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# Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

#### NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 80 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific **Minnesota Rule** chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the **Minnesota Rules** are published. The current 1995 set is a 13-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Generally speaking, proposed and adopted exempt rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

An agency must first solicit **Comments on Planned Rules** or **Comments on Planned Rule Amendments** from the public on the subject matter of a possible rulemaking proposal under active consideration within the agency (*Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.101). It does this by publishing a notice in the *State Register* at least 60 days before publication of a notice to adopt or a notice of hearing, or within 60 days of the effective date of any new statutory grant of required rulemaking.

When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or a notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the most current edition of the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues #1-13 inclusive; issues #14-25 inclusive; issue #26 cumulative for issues #1-26; issues #27-38 inclusive; issue #39, cumulative for issues #1-39; issues #40-51 inclusive; and issues #1-52 (or 53 in some years), cumulative for issues #1-52 (or 53). An annual subject matter index for rules was separately printed usually in August, but starting with Volume 19 now appears in the final issue of each volume. 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# **Proposed Rules**

#### **Comments on Planned Rules or Rule Amendments**

An agency must first solicit **Comments on Planned Rules** or **Comments on Planned Rule Amendments** from the public on the subject matter of a possible rulemaking proposal under active consideration within the agency (*Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.101). It does this by publishing a notice in the *State Register* at least 60 days before publication of a notice to adopt or a notice of hearing, and within 60 days of the effective date of any new statutory grant of required rulemaking.

#### Rules to be Adopted After a Hearing

After receiving comments and deciding to hold a public hearing on the rule, an agency drafts its rule. It then publishes its rules with a notice of hearing. All persons wishing to make a statement must register at the hearing. Anyone who wishes to submit written comments may do so at the hearing, or within five working days of the close of the hearing. Administrative law judges may, during the hearing, extend the period for receiving comments up to 20 calendar days. For five business days after the submission period the agency and interested persons may respond to any new information submitted during the written submission period and the record then is closed. The administrative law judge prepares a report within 30 days, stating findings of fact, conclusions and recommendations. After receiving the report, the agency decides whether to adopt, withdraw or modify the proposed rule based on consideration of the comments made during the rule hearing procedure and the report of the administrative law judge. The agency must wait five days after receiving the report before taking any action.

#### Rules to be Adopted Without a Hearing

Pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes* § 14.22, an agency may propose to adopt, amend, suspend or repeal rules without first holding a public hearing. An agency must first solicit **Comments on Planned Rules** or **Comments on Planned Rule Amendments** from the public. The agency then publishes a notice of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing, together with the proposed rules, in the *State Register*. If, during the 30-day comment period, 25 or more persons submit to the agency a written request for a hearing of the proposed rules, the agency must proceed under the provisions of §§ 14.14-14.20, which state that if an agency decides to hold a public hearing, it must publish a notice of intent in the *State Register*.

#### **Proposed Permanent Rules Relating to Fishing**

DUAL NOTICE: Notice of Intent to Adopt Rules Without a Public Hearing Unless 25 or More Persons Request a Hearing, and Notice of Hearing If 25 or More Requests for Hearing Are Received

Proposed Rules and Rule Amendments Governing Fishing, *Minnesota Rules*, Chapters 6254, 6256, 6258, 6260, 6262, and 6266.

**Introduction.** The Department of Natural Resources intends to adopt rules without a public hearing following the procedures set forth in the Administrative Procedure Act, *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.22 to 14.28, and rules of the Office of Administrative Hearings, *Minnesota Rules*, parts 1400.2300 to 1400.2310. If, however, 25 or more persons submit a written request for a hearing on the rules within 30 days or by 4:30 p.m. on March 25, 1998, a public hearing will be held beginning on April 14, 1998 at the Kelly Inn, 161 St. Anthony Blvd., (located just north of Highway I-94, Marion St. exit), St. Paul, Minnesota, starting at 1:30 p.m., and reconvening on April 15, 1998 at the Rochester Community and Technical College, Heintz Center, Rooms C105, C107, and C109, 1926 College View Road S.E., Rochester, Minnesota, starting at 6:30 p.m., and reconvening on April 16, 1998 at Lake of the Woods School, State Highway 11 W., Baudette, Minnesota, starting at 6:30 p.m., and continuing until completed. To find out whether the rules will be adopted without a hearing or if the hearing will be held, you should contact the agency contact person after March 25, 1998 and before April 14, 1998.

