses. Watersheds with high soil fertility should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

(7) Geology. Wetlands in watersheds with high subsurface permeability are likely to have high value for groundwater recharge and water quality. Watersheds with high subsurface permeability should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

(8) Wetland complexes. Wetlands in watersheds where a diversity of wetland types and sizes are or were historically present are likely to have high value for public recreation. Watersheds with an existing or historical high diversity of wetland types should be considered as priority preservation and restoration areas.

(9) Proximity to population centers. Wetlands in watersheds that are close to population centers are likely to have high value for water quality, flood water retention, public recreation, and commercial uses. Watersheds near population centers should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

(10) Public ownership. Wetlands in watersheds with a high proportion of land in public ownership are likely to have high value for public recreation. These watersheds should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

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(11) Significant wildlife use. Wetlands in watersheds with current or historical records of use by significant numbers or species of wildlife or fish are likely to have high value for public recreation and commercial uses. Watersheds with records of significant fish or wildlife use should be considered as high priority preservation and restoration areas.

D. The board will review the inclusion of high priority areas in plans as part of the standard process for plan review established in statute. High priority areas approved by the board that are not in a high priority region listed in item C become high priority regions with board approval.

WETLAND PRESERVATION AREAS

8420.0400 WETLAND PRESERVATION AREAS.

Subpart 1. **Purpose.** Wetlands located in areas that are both high priority regions and high priority areas as identified in part 8420.0350 are eligible for enrollment as wetland preservation areas. A wetland so enrolled is exempt from property tax.

Subp. 2. **Landowner application for wetland preservation area.** A landowner may apply to the county for designation of a wetland as a wetland preservation area on forms provided by the board. The applicant must include a strip of upland 16.5 feet wide around the perimeter of the wetland. The applicant may include up to four acres of upland for each acre of wetland.

The application must be accompanied by a restrictive covenant on a form provided by the board. The covenant will contain the same limitations on use that are provided in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103F.515, subdivision 4, including a covenant that the enrolled upland area will be vegetated by the landowner to permanent vegetation other than noxious weeds. The covenant must be signed, acknowledged, and ready for recording.

Subp. 3. **County review of application.** The county shall accept the application if the wetland is in a high priority region and high priority area, if it includes the 16.5 foot strip, and is accompanied by the proper covenant.

The county may limit or reject additional upland proposed to be included according to standards the county establishes.

The county may reject the application if the application does not qualify, or send it back for modification and resubmittal if that is appropriate. If the application qualifies, the county shall approve it and mark the date of approval on the application.

Within five days of approval of the application, the county shall forward it to the county recorder for recording of the restrictive covenant or memorialization of the application on the certificate of title. The county shall also send a copy of the approved application to the county assessor for entry in the assessor's records as a wetland preservation area. The county shall also send copies of the approved application to the soil and water conservation district, the regional development commission, the local government unit, and the board.

Subp. 4. **Applicable statutes.** In addition to this chapter, wetland preservation areas are subject to *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 103F.6112 to 103F.6116, and the property tax provisions of *Minnesota Statutes*, section 272.02, subdivision 1, clause (10).

STANDARDS AND PROCEDURES FOR EVALUATING WETLAND REPLACEMENT PLANS

8420.0500 PURPOSE.

Parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630 specify the procedures and criteria for avoiding and minimizing wetland impacts and for ensuring adequate replacement of lost public values for unavoidable wetland impacts.

8420.0505 INTERIM REPLACEMENT PLANS.

Replacement plans approved under the interim guidelines in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2369, must be completed in entirety by June 30, 1995. If the replacement plan is not completed by June 30, 1995, replacement of the impacted wetland becomes subject to the process and provisions in parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630. This does not apply to phased projects approved during the interim period. Phased projects may be completed under the conditions and guidelines for which they were approved.

8420.0510 PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. **Generally.** No person shall drain or fill a wetland, wholly or partially, without first having a wetland value replacement plan approved by the governing body of the local government unit, or the lead local government unit if so designated by the board, consistent with parts 8420.0120 to 8420.0290, and provided that the activity is not prohibited under the special considerations provisions in part 8420.0540, subpart 9.

Subp. 2. **Preapplication conference and site visit.** Before preparation of a wetland value replacement plan, it is recommended that the landowner meet with the local government unit for a preapplication conference and site visit. The local government unit is encouraged to inform the landowner of all sequencing requirements and the criteria used to evaluate replacement plans. A landowner may submit the information required in part 8420.0520 and request a determination of compliance with the sequencing requirements from the local government unit before preparing a replacement plan.

Subp. 3. **Evaluation.** Questions concerning the public value, location, size, or type of wetland shall be submitted to the technical evaluation panel. The local government unit may use a technical panel to predetermine public value, location, size, or type of wetlands

under its jurisdiction and use this determination in administering the act. Wetland boundaries must be determined using the methodologies in the federal Manual for Identifying and Delineating Jurisdictional Wetlands (January 1989). Wetland type must be identified according to Cowardin, et al., 1979, Classification of Wetlands and Deepwater Habitats of the United States and according to United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition) "Wetlands of the United States." The technical panel shall provide its determinations to the local government unit for consideration.

8420.0520 SEQUENCING.

Subpart 1. **Requirement.** Except for wetlands located in cultivated fields that are subject to subpart 8, and calcareous fens that are subject to subpart 9, the local government unit may not consider or approve a wetland replacement plan unless the local government unit finds that the applicant has demonstrated that the activity impacting a wetland has complied with all of the following principles in descending order or priority:

- A. avoids direct or indirect impacts to the wetland that may destroy or diminish the wetland under the criteria in subpart 3;
- B. minimizes the impact to the wetland by limiting the degree or magnitude of the wetland activity and its implementation under the criteria in subpart 4;
- C. rectifies the impact by repairing, rehabilitating, or restoring the affected wetland under the criteria in subpart 5;
- D. reduces or eliminates the impact to the wetland over time by preservation and maintenance operations under the criteria in subpart 6; and
- E. compensates for unavoidable impacts to the wetland by replacing or providing substitute wetland areas having equal or greater public value as provided for in parts 8420.0530 to 8420.0630.

Subp. 2. **Application options.** An applicant may either submit the information required for sequencing analysis as part of the application for replacement plan approval or apply for a sequencing determination before preparing a replacement plan. Each half of a split application will receive the same notice and comment procedures as a unitary application.

Subp. 3. **Determination of impact avoidance.**

- A. Avoidance must be required when indicated by part 8420.0540, subpart 9.
- B. Wetland dependence determination:

(1) Based on information provided by the applicant, the local government unit shall determine if the proposed project is wetland dependent. A project is wetland dependent if wetland features, functions, or values are essential to fulfill the basic purpose of the project. A wetland present at the site of a proposed project does not make that project wetland dependent.

(2) A project that has been determined by the local government unit to be wetland dependent is exempt from the analysis of avoidance alternatives in item C.

C. Alternatives analysis:

(1) The applicant shall provide the local government unit with documentation describing at least two alternatives in addition to the proposed project, one of which may be the no-build alternative, that would avoid impacts to wetlands. The alternatives may include consideration of alternate sites or alternative project configurations on the proposed site. The alternatives must be judged by the local government unit as good faith efforts, or the local government unit may require the applicant to redraft them for reconsideration.

(2) The local government unit shall determine whether any feasible and prudent alternatives are available that would avoid impacts to wetlands. An alternative shall be considered feasible and prudent if it is capable of being done from an engineering point of view, is in accordance with accepted engineering standards and practices, is consistent with reasonable requirements of the public health, safety, and welfare, is an environmentally preferable alternative based on a review of social, economic, and environmental impacts, and would create no truly unusual problems. The local government unit shall consider the following in evaluating alternatives as applicable:

(a) whether the basic project purpose can be reasonably accomplished using one or more other sites in the same general area that would avoid wetland impacts. An alternate site may not be excluded from consideration because it includes or requires an area not owned by the applicant that could reasonably be obtained, used, expanded, or managed to fulfill the basic purpose of the proposed project;

(b) the general suitability of alternate sites considered by the applicant;

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(c) whether reasonable modification of the size, scope configuration, or density of the project would avoid impacts to wetlands;

(d) efforts by the applicant to accommodate or remove constraints on alternatives imposed by zoning standards or infrastructure, including requests for conditional use permits, variances, or planned unit developments; and

(e) the physical, economic, and demographic requirements of the project. Economic considerations alone do not make an alternative not feasible and prudent.

(3) If the local government unit determines that a feasible and prudent alternative exists that would avoid impacts to wetlands, it shall deny the replacement plan. If no feasible and prudent alternative is available that would avoid impacts to wetlands, the local government unit shall evaluate the replacement plan for compliance with subparts 4 to 6.

Subp. 4. Determination of impact minimization.

A. The applicant shall demonstrate to the local government unit's satisfaction that the activity will minimize impacts to wetlands. In reviewing the sufficiency of the applicant's efforts to minimize wetland impacts, the local government unit must consider:

- (1) the spatial requirements of the project;
- (2) the location of existing structural or natural features that may dictate the placement or configuration of the project;
- (3) the purpose of the project and how the purpose relates to placement, configuration, or density;
- (4) the sensitivity of the site design to the natural features of the site, including topography, hydrology, and existing vegetation;
- (5) the value, function, and spatial distribution of the wetlands on the site;
- (6) individual and cumulative impacts; and
- (7) an applicant's efforts to:
 - (a) modify the size, scope, configuration, or density of the project;
 - (b) remove or accommodate site constraints including zoning, infrastructure, access, or natural features; and
 - (c) otherwise minimize impacts.

B. If the local government unit finds that an applicant has not complied with the requirements to minimize wetland impacts, the local government unit shall list, in writing, its objections to the project. If, within 30 days, the applicant does not withdraw the project proposal or indicate intent to submit an amended project proposal satisfying the local government unit's objections, the statement of objections shall constitute a denial.

Subp. 5. **Determination of impact rectification.** Temporary impacts to a wetland must be rectified by repairing, rehabilitating, or restoring the affected wetland.

A. Activities may qualify for a no-loss determination in part 8420.0220 by meeting all of the following conditions:

- (1) the physical characteristics of the affected wetland, including ground elevations, contours, inlet dimensions, outlet dimensions, substrate, and hydrologic regime, are restored to preproject conditions sufficient to ensure that all preproject functions and values are restored;
- (2) the activity is completed and the physical characteristics of the wetland are restored within six months of the start of the activity; and
- (3) the party responsible for the activity provides a performance bond to the local government unit for an amount sufficient to cover the estimated cost to restore the wetland to preproject conditions. The local government unit shall return the performance bond to the responsible party upon a determination by the local government unit that the conditions in this item and item B have been met.

