It also contains executive orders of the governor; commissioners' orders; state contracts and advertised bids; professional, technical and consulting contracts; non-state public contracts; state grants; decisions of the supreme and tax courts; a monthly calendar of scheduled cases before the supreme court; and other announcements. The Thursday edition contains additional state contracts and advertised bids, and the most complete listing of contract awards available in one source.

In accordance with expressed legislative intent that the STATE REGISTER be self-supporting, the following subscription rates have been established: the Monday edition costs \$130.00 per year and includes an index issue published in August (single issues are available at the address listed above for \$3.50 per copy); the combined Monday and Thursday editions cost \$195.00 (subscriptions are not available for just the Contracts Supplement); trial subscriptions are available for \$60.00, include both the Monday and Thursday edition, last for 13 weeks, and may be converted to a full subscription anytime by making up the price difference. NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The State Register is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the State Register. Published every Monday, the State Register makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific Minnesota Rule chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the Minnesota Rules are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the State Register.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. The agency must, however, publish a notice of intent to adopt emergency rules, along with the rules themselves, in the *State Register*. The notice must advise the public:

- 1) that a free copy of the proposed emergency rule is available upon request from the agency;
- 2) that notice of the date that the rule is submitted to the attorney general will be mailed to persons requesting notification;
- 3) that the public has at least 25 days after publication of the proposed emergency rule to submit data and views in writing; and
- 4) that the emergency rule may be modified if the data and views submitted support such modification.

Adopted Emergency Rules

Emergency rules take effect five working days after approval by the attorney general, and after compliance with Minn. Stat. §§14.29-14.365. As soon as possible, emergency rules are published in the *State Register* in the manner provided for in section 14.18.

Emergency rules are effective for the period stated in the notice of intent to adopt emergency rules. This may not exceed 180 days.

Continued/Extended Emergency Rules

Adopted emergency rules may be continued in effect (extended) for an additional 180 days. To do this, the agency must give notice by: 1) publishing notice in the *State Register*: and 2) mailing the same notice to all persons who requested notification on rulemaking. No emergency rule may remain in effect 361 days after its original effective date. At that point, permanent rules adopted according to Minn. Stat. 14.14-14.28 supercede emergency rules.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to recipients and providers of Minnesota Medical Assistance (MA) and to the public of certain changes affecting the MA Program that were enacted during the 1990 legislative session. This notice is published pursuant to federal regulations which govern the administration of the MA Program, *Code of Federal Regulations*, Title 42, section 447.205. The purpose of this notice is to inform the public of changes made in the MA Program due to changes in the state law. The legislative changes are expected to result in an estimated decrease in MA expenditures of \$1,333,000 for fiscal year 1991.

I. Insurance Benefits.

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 518.171 is amended to prevent a child support obligor from satisfying a child support order by applying for MA or GAMC.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, §§ 518.171 and 13.46 are amended to require health and dental insurers to enroll a dependent of a child support obligor if the obligor fails to cooperate with the enrollment process.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, Chapter 256 is amended to add a section requiring the Commissioner to establish a program to pay private health plan premiums for persons who have contracted human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), to enable these persons to continue coverage under a group or individual health plan.

II. MA Eligibility.

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, §§ 256B.055 and 256B.057 are amended to allow a licensed, registered nurse to verify pregnancy for purposes of MA eligibility.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.056 is amended to add a subdivision requiring that, for persons over age 65, and blind and disabled persons, the income and asset methodologies of the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program must be used in determining eligibility. For families and children, the income and asset methodologies of the AFDC program must be used.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.056, subd. 2 is amended to allow, for a recipient residing in a long term care facility, an exclusion for the value of the homestead from total assets if: (1) a sibling who has an equity interest in the home resides in the home and lived there for one year before the recipient entered the long term care facility; and (2) a child of any age lives in the home, if the child lived in the home two years before the recipient entered the long term care facility, and the child provided care to the recipient that enabled the recipient to remain at home.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256.057, subd. 2 is amended to provide that a child of at least one but less than six years of age whose family income is less than 133 percent of the federal poverty guidelines for the same family size is eligible for medical assistance.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.057 is amended to add a subdivision to provide MA coverage of Medicare part A premiums for "qualified working disabled adults." A qualified working disabled adult is a person who is eligible for medicare Part A benefits under section 1818A of the Social Security Act, whose income is at or less than 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines, and whose nonexempt assets do not exceed two times the SSI maximum, and who is not otherwise eligible for MA.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.057 is amended by adding a subdivision to provide MA eligibility for "disabled adult children." A disabled adult child is a person who is over age 18, who became disabled before age 22, who lost SSI benefits due to eligibility for child's insurance benefits under section 202 (d) of the Social Security Act, or an increase in those benefits, on or after July 1, 1987.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0575 is amended to provide an additional income deduction for an institutionalized person. This deduction applies if the institutionalized person has a child under age 18 who lived with the institutionalized person prior to admission, and who does not live with the institutionalized person's spouse. The deduction equals the MA income standard for the family size including only the children, minus the income of the child or children.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.059, subd. 4 is amended to revise the asset allowance for a community spouse. If a community spouse is eligible to retain assets in addition to the asset allowance in order to produce additional income, the assets that produce the most income must be counted first.

- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.059, subd. 5 is amended to provide that an institutionalized spouse may be found eligible for MA even if the value of his or her assets exceeds the allowance amount, under certain circumstances. The institutionalized spouse must assign to the Commissioner his or her rights to support from the community spouse, unless he or she is unable to do so due to a physical or mental impairment. Also, the institutionalized spouse may be eligible without an assignment if the denial of eligibility would cause an imminent threat to his or her health and well-being.
- Effective May 4, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0595, subd. 1 is amended to prohibit a community spouse of an institutionalized person from transferring assets for less than fair market value within 30 months prior to and any time after the date of institutionalization if the institutionalized spouse receives MA, or the date of first approved application, if the institutionalized spouse does not yet receive MA.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0595, subd. 2 is amended to create a cause of action against the person who receives assets of an MA recipient for less than fair market value, and the transfer was not reported at the proper time. The action is for the lesser of the cost of long term care services paid during what would have been the period of ineligibility, or the uncompensated amount of the transfer.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.17, subds. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8 are revived, for transfers of assets for less than fair market value that occurred before July 1, 1988.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, \$ 256B.17, subd. 7 is revived for those persons who were institutionalized before October 1, 1989.
- Effective July 1, 1990, MA has a claim against the estate of a person who received MA while residing in a long term care facility for six months or longer, regardless of his or her age at the time of receipt. The claim is for the total amount paid by the MA program.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 252.27 is amended to require that parents of children on MA whose income is not counted in the eligibility determination must make a contribution towards the cost of the child's care. The contribution will be between 10 and 15 percent of family income that exceeds 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines for the family size.

III. MA Covered Services

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0625, subd. 4 is amended to eliminate the requirement that a physician remain on the premises of a physician-directed clinic whenever the clinic is open.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.0625 is amended by adding a subdivision to provide that MA covers occupational therapy and related services.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0625, subd. 9 is amended to expand dental coverage to include fixed cast metal restorations that are cost-effective for persons who cannot use removable dentures because of their medical conditions. Prior authorization is required.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.0625, subd. 13 is amended to eliminate unit dose packaging of over-the-counter drugs.
- Effective July 1, 1990, § 256B.0625 is amended to add a subdivision which allows coverage of certain services performed by a certified pediatric nurse practitioner or a certified family nurse practitioner.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.0625 is amended to add a subdivision to provide coverage for services of a certified public health nurse practicing in a public health nursing clinic.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.0625 is amended to add a subdivision to provide coverage for services of rural health clinics, federally qualified health centers, and nonprofit community health clinics. Payments for rural health clinics and federally qualified health centers will be made according to applicable federal law and regulation.
 - Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 252.478 is added to establish metro transportation support grants.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.04, subd. 16 is amended to allow the Commissioner to waive the requirement that personal care services must be provided through an agency when there are less than two agencies serving that county.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.0627 is added to establish three home care service levels and to require prior approval for home care provided in foster care settings. Level One services are those costing less than \$800 per month or any amount for services of 30 days or less. Level Two services are those authorized by a health care cost assessment which will cost more than \$800 per month, but less than the cost of comparable average institutional care. Level Three services are those which cost more than the average as authorized by a home care cost assessment, but not more than the appropriate institutional care. All Level Three services must be reviewed by DHS. Home care recipients will be grandfathered in at the December 1987 level. Recipients of Level Two and Three services will be assigned a case manager. The commissioner is authorized to recover payments that exceed the limitations established for that particular level of care.

