Requests for deadline extensions should be made only in valid emergency situations.

******Notices of public hearings on proposed rules and notices of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing are published in the Proposed Rules section and must be submitted two weeks prior to the issue date.

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NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific *Minnesota Rule* chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the *Minnesota Rules* are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. Adopted Rules

The adoption of a rule becomes effective after the requirements of Minn. Stat. \$14.14-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule.

If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed.

If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

An emergency rule becomes effective five working days after the approval of the Attorney General as specified in Minn. Stat. \$14.33 and upon the approval of the Revisor of Statutes as specified in \$14.36. Notice of approval by the Attorney General will be published as soon as practicable, and the adopted emergency rule will be published in the manner provided for adopted rules under \$14.18.

Executive Order 91-14: Providing for a State Affirmative Action Council

I, ARNE H. CARLSON, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the applicable statutes, do hereby issue this Executive Order:

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has been a leader in its commitment to equal employment opportunity throughout state government; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota is directed by federal law and by state law to formulate an affirmative action program to provide equal employment opportunity in state government; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has the responsibility to ensure that the workforce is reflective of the diversity of the state's population; and

WHEREAS, affirmative action will be monitored at the highest levels of state government;

NOW, THEREFORE, I order that:

1. There is hereby created an Affirmative Action Council to develop a long range plan and recommendations to implement the State's Affirmative Action Program and equal opportunity bidding procedures and to advise the Governor and the Legislature on equal opportunity.

- 2. The council shall be composed of the following:
 - a. Lieutenant Governor.
 - b. Commissioner of Human Rights-responsible for the enforcement of the state's Human Rights Act.
 - c. Commissioner of Employee Relations—responsible for maintaining an efficient and effective meritbased personnel management system.
 - d. Commissioner of Jobs and Training—responsible for providing employment information and applicant referral services to assist in meeting labor force needs.
 - e. Commissioner of Administration—responsible for bidding and managing all state contracts for purchase of supplies, equipment, services and construction projects.
- 3. The Lieutenant Governor shall serve as chairperson of the council.
- 4. The purpose of the council is to create a management team to analyze, make recommendations and monitor the state's affirmative action program and the state procurement program assuring equal access to protected groups under *Minnesota Statutes* 43A.19 and *Minnesota Statutes* 473.143.
- 5. Duties of the council:
 - a. The council shall develop a long range plan which will include action steps and goals in order to implement the state's Affirmative Action Program, to assure equal access to contracting opportunities, to identify issues needing attention by the state, and to make policy recommendations to the Governor and monitor the achievement of goals.
 - b. The council shall work in cooperation with the Spanish Speaking Affairs Council, the Council on Black Minnesotans, the Council on Asian-Pacific Minnesotans, the Indian Affairs Council, the State Council on Disability, and the Commission on the Economic Status of Women, and will be advised by members of the Statewide Affirmative Action Committee and others as deemed appropriate in order to develop an understanding of the diversity of the issues at hand.
 - c. The council shall conduct an identification of present affirmative action and procurement programs and will conduct an assessment of protected group participation in these programs.
 - d. The council shall prepare a report assessing the performance of state government and the operating agencies in the area of affirmative action and contracting. The report shall also include the identification of barriers to the full utilization of all protected groups with specific recommendations for changes in policy and procedures to assure better access.
 - e. Administrative Provisions: The Department of Employee Relations shall provide staff support as needed for the Council to fulfill its duties.

Pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes* 1990, Section 4.035, subd. 2, this Order shall be effective fifteen (15) days after publication in the *State Register* and filing with the Secretary of State and shall remain in effect until rescinded by proper authority or it expires in accordance with *Minnesota Statutes* 1990, Section 4.035, subd. 3.

Notice of Adoption of Voluntary Best Management Practices for the Herbicide Atrazine

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the State Department of Agriculture has adopted Voluntary Best Management Practices for the herbicide atrazine.