B. An applicant shall be granted a no-loss determination under the criteria in item A once in a ten-year period for a particular site within a wetland, except that repairs to the original project shall be allowed under the no-loss determination, if the local government unit determines the request to be necessary and reasonable.

C. Wetland impacts that do not qualify for a no-loss determination according to the criteria in item A are subject to replacement under the criteria in parts 8420.0530 to 8420.0630.

Subp. 6. **Determination of reduction or elimination of impacts over time.** After an activity is completed, further wetland impacts from the draining or filling must be reduced or eliminated by maintaining, operating, and managing the project in a manner that preserves and maintains remaining wetland functions and values. The local government unit must require applicants to implement best management practices to protect wetland functions and values.

Subp. 7. **Unavoidable impacts.** Unavoidable wetland impacts that remain after efforts to minimize, rectify, or reduce or eliminate them must be compensated for according to parts 8420.0530 to 8420.0630.

Subp. 8. **Wetlands on cultivated fields.** If the wetland is located on a cultivated field, replacement must be accomplished through restoration without regard to the priority order in subpart 1, provided that a deed restriction in favor of the local government unit is made part of the approved wetland replacement plan and is placed on the altered wetland prohibiting nonagricultural use for at least ten years.

Subp. 9. **Calcareous fens.** Calcareous fens, as identified by the commissioner, may not be filled, drained, or otherwise degraded, wholly or partially, by any activity, unless the commissioner, under an approved management plan, decides some alteration is necessary, as provided in part 8420.1010.

8420.0530 REPLACEMENT PLAN COMPONENTS.

On an application form provided by the local government unit, and with needed attachments supplied by the applicant, the following documentation must be provided:

A. organizational information, including the following:

(1) the post office address of the applicant;

(2) for corporations, the principal officers of the corporation, any parent companies, owners, partners, and joint venturers, and a designated contact person;

(3) managing agents, subsidiaries, or consultants that are or may be involved with the wetland draining or filling project;

B. either an affidavit confirming that the wetland values will be replaced before or concurrent with the actual draining or filling of a wetland or an irrevocable bank letter of credit or other security acceptable to the local government unit to guarantee the successful completion of the wetland value replacement;

C. for the impacted wetland:

(1) a recent aerial photograph or accurate map of the impacted wetland;

(2) the location of the wetland, including the county, department watershed number, legal description, and Universal Transverse Mercator coordinate of approximate wetland center;

(3) the size of the wetland, in acres or square feet, as measured from aerial photography or legal survey;

(4) the type of wetland using United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition) and National Wetland Inventory mapping conventions (Cowardin et al., 1979);

(5) a list of the dominant vegetation in the wetland, including genera of the vegetation exceeding 20 percent coverage and an estimate of coverage, for example, 50 percent *Salix*, 20 percent *Typha*, and 30 percent *Carex*;

(6) a soils map of the site showing soil type and substrate, where available;

(7) the size of the watershed that drains surface water into the wetland as determined from a United States Government Survey topographical map or other suitable topographical survey;

(8) the locations of any surface inlets or outlets, natural or otherwise, draining into or out of the wetlands, and if the wetland is within the floodplain of a stream, river, or other watercourse, the distance and direction to the watercourse;

(9) a map or photograph of the land use of the immediate watershed within one mile of the impacted wetland. Land use categories to be used include: residential; industrial; commercial; tillable cropland; permanent pasture; livestock facilities, for example, feedlots; idle grassland, timber, wetlands, and public natural resource lands. The surrounding land use information shall also indicate the presence and location, if any, of wetland preservation regions and areas, wetland development avoidance regions and areas, and wetland deficient regions and areas as identified in the comprehensive water plan;

(10) the nature of the proposed project, its areal extent, and the impact on the wetland must be shown in sufficient detail to allow the local government unit to determine the amount and types of wetland to be impacted and to demonstrate compliance with the replacement sequencing criteria in part 8420.0520, if applicable;

(11) evidence of ownership or rights to the affected areas. When two or more landowners are involved, including both the impact site and the proposed replacement site, a contract or other evidence of agreement signed by all landowners and notarized must

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be included with the replacement plan. The contract or agreement must contain an acknowledgment of the covenant provisions in item D, subitem (7), by landowners on which a replacement wetland is proposed and the location and acreage of replacement wetlands. The contract becomes binding upon final approval of the replacement plan;

(12) a list of all other local, state, and federal permits and approvals required for the activity; and

(13) other information considered necessary by the local government unit for evaluation of the activity;

D. for the replacement wetland, item C, subitems (1) to (9) and (11) to (13), and:

(1) an explanation of the size and type of wetland that will result from successful completion of the replacement plan;

(2) scale drawings showing plan and profile views of the replacement wetland and fixed photo-reference points for monitoring purposes. Photo-reference points should include views of any control structures and enough additional points to adequately depict the entire project;

(3) how the replacement wetland shall be constructed, for example, excavation or restoration by blocking an existing tile; the type, size, and specifications of outlet structures; elevations, relative to Mean Sea Level or established bench mark, of key features, for example, sill, emergency overflow, and structure height; and best management practices that will be implemented to prevent erosion or site degradation;

(4) for created wetlands only, additional soils information, such as borings of the site, sufficient to determine the capability of the site to produce and maintain wetland characteristics;

(5) a timetable that clearly states how and when implementation of the replacement plan shall proceed, and when construction of the replacement wetland shall be finalized;

(6) the approximate distance and direction of the replacement wetland location in relation to the impacted wetland;

(7) a notice in a form provided by the board attached to and recorded with the deed for lands containing a replacement wetland, specifying the following:

(a) the location of the replacement wetland;

(b) that the wetland is subject to the act;

(c) that the fee title owner is responsible for the costs of repairs or reconstruction, if necessary, or for replacement costs;

(d) that reasonable access to the replacement wetland shall be granted to the proper authorities for inspection, monitoring, and enforcement purposes;

(e) that costs of title review and document recording is the responsibility of the fee title owner; and

(f) that the local government unit or board can require necessary repairs or reconstruction work to return the wetland to the specifications of the approved replacement plan and require reimbursement of reasonable costs from the wetland owner, or can require replacement of the wetland according to the act;

(8) a statement that the replacement wetland was not previously restored or created under a prior approved replacement plan;

(9) a statement that the replacement wetland was not drained or filled under an exemption during the previous ten years;

(10) a statement that the replacement wetland was not restored with financial assistance from public conservation programs;

(11) a statement that the replacement wetland was not restored using private funds other than those of the landowner unless the funds are paid back with interest to the individual or organization that funded the restoration and the individual or organization notifies the local government unit in writing that the restored wetland may be considered for replacement;

(12) a plan for monitoring the success of the replacement plan in meeting the project goal in subitem (1), and as specified in parts 8420.0610 and 8420.0620; and

(13) other information considered necessary for evaluation of the project by the local government unit.

E. The applicant must provide information known to the applicant or readily available concerning the special considerations criteria in part 8420.0540, subpart 9.

8420.0540 REPLACEMENT PLAN EVALUATION CRITERIA.

Subpart 1. **Sequencing.** Before consideration or approval of a replacement plan, the local government unit must ensure that the applicant has exhausted all possibilities to avoid and minimize adverse wetland impacts according to sequencing in part 8420.0520.

The applicant must demonstrate to the local government unit that the replacement plan complies with this part and part 8420.0550.

Subp. 2. **Type of replacement.** The order of preference for the method of replacement, from most preferred to least preferred, is project-specific restoration, project-specific creation, then wetland banking. Modification or conversion of nondegraded wetlands from

one wetland type to another does not constitute adequate replacement. Wetlands drained or filled under an exemption may not be restored for replacement credit for ten years after draining or filling.

A wetland area converted to another type by impoundment of additional water on nondegraded wetlands does not constitute replacement.

Subp. 3. **Timing of replacement.** Replacement of wetland values must be completed before or concurrent with the actual draining or filling of a wetland. An irrevocable bank letter of credit or other security acceptable to the responsible government unit must be given to the responsible government unit until successful completion of the replacement. All wetlands to be restored or created for replacement must be designated for replacement before restoration or creation. Submission to the local government unit of the information required in part 8420.0530 and subsequent approval shall be considered evidence of designation for replacement, provided the information is submitted before the actual restoration or creation.

Subp. 4. **Location of replacement wetlands.** Replacement wetlands shall be located within the same watershed or county as the impacted wetlands, except that counties or watersheds in which 80 percent or more of the presettlement acreage is intact may accomplish replacement in counties or watersheds in which 50 percent or more of the presettlement wetland acreage has been filled, drained, or otherwise degraded. Replacement wetlands should be located as close to the impacted wetland as possible, preferably in the same watershed.

Subp. 5. **Statewide replacement for public transportation projects.** Wetlands impacted by public transportation projects may be replaced statewide, provided they are approved by the commissioner under an established wetland banking system, or under the rules in parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760.