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.091, subd. 6 is amended to deny MA reimbursement for nursing homes for any recipient who the team has determined does not meet the level of care criteria for nursing home placement.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Chapter 256B is amended to add a section governing requests for contested cases by vendors of medical care. The section sets forth the time for filing requests and the information required in the request.
- Effective July 1, 1990, the Commissioner must adopt or amend rules to allow a mental health practitioner with a bachelor's degree to provide mental health services when employed by a private, nonprofit agency specializing in mental health to low income children under age 15. - Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.431, subd. 3e is amended to include nonprofit hospital-attached convalescent and nursing care facilities among those eligible for a three year extension of the statutes as hospital-attached, if the hospital closes.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.431, subd. 3h is amended by adding a provision for recognition of debt of a nursing home that was under lease prior to 1984 and was subsequently sold.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.431, subd. 3i is amended by adding a provision concerning nursing home property rates and how the Department determines these rates. Nursing homes whose property payment rates were determined under the provisions of *Minnesota Rules*, part 9549.0060, subp. 13, item A (full rental) for the rate year beginning July 1, 1989 will continue to have their property related rate calculated according to those provisions.

Nursing homes whose property payment rates were determined under the provisions of *Minnesota Rules*, part 9549.0060, subp. 13, item B (phase down) shall receive a rate equal to the greater of 87 percent of their property rate in effect July 1, 1989; or the rental per diem determined under the provisions of *Minnesota Rules*, part 9549.0010 to 9549.0080 or the sum of 100 percent of the nursing home's allowable principle and interest expense, plus its equipment allowance multiplied by the resident days for the reporting year ending September 30, 1989, divided by the nursing home's capacity days as determined under *Minnesota Rules*, part 9549.0060, subp. 11, as modified by subd. 3f, paragraph c.

Nursing homes whose property payment rates were determined under the provisions of *Minnesota Rules*, part 9549.0060, subp. 13, items C or D (phase up) for the rate year beginning July 1, 1989, will receive a property related payment equal to the lesser of 116 percent of their July 1, 1989, property payment rate or their rental per diem rate in effect on July 1, 1990.

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.431, subd. 3j is added to include a property rate adjustment for required improvements under the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987 for certified, freestanding boarding care homes for hand rails and nurse call lights.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.431, subd. 7 is amended to modify the professional nursing compensated hours for nursing homes under 61 beds to meet requirements of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.431, subd. 11, is amended to add a provision concerning special property rate setting procedures for nursing homes leased prior to January 1, 1986 and currently subject to adverse licensure action. If the ownership of these facilities changes prior to July 1, 1990, these homes will receive a property payment rate equal to the lesser of their current lease obligations divided by capacity days or their frozen property rate in effect on July 1, 1989. For rate years on or after July 1, 1991, the property rate for these homes will be the rental rate computed using the previous owner's allowable debt prior to the sale and lease back transaction that occurred in December, 1985.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.48, subd. 1c is amended to provide special case mix rate setting procedures for nursing home providers with certain addenda to their provider agreements, and phasing-out of the MA program. A provider with an addendum to its provider agreement effective either July 1, 1983 or September 25, 1985 will be reimbursed under this subdivision. For rate years beginning on or after July 1, 1991, rates will be determined by multiplying the July 1, 1990 rate by the 12-month inflation factor between the midpoints of the two rate years using the factor that is applied to other nursing homes.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.48, subd. 2 is amended to modify what a facility's audited financial statement and supplemental data should include.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.49 is amended by adding a subdivision on continued services for waiver clients over age 65.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.495, subd. I is amended to allow payment of receivership fees to managing agents.

Official Notices

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.50, subd. 1 is amended to permit the appeal of a nursing home's maximum therapy rent computation under the expedited appeals process.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.50, subd. 1b is amended to change what is required in appeal information which must be submitted with a provider appeal.
- Effective July 1, 1990, for rate years beginning on or after October 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.501, subd. 3c is amended to change the ICF/MR inflation factor for allowable operating costs in the program, maintenance, and administrative categories by using Data Resources, Inc. forecast for changes in the consumer price index—all items (U.S. city average). The indices as forecasted by Data Resources, Inc. are applied in the first quarter of the calendar year in which the rate year begins.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*. § 252.46, subd. 4 is amended for day training and habilitation service rates established after January, 1990 for services provided when at least 50 percent of the persons served by the new vendor are persons discharged from a regional treatment center. The recommended payment rates shall not exceed twice the current statewide average payment rates.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 252.46, subd. 12 is amended to delay the rate increase for day training and habilitation rates established January 1, 1991.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.091, subd. 4 is amended to allow for new preadmission screening rates, other states doing the screening and cites consequences of timelines not being met.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 256B.091, subd. 8 is amended to include new alternative care grant (ACG) allocation formulas and funding levels, and allows medical assistance expenditures for ACG waiver clients to be paid out of the regular MA account.
- Until June 30, 1993, the Commissioner shall provide an annual inflation adjustment of not more than four percent for payment rates for private duty nursing services, personal care services, home and community-based waivered services, and alternative care grant services for persons classified as 180-day eligible.