**Agency Contact Person.** Comments or questions on the rules and written requests for a public hearing on the rules must be submitted to the agency contact person. Subject of Rules and Statutory Authority. The proposed rules and rule amendments govern various fish matters, specifically:

- 1) seasons and limits for rough fish taken by spearing, harpooning, archery, and dip nets;
- various changes to sport gill netting regulations for ciscoes and whitefish, including clarifying that seasons may not be opened on lakes subject to sport gill netting, making the gill netting season on Upper Red Lake subject to opening and closing on 48 hour notice, adding one or more lakes to the gill netting season, and changing the season on Big Turtle Lake in Itasca County;

#### Proposed Rules =

- reporting requirements for various commercial enterprises, including Lake Superior fishing guides, minnow dealers, mussel harvesters, turtle sellers, and commercial fishing operators;
- 4) clarifying species of frogs regulated by the commissioner;
- 5) harvest restrictions for mussels;
- 6) raising the size limit for three ridge mussels;
- 7) expanding the gear types authorized under rough fish removal permits;
- 8) changes to inland commercial fishing areas;
- 9) changes to fishing regulations on that part of Pool 3 of the Mississippi River that is not on the Minnesota-Wisconsin border to make them consistent with the border water regulations;
- 10) adding East Bearskin Lake to list of lake trout lakes partially outside of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness (BWCAW);
- 11) various changes to fishing regulations on Lake Superior and its tributaries, including harvest restrictions for unclipped rainbow trout, possession limits for brown trout, and simplifying brook trout and splake seasons and possession limits;
- 12) season changes for trout in southeast Minnesota;
- 13) continuous closed fishing season for two sections of the Knife River in Lake County;
- 14) harvest restrictions for largemouth bass and northern pike in Loon Lake in Waseca County and Ida Lake in Blue Earth County;
- 15) harvest restrictions for smallmouth bass in the Otter Tail River in Wilkin and Otter Tail counties;
- 16) clarifying the commissioner's authority to allow commercial taking of fish in waters otherwise closed to fishing;
- 17) changing the minimum size limit for muskellunge on the Minnesota Wisconsin border waters to 40 inches; and
- 18) reducing the aggregate possession limit for walleye and sauger in the Rainy River to two from March 1 through April 14.

The statutory authority to adopt the rules is *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 97A.045, subds. 2 and 4; 97C.005, subd. 3; 97C.041; 97C.311, subd. 2; 97C.345, subd. 5; 97C.375; 97C.381; 97C.395, subd. 1; 97C.401, subd. 1; 97C.505, subd. 1; 97C.601, subd. 6; 97C.605, subd. 3; 97C.701, subd. 1; 97C.805, subds. 1 and 2; 97C.811, subd. 3; and 97C.815, subd. 1

A copy of the proposed rules is published in the *State Register*. A free copy of the rules is available upon request from the agency contact person listed above.

**Comments.** You have until 4:30 p.m. on March 25, 1998, to submit written comment in support of or in opposition to the proposed rules or any part or subpart of the rules. Your comment must be in writing and received by the agency contact person by the due date. Comment is encouraged. Your comments should identify the portion of the proposed rules addressed, the reason for the comment, and any change proposed. You are encouraged to propose any change desired. Any comments that you would like to make on the legality of the proposed rules must also be made during this comment period.

Request for a Hearing. In addition to submitting comments, you may also request that a hearing be held on the rules. Your request for a public hearing must be in writing and must be received by the agency contact person by 4:30 p.m. on March 25, 1998. Your written request for a public hearing must include your name and address. You must identify the portion of the proposed rules to which you object or state that you oppose the entire set of rules. Any request that does not comply with these requirements is not valid and cannot be counted by the agency for determining whether a public hearing must be held. You are also encouraged to state the reason for the request and any changes you want made to the proposed rules.