The adoption of Best Management Practices is authorized by *Minnesota Statutes* 18B.10 which requires that the Commissioner of Agriculture take action necessary to prevent contamination of ground water from pesticide use.

The Proposed Atrazine Best Management Practices were first published for comment in the Monday, February 11, 1991 (Volume 15, Number 33) issue of the Minnesota *State Register*.

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Voluntary Atrazine Best Management Practices

Herbicide Selection Recommendations

1. Use Integrated Pest Management techniques for pest control.

- a. Scout fields to identify weed species present.
- b. Assess population levels.
- c. Determine whether herbicide treatments are merited and if so, which herbicides are appropriate.
- d. Consider alternatives to atrazine use that may do the same job with less potential negative impact on water resources.
- e. Apply the least amount of herbicide necessary to control the weeds, and only where weed problems exist or are anticipated.

2. Maintain a field history which includes soil test results, crops, pest problems, pesticides used (brand names, active ingredients, rates), application dates, and results.

Mixing and Loading

1. Mix, load, or clean equipment containing atrazine a minimum of 150 feet from a sinkhole (outer edge of slope), streambed, lake, wetland, water impoundment, river or similar areas.

2. Mix, load and clean-out equipment on impervious surfaces. Atrazine mixing/loading and equipment clean-out should be carried out on an impervious surface such as a mixing and loading pad. Equipment and container wash waters should be applied evenly over labeled areas or used as part of dilution make-up water.

Application Rates

1. Sensitive Areas

Limit to one and one-half pounds or less atrazine active ingredient (or 1.6 pounds atrazine active ingredient plus related compounds) per acre per calendar year in sensitive areas. The application rate for atrazine of 1.5 lbs. active ingredient is equivalent to 1.6 qts. of 4L, 2.0 lbs. of 80W, or 1.8 lbs. of 90% WDG or DF formulations. Sensitive areas, until further defined by the Department of Natural Resources, include highly permeable geologic material such as:

a. fractured rock aquifers (including karst, sinkhole areas) or;

b. where sands, loamy sands, and/or sandy loams are the prevalent soil texture within a field (greater than 50% of the soil surface) and where the water table is less than thirty feet below the surface.

Counties in which these conditions are prevalent include: Anoka, Becker, Benton, Brown, Chisago, Dakota, Fillmore, Goodhue, Houston, Hubbard, Isanti, Morrison, Mower, Olmsted, Ottertail, Pope, Sherburne, Stearns, Todd, Wabasha, Wadena, Washington, Watowan, and Winona.

It should be noted that portions of every Minnesota county may include one, or all, of these conditions. For example, in addition to the counties listed above, sands, loamy sands, and/or sandy loams are prevalent in river valleys, especially in south western counties such as Rock and Pipestone. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service for further information on specific soil conditions on your farm.

2. Statewide

Limit to no more than 3 lbs. atrazine active ingredient per acre per calendar year. The maximum application rate for atrazine is equivalent to 3 qts. of 4L, 3³/₄ lbs. of 80W, or 3.3 lbs. of 90% WDG or DF formulations except in sensitive areas where rate restrictions apply.

Refrain from using atrazine for nonselective weed control on noncrop land.

Atrazine Use Recommendations

1. Only apply atrazine between spring thaw and until corn reaches 12 inches in height. Do not apply atrazine in the fall or winter.

2. Establish and maintain buffer areas. Buffer areas are grassy water ways or vegetation strips around sinkholes, drainage wells and other areas where distance limitations apply. Avoid atrazine drift into these buffer areas.

3. Follow proven irrigation management practices to minimize leaching. Do not over irrigate. Contact University of Minnesota Extension Service Irrigation Specialists for irrigation recommendations.

Container Management

1. Rinse containers *immediately*. Delay in rinsing atrazine containers results in a residue that, upon drying, is highly resistant to rinsing. Proper rinsing may be accomplished by pressure rinsing or triple rinsing *immediately* after emptying container. Use rinsate as dilution make-up water. Apply rinsate evenly over a labeled site.