- C. Other MA Payment Rates:
- Effective July 1, 1990, payments for obstetrical and pediatric services are increased by 15 percent in addition to the 10 percent increase for obstetrical services in October, 1988. The 15 percent increase applies to the provider categories under § 6402 (b) of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989.
- \$14,000 was appropriated to the Commissioner for reimbursement of the State share of MA allowable payments to pharmacies providing services to nursing homes from May to December of 1987, for claims rejected under *Minnesota Rules*, part 9505.0450. The pharmacy must demonstrate that the DHS computer system failed to recognize a claim for electronic billing because a computer file indicator designated the claim as a manual bill.
- For services rendered on or after July 1, 1990, MA payments for ambulance services are increased by 7.5 percent from the lower of (1) the submitted charges; or (2) the 50th percentile of the prevailing charge for 1982.
- For individual and group psychotherapy services rendered on or after July 1, 1990, payment rates are reduced by six percent. For mental health services provided by masters-prepared social workers and registered nurses on or after October 1, 1990, MA payments will be 65 percent of the rate paid to other mental health professionals.
 - The Commissioner has the authority to estimate the 50th percentile of the prevailing charge for 1982 in the following situations:
 - -there were less than ten billings in 1982;
 - -the service was not available in 1982;
 - -the payment amount is the result of a provider appeal;
 - -the procedure code has changed since 1982; or
- -the 50th percentile reflects a payment which is grossly inequitable when compared with payment rates for procedures or services which are substantially similar.
 - Effective July 1, 1990, the maximum pharmacy dispensing fee is reduced to \$4.10.
- Upon federal approval, payments to Indian Health Service facilities for outpatient medical services billed after June 30, 1990, must be in accordance with the rate published by the U.S. Assistant Secretary for Health under the authority of *United States Code*, title 42, sections 248(a) and 249(b). GAMC services to these facilities will be according to the GAMC rate for the same service provided in facilities other than those of the Indian Health Service.
- The Commissioner is directed to examine methods to increase MA reimbursement to medical doctors and doctors of osteopathy and present recommendations to the Legislature by January 15, 1991.

V. Managed Care.

- Effective July 1, 1990, the Commissioner may contract with public or private entities for health care services for MA recipients identified as inappropriately using health care services. The Commissioner may select providers to provide case management services.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 256B.69 is amended to eliminate the geographic limitations on prepaid MA projects, and to delete the automatic repealer for the administrative rule governing the MA prepaid program.

VI. Miscellaneous

- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 245A.12 is amended to revise and add changes to the voluntary receivership requirements for residential programs. The revisions and additions include: additional definitions; management agreements; rate adjustment; controlling individuals and restrictions on licensure; liability; liability for financial obligations; physical plant of the residential programs; receivership accounting; and receivership costs.
- Effective July 1, 1990, Minnesota Statutes, § 245A.13 is amended to revise and add changes to the involuntary receivership requirements for residential ICF/MR programs. The revisions and additions include: the application process; appointment of a receiver; the power and duties of the receiver; fees; termination of an involuntary receivership; emergency procedures; rate recommendations; adjustment to the rates receivership accounting; liability; occupation of the physical plant under an involuntary receivership; receivership accounting; and receivership costs.
- Effective July 1, 1990, *Minnesota Statutes*, § 144A.073 is amended to allow a construction project that was approved under the moratorium exception approval process may be commenced more than 12 months after the Commissioner's approval but not later than July 1, 1992.

Notice of Change in the Sliding Fee Scale for the Consolidated Chemical Dependency Treatment Fund (CCDTF)

Minnesota Statutes, section 254B.04, subdivision 2(a), requires the Commissioner of Human Services to adopt a sliding fee scale for the CCDTF. Minnesota Rules, part 9530.7020, subpart 3 requires the department to adjust the sliding fee scale annually, and publish the adjustments in the State Register. The sliding fee scale listed below will be effective for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1990.