**Withdrawal of Requests.** If 25 or more persons submit a written request for a hearing, a public hearing will be held unless a sufficient number withdraw their requests in writing. If enough requests for hearing are withdrawn to reduce the number below 25, the agency must give written notice of this to all persons who requested a hearing, explain the actions the agency took to effect the withdrawal, and ask for written comments on this action. If a public hearing is required, the agency will follow the procedures in *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.131 to 14.20.

**Alternative Format/Accommodation.** Upon request, this Notice can be made available in an alternative format, such as large print, Braille, or cassette tape. To make such a request or if you need an accommodation to make this hearing accessible, please contact the agency contact person at the address or telephone number listed above.

**Modifications.** The proposed rules may be modified, either as a result of public comment or as a result of the rule hearing process. Modifications must be supported by data and views submitted to the agency or presented at the hearing and the adopted rules may not be substantially different than these proposed rules. If the proposed rules affect you in any way, you are encouraged to participate in the rulemaking process.

## **Proposed Rules**

**Cancellation of Hearings.** The hearings scheduled for April 14, 15, and 16, 1998, will be canceled if the agency does not receive requests from 25 or more persons that a hearing be held on the rules. If you requested a public hearing, the agency will notify you before the scheduled hearings whether or not the hearings will be held. You may also call the agency contact person at (612) 296-0791 after March 25, 1998 to find out whether the hearings will be held.

**Notice of Hearing.** If 25 or more persons submit written requests for a public hearing on the rules, a hearing will be held following the procedures in *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.131 to 14.20. The hearing will be held on the date and at the time and place listed above. The hearing will continue until all interested persons have been heard. Administrative Law Judge Allan W. Klein is assigned to conduct the hearing. Judge Klein can be reached at the Office of Administrative Hearings, 100 Washington Square, Suite 1700, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55401-2138, telephone (612) 341-7609 and fax (612) 349-2665.

**Hearing Procedure.** If a hearing is held, you and all interested or affected persons, including representatives of associations or other interested groups, will have an opportunity to participate. You may present your views either orally at the hearing or in writing at any time before the close of the hearing record. All evidence presented should relate to the proposed rules. You may also submit written material to the Administrative Law Judge to be recorded in the hearing record for five working days after the public hearing ends. This five-day comment period may be extended for a longer period not to exceed 20 calendar days if ordered by the Administrative Law Judge at the hearing. Following the comment period, there is a five-working-day response period during which the agency and any interested person may respond in writing to any new information submitted. No additional evidence may be submitted during the five-day response period. All comments and responses submitted to the Administrative Law Judge must be received at the Office of Administrative Hearings no later than 4:30 p.m. on the due date. All comments or responses received will be available for review at the Office of Administrative Hearings. This rule hearing procedure is governed by *Minnesota Rules*, parts 1400.2000 to 1400.2240, and *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 14.131 to 14.20. Questions about procedure may be directed to the Administrative Law Judge.

The agency requests that any person submitting written views or data to the Administrative Law Judge prior to the hearing or during the comment or response period also submit a copy of the written views or data to the agency contact person at the address stated above.

**Statement of Need and Reasonableness.** A statement of need and reasonableness is now available from the agency contact person. This statement contains a summary of the justification for the proposed rules, including a description of who will be affected by the proposed rules and an estimate of the probable cost of the proposed rules. The statement may also be reviewed and copies obtained at the cost of reproduction from either the agency or the Office of Administrative Hearings.

**Lobbyist Registration.** *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 10A, requires each lobbyist to register with the Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board. Adoption Procedure if No Hearing. If no hearing is required, the agency may adopt the rules after the end of the comment period. The rules and supporting documents will then be submitted to the Office of Administrative Hearings for review for legality. You may ask to be notified of the date the rules are submitted to the office. If you want to be so notified, or want to receive a copy of the adopted rules, or want to register with the agency to receive notice of future rule proceedings, submit your request to the agency contact person listed above.

Adoption Procedure After a Hearing. If a hearing is held, after the close of the hearing record, the Administrative Law Judge will issue a report on the proposed rules. You may ask to be notified of the date when the Administrative Law Judge's report will become available, and can make this request at the hearing or in writing to the Administrative Law Judge. You may also ask to be notified of the date on which the agency adopts the rules and files them with the Secretary of State, and can make this request at the hearing or in writing to the agency contact person stated above.