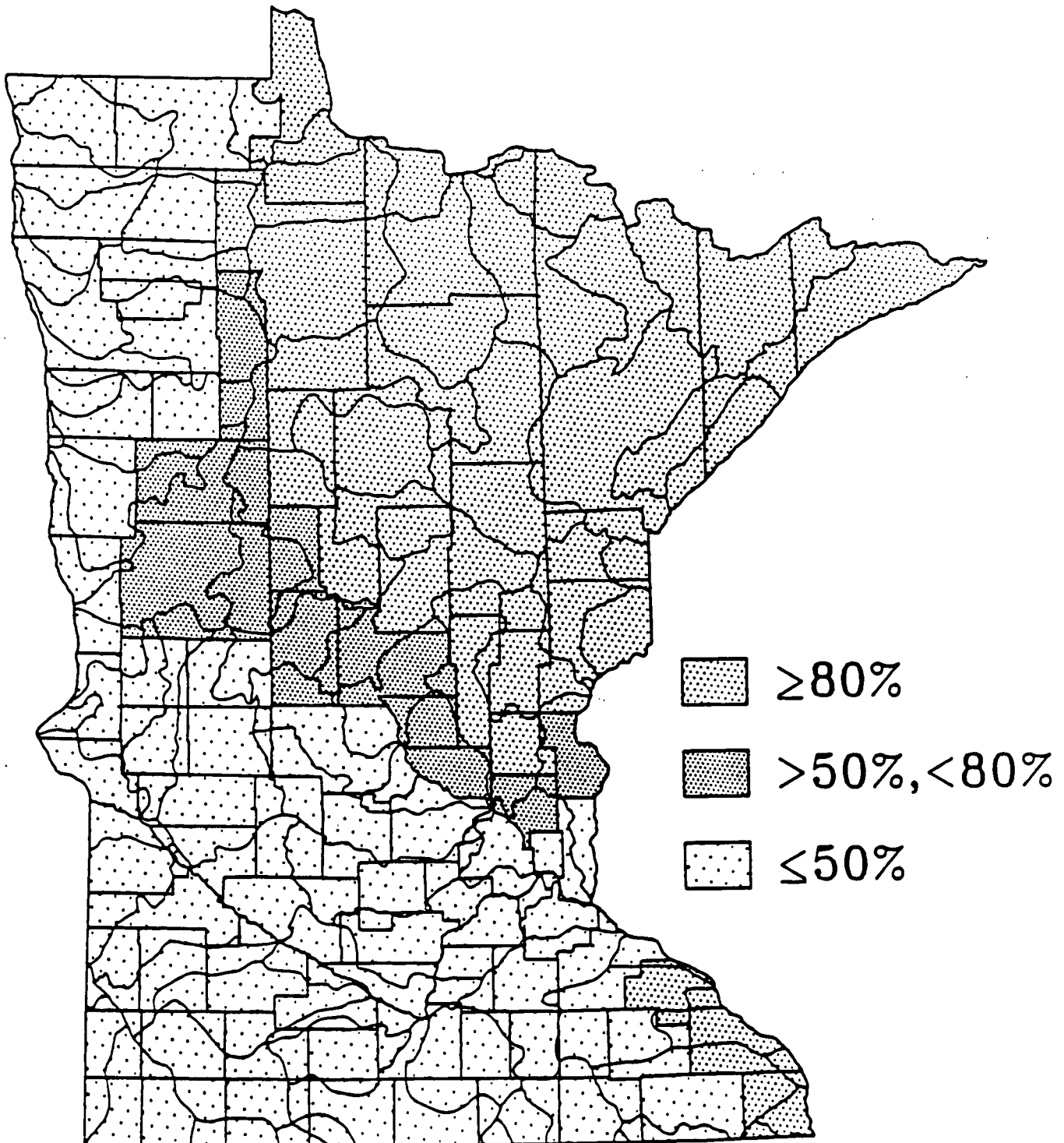
A. For purposes of this part, the following counties have 80 percent or more of their presettlement wetland acreage intact: Aitkin; Beltrami; Carlton; Cass; Cook; Crow Wing; Houston; Hubbard; Isanti; Itasca; Kanabec; Koochiching; Lake; Lake of the Woods; Mille Lacs; Pine; St. Louis; Wabasha; and Winona.

B. For purposes of this part, the following counties have 50 percent or less of their presettlement acreage intact: Big Stone; Blue Earth; Brown; Carver; Chippewa; Clay; Cottonwood; Dakota; Dodge; Douglas; Faribault; Fillmore; Freeborn; Goodhue; Grant; Hennepin; Jackson; Kandiyohi; Kittson; Lac Qui Parle; Le Sueur; Lincoln; Lyon; Mahnomen; Marshall; Martin; McLeod; Meeker; Mower; Murray; Nicollet; Nobles; Norman; Olmsted; Pennington; Pipestone; Polk; Pope; Ramsey; Red Lake; Redwood; Renville; Rice; Rock; Roseau; Scott; Sibley; Stearns; Steele; Stevens; Swift; Traverse; Waseca; Washington; Watonwan; Wilkin; Wright; and Yellow Medicine.

Subp. 6. **Size of replacement wetlands.** Replacement wetlands must be of a size sufficient to ensure that they provide equal or greater public value than the wetland that was drained or filled. For a wetland located on nonagricultural land, the minimum size of the replacement wetland must be in the ratio of two acres of replaced wetland for each acre of drained or filled wetland. For a wetland located on agricultural land, the minimum size of the replacement wetland must be in the ratio of one acre of replaced wetland for each acre of drained or filled wetland. The actual replacement ratios required for a replacement wetland may be more than the minimum, subject to the evaluation of wetland functions and values in subpart 10.

Subp. 7. **Carbon balance.** When it is necessary to replace a drained or filled peatland, the replacement wetland must be revegetated with planted or naturally invading vegetation established within three growing seasons.

Subp. 8. **Ecological consistency.** Restoration and replacement of wetlands must be accomplished according to the ecology of the landscape area affected. A replacement plan that would result in wetlands or wetland characteristics that do not naturally occur in the landscape area in which the replacement will occur will not be approved.

Subp. 9. **Special considerations.** The factors in items A to I, when identified as being applicable to an impact site or a replacement site, must be considered by the local government unit in the review of replacement plans.

A. Federal or state-listed endangered species. A replacement plan for activities that involve sites where species listed in parts 6134.0200 to 6134.0400 are known to be present will not be approved if the local government unit determines that the proposed activities will constitute a taking of those listed species under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.0895. Limited information on the presence of listed species at a particular site is available from the department's natural heritage program. Activities that involve taking listed species are subject to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.0895.

B. Rare natural communities. A replacement plan for activities that involve the modification of a rare natural community as determined by the department's natural heritage program will not be approved if the local government unit determines that the proposed activities will permanently adversely affect the natural community.

C. Special fish and wildlife resources. A replacement plan for activities that would have a significant adverse impact that cannot be mitigated on a special or locally significant fish and wildlife resource will not be approved. These activities include, but are not limited to:

- (1) fish passage and spawning areas;
- (2) colonial waterbird nesting colonies;
- (3) migratory waterfowl concentration areas;
- (4) deer wintering areas; and/or
- (5) wildlife travel corridors.

Activities involving streams must not block fish passage unless approved by the department.

D. Archaeological or historic sites. A replacement plan for activities that involve the modification of known archaeological or historical sites on or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places, as designated by the state historic preservation officer, will not be approved if the local government unit determines that the proposed activities will have a significant adverse impact on the archaeological or historical value of the site.

E. Groundwater sensitivity. A replacement plan for activities will not be approved if the local government unit determines the activities would have a significant adverse impact on groundwater quality. The publication "Criteria and Guidelines for Assessing Geologic Sensitivity of Ground Water Resources in Minnesota" (MDNR, 1991) may be used as a guide in determining potential impacts.

F. Sensitive surface waters. A replacement plan will not be approved if the local government unit determines the activities will have a significant adverse impact on the water quality of outstanding resource value waters listed in part 7050.0180 or on trout waters designated by the commissioner.

G. Education or research use. Wetlands known to be used for educational or research purposes must be maintained or adequately replaced.

H. Waste disposal sites. The local government unit must evaluate the type and amount of waste material found at the site. Activities involving known or potential hazardous wastes or contaminants must be conducted according to applicable federal and state standards.

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I. Consistency with other plans. The local government unit must consider the extent to which proposed activities are consistent with other plans, such as watershed management plans, land use plans, zoning, and master plans.

Subp. 10. Evaluation of wetland functions and values.

A. Evaluation options. Replacement wetlands must replace the functions and values that are lost from a wetland that is drained or filled. A replacement wetland should replace the same combination of functions and values provided by the impacted wetland. The wetland type index system in items B to D uses relative values of wetland functions compared across wetland types to evaluate the adequacy of wetland replacement. The local government unit may allow the evaluation of wetlands by measuring and comparing public values specified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.3355, with the current version of the Minnesota wetland evaluation methodology in item E.

B. Wetland types: abbreviated Cowardin classification. For purposes of this part, an abbreviated version of the wetland classification system developed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (Cowardin et al. 1979) and used to indicate wetland types on the National Wetland Inventory maps is described in subitems (1) to (18). The United States Fish and Wildlife Service Circular No. 39 (1971 edition) classification is indicated in parentheses.

- (1) "PFA" includes all PFO wetlands in the A and J water regimes (type 1).
- (2) "PFB" includes all PFO wetlands in the B water regime (type 7).
- (3) "PFC" includes all PFO wetlands in the C and wetter water regimes (type 7).
- (4) "PSA" includes all PSS wetlands in the A and J water regimes (type 6).
- (5) "PSB" includes all PSS wetlands in the B water regime, except type PSS3B wetlands (type 6).
- (6) "PSC" includes all PSS wetlands in the C and wetter water regimes (type 6).
- (7) "PSX" includes all PSS3b and PML wetlands (type 8).
- (8) "PEA" includes all PEM wetlands in the A and J water regimes (type 1).
- (9) "PEB" includes all PEM wetlands in the B water regime (type 2).
- (10) "PEC" includes all PEM wetlands in the C water regime (type 3).
- (11) "PEF" includes all PEM wetlands in the F and wetter water regimes (type 4).
- (12) "PA" includes all PAB wetlands (type 5).
- (13) "PU" includes all PUB wetlands (type 5).
- (14) "L1" includes all L1 wetlands (Lacustrine Limnetic) (type 5).
- (15) "L2" includes all L2 wetlands (Lacustrine Littoral) (type 5).
- (16) "R2" includes all R2 wetlands (Riverine - Lower Perennial) (no equivalent).
- (17) "R3" includes all R3 wetlands (Riverine - Upper Perennial) (no equivalent).
- (18) "R4" includes all R4 wetlands (Riverine - Intermittent) (no equivalent).

Table 1, in item D, subitem (1), provides technical specifications for constructing wetland types. In evaluating a wetland replacement plan, the local government unit must determine whether the wetland type stated as the replacement plan goal will result from the replacement plan specifications. If a wetland type other than the replacement plan goal is likely to result, the local government unit must evaluate the plan based on this determination.

The local government unit may consider allowing constructed storm water detention basins for replacement credit if the basin conforms to the following specifications:

- (a) the basin design uses a two-cell system in which the upstream cell has a 24-hour retention time for a two-year storm event;
- (b) the downstream cell is designed for a maximum 12-inch bounce for a ten-year storm event;
- (c) the standards in part 8420.0550 are followed; and
- (d) the design goal is a PEM wetland that meets all statutory definitions of a wetland, for example, soils, hydrology, and vegetation.

Only the downstream cell can be counted for wetland credit, and the replacement plan must include a plan and schedule for maintenance of the storm water basin system. Storm water basins which allowed for replacement are not eligible for the exemption in part 8420.0120, subpart 10, and are subject to parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630.

Stormwater management basins constructed for the primary purpose of controlling or treating stormwater runoff from impervious surfaces or developed areas, not conforming to the specifications in units (a) to (d), are not considered wetlands. These are therefore exempt from replacement plan requirements when constructed in nonwetlands, and also cannot be considered for credit as part of a replacement plan, regardless of their location.

C. Replacement ratios for in-kind replacement. When wetland functions lost as a result of drainage or filling are replaced by restoring a wetland of the same type and in the same watershed and with the same inlet and outlet characteristics as described in item D, subitem (3), and related definitions, the replacement shall be considered to be in-kind and the minimal replacement ratio shall be used to determine the necessary size of the replacement wetland. For impacted wetlands on agricultural land, the minimal replacement ratio is 1:1, requiring an equal area be replaced for the area impacted. For impacted wetlands on nonagricultural land, the minimal replacement ratio is 2:1, requiring two times the impacted area be replaced.

