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Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 80 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific **Minnesota Rule** chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the **Minnesota Rules** are published. The current 1999 set is a 13-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Generally speaking, proposed and adopted exempt rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

An agency must first solicit **Comments on Planned Rules** or **Comments on Planned Rule Amendments** from the public on the subject matter of a possible rulemaking proposal under active consideration within the agency (*Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.101). It does this by publishing a notice in the *State Register* at least 60 days before publication of a notice to adopt or a notice of hearing, or within 60 days of the effective date of any new statutory grant of required rulemaking.

When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or a notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the most current edition of the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues #1-13 inclusive; issues #14-25 inclusive; issue #26 cumulative for issues #1-26; issues #27-38 inclusive; issue #39, cumulative for issues #1-39; issues #40-51 inclusive; and issues #1-52 (or 53 in some years), cumulative for issues #1-52 (or 53). An annual subject matter index for rules was separately printed usually in August, but starting with Volume 19 now appears in the final issue of each volume. Adopted Rules

A rule becomes effective after the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.05-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in the *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule. If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed. If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

Pollution Control Agency Adopted Permanent Rules Relating to Storm Water Regulatory Program

The rules proposed and published at *State Register*, Volume 29, Number 16, pages 415-426, October 18, 2004 (29 SR 415), are adopted with the following modifications:

7090.0060 INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE.

For the purposes of parts 7090.2000 to 7090.2060, the storm water discharge design requirements, construction activity requirements, and the requirements of Appendix A in the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency document General Permit Authorization to Discharge Storm Water Associated With Construction Activity Under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System/State Disposal System Permit (NPDES/SDS) Program (construction storm water permit) are incorporated by reference. This document is subject to change every five years. For purposes of parts 7090.2000 to 7090.2060, all references to the construction storm water permit must be construed as referring to the most current version, which at the time this chapter was adopted was Permit No: MN R 100001, issued on August 1, 2003. This document can be found at the Minnesota State Law Library, Minnesota Judicial Center, 25 Constitution Avenue Rev. 7090.0080 DEFINITIONS.

Subp. 3. **Common plan of development or sale.** "Common plan of development or sale" means <u>one proposed plan for</u> a contiguous area where multiple separate and distinct land disturbing activities may be taking place at different times, on different schedules, but under one proposed plan. "One <u>proposed plan</u>" is broadly defined to include design, permit application, advertisement, or physical demarcation indicating that land-disturbing activities may occur.

Subp. 13. Surface waters: "Surface waters" means all streams, lakes, ponds, marshes, wetlands, reservoirs, springs, rivers, drainage systems, waterways, watercourses, and irrigation systems whether natural or artificial, public or private.

Subp. 14: Urbanized area. "Urbanized area" means a land area consisting of one or more places and the adjacent urban fringe as defined by the United States Census Bureau. These areas contain at least 50,000 people and an overall population density of at least 1,000 people per square mile of land.

7090.1010 MS4 PERMIT REQUIREMENTS.

Subpart 1. **Permits required.** An NPDES/SDS storm water permit is required within the specified time period for MS4s identified in items A to C. An owner or operator of an MS4 must submit a complete permit application requesting a permit. Once an MS4 is required to obtain a permit, the requirement remains in effect until the requirement is removed pursuant to subpart 4, item B.

A. MS4s located in an urbanized area in whole or in part, that are regulated in accordance with *Code of Federal Regulations*, title 40, section 122.26(a)(1)(iii) and (iv), and (a)(9)(i)(A), including any publicly owned entity, such as a military base, hospital, prison or correctional facility, college, or university, with a potential resident capacity, bed count occupancy, or average daily user population of 1,000 or more.

7090.2010 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITY PERMIT REQUIREMENTS.

Subpart 1. Permits required. An NPDES/SDS construction storm water permit is required if:

A. a person is conducting construction activity except for construction activities identified under part 7090.2020; or

7090.2020 NPDES/SDS CONSTRUCTION STORM WATER GENERAL PERMIT COVERAGE.

Subpart 1. Scope. The commissioner shall notify owners and operators of construction activities that disturb one to less than five acres of soil and meet the requirements in subpart 2 or 3 that they are covered under the NPDES/SDS construction storm water general permit even if the owner or operator has not submitted a permit application. Owners and operators that meet the requirements of subpart 2 or

3 may request an individual NPDES/SDS construction storm water permit in accordance with chapter 7001.