**Order.** I order that the rulemaking hearing be held at the date, time, and location listed above.

#### 6254.0600 REQUIREMENTS TO HOLD AND MOVE MORE THAN 24 DOZEN MINNOWS.

[For text of subps 1 to 4, see M.R.]

Subp. 5. **Required reporting.** Minnow dealers and exporting minnow dealers must report, on forms provided by the commissioner, for the previous calendar year. Reports must be submitted to the address identified on the form so that they are received prior to February 4 15 of each year to the address identified on the form. A minnow dealer's license or exporting minnow dealer's license may not be renewed until the yearly report has been received.

#### 6256.0050 DEFINITION OF FROGS.

"Frogs" means the following species:

- A. northern cricket frog (Acris crepitans);
- B. Cope's gray tree frog (Hyla chrysoscelis);
- C. gray tree frog (Hyla versicolor);
- D. spring peeper (Pseudacris crucifer);
- E. chorus frog (Pseudacris triseriata);
- F. bull frog (Rana catesbeiana);
- G. green frog (Rana clamitans);
- H. pickerel frog (Rana palustris);
- I. northern leopard frog (Rana pipiens);
- J. mink frog (Rana septentrionalis);
- K. wood frog (Rana sylvatica);
- L. American toad (Bufo americanus);
- M. great plains toad (Bufo cognatus);
- N. Canadian toad (Bufo hemiophrys);
- O. plains leopard frog (Rana blain);
- P. southern leopard frog (Rana utricularia);
- Q. pig frog (Rana grylio); and
- R. river frog (Rana becksheri).

#### 6256.0200 SPECIES AND SIZE LIMITS FOR TAKING LEOPARD FROGS AND BULL FROGS.

Only Northern leopard frogs (Rana pipiens) and bull frogs (Rana catesbeiana) must be more than six inches long may be when taken or possessed for purposes other than bait.

#### 6256.0500 COMMERCIAL TAKING OF TURTLES.

[For text of subps 1 to 6, see M.R.]

Subp. 7. **Required reporting by turtle seller.** A holder of a turtle seller's license must submit reports must be submitted for the previous calendar year, on forms provided by the commissioner, by a holder of a turtle seller's license so that they are received at the address identified on the form at the time of license renewal or March 1, whichever comes first. The forms must record the numbers and pounds of turtles taken, species of turtles taken, and other information as specified.

#### 6258.0100 SEASON FOR HARVESTING MUSSELS MUSSEL SHELLS FOR PERSONAL USE.

<u>Live mussels may not be harvested for personal use.</u> During the open season, a person possessing a valid resident or nonresident angling license or a person exempt from licensing may take and possess at any time, for personal use only, not more than 24 <del>live</del> whole <u>shells</u> or 48 shell halves of <u>dead</u> freshwater mussels. <u>Mussels Mussel shells</u> may be harvested in waters of the state where fish may be taken by angling. <u>Mussels Mussel shells</u> must be harvested by hand picking only and may not be purchased or sold.

#### 6258.0300 COMMERCIAL PERMITS FOR MUSSELS.

Subpart 1. **Commercial permit required.** A person may not take, possess, buy, sell, or transport <u>live freshwater mussels or</u> more than 24 <u>live</u> whole <u>shells</u> or 48 shell halves of <u>dead</u> freshwater mussels, or assist another person in such taking, without first obtaining a commercial mussel permit from the commissioner.

#### 6258,0400 SPECIES FOR COMMERCIAL HARVEST.

Only three ridge (*Amblema plicata*) mussels may be harvested under a commercial mussel permit. Additional species may be requested for harvest from specific sites by special permit. Three ridge mussels may lawfully be harvested, as live whole mussels or shell halves, provided that they cannot pass through a 2-3/4 three-inch diameter hole.