D. Out-of-kind replacement ratios. If the wetland functions lost as a result of drainage or filling are to be replaced by creating a wetland or restoring a wetland of a different type than the impacted wetland, or if the replacement wetland is in a watershed other than the impacted wetland or had different inlet and outlet characteristics than the impacted wetland, the replacement shall be considered to be out-of-kind and the local government unit shall use the replacement ratios in this subpart to determine the amount of replacement wetland needed to replace the lost wetland values.

(1) Wetland type ratio. Differences in wetland functions and values among wetland types are to be evaluated and replaced using the wetland type ratio table in this part, to be applied as specified in subitem (5). The wetland type ratio table incorporates an evaluation of public values as specified in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103B.3355, for the purposes of comparison among wetland types.

If a wetland to be drained or filled exhibits more than one wetland type as determined by the technical panel, and more than one wetland type is proposed to be drained or filled, the local government unit shall use the following procedure to determine needed replacement. The acreage of each wetland type to be converted to nonwetland shall be determined. The wetland type ratio table shall then be used to determine the amount of replacement wetland for each wetland type. The sum of the replacement for each wetland type shall be the resultant acreage requirement for the wetland type ratio.

(2) Hydrologic unit ratio.

(a) Except as noted in unit (b), when a replacement wetland is located in a different hydrologic unit than the impacted wetland, as indicated by the United States Geological Survey Hydrologic Unit Map for Minnesota (Figure 2), the following ratios must be applied, as specified in subitem (5):

(b) The hydrologic unit ratio does not apply when replacement for impacts within counties or watersheds having 80 percent or more of their presettlement wetland acreage intact is accomplished in counties or watersheds in which 50 percent or more of the presettlement acreage has been drained or filled.

(3) Inlet and outlet characteristics ratio. If the inlet and outlet characteristics of a replacement wetland differ from those of the impacted wetland, the following ratios shall be applied, as specified in subitem (5).

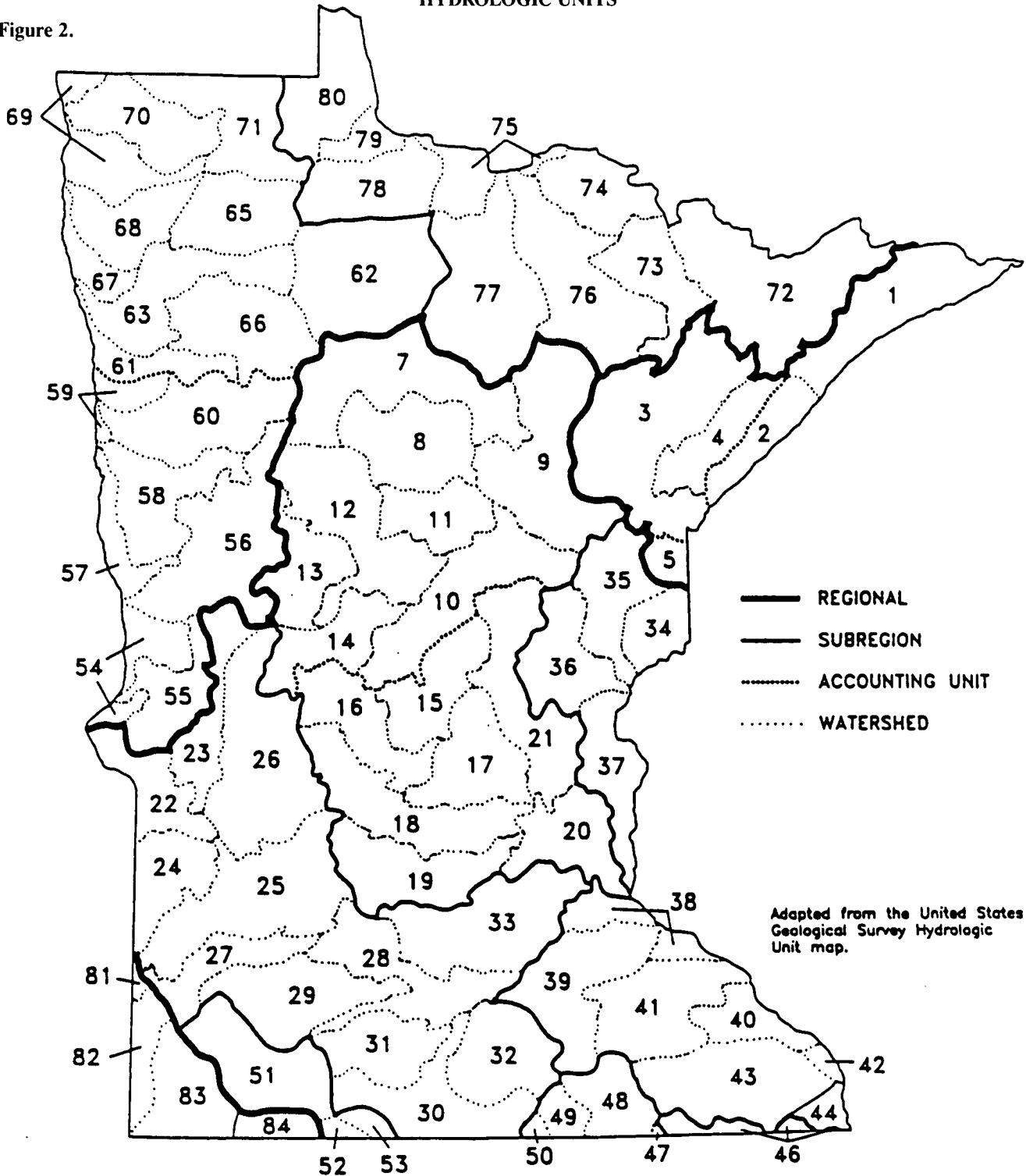
The inlet and outlet characteristics ratio does not apply when replacement for impacts within counties or watersheds having 80 percent or more of their presettlement wetland acreage intact is accomplished in counties or watersheds in which 50 percent or more of the presettlement acreage has been drained or filled.

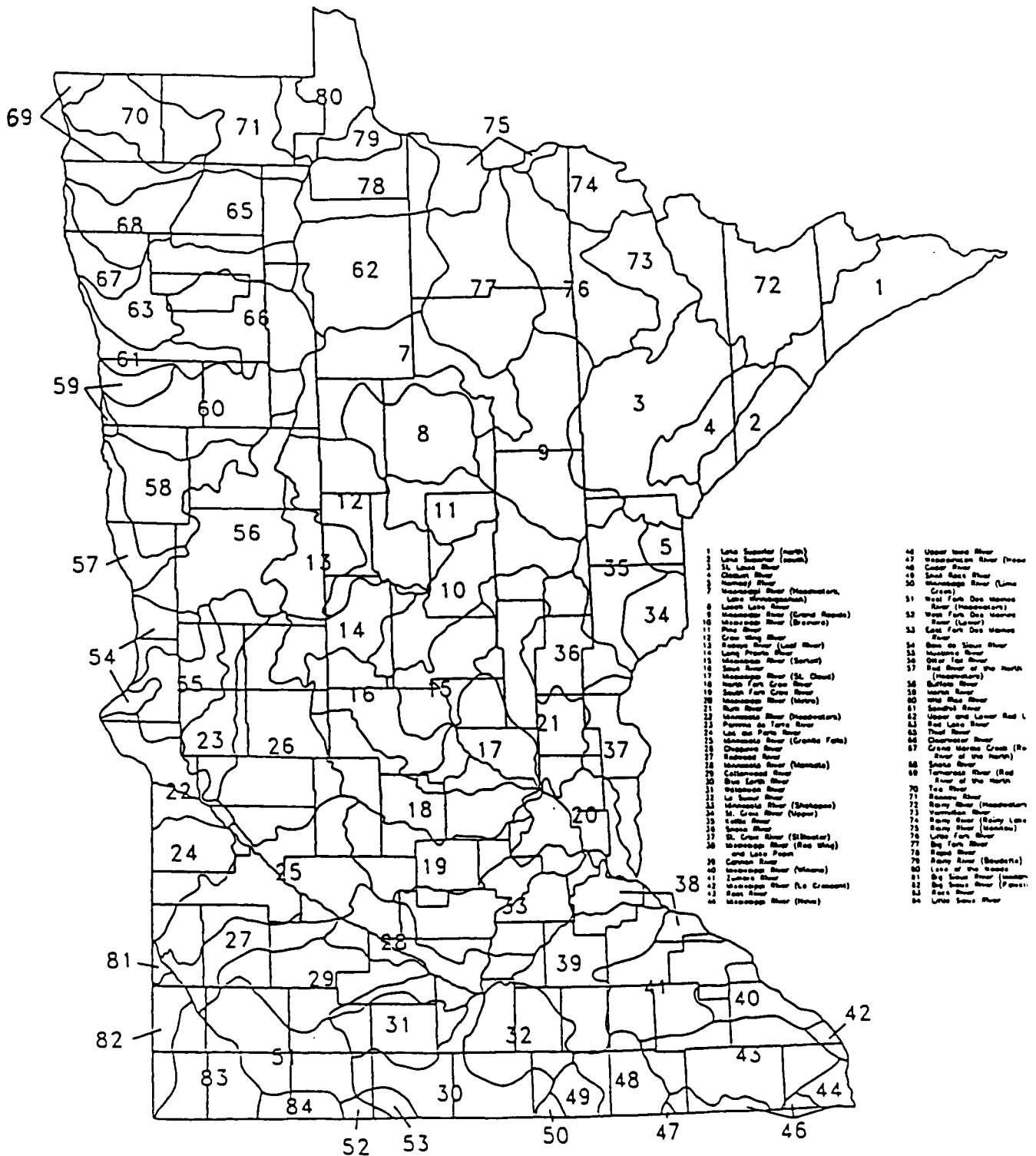

(4) Local public value ratio. A local government unit may by ordinance establish additional local public value ratios to address wetland conservation or preservation issues of local concern. These ratios must have a minimum value of zero and should be based on wetland management objectives of a local water management plan adopted under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 103B or 103D. The local preservation ratios must be applied as specified in subitem (5).

(5) Application of replacement ratios. The required replacement ratio for out-of-kind replacement shall be the sum of the wetland type ratio plus the hydrologic unit ratio plus the inlet and outlet characteristics ratio plus the local public value ratio. When this ratio is less than the minimum in-kind ratio of 1:1 for wetlands on agricultural land or 2:1 for wetlands on nonagricultural lands, the minimum in-kind ratio shall be the required replacement ratio.