This fee schedule is based on the estimated Minnesota State Median Income of \$39,775 for a four-person household in fiscal year 1990. The Bureau of the Census developed the median income estimates for each state from three sources of data: the March 1988 Current Population Survey; the 1980 Census of Population; and 1987 per capita income estimates from the Bureau of Economic Analysis. These median income estimates were published in the *Federal Register*, Volume 54, No. 50/Thursday, March 16, 1989, page 11078.

Notice of Solicitation of Outside Information or Opinions Regarding Proposed Amendments to Rules Governing Parental Contributions Towards the Cost of Services Provided to Children Who are Determined Eligible for Medical Assistance Without Consideration of Parental Income and Assets

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the State Department of Human Services is seeking information or opinions from sources outside the agency in preparing to propose the amendment of the rule governing parental contributions for the cost of services provided to children who are determined eligible for Medical Assistance without consideration of parental income and assets. The proposed amendment will set forth criteria for obtaining a variance from parental contribution responsibility in cases where undue hardship is established. The amendment of the rule is authorized by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 256B.14, which permits the agency to promulgate rules to determine the ability of responsible relatives to contribute partial or complete repayment of Medical Assistance furnished to recipients for whom they are responsible. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 252.27 governs the responsibility of parents based upon the ability to pay for the cost of 24-hour care outside the home.

The State Department of Human Services requests information and opinions concerning the subject matter of the rule. Interested persons or groups may submit data or views on the subject matter of concern in writing or orally. Oral statements will be received during regular business hours over the telephone at 612/297-4997 and in person at the above address.

All statements of information and opinions shall be accepted until further notice is published in the *State Register* or the Notice of Hearing or Notice of Intent to Adopt Rules Without a Hearing is published in the *State Register*. Any written material received by the State Department of Human Services shall become part of the rulemaking record to be submitted to the attorney general or administrative law judge in the event that the rule is adopted.

Unemployment Insurance Quality Control Annual Report for Calendar Year 1989

Minnesota's Quality Control Program reported that 89.8% of the Unemployment Insurance Payments for 1989 were properly paid. This represents little change from 1988 when the rate was 90.4%. Of some significance is that employer responsibility for payment errors declined 9.1% in 1989 while claimant responsibility increased 5.4% as did agency responsibility by 2.1%. The decline in employer caused errors can be attributed to the change from request to quarterly wage record reporting. The conversion to new payment systems is the likely cause for the increase in agency errors, however, this should be temporary now that the new systems are completed and we expect these errors to decline as staff becomes fully knowledgeable in their use and capabilities.



Order C5-85-837: Promulgating Jury Management Rules

WHEREAS, by order dated November 14, 1986, the Supreme Court adopted the Minnesota Standards Relating to Jury Use and Management as advisory guidelines for management of jury systems within the State of Minnesota, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 1990 Minnesota Laws, Chapter 553, section 10, the Legislature recognized the inherent power of the Supreme Court to promulgate rules governing jury management by repealing statutes governing jury management, effective August 1, 1990, and authorizing the Supreme Court to promulgate rules governing jury management by July 31, 1990, and

WHEREAS, technological changes necessary to compile a jury source list from voter registration and drivers' license lists cannot be implemented until January 1, 1991,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:

- 1. The attached Jury Management Rules be, and the same hereby are, prescribed and promulgated for the effective and efficient management of jury systems within the State of Minnesota.
- 2. These Jury Management Rules shall be effective August 1, 1990, and shall supersede the Minnesota Standards Relating to Jury Use and Management.
- 3. Effective January 1, 1991, the Jury Management Rule 802(c) shall be amended to read as follows:
- (c) "Source list" means the voter registration and drivers' license lists for the jurisdiction served by the court, which may be supplemented with names from other sources as set out in the jury administration plan.
- 4. Effective January 1, 1991, Jury Management Rule 806(b) shall be amended to read as follows:
- (b) The voter registration and drivers' license list for the county must serve as the source list. The source list may be supplemented with names from other lists specified in the jury administration plan. Whoever has custody, possession, or control of the lists used in compiling the source list shall provide them to the jury commissioner, upon request and for a reasonable fee, at any reasonable time. All lists shall contain the name and address of each person on the list."