Subp. 4. 2. Emergency construction.

A. Construction activities <u>are</u> required to minimize the impacts of an emergency situation, including but not limited to floods, tornadoes, and severe storms, presenting imminent threat to human health, public drinking water, or the environment may begin before the submittal of a permit application if:

(1) The owner notifies <u>must notify</u> the commissioner when the construction activity begins; and

(2) the owner and operator comply with the construction activity requirements, and the requirements of Appendix A in the construction storm water permit as incorporated by reference in part 7090.0060.

C. A permit application must be submitted to the commissioner within seven days of the emergency construction start date.

7090.2020 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITY CONDITIONAL EXCLUSION.

Subpart 1. Scope. Owners and operators responsible for the construction activities that meet the requirements in subparts 2 and 3 are conditionally excluded from the requirement to submit a permit application and have the option to either apply for a construction storm water permit or meet the requirements of part 7090.2030. An owner or operator conducting construction activity pursuant to this conditional exclusion that fails to comply with part 7090.2030 must submit a permit application.

Subp. 2: <u>3</u>. Feedlots. Construction activities are eligible under subpart 1 for the purposes of building a new or expanded animal feedlot; or manure storage area, or animal holding facility or performing related maintenance. The owner or operator must: apply for and obtain the appropriate permit under part 7020.0405, other than an NPDES permit, and if no permit is required under part 7020.0405, the owner or operator must complete the preconstruction notification submittal requirements under part 7020.2000, subpart 5.

A. apply for and obtain an SDS permit as required under part 7020.0405, subpart 1, item B;

B. apply for and obtain an interim permit as required under part 7020.0405, subpart 1, item C;

C. apply for and obtain a construction shortform permit as required under part 7020.0405, subpart 1, item D; or

D. fulfill the preconstruction notification requirements under part 7020.2000, subpart 5.

Owners and operators of feedlot construction activities that are not subject to the permit requirements under part 7020.0405, subpart 1, or the notification requirements under part 7020.2000, subpart 5, must comply with the requirements of part 7090.2030 or apply for a construction storm water permit.

Subp. 3. Conservation practice projects. Construction activities are eligible under subpart 1 if they disturb one to less than five acres of soil for purposes of a conservation practice project including a grassed waterway, terrace or diversion, water and sediment control basin, or other conservation practice that reduces erosion and controls sediment runoff. The owner or operator must:

A. participate in a state or federal conservation program that includes financial assistance; and

B. utilize the design standards, construction and materials specifications, and associated construction inspection requirements maintained by the United States Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service, and Board of Water and Soil Resources for conservation programs, or other design standards and specifications approved by these programs.

7090.2030 BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMPS) REQUIRED FOR CONDITIONAL EXCLUSION PROJECTS.

Subpart 1. Scope. Owners and operators responsible for construction activities that meet the requirements for a conditional exclusion under part 7090.2020 must include the BMPs in subparts 2 to 6.

Subp. 2. Minimize size of disturbed area. When permanent vegetation must be disturbed, the area of disturbance must be limited to the minimum required for the project.

Subp. 3. Sediment control. Where disturbed areas have steep slopes or concentrated flow, buffers or other sediment control BMPs, such as silt fences or staked hay bales, must be used to minimize sediment from entering surface waters and subsurface drainage systems, including tile inlets. Sediment control BMPs must be established on down gradient perimeters before any upgradient construction activities begin, except for conservation practice projects such as grassed waterways and terraces that are constructed in five days or less, and in an area where soil disturbance has occurred before construction. These BMPs must remain in place until other temporary or final stabilization practices have been established.

Subp. 4. Soil stockpiles. Topsoil or other temporary stockpiles of soil must be placed in locations where they will not be subject to erosion from channelized flow. If stockpiles are placed within 300 feet upslope of a surface water or tile inlet for more than three days, or when precipitation and runoff are imminent, a grass buffer or other equivalent sediment control BMPs, such as silt fences or staked hay bales, must be used between the soil stockpile and surface water or tile inlet.

Subp. 5. Temporary stabilization.