E. Determining impacts of partial drainage. In cases where wetlands will be partially or incompletely drained, the amount of wetland to be replaced must be determined according to the following formula:

$$\text{Where: NI} = \text{OA} - \frac{1}{\text{RR}}(\text{RA})$$

NI = Net impact (acres of original wetland type to be replaced)

OA = Original acreage of original wetland type

RR = Replacement ratio, determined from table 1, using the original wetland type as the impacted wetland type and the wetland type resulting from the partial drainage as the replacement wetland type

RA = Remaining acres of the original wetland

Calculation of partial drainage credit is explained by the following example:

A ten acre type 3 (PEC) wetland is partially drained resulting in a five acre type 1 (PEA) wetland. ($\text{NI} = 10 - 1/3(5) = 8 \frac{1}{3}$) Eight and one-third acres of type 3 wetland is needed as replacement.

F. Determining credit for restoration of partially drained wetlands. In cases where partially drained wetlands are restored to their former state, the acres credited for restoring a partially drained wetland is in two parts. The first is the new wetland credit (NWC) caused by the restoration (for example, if the preresoration wetland is one acre and postrestoration will be three acres, the new wetland credit is two acres). The second credit is for the change in value of the preresoration wetland acres. This is the public value credit (PVC) and must be computed as follows:

$$\text{PVC} = \left(\frac{\text{RR} - 1}{\text{RR}} \right) \text{OA}$$

Where: PVC = Public value credit

RR = Replacement ratio, determined from table 1, using the preresoration wetland type as the replacement wetland type, and the postrestoration type as the impacted wetland type

OA = Wetland acreage before restoration

The credit for increase in new acres can be used in its entirety. The public value credit can only be used for that portion of wetland replacement requiring greater than a 1:1 ratio.

Calculation of partial restoration credits is explained by the following example:

A partially drained five acre type 1 (PEA) wetland is to be restored to a ten acre type 3 (PEC) wetland.

$$\left(\frac{3 - 1}{3} \right) 5 = 3 \frac{1}{3} \text{ PVC}$$

This restoration is proposed as replacement for a ten acre type 6 wetland. The wetland is located on nonagricultural land so the minimum replacement ratio is 2:1. This means 20 acres of replaced wetland is needed.

From the wetland type value in table 1, the replacement ratio is 1. The replacement is located in the same watershed, so the hydrologic unit ratio is 0.0. The inlet and outlet characteristics are isolated for the impacted wetland and tributary for the replacement wetland, so the inlet and outlet characteristics ratio is 0.4. The out-of-kind replacement ratio is the sum of $1.0 + 0.0 + 0.4 = 1.4$. This is less than the minimum of 2:1, so additional acreage is needed.

To ensure no-net loss of wetlands, at least ten acres of new wetland credit must be used to offset the ten acres of wetland lost. The remaining ten acres of required replacement can use either new wetland credit or public value credit.

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The proposed restoration is insufficient to replace the proposed impact, therefore an identical site is also selected for restoration. From site one, new wetland credit equals five; from site two, new wetland credit equals five; ($5 + 5 = 10$ acres of NWC). The no-net loss wetland acreage requirement is satisfied. Ten acres must still be found to satisfy the 2:1 requirement. Site one still has three and one-third acres of public value credit, as does site two; ($3 \frac{1}{3} + 3 \frac{1}{3} = 6 \frac{2}{3}$). An additional three and one-third acres of either new wetland credit or public value credit must be found to meet the additional acreage requirements.

G. Special cases or appeals. For projects of unusual complexity, or replacement plans that have been denied and are being appealed, and for which the local government unit believes an alternative evaluation process may produce a substantially different replacement requirement, the local government unit may evaluate the replacement plan using the current version of the Minnesota wetland evaluation methodology or another scientifically accepted method that evaluates all wetland functions and values for both the impacted and replacement wetlands.

When using the Minnesota wetland evaluation methodology to evaluate replacement plans, the ratio of impact wetland to replacement wetland must not be less than the minimum acreage requirements. Further, the hydrologic unit ratio in item D, subitem (2), the inlet and outlet characteristics ratio in item D, subitem (3), and the local public value ratio, if any, in item D, subitem (4), must also be added to the Minnesota wetland evaluation methodology ratio as in item D, subitem (5).

H. Adequacy decision. A replacement plan that fails to meet the requirements in items A to G must be considered inadequate in replacing lost functions and values and shall not be approved by the local government unit. A replacement plan that has been considered by the local government unit and not approved may be revised and resubmitted for consideration by the local government unit. As required by part 8420.0250, the decision of a local government unit to approve, approve with conditions, or not approve a replacement plan becomes final if not appealed to the board within 30 days after the date on which the decision is mailed to those required to receive notice of the decision. Before construction of the replacement wetland may proceed, the notice specified in part 8420.0530, item D, subitem (7), must be recorded and proof of recording provided to the local government unit.

I. Replacement wetlands eligible for RIM. A landowner who drains or fills a wetland and replaces it by restoring an impacted wetland on the landowner's property under an approved replacement plan may apply to the board for enrollment of the replacement wetland into the Reinvest in Minnesota program no sooner than one year after completion of the replacement project.

8420.0550 WETLAND REPLACEMENT STANDARDS.

Subpart 1. **General requirements.** The standards and guidelines in this part shall be used in wetland creation and restoration efforts to ensure adequate replacement of wetland functions and values.

The table in subpart 3 provides general guidelines for the physical characteristics that each type of replacement wetland should have.

Subp. 2. **Specific requirements.** The standards in items A to D shall be followed in all wetland replacements unless the technical panel determines that a standard is clearly not appropriate.

A. Water control structures must be constructed using specifications provided in the RIM Reserve Wetland Restoration Manual or their equivalent. Control structures may be subject to the department dam safety regulations.

B. A minimum one-rod strip, 16.5 feet wide, of vegetation sufficient to control erosion must be established and maintained adjacent to the entire perimeter of all replacement wetlands.

C. For replacement wetlands where the dominant vegetation of the wetland type identified as the replacement goal in part 8420.0540, subpart 10, is not likely to recover naturally in a five-year period, wooded and shrub wetlands especially, the replacement wetland must be seeded or planted with appropriate species, as determined by the soil and water conservation district, in coordination with the department. If the replacement wetland is seeded or planted, the seed or planting stock should be of local origin to preserve local genotypes. During the monitoring period, the applicant must take reasonable steps to prevent invasion by any species, for example, purple loosestrife and Eurasian water milfoil, that would defeat the revegetation goal of the replacement plan.

D. Erosion control measures as determined by the soil and water conservation district must be employed during construction and until permanent ground cover is established to prevent siltation of the replacement wetland or nearby water bodies.

E. For all restored wetlands where the original organic substrate has been stripped away and for all created wetlands, the basin must be excavated one foot below final grade elevation and backfilled with one foot of organic soil. When feasible, the organic soil used for backfill should be taken from the drained or filled wetland.

F. The bottom contours of created types 3, 4, and 5 wetlands must be undulating, rather than flat, to provide a variety of water depths.

G. Sideslopes of created wetlands and buffer strip must not be steeper than 5:1, five feet horizontally for every one foot vertically. Sideslopes of 10:1 to 15:1 are preferred.

H. Created wetlands must have an irregular edge to create points and bays.

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8420.0600 MONITORING.

The purpose of wetland value replacement monitoring is to ensure that the replacement wetland achieves the goal of replacing lost functions and values.

8420.0610 DURATION OF MONITORING.

Monitoring shall be by means of an annual report as specified in part 8420.0620 and shall continue for five years following completion of the wetland replacement project. Through written notification to the applicant, the local government unit may extend the required monitoring period for not more than an additional five-year period if, at the end of the initial five-year period, the goal of the replacement plan has not been achieved, but may be achieved with more time.

8420.0620 MONITORING ANNUAL REPORT.

Subpart 1. **Purpose.** The purpose of the annual report is to describe actual wetland restoration or creation activities completed during the past year, activities planned for the upcoming year, and the information in subpart 2. The applicant shall submit the annual report to the local government unit on a date determined by the local government unit until the applicant has fulfilled all of the requirements of the local government unit. The local government unit, at its discretion, may prepare the annual report for the applicant.

Subp. 2. **Report content.** The annual report shall include the following information and other site-specific information identified by the local government unit:

- A. a description of the project location, size, current wetland type (Cowardin classification), and desired wetland type (goal);
- B. a comparison of the as-built specifications versus the design specifications (first annual plan only) and a rationale for significant changes;
- C. hydrology measurements: monthly water level elevations during the period April through October (msl, referenced to a known bench mark);
- D. a list of the dominant vegetation in the wetland, including genera of the vegetation exceeding 20 percent coverage and an estimate of coverage, for example, 50 percent *Salix*, 20 percent *Typha*, and 30 percent *Carex*; and
- E. color photographs of the project area taken anytime during the period June through August, referenced to the fixed photo-reference points identified on the wetland replacement plan and labeled accordingly.

8420.0630 MONITORING DETERMINATIONS BY THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNIT.

The local government unit responsible for monitoring as determined under part 8420.0230:

- A. must inspect the project when construction is complete and certify compliance with construction specifications, and may inspect the project at any time during the construction and monitoring period, and any time after that to assess the long-term viability of the replaced wetland. When the local government unit certifies that the construction specifications have been met, the local government unit shall so advise the applicant and return any bond or other security that the applicant had provided;
- B. may order corrective action at any time during the required monitoring period if it determines that the goal of the approved replacement plan will not be met, and may require the applicant to prepare an amended wetland value replacement plan for review and approval by the local government unit, which describes in detail the corrective measures to be taken to achieve the goal of replacing lost wetland functions and values;
- C. shall make a finding based on a site visit at the end of the monitoring period as to whether the goal of the replacement plan has been met. If the goal of the replacement plan has not been met, the local government unit shall order corrective action and extend the monitoring period; and
- D. shall require one or more of the following actions if during the monitoring period the local government unit finds that the goal of the replacement plan will not be met:
 - (1) order the applicant to prepare and implement a new replacement plan;
 - (2) issue a cease and desist order on the draining and filling activity if it has not been completed;
 - (3) order restoration of the impacted wetland;
 - (4) obtain forfeiture of a bond or other security and use the proceeds to replace the lost wetland values;
 - (5) ask the district court to order the applicant to fulfill the replacement plan; or
 - (6) other actions that the local government unit determines necessary to achieve the goal of the replacement plan.

STANDARDS AND CRITERIA FOR STATE WETLAND BANKING

8420.0700 PURPOSE.

The purpose of parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760 is to provide standards for the establishment and administration of a state wetland

banking system as authorized by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2242.

8420.0710 DEFINITIONS.

Subpart 1. **Scope.** For purposes of parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760, the terms in this part have the meanings given them.

Subp. 2. **Account or wetland bank account.** "Account" or "wetland bank account" means a record of wetland debits and credits established by an account holder within the state wetland banking system.

Subp. 3. **Account holder.** "Account holder," in the state wetland banking system, is a person, corporation, government agency, or organization that is the owner of credits.

Subp. 4. **Applicant.** "Applicant" is a person, corporation, government agency, or organization that makes an application to withdraw wetland credits from the wetland bank.