Jury Management Rules

RULE 801. GENERAL POLICY. Persons shall be selected randomly for jury service, from the broadest possible cross section of people in the area served by the court. All qualified persons have an obligation to serve as jurors when summoned, and all should be considered for jury service.

RULE 802. DEFINITIONS.

- (a) "Court" means a district court of this state, and includes, when the context requires, any judge of the court.
- (b) "Court administrator," "judicial district administrator," and "jury commissioner" include any deputy of the court designated to perform the functions listed in these rules.

Supreme Court Decisions, Opinions & Rules

- (c) "Source list" means the voter registration list for the jurisdiction served by the court, which may be supplemented with names from other sources as set out in the jury administration plan.
- (d) "Voter registration list" means the official record of persons registered to vote.
- (e) "Drivers' license list" means the record, maintained by the department of public safety, of persons over 18 years old licensed to drive a motor vehicle or issued a state identification card.
- (f) "Master list" means a list of names and addresses, or identifying numbers of prospective jurors, randomly selected from the source list
- (g) "Juror" means a person summoned and qualified for service who either is deferred to a specific future date, attends court for the purpose of serving on a jury, or is on call and available to report to court when requested.
- (h) "Random selection" means the selection of names in a manner totally immune to the purposeful or inadvertent introduction of subjective bias and such that no recognizable class of the population from which names are being selected can be purposely included or excluded.
- (i) "Petit jury" means a body of six persons, impaneled and sworn in any court to try and determine, by verdict, any question or issue of fact in civil or criminal action or proceeding, according to law and the evidence as given them in court. In a criminal action where the offense charged is a felony, a petit jury is a body of 12 persons, unless the defendant consents to a jury of six.

RULE 803. JURY COMMISSIONER.

- (a) A jury commissioner is established in each county to administer the jury system under the supervision and control of the chief judge of the judicial district. The jury commissioner shall be the judicial district administrator or designee. If another person is designated jury commissioner, the other person shall be responsible to the judicial district administrator in the performance of the jury commissioner's tasks.
- (b) The jury commissioner shall collect and analyze information regarding the performance of the jury system on a regular basis in order to evaluate:
- (1) the representativeness and inclusiveness of the jury source list;
- (2) the effectiveness of qualification and summoning procedures;
- (3) the responsiveness of individual citizens to jury duty summonses;
- (4) the efficient use of jurors; and
- (5) the cost effectiveness of the jury system.
- (c) The jury commissioner should seek to secure adequate and suitable facilities for juror use in each court facility in which jury trials are held.

RULE 804. JURY ADMINISTRATION PLAN.

- (a) Each jury commissioner shall develop and place into operation a written plan for the administration of the jury system. The plan shall be designed to further the policies of these rules.
- (b) Each plan must
- (1) describe the jury system;
- (2) give a detailed description of the random selection procedures to be used in all phases of juror selection, in accordance with Rule 805;
- (3) identify the lists of names, if any, which shall be used to supplement the source list, and describe the storage media by which the lists shall be maintained;
- (4) indicate if a master list is to be used, and set the minimum number of names which can be used;
- (5) list the conditions which will justify excusing a juror, as well as those which justify deferral;
- (6) describe the juror qualification questionnaire, which will be used to gather information to determine if a prospective juror is qualified;
- (7) contain policies and procedures for enforcing a summons and for monitoring failures to respond;
- (8) describe juror orientation and instruction for jurors upon initial contact prior to service; upon first appearance at the courthouse; upon reporting to a courtroom for voir dire; following empanelment; during the trial; prior to deliberations; and after the verdict has been rendered or when a proceeding is terminated without a verdict.

RULE 805. RANDOM SELECTION PROCEDURES.

- (a) Random selection procedures shall be used throughout the juror selection process. Any method may be used, manual or automated, that provides each eligible and available person with an equal probability of selection.
- (b) Random selection procedures shall be employed in
- (1) selecting persons to be summoned for jury service;
- (2) assigning prospective jurors to panels; and
- (3) calling prospective jurors for voir dire.
- (c) Departures from the principle of random selection are appropriate
- (1) to exclude persons ineligible for service in accordance with Rule 808;
- (2) to excuse or defer prospective jurors in accordance with Rule 810;
- (3) to remove prospective jurors for cause or if challenged peremptorily in accordance with applicable rules of procedure;
- (4) to equalize service among all prospective jurors in accordance with Rule 812.