#### 6258.0800 PERMITTEE REPORTS, RECORDS, AND INSPECTIONS.

Subp. 2. **Required reports.** A permittee must submit reports monthly while the permit is valid on forms provided by the commissioner. Reports for the previous month must be submitted by the permittee to the address identified on the form so that they are received by the department by the 15th of each month even if no harvest activity took place. All information requested on the report must be provided. Failure to submit required reports may result in revocation of the existing permit and may render the permittee ineligible for permits for one year.

#### 6260.0300 COMMERCIAL FISHING PERMIT ISSUANCE.

- Subp. 3. Class B permits. Class B permits may be issued for:
  - A. permanently or temporarily installed traps in waters of the state with fish migrations;
  - B. the use of seines, hoop nets, and fyke nets by persons other than licensed inland commercial operators;
  - C. licensed inland commercial operators to fish waters other than the core waters of their assigned area;
  - D. licensed inland commercial operators to fish unassigned waters; or
  - E. licensed inland commercial operators to crib fish in waters other than where taken.

#### 6260.1700 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE OF THE WOODS.

Subp. 7. **Required reporting.** Commercial operators licensed to fish Lake of the Woods must submit monthly reports on forms provided by the commissioner for each month that commercial fishing activity takes place. The reports must be sent to the address identified on the form so that they are received by the tenth day of the month following the month reported to the area fisheries headquarters that the activity took place.

#### 6260.1800 COMMERCIAL FISHING ON LAKE SUPERIOR.

Subp. 7. **Required reporting.** Commercial fishing operators must submit a record of their commercial fishing operations for each month of the calendar year on forms provided by the commissioner. These reports must be submitted to the address identified on the form so that they are received within ten days after the end of the month for which the report is made. Reports must be made regardless of whether fish are taken and regardless of whether any fishing operations have taken place. Separate records must be kept for each pound or trap net used in Lake Superior and St. Louis Bay. Reports for pound or trap nets must include the number of game fish kept and released, and must be submitted to the Lake Superior Office by the tenth day of each month for the preceding month, whether or not pound or trap nets were fished.

Rough fish may be taken in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 97C.345, 97C.371, and 97C.375. Rough fish may be taken by the following methods from May 1 through the third Sunday in February between sunrise and sunset in all inland waters, except where the taking of fish is otherwise prohibited by law or rule. Nonresidents may not spear from a fish house or darkhouse.

- A. Rough fish may be taken by harpooning with a rubber powered gun, spring gun, or compressed air gun. Harpooning equipment may not be used within 1,000 feet of an established swimming beach. Harpooning equipment may be discharged only when both the equipment and operator are entirely beneath the surface of the water and may not be carried in a cocked position while out of the water.
- B. Rough fish may be taken by archery provided that the arrows used are tethered or controlled by an attached line. The use of crossbows is prohibited.

#### 6262.3050 REQUIRED RECORDKEEPING.

Licensed Lake Superior fishing guides must keep accurate records on forms provided by the commissioner. Records must be kept on a monthly basis and must be submitted by the licensee so that they are received by the Lake Superior area fisheries supervisor on or before the tenth day of each month for the preceding month. **Subject of Rules.** The Minnesota Department of Health (Department) requests comments on its planned amendment to rules governing vital records. The Department is considering rule amendments to update chapter 4600 to support the development of a computerized vital records system including electronic birth certificate, electronic death certificate, standard formats for birth and death certificates as required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 144.225, subdivision 8, and the development of fee schedules for services not defined by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 144.226, subdivision 1. Issues include signature requirements on birth and death certificates, timely completion and filing of birth and death certificates, data quality improvement, defining what constitutes evidence of tangible interest as required by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 144.225, subdivision 7, and other issues related to the transition from paper records to electronic records.

**Persons Affected.** The amendment to the rules would likely directly affect local registrars, physicians who sign birth or death certificates, hospitals, mortuaries, and funeral directors. Others who will be affected are users of vital records data including the Minnesota Historical Society, schools, Social Security Administration, passport offices, immigration, the military, National Center for Health Statistics, Department of Human Services, the Veteran's Administration, life insurance companies, estate attorneys, genealogists, historical researchers, other vital records data users, and the general public.

Statutory Authority. Minnesota Statutes, section 144.12, subdivision 1, clause (11), authorize the Department and Minnesota