Subp. 5. **Credits or wetland credits.** "Credits" or "wetland credits" means acres or tenths of acres of restored wetland, catalogued by abbreviated Cowardin, et al. wetland type from part 8420.0540, subpart 10, and inlet and outlet characteristics deposited in the wetland bank.

Subp. 6. **State wetland banking system, wetland bank, or bank.** "State wetland banking system," "wetland bank," or "bank" means a system of identifying wetlands restored for replacement credit, providing for, and facilitating and tracking the exchange of wetland credits for projects that require replacement plans.

8420.0720 PRINCIPLES OF WETLAND BANKING.

Subpart 1. **Goal.** Implementation of a wetland banking system must comply with the purposes and goals of the act by achieving a no-net loss in the quantity, quality, and biological diversity of Minnesota's existing wetlands.

Subp. 2. **Sequencing prerequisite.** The state wetland banking system may only be used for replacement of drained or filled wetlands when the local government unit determines that the applicant has complied with all of the sequencing requirements of part 8420.0520; that the project would otherwise be allowed if adequate replacement could be secured by the applicant; that project-specific replacement is not reasonable or desirable; and that the owner of the account agrees to the withdrawal of credits from the account.

Subp. 3. **Geographic limitations.** In counties having greater than 80 percent of their presettlement wetlands intact, wetland banking is allowed for any impact. Wetland banking in counties with less than 80 percent of their presettlement wetlands intact can be considered only in situations involving impacts of less than five acres, except in certain circumstances as noted in part 8420.0740, subpart 2, item B, subitem (2).

Subp. 4. **Restoration only.** Only restored wetlands are eligible for deposit into the wetland bank. Created wetlands are not eligible for deposit.

Subp. 5. **Exempt wetlands.** Wetlands that are drained or filled under an exemption in part 8420.0120 and subsequently restored are not eligible for deposit in the wetland bank.

Subp. 6. **Account balance.** Accounts must maintain a positive balance. A wetland bank account shall specify acreage by wetland type deposited by the account holder minus subsequent withdrawals.

Subp. 7. **Credit transfers.** Wetland credits may be transferred to another account holder providing the fee title or easement or license is transferred also, and providing all the remaining credit for a wetland remains in one account. Wetland credits may be withdrawn by an applicant and partial withdrawals are allowed. The account holder is responsible for the success of the wetland until completion of monitoring. After completion of monitoring, the fee title owner or easement or license holder and anyone who has contracted with the owner is responsible for maintaining the wetland and replacing it according to this chapter if the wetland is subsequently drained or filled, by structural failure, or otherwise.

Subp. 8. **Deed recording.** For wetlands proposed for deposit, a deed covenant must be recorded stating that the subject wetland was or will be restored for mitigation banking purposes.

Subp. 9. **Qualification.** A wetland cannot be deposited for credit that cannot, under parts 8420.0500 to 8420.0630, be used for replacement.

8420.0730 ADMINISTRATION AND MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY.

Subpart 1. **Establishment.** The board shall establish a state wetland bank. The board or the board's assignee is responsible for management of the bank including recording all bank transactions, maintaining bank records, and ensuring that the operation of the

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bank complies with parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760. The board shall notify all local government units upon establishment of the bank. Any banking system must comply with parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760 and must be approved by the board and the commissioner.

Subp. 2. **Deposit prerequisites.** To be deposited into the wetland bank, a restored wetland must be certified as eligible for deposit by the local government unit in which it is located, according to part 8420.0740, subpart 1. The method of certification by local government units is optional, but wetland credits may not be deposited into the bank within that local government units jurisdiction without certification. If a local government unit elects to certify restored wetlands for the wetland bank, the local government unit is also responsible for ensuring that the monitoring provisions in part 8420.0750 are fulfilled. A local government unit may decline to certify all restored wetlands within its jurisdiction or, based on a comprehensive local water plan, a local government unit may elect to certify restored wetlands for deposit into the wetland bank only in selected areas, for example, high priority regions and areas. If the local government unit elects to reject or limit banking, it must do so by rule or ordinance, as applicable.

Subp. 3. **Annual report.** Each local government unit participating in the wetland bank shall submit an annual report to the board on a form prescribed by the board.

8420.0740 PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. Deposits and credits.

A. Only restored wetlands are eligible for deposit into the wetland bank. Created wetlands are not eligible for deposit.

B. Wetland replacement approved before the date that a statewide wetland banking system is established is eligible for deposit into the wetland bank if the wetland replacement has been authorized by a public agency specifically for an existing wetland bank that has been approved by the commissioner.

C. After the date that a statewide wetland banking system is established, wetlands restored without prior local government unit approval as specified in this part are not eligible for deposit into the wetland bank.

D. The minimum wetland acreage eligible to establish an account in the wetland bank is 0.5 acres.

E. There is no maximum wetland acreage eligible for deposit in the wetland bank. The local government unit, upon recommendation of the technical panel, must identify the acreage that will receive credit. As an incentive to encourage the restoration of small wetlands, the local government unit shall assign credit to restored wetland acreage as follows:

Restored Wetland	Credit
0 to 10 acres	100 percent
over 10 acres	90 percent

The local government unit may modify the credit given, up to a maximum of 100 percent, if unanimously agreed to by the technical panel.

F. The initial deposit of wetland credits from a wetland restoration in the wetland bank must be done by the fee title owner or easement or license holder of the restored wetland.

G. Except as provided for in item B, in order to deposit wetland acres into the wetland bank, the depositor must notify the local government unit in writing, before restoration, that the wetland proposed for restoration is specifically designated for deposit into the wetland bank. This notification may be part of the documentation requested in item H. In cases where excess wetland acreage is expected to result from a specific replacement plan according to parts 8420.0530 to 8420.0550, the owner must indicate on the replacement plan that the excess acreage is to be considered available for wetland banking.

H. In cases where a wetland is proposed to be restored solely for wetland banking purposes, that is, the wetland is not part of a project-specific wetland replacement plan, the depositor must submit to the local government unit a bank plan containing the information required in part 8420.0530, items A and D.

The bank plan is subject to the notice and comment provisions in part 8420.0230. Based on input from the technical evaluation panel and other comments received, the local government unit must determine the likelihood that the restoration will be successful and, if affirmative, approve the plan and advise the depositor of the wetland acreage likely to be accepted into the wetland bank. Approval of the plan shall be considered official acknowledgment that the restored wetland is designated for replacement.

I. In cases where a wetland is to be restored by an agency, department, or subdivision of the local government unit for deposit into the wetland bank, the local government unit must prepare the information required in part 8420.0530, items A and D, and notice this information according to the notice and comment provisions in part 8420.0230.

J. The proposed wetland must be restored within two years of approval or the bank plan must be resubmitted for consideration. Upon approval, the depositor shall restore the wetland and notify the local government unit when construction has been completed. The technical panel shall inspect the site when construction is completed to ensure that construction specifications have been followed. Failure to follow approved construction specifications is sufficient grounds for the local government unit to deny consideration of the wetland for banking.

K. No sooner than six months after construction has been completed and approved, the depositor shall contact the local government unit to request a final determination of wetland bank acceptability and approved quantities of wetland credits for deposit. The technical panel shall ensure that sufficient time has been allowed for the restored wetland to become established, especially vegetation and hydrology, before making this determination. If the technical panel has reason to believe that the wetland characteristics may change substantially, the panel must postpone its recommendation to the local government unit until the wetland has stabilized.

Based on a site visit, the technical panel will determine the size and type of wetland, using the abbreviated Cowardin et al. classification in part 8420.0540, subpart 10, as well as inlet and outlet characteristics resulting from the restored wetland. The technical panel will provide the information to the local government unit.

L. The local government unit shall notify the depositor of its findings as to the suitability of the wetland and approved wetland credits. If the depositor chooses to proceed with a deposit into the bank, the depositor must record the notice specified in part 8420.0530, item D, subitem (7), and submit proof of the recording to the local government unit for the wetlands to be deposited. If the depositor chooses not to proceed with the deposit, the depositor may return the wetland to its preconstruction condition without replacement within five years. At any time within the five-year period, the depositor may request certification for deposit into the bank or may amend the bank plan and submit the plan to the local government unit for approval and subsequent certification. After five years, any activity in the wetland is subject to this chapter.

M. To be deposited into the bank, the following information concerning the restored wetland must be submitted to the board by the local government unit in which the wetland is located:

- (1) name, address, and telephone number of the depositor;
- (2) location of the restored wetland, including legal description, UTM coordinates, county, and watershed;
- (3) a copy of the deed for the property containing the restored wetland with the required covenant recorded;
- (4) size of the wetland acreage to be deposited, to the 0.1 acre, by wetland type, using the abbreviated Cowardin, et al. classification in part 8420.0540, subpart 10, and inlet and outlet characteristics; and
- (5) certification that the wetland is approved for deposit into the bank.

N. The board shall acknowledge the deposit to the depositor and local government unit and officially enter the information in item M into the wetland bank. Information on deposited wetlands shall be available from the board on request according to subpart 2, item C.

O. Wetlands deposited into the wetland bank, on which withdrawals have occurred, are subject to replacement for any subsequent drainage or filling.

P. Wetlands deposited into the wetland bank are subject to the monitoring provisions in part 8420.0750.

Subp. 2. **Withdrawals.**

A. Before consideration of use of the wetland bank, applicants must satisfy the requirements of part 8420.0520. It must be clearly demonstrated that the applicant has made a good faith effort to avoid, minimize, rectify, or reduce or eliminate over time the impact on the wetland, and that no feasible and prudent alternative to the impact exists. The local government unit must certify that the project would otherwise be allowed if adequate replacement could be secured by the applicant and that the applicant has made a good faith effort to do so and has not succeeded in locating a site.

B. The use of the wetland bank is limited to:

- (1) projects occurring in counties having greater than 80 percent of their presettlement wetlands;
- (2) counties with less than 80 percent of their presettlement wetlands remaining, with the use of the wetland bank limited to:
 - (a) linear-type transportation or utility projects with impacts less than five acres per basin, minus any project-specific replacement acreage;
 - (b) other projects with a cumulative impact of less than five acres, minus any project-specific replacement acreage; or
 - (c) whenever the local government unit determines that the use of the wetland bank is reasonable and desirable.

C. When using the wetland bank to replace drained or filled wetlands, the replacement must comply with part 8420.0540.

Proposed Rules

D. The board, on request, will provide the following information to persons making inquiries concerning available wetland bank deposits with a local government unit jurisdiction, county, or watershed:

- (1) account holder: name, address, and telephone number;
- (2) available wetlands: wetland acres by abbreviated Cowardin et al. classification type and inlet and outlet characteristics;
- (3) location: section, township, range, county, and watershed.