RULE 806. JURY SOURCE LIST.

- (a) The jury commissioner for each county shall be responsible for compiling and maintaining copies of all lists to be used in the random selection of prospective jurors. These lists shall be compiled when the court finds it necessary. No names shall be placed on the source list, master list, grand jury list, or petit jury venire except as provided by the applicable jury administration plan, or these rules.
- (b) The voter registration list for the county must serve as the source list. The source list may be supplemented with names from other lists specified in the jury administration plan. Whoever has custody, possession, or control of the lists used in compiling the source list shall provide them to the jury commissioner, upon request and for a reasonable fee, at any reasonable time. All lists shall contain the name and address of each person on the list.
- (c) The source list must be used for the random selection of names or identifying numbers of prospective jurors to whom qualification questionnaires and summonses for service must be sent.
- (d) When the source list is so large that its use for selecting prospective jurors and mailing out summonses and questionnaires is unreasonably cumbersome, burdensome, and noneconomical, a second list may be created. This master list shall be randomly drawn from the source list.
- (e) The jury commissioner shall review the jury source list once every four years for its representativeness and inclusiveness of the adult population in the county and report the results to the chief judge of the judicial district.
- (f) If the chief judge, or designee, determines that improvement is needed in the representativeness or inclusiveness of the jury source list, appropriate corrective action shall be ordered.

RULE 807. JURY QUESTIONNAIRE AND SUMMONS. ONE-STEP PROCESS.

- (a) The jury commissioner shall mail to every prospective juror whose name has been drawn a juror qualification questionnaire and summons for service, along with instructions to fill out and return the questionnaire by mail within ten days of receipt.
- (b) The notice summoning a person to jury service and the questionnaire eliciting essential information regarding that person shall be:
- (1) combined in a single mailing;
- (2) phrased so as to be readily understood by an individual unfamiliar with the legal and jury systems; and
- (3) delivered by first class mail.
- (c) A summons shall clearly explain how and when the recipient must respond and the consequences of a failure to respond.
- (d) The questionnaire shall be phrased and organized so as to facilitate quick and accurate screening, and should request only that information essential for:
- (1) determining whether a person meets the criteria for eligibility;
- (2) determining whether there exists a mental or physical disability which would prevent the person from rendering satisfactory jury service:
- (3) providing basic background information including age, race, gender, occupation, educational level, address, marital status, prior jury service within the past four years, occupation of spouse, and the age(s) of any children; and

- (4) efficiently managing the jury system.
- (e) The jury commissioner shall make a list of the persons to whom the summons and questionnaire have been sent, but neither the names nor the list shall be disclosed except as provided in these rules.

RULE 808. QUALIFICATIONS FOR JURY SERVICE.

- (a) The jury commissioner shall determine on the basis of information provided on the juror qualification questionnaire, supplemented if necessary, whether the prospective juror is qualified for jury service. This determination shall be entered on the questionnaire or other record designated by the court.
- (b) To be qualified to serve as a juror, the prospective juror must be:
- (1) A citizen of the United States.
- (2) At least 18 years old.
- (3) A resident of the county.
- (4) Able to communicate in the English language.
- (5) Be physically and mentally capable of rendering satisfactory jury service. A person claiming disability may be required to submit a physician's certificate as to the disability, and the Judge may inquire of the certifying physician.
- (6) A person who has had their civil rights restored if they have been convicted of a felony.
- (7) A person who has not served as a state or federal grand or petit juror in the past four years.
- (c) A judge, serving in the judicial branch of government, is disqualified from jury service.

RULE 809. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. A citizen shall not be excluded from jury service in this state on account of race, color, creed, religion, sex, national origin, marital status, status with regard to public assistance disability, age, occupation, or economic status.

RULE 810. EXCUSES AND DEFERRALS.

- (a) All automatic excuses or disqualifications from jury service are eliminated except as provided in Rule 808.
- (b) Eligible persons who are summoned may be excused from jury service only if:
- (1) their ability to receive and evaluate information is so impaired that they are unable to perform their duties as jurors and they are excused for this reason by a jury commissioner or a judge;
- (2) they request to be excused because their service would be a continuing hardship to them or to members of the public and they are excused for this reason by the jury commissioner.
- (c) Upon request from a qualified prospective juror, the jury commissioner shall determine whether the prospective juror meets the conditions for deferral set out in the jury administration plan. The deferral shall be for a reasonable time, after which the prospective juror shall be available for jury service, in accordance with the court's direction. Deferral of jury service is encouraged as an alternative to excuse from service.
- (d) The reason for the excuse or deferral of any prospective juror must be entered in the jury commissioner's records.
- (e) A member, officer or employee of the legislature is excused from jury service while the legislature is in session.