A. Where disturbed areas are not otherwise protected by permanent crossion control materials, disturbed areas must be seeded and temporarily stabilized until the seed establishes a permanent vegetative cover. Mulch or crossion control blanket must be applied to disturbed areas with steeper than 3:1 slopes within seven days after final grading, except for conservation practice projects such as terraces with slope lengths less than 15 feet in area where soil disturbance has occurred before construction. Other temporary stabilization BMPs

must be installed within the following time frames after final grading for the indicated slopes:

(1) slopes of 10:1 to 3:1, 14 days; and

(2) slopes flatter than 10:1, 21 days.

B. For construction activities conditionally excluded under part 7090.2020, temporary stabilization may include any of the following BMPs that are effective for the site conditions:

(1) compaction of the soil surface of concentrated flow areas to reduce soil erodibility;

(2) grading along the contour and use surface roughing techniques such as slope tracking with tracked equipment;

(3) application of mulch or erosion control blanket; and

(4) installation of check dams such as fiber rolls; sand or gravelfilled berms, including filled bags for removal; or geotextile erosion barriers across concentrated flow areas such as waterways.

Subp. 6. Final stabilization. Disturbed areas, not including cropland, must be protected by permanent erosion control materials or other BMPs that achieve the equivalent of 70 percent uniform vegetative cover. If construction is completed after the fall seeding cutoff date, dormant seeding must be applied or any of the temporary stabilization BMPs listed in subpart 5 that are effective and appropriate for the site conditions must be implemented, and seeding and final stabilization must be implemented as soon as feasible the following spring:

Errata to Adopted Permanent Rules Relating to Universal Waste Rules

The rules published in the July 18, 2005 *State Register* (30 SR 43) contained an error regarding the number of lamps that may be accumulated without obtaining financial assurance. The first sentence of *Minnesota Rules*, part 7045.1400, subp. 3, item A is corrected to read "Except as excluded in item B, universal waste handlers who accumulate more than 1,000 lamps shall, in addition to complying with all requirements of this part, establish financial assurance in an amount that the commissioner determines is adequate to cover the cost of hiring a third party to properly dispose of all of the lamps and close the accumulation site."

Public Hearing on the Blue Lake Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements Project Facility Plan

Shakopee City Hall (Council Chambers) 129 Holmes St. S., Shakopee, Minnesota Thursday, September 15, 2005 7:00 p.m.

The Metropolitan Council will hold a public hearing on the Blue Lake Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements Project Facility Plan. The Draft Facility Plan for this project, prepared by the Metropolitan Council's Environmental Services Division (MCES), outlines recommendations for:

- Process expansion and improvements to accommodate growth in the service area through 2030.
- Process modifications to assure compliance with an NPDES permit requirement effective October 1, 2008, to remove total phosphorus from the wastewater to an annual average of 1 mg/l.
- Replacement of the current gaseous disinfection system with a liquid hypochlorite/bisulfite system to reduce safety and security risks.

Official Notices

- · Replacement and rehabilitation of process equipment and support systems that are reaching the end of their useful lives.
- · Expansion and improvement to solids processing systems to accommodate increased wastewater solids production.

Construction is expected to begin in late 2007. Phosphorus removal modifications will be completed by late 2008. Remaining liquid treatments will be completed in 2010. Solids processing facilities construction is expected to begin in 2009, with completion in 2012. The Blue Lake Wastewater Treatment Plant, located in Shakopee, serves approximately 236,000 people in the west- and southwest-metro suburbs.

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) hereby announces that it will accept proposals for project implementation and non-implementation grants through the Federal Clean Water Act Section 319 Nonpoint Source Grant Program (Section 319). Typically, State Clean Water Partnership (CWP) Program grant funds are available. However, again this year the grant funds were used to fund continuation projects. CWP loans will be available this funding round.

In 1987, the Minnesota Legislature established the CWP Program (*Minnesota Statutes* §§ 103F.701 through 103F.761) to protect and improve surface and ground water in Minnesota through financial and technical assistance to local units of government. Section 319 provides federal grant money for nonpoint pollution abatement and water resource restoration.