E. The applicant may then contact, negotiate, and purchase the required wetland acreage from the account holder. When the account holder and applicant come to agreement, the applicant will provide requested information on a notarized credit transfer form developed by the board, and include the credit transfer form as part of the wetland replacement plan transmitted to the local government unit. The credit transfer form will include information indicating the wetland type by acres for transferal, location of restored wetlands, and the inlet and outlet characteristics of the banked wetland.

F. The local government unit must circulate the applicant's wetland replacement plan and the credit transfer form to identify specific wetland bank credits as the applicable replacement wetland, using the public comment and review process in part 8420.0230 and to the local government unit whose jurisdiction covers the location of the wetland bank acreage. The local government unit must contact the board to verify that replacement credits indicated on the credit transfer form are available before final approval of wetland bank withdrawals.

The comment and review process initiated in this item may be limited to the bank transaction only, if public comment and review has already taken place for all other aspects of the proposed development and its impact.

G. Wetlands impacted by public transportation projects may be replaced statewide, provided the replacements are approved by the commissioner under an established wetland banking system or under the rules for wetland banking as provided for in parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0760.

The commissioner shall notify the local government unit and the board of the decision within 30 days of the date that the notice of the replacement plan is published in the EQB Monitor. If the commissioner does not approve the replacement plan, the local government unit shall not approve the replacement plan.

H. On approval of the applicant's wetland replacement plan using wetland bank acreage as wetland replacement, the local government unit shall notify the board to debit the appropriate banked wetland by type and acreage. The board will complete the accounting transactions and send a notice of credit transfer to the account holder.

I. The applicant shall not be allowed to begin proposed drain or fill activities until the local government unit formally approves the wetland replacement plan using the acknowledged wetland bank credits as replacement.

J. An individual, corporation, local government unit, or other organization may buy and hold credits from account holders in the bank for later use or resale. Transfer of credits must be accomplished through use of a board credit transfer form, and must be maintained in an account in the state wetland banking system. An account will be established for the individual or organization on presentation to the board of a credit transfer form, and required organization information. The board will notify both account holders on transfer of the wetland credits. An account transfer must be accompanied by transfer of the fee title or easement or license. A credit for a wetland may not be split between accounts. Wetland credits may also be transferred between banks approved by the board.

8420.0750 AUDITING AND MONITORING.

Subpart 1. Annual report and audit.

A. The board will develop wetland bank deposit, withdrawal, and credit transfer forms and distribute them to local government units indicating a desire to certify restored wetland acreage for deposit in the wetland bank.

B. The wetland bank data file maintained by the board will contain at least the following information:

- (1) wetland acres by abbreviated Cowardin et al. classification type, inlet and outlet characteristics, restoration date, and bank acceptance date, fee owner, location (UTM coordinates, section, township, range, local government unit, county, and watershed of the banked wetland); and
- (2) previous withdrawals against each banked wetland by impact wetland (wetland acres by abbreviated Cowardin, et al. classification type, inlet and outlet characteristics, date of wetland impact), ownership (fee owner, address, telephone number) and location (UTM coordinates, section, township, range, local government unit, county, and watershed of the impacted wetland).

C. The board may periodically inspect wetland bank records and correspondence maintained by a local government unit to determine compliance with this part.

D. An annual wetland bank report shall be prepared and distributed by the board to applicable local government units, soil and water conservation districts, watershed districts, watershed management organizations, the department, and on request.

Subp. 2. Monitoring.

A. After the wetland is entered into the bank, the local government unit responsible for monitoring under part 8420.0230 and the account holder shall continue monitoring according to parts 8420.0600 to 8420.0630. The account holder is responsible for the success of the wetland until completion of monitoring, even after all the credit has been withdrawn.

B. The board shall inspect restored wetlands deposited into the wetland bank at least once each five years to ensure that the wetlands conform to conditions specified in the approved restoration plan, and to make a determination of needed corrective action.

8420.0760 ENFORCEMENT AND CORRECTIVE ACTIONS.

A. Enforcement of parts 8420.0700 to 8420.0750 is governed by part 8420.0290 and *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.2372.

B. If, on inspection, the board determines that wetlands deposited in the wetland bank are not in compliance with this chapter, the board must prescribe corrective measures to the local government unit to bring the wetland into compliance.

C. If satisfactory remediation does not result, the board may refuse future wetland bank certifications by the local government unit and require all wetland replacements to be on a project-specific basis.

D. If a local government unit determines that a banked wetland does not substantially meet the specifications in the approved bank plan, the local government unit must notify the board, and the board shall restrict further withdrawals from the account until the local government unit notifies the board that the wetland has been brought into compliance. The board may also restrict withdrawals when a local government unit is the account holder and the board determines that a banked wetland does not substantially meet the specifications in the approved bank plan.

E. The local government unit or the board can undertake reconstruction work and require reimbursement of reasonable costs from the fee title owner or easement or license holder.

**STANDARDS AND CRITERIA FOR IDENTIFICATION,
PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF CALCAREOUS FENS****8420.1010 PURPOSE.**

The purpose of parts 8420.1010 to 8420.1060 is to provide minimum standards and criteria for the identification, protection, and management of calcareous fens as authorized by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 103G.223. Calcareous fens may not be drained or filled or otherwise altered or degraded except as provided for in a management plan approved by the commissioner.

Part 8420.0120 does not apply to calcareous fens.

8420.1020 IDENTIFYING CALCAREOUS FENS.

A calcareous fen is a peat-accumulating wetland dominated by distinct groundwater inflows having specific chemical characteristics. The water is characterized as alkaline, with high concentrations of calcium and low dissolved oxygen content. The chemistry provides an environment for specific and often rare hydrophytic plants.

8420.1030 PROCEDURES TO LIST CALCAREOUS FENS.

A. The commissioner shall investigate wetlands to determine if the wetland is properly identified as a calcareous fen.

B. The commissioner shall maintain a current list of known calcareous fens in the state and their location.

C. The commissioner shall provide an updated list of calcareous fens to the board for further distribution.

8420.1040 MANAGEMENT PLANS.

Calcareous fens may not be drained or filled or otherwise altered or degraded except as provided for in a management plan approved by the commissioner.

8420.1050 RESTORATION.

The commissioner may approve management plans to restore or upgrade a previously damaged calcareous fen.

8420.1060 APPEALS.

A. A landowner or project proposer may challenge the commissioner's determination that a wetland is a calcareous fen or the commissioner's calcareous fen management plan by demanding a hearing. The hearing will be carried out in the same manner as water permit hearings under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 103G.

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Proposed Rules

B. The hearing must be demanded within 30 days after mailed notice of the commissioner's decision to the project proposer, otherwise the decision becomes final and may not be challenged by the project proposer.

C. Appeal of the commissioner's decision after the hearing must be done in the manner provided for appeals from contested case decisions in *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 14.

Adopted Rules

The adoption of a rule becomes effective after the requirements of Minn. Stat. §14.14-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule.

If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed.

If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

An emergency rule becomes effective five working days after the approval of the Attorney General as specified in Minn. Stat. §14.33 and upon the approval of the Revisor of Statutes as specified in §14.36. Notice of approval by the Attorney General will be published as soon as practicable, and the adopted emergency rule will be published in the manner provided for adopted rules under §14.18.

1650.0510 DEFINITIONS.

[For text of subs 1 and 2, see M.R.]

Subp. 2a. Agricultural farmland. "Agricultural farmland" means productive, tillable land or land used for pasture.

[For text of subs 3 to 14, see M.R.]

Subp. 15. First time farmer. "First time farmer" means an individual who, together with the individual's spouse and minor children:

1650.0540 APPLICATION PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. Application.

A. If the application is approved and the authority makes application for a volume cap allocation as described in part 1650.0550, subpart 2, the ~~check fee~~ must be delivered to the commissioner of finance in payment of the application charge imposed by Minnesota Statutes, chapter 474A. If the application is rejected, the volume cap allocation fee must be returned to the applicant.

Subp. 3a. **Use of allocation.** The allocation purchased from the finance department must be used within 90 days. If the allocation expires due to no fault of the authority, the authority may require payment of additional fees to secure a new allocation.

Subp. 3b. **Insufficient funds.** If there are insufficient funds to allocate to all applications received, priority must be given in the order of the application number. The petition must be in writing and must be sent within 15 business days of the date of the disapproval. The petition must state the petitioner's reasons for disagreeing with the disapproval and may include additional information relevant to the request for reconsideration. Within 15 business days of receiving the petition, the executive director shall send a written response to the petitioner upholding or reversing the original decision and giving the reasons for the decision.

Rules as Adopted

1650.0600 PURPOSE.

Parts 1650.0600 to 1650.0650 establish the criteria and procedures to be used by the rural finance authority in the administration of the agricultural improvement loan program authorized by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 41B.043. The purpose of the agricultural improvement loan program is to issue bonds to finance agricultural improvements loans from the authority to eligible applicants. Loans under this program will be made to applicants who meet the eligibility requirements in part 1650.0620. Repayment of the loans must be secured by mortgage liens on all or a part of the farm on which the agricultural improvements are located and other security the authority considers necessary.

1650.0610 DEFINITIONS.

Subpart 1. **Scope.** The definitions in this part apply to parts 1650.0600 to 1650.0650.

Subp. 2. **Agricultural improvements.** "Agricultural improvements" means improvements to a farm, including the purchase and construction or installation of improvements to land, buildings, and other permanent structures, including equipment incorporated in or permanently affixed to the land, buildings, or structures, that are useful for and intended to be used for the purpose of farming. "Agricultural improvements" do not include equipment not affixed to real estate or improvements or additions to that equipment.

Subp. 3. **Agricultural improvement loan program; program.** "Agricultural improvement loan program" or "program" means the program authorized by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 41B.043.

Subp. 4. **Agricultural land.** "Agricultural land" means land suitable for use in farming.

Subp. 5. **Applicant.** "Applicant" means a potential borrower who submits an application to the authority.

Subp. 6. **Application.** "Application" means an application for a loan under the agricultural improvement loan program in the form provided by the authority.

Subp. 7. **Assets.** "Assets" means all property, real or personal, tangible or intangible, and all contract rights of value that constitute assets, including cash crops or feed on hand, livestock held for sale, breeding stock, receivable notes, receivables, cash invested in growing crops, cash value of life insurance, machinery and equipment, cars, trucks, farms and other real estate including life estates and personal residences, and the value of a beneficial interest in trusts.

Subp. 8. **Authority.** "Authority" means the rural finance authority.

Subp. 9. **Borrower.** "Borrower" means the person or persons liable on a mortgage loan made under the program. A borrower may also be a domestic family farm corporation as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 500.24.

Subp. 10. **Collateral.** "Collateral" means all assets pledged as security for a borrower's obligation under a mortgage loan made under the program. It includes all assets, guarantees, money, letters of credit, or assignments of collateral or a pledge for a loan on which the lender has a security interest or lien.