RULE 811. TERM OF JURY SERVICE. The time that persons are called upon to perform jury service and be available for jury service is the shortest period consistent with the needs of justice.

- (a) In counties with a population of 100,000 or more, a term of service must not exceed two weeks or the completion of one trial, whichever is longer.
- (b) In counties with a population of less than 100,000 but more than 50,000, a term of service must not exceed two months. However, no person is required to continue to serve after the person has reported to the courthouse for ten days or after the completion of the trial on which the juror is sitting, whichever is longer.
- (c) In counties with a population of less then 50,001 but more than 15,000, a term of service must not exceed four months. However, no person is required to continue to serve after the person has reported to the courthouse for ten days or after the completion of the trial on which the juror is sitting, whichever is longer.
- (d) In counties with a population of 15,000 or less, a term of service shall not exceed six months. However, no person is required to continue to serve after the person has reported to the courthouse for selection for three days, or after the completion of the trial on which the juror is sitting, whichever is longer.
- (e) Chief judges and judicial district administrators shall review the frequency of juror use in each county in determining the shortest

period of jury service that will enable the greatest number of citizens to have the opportunity to report to the courthouse and participate in the jury system. All courts shall adopt the shortest period of jury service that is practical.

RULE 812. JUROR USE.

- (a) Courts shall employ the services of prospective jurors so as to achieve optimum use with minimum inconvenience to jurors.
- (b) Courts shall determine the minimally sufficient number of jurors needed to accommodate trial activity; this information and appropriate management techniques shall be used to adjust both the number of individuals summoned for jury duty and the number assigned to jury panels.
- (c) Courts may employ procedures to ensure that each prospective juror who has reported to the courthouse is assigned to a courtroom for your dire each day before any prospective juror is assigned a second time that day.

RULE 813. CHALLENGING COMPLIANCE WITH SELECTION PROCEDURE.

- (a) A party may move to stay the proceedings, quash the indictment, or for other appropriate relief, on the ground that these rules have not been complied with. Such motion should be made within seven days after the moving party discovers or should have discovered the grounds for the motion, and in any event before the petit jury is sworn to try the case.
- (b) If a motion filed under (a) contains a sworn statement of facts which, if true, constitute a substantial failure to comply with these rules, the moving party is entitled to present the testimony of the jury commissioner, any relevant records and papers even if not public or otherwise available, and any other relevant evidence in support of the motion. If the court determines that there has been a substantial failure to comply with these rules in the selection of either a grand jury or a petit jury, the court shall stay the proceedings while a jury is selected in conformity with these rules.
- (c) The procedures prescribed by this Rule are the exclusive means by which a party may challenge a jury on the grounds that the jury was not selected in conformity to these rules.

RULE 814. RECORDS.

- (a) The names of qualified prospective jurors drawn and the contents of juror qualification questionnaires completed by those prospective jurors must be made available to the public upon specific request to the court, supported by affidavit setting forth the reasons for the request, unless the court determines in any instance that in the interest of justice this information should be kept confidential or its use limited in whole or in part.
- (b) The contents of juror qualification questionnaires must be made available to attorneys upon request in advance of voir dire. The court may restrict access to addresses of the prospective jurors.
- (c) The jury commissioner shall make sure that all records and lists are preserved for the length of time ordered by the court. The contents of any records or lists not made public shall not be disclosed until one year has elapsed since preparation of the list and all persons selected to serve have been discharged, unless a motion is brought under Rule 813.

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §271.06, subd. 1, an appeal to the tax court may be taken from any official order of the Commissioner of Revenue regarding any tax, fee or assessment, or any matter concerning the tax laws listed in §271.01, subd. 5, by an interested or affected person, by any political subdivision of the state, by the Attorney General in behalf of the state, or by any resident taxpayer of the state in behalf of the state in case the Attorney General, upon request, shall refuse to appeal. Decisions of the tax court are printed in the *State Register*, except in the case of appeals dealing with property valuation, assessment, or taxation for property tax purposes.