Notes for Current Proposal Process:

- Funding for diagnostic studies is not available this round.
- The proposal has been streamlined by MPCA staff, along with other federal and state agencies, to simplify both the proposal and the review process.
- There are separate proposal forms for Implementation projects and Non-implementation projects this year.
- A portion of Section 319 funds available this funding round will be dedicated to projects implementing Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDLs) allocations that have been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
- Priority will be given to projects that pertain to restoring impaired waters on the impaired waters list at the MPCA Web site at: *http://www.pca.state.mn.us/water/tmdl/index.html*.
- For a feedlot project to be eligible for Section 319 funds, a county that has more than 200 feedlots required to be registered must have delegated authority to manage their feedlot program. See MPCA Web site at:

http://www.pca.state.mn.us/hot/feedlot-countyprogram.html

- The Section 319 grants do not fund projects whose purpose is primarily water quality monitoring or assessment. However, water quality effectiveness monitoring that is part of an implementation project is allowed and encouraged.
- This year Section 319 funds will not be used to provide added incentive to practices that are receiving an incentive payment from another government program or source. If a practice is receiving cost-share or incentive funds from another governmental grant program, that practice will not be eligible to receive Section 319 funds solely to increase the level of cost-share or incentive payments. However, Section 319 funds can be used to extend practices that benefit water quality. For example, if another government program is providing incentive to put in a 30 foot buffer, and the effectiveness of the buffer would be significantly improved with a 50 foot buffer, Section 319 funds can pay for the additional 20 foot portion of the buffer only, but not for the original 30 foot buffer.
- Proposals must be sent in electronic and paper form.

Types of Projects

Project funding will be awarded for two types of projects this round:

1. Non-Implementation proposals that evaluate the effects of hydrologic modification on pollutant transport. First, projects could assess the impacts of recent modifications on the local flow system and the associated pollutant load. Second, projects could demonstrate techniques to stabilize flow regimes in various landscape settings in order to protect or restore water quality. Specifically, we are looking for proposals that assess how natural differences in landscapes as well as hydrologic modifications influence the hydrographic record, including storm event peak height, peak duration and frequency of runoff events. The differences in hydrology and water quality between

natural and enhanced systems should be evaluated so that effective management practices can be identified, transferred and promoted in other areas.

2. Implementation proposals that identified activities in an approved CWP Phase I or equivalent implementation plan, Watershed Restoration Action Strategy (WRAS) final report (*http://www.epa.gov/owow/nps/npsguid3.html#VIIc*) or projects implementing approved TMDLs (*http://www.pca.state.mn.us/publications/reports/tmdl-list-2004.pdf*).

Criteria for Project Selection

Minnesota Rules 7076.0100 through 7076.0290 and EPA Section 319 Program guidance provide the criteria and procedural condition under which the MPCA may award assistance. In addition, there will be three criteria that will be emphasized to evaluate projects:

1. The first criterion is whether a sponsor of a project is self-sustaining or has plans in place to become self-sustaining within three (3) years.

2. The second criterion is whether the watershed project addresses impairments that are listed on the 2004 list for the pollutants of concern.

3a. For implementation projects: The evaluation teams will consider whether applicant projects have completed a comprehensive assessment and planning process in the watershed or around the water body of concern. Such assessments must consist of an approved CWP Phase I or equivalent implementation plan, a TMDL study, or a WRAS.

3b. For non-implementation projects: In order to advance water quality work in Minnesota, we need to understand the source, transport and fate of pollutants in the various landscapes of the state. Of particular interest is how landscape alterations and management influences hydrology and pollutant transport. We are soliciting proposals that demonstrate the ecological and economic implications of managing to stabilize flow, duration, and timing of runoff and how doing so can help protect water quality and ecological health.

Eligible Proposers

Proposals will be accepted from public and private entities, including local units of government, tribal authorities, cities, counties, regional development centers, local school systems, colleges and universities, local nonprofit organizations, state agencies, federal agencies, watershed groups, and for-profit groups interested in leading a nonpoint source pollution control project. Individuals may also submit proposals, but funding is limited to non-implementation projects. Ineligible Section 319 costs include activities addressing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit requirements such as feedlot or stormwater permits, any type of point source related activities, and activities addressing enforcement actions. Any non-permitted feedlots addressed with Section 319 money must have a Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plan.

Request Limits

This year there will be a per-project grant cap of three-hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00). There will be no cap on loan requests this year for qualifying projects.