Subp. 11. **Executive director.** "Executive director" means the executive director of the authority or any other officer authorized to act on behalf of the board of the authority or its executive director.

Subp. 12. **Fixtures.** "Fixtures" means an article of personal property that has been affixed or annexed to real estate so that it is regarded as a part of the real property. A thing is considered to be affixed or assumed to real estate if it is attached to it by roots, imbedded in it, permanently resting upon it, or permanently attached to it, as by means of cement, plaster, nails, bolts, or screws.

Subp. 13. **Grade B dairy farmers.** "Grade B dairy farmers" means producers currently listed as manufacturing grade milk producers by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture, Dairy and Livestock Division; producers intending to put back into operation a facility that is currently not in milk production and does not meet Grade A standards; and Grade A dairy farmers that have received a notice of intention to suspend permit from the Dairy and Livestock Division.

Subp. 14. **Liabilities.** "Liabilities" means debts or other obligations for which an applicant is responsible, including accounts payable, notes or other indebtedness owed, taxes, rent, amounts owed on real estate contracts or mortgages, judgments, and accrued interest payable.

Subp. 15. **Mortgage loan or loan.** "Mortgage loan" or "loan" means a loan from the authority under the program that is secured by a mortgage on all or a portion of the farm on which the agricultural improvements will be located.

Subp. 16. **Net worth.** "Net worth" means the total value of an applicant's assets and the assets of the applicant's spouse and dependents, less the liabilities of the same parties.

Subp. 17. **Real estate.** "Real estate" means land and anything permanently affixed to the land, such as buildings, fences, and things attached to the buildings, such as light fixtures, plumbing, and heating fixtures, or other items that would be personal property if not attached.

1650.0620 BORROWER ELIGIBILITY.

To receive a loan under the agricultural improvement loan program, applicants must meet the following criteria:

A. the applicants must be residents of Minnesota or a domestic family farm corporation as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 500.24, subdivision 2;

B. at least one of the applicants must be the principal operator of the farm upon which the agricultural improvements will be located;

C. at least one of the applicants must be actively engaged in farming;

D. the applicants must show the ability to repay the loan; and

E. the applicants must show that they would not be able to make the proposed improvements without the availability of this financing.

1650.0630 APPLICATION AND PROCEDURES.

Subpart 1. **Application forms.** All applications under the program must be on forms designated by the authority. The applicant should complete the application form and submit it to the authority along with other information required by the authority. Financial statements should be dated within 90 days of the application.

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Adopted Rules

Subp. 2. **Personal history letter signed by the applicant.** A personal history letter may be submitted with the application to explain the type of project for which funds will be used, the applicant's background, and the type of farming unit.

Subp. 3. **Fees.** The applicant must submit with the application a nonrefundable \$50 application fee. A loan origination fee equal to 1-1/2 percent of the amount of the loan must be submitted by the applicant at the closing of the loan. The loan origination fee and other loan closing expenses may be financed with proceeds of the loan. The applicant must also pay all other out-of-pocket costs required to complete the closing of the loan, such as filing fees, mortgage registration, taxes, and appraisal fees. The authority shall pay its own legal fees.

Subp. 4. **Terms of loan.** The maximum term of a loan is six years. The applicant must agree on the loan terms such as interest rate, length of loan, repayment schedule, and prepayment options. The maximum loan amount is \$20,000 and the loan may have a balloon. The collateral securing the loan must have a value of at least 150 percent of the amount of the loan.

Subp. 5. **Interim financing.** The applicant shall not begin acquisition or construction of any part of the agricultural improvements before the authority approves the application. When the application has been approved, upon notice to and approval by the authority, the applicant may move forward with acquisition or construction of the agricultural improvements. A lender may provide interim financing for the agricultural improvements until the closing of the loan. The interim financing, principal only, will be paid with the proceeds of the loan.

Subp. 6. **Misrepresentation in application.** If a change occurs in the information provided by the applicant to the authority, the applicant shall immediately update and correct that information. Misrepresentation in the application or failure to update any required information is grounds to reject an application, revoke a notice of approval, or refuse to close the loan.

1650.0640 AUTHORITY REVIEW, NOTICE, APPEAL.

Subpart 1. **Authority review.** The authority shall accept or reject applications within 30 working days of their receipt. If the documentation is not sufficient to make a determination, the authority may request additional information as needed.

Subp. 2. **Authority acceptance.** The authority shall accept applications based upon whether:

- A. the applicant meets all eligibility criteria;
- B. the proposed agricultural improvements meet specifications set by statute and rule;
- C. the applicant demonstrates an ability to repay the mortgage loan and other obligations, based on the financial information submitted with the application; and
- D. the authority has sufficient funds available to make the loan.

Subp. 3. **Authority notice.** The authority shall promptly notify the applicant in writing whether or not the application is approved. If the application is rejected, the notice must state the reasons. For accepted applications, the notice shall delineate any conditions related to the acceptance of the application.

Subp. 4. **Administrative appeal.** If the application is rejected, the applicant may petition the executive director for reconsideration. The petition must be in writing and must be sent within 15 working days of the authority's mailing of its notice of rejection. The petition must state the grounds for the appeal and may include additional relevant information. Within 15 working days of receiving the petition, the executive director shall send a written response to the petitioner upholding or reversing the original decision and giving reasons for the decision.

Subp. 5. **Formal appeal.** After appeal to the executive director, a petitioner may appeal the executive director's decision directly to the authority's board by written notice to the executive director within 15 working days of the executive director's mailing of its notice of rejection. The decision of the board is final.

1650.0650 LOAN ADMINISTRATION.

Subpart 1. **Loan administration.** The authority shall perform all tasks and functions customarily performed in administering the loans with the degree of care and diligence usually maintained by agricultural real estate lenders. The authority has custody and control of all loan documents.

Subp. 2. **Enforcement.** The authority shall manage, administer, and enforce the loan, including, without limitation, the right to accelerate the loan on default and to foreclose or otherwise enforce remedies against the borrower.

Subp. 3. **Inspection.** At any time during the term of a loan, the authority or the state legislative auditor may inspect the collateral during normal business hours.

Notice of Intent to Issue a Statewide General Permit Governing Country Grain Elevators and Solicitation of Public Comments

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (Agency) is preparing to issue a statewide general permit governing country grain elevators. The issuance of the general permit is authorized by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7001.0210, subp. 2 (1991), which allows the Agency to issue a general permit if "...the Agency finds that it is appropriate to issue a single permit to a category of permittees, whose operations, emissions, activities, discharges or facilities are the same or substantially similar..."

There are many grain elevator facilities which require an air emission permit. The air emissions from such facilities are subject to the same or substantially similar emission limitations and operational requirements. Establishment of a general permit will save the permittee the resources and time required to obtain an individual permit and the Agency the resources and time required to issue an individual permit. The draft general permit establishes emission limits for criteria pollutants and other conditions which must be followed under federal regulations and Minnesota rules. The general permit has a duration of five years.

This general permit applies to country grain elevators that have an annual throughput of greater than 45,000 tons per year and less than 375,000 tons per year, are not subject to federal New Source Performance Standards, and are located in areas of the state that attain national ambient air quality standards for particulate matter. Grain elevators that have a permanent storage capacity of 2.5 million bushels or more are subject to federal New Source Performance Standards and are therefore not eligible for this general permit. This general permit contains limitations on fuel type used, emission limitations, throughput limitations and operation and maintenance, recordkeeping, reporting and compliance determination requirements. The general permit's requirements also assure that the maximum potential emissions from these sources is less than 250 tons per year for each criteria pollutant, to keep these sources minor under federal permit regulations for attainment areas.

The preliminary determination to issue the general permit is tentative. There are three formal procedures for public participation in the Agency's consideration of the general permit. These procedures are set forth in *Minnesota Rules* pts. 7001.0100 to 7001.0130. First, interested persons may submit written comments on the proposed general permit. Second, interested persons may request the Agency to hold a public information meeting. Third, interested persons may request the Agency to hold a contested case hearing, which is conducted by the Office of Administrative Hearings pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act.

Interested persons who submit comments or requests to the Agency shall set forth:

1. a statement of the person's interest in the draft general permit;
2. a statement of the action the person wishes the Agency to take, including specific references to the section of the draft general permit that the person believes should be changed; and

The issuance of the general permit is authorized by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7001.0210, subp. 2 (1991), which allows the Agency to issue a general permit if "...the Agency finds that it is appropriate to issue a single permit to a category of permittees, whose operations, emissions, activities, discharges or facilities are the same or substantially similar..."

There are many air emission facilities which require an air emission permit solely because they utilize emergency/standby electrical generators. The air emissions from such facilities have a negligible environmental impact. The proposed general permit would apply to and identify air emission units which have the potential to emit at least one criteria pollutant in amounts greater than twenty-five tons per year. Establishment of a general permit will save the permittee the resources and time required to obtain an individual permit and the Agency the resources and time required to issue an individual permit. The draft general permit establishes emission limits for criteria pollutants and other conditions which must be followed. The general permit has a duration of five years.

This general permit applies to air emission facilities that require an air emission permit solely because they contain one or more emergency/standby electrical generators. If an air emission facility contains other types of emission units, the facility is not eligible for this general permit. This general permit contains limitations on fuel type used, emission limitations, and recordkeeping, reporting and compliance determination requirements. The general permit also limits emissions from these facilities, by either limiting fuel quantity used each year or limiting allowed hours of operation, to assure that the maximum potential emissions from these sources is less than 50 tons per year for each criteria pollutant.

The preliminary determination to issue the general permit is tentative. There are three formal procedures for public participation in the Agency's consideration of the general permit. These procedures are set forth in *Minnesota Rules* pts. 7001.0100 to 7001.0130. First, interested persons may submit written comments on the proposed general permit. 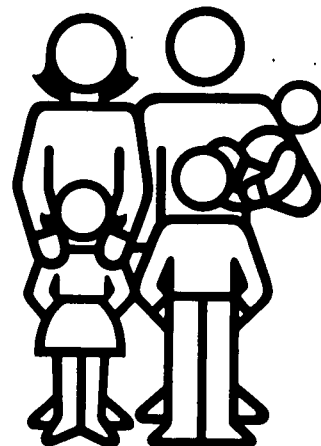

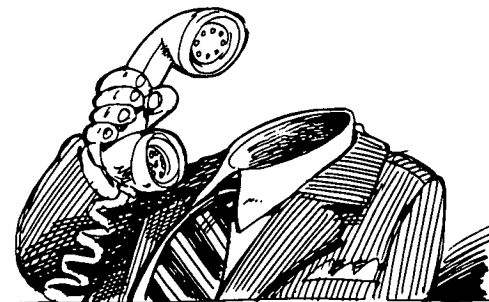