2. Properly dispose of rinsed atrazine containers. Recycle or dispose of container as a solid waste. Contact Minnesota Department of Agriculture for further information on recycling and disposal.

Legal Requirement

Atrazine must not be applied through an irrigation system.

Assistance to Atrazine Users

Contact the Minnesota Department of Agriculture or the Minnesota Extension service for further information on Atrazine Best Management Practices.

Atrazine Best Management Practices are supplemental voluntary management practices. Users must also follow all legal requirements such as:

1. Read and follow label directions. Recent label changes have occurred on atrazine containing products. Be sure to read and follow all directions and precautions appearing on the label in your possession. Certain atrazine Best Management Practices recommendations are mandatory if listed on the label in the users possession.

2. Atrazine is a Restricted Use Pesticide. Purchasers and applicators must have proper Minnesota Department of Agriculture issued licensure or certification. All sales must be reported to Minnesota Department of Agriculture by the Restricted Use Pesticide dealer at the end of each year.

3. Do not mix near wells. Follow Minnesota Water Well Code which currently prohibits mixing, loading or cleaning of application equipment within 150 ft. of a well (including, but not limited to, a farm well, drinking water well, abandoned well, irrigation well or drainage well).

4. Properly calibrate equipment so that label rates are accurately delivered to the target site.

5. Avoid backsiphoning by utilization of a fixed airgap or other Minnesota Department of Agriculture/Minnesota Department of Health approved anti-backsiphoning device.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the State Department of Agriculture has adopted Voluntary Best Management Practices for nitrogen (N) fertilizers. The adoption of Best Management Practices is authorized by *Minnesota Statute* (1989) Chapter 326 (Article 1) which requires the Commissioner of Agriculture to take action necessary to prevent contamination of water resources from N fertilizer use.

The Proposed Nitrogen Fertilizer Best Management Practices were first published for comment in Volume 36 (March 4, 1991) issue of the Minnesota State Register.

Nitrogen Fertilizer Best Management Practices

Organizational Strategy

Best Management Practices (BMPs) are based upon a three-tier strategy. Each succeeding tier enhances or refines the previous tier. The three tiers are: (1) Statewide BMPs, (2) Regional BMPs, and (3) Special Situation BMPs.

(1) Statewide BMPs apply to all areas of the state. The succeeding tiers further refine statewide recommendations. The application of these BMPs result in specific practices that are uniquely tailored to a given situation.

(2) Regional BMPs account for some of the local variation in soils, hydrogeologic conditions, and climatic conditions. The state has been divided into five regions based upon general climatic conditions, soil characteristics, and the resulting sensitivity to ground-



water contamination. The counties listed do not denote the exact boundaries for each region, but are listed as a guide to N users where the prevalent conditions may apply. Regional BMPs refine the prescriptions of the statewide BMPs.

(3) Special Situation BMPs describe management criteria for the following conditions: (1) irrigated soils, (2) coarse textured, nonirrigated soils, (3) turf, and (4) areas near surface water. These areas pose additional environmental susceptibility problems and require additional management considerations.

Best Management Practices

A. Statewide Nitrogen BMPs

1. Develop realistic yield goals. The yield goal, specific for each field, should be based on the past five-year average and exclude the worst year. In situations where crop rotation practices limit recent yield information, yield goals should be based on farm specific information from the previous five years for the specific crop to be fertilized.

- 2. Develop and utilize a comprehensive record-keeping system to record field specific information.
- 3. Adjust N rates according to soil organic matter content, previous crop, and manure application.
- 4. Use a soil nitrate test when appropriate.
- 5. Use prudent manure management to optimize N credit:
 - (a) Test manure for nutrient content.
 - (b) Calibrate manure application equipment.
 - (c) Apply manure uniformly throughout a field and do not apply over the recommended rates.
 - (d) Injection of manure is preferable, especially on strongly sloping soils.
 - (e) Incorporate broadcast applications whenever possible.
 - (f) Avoid manure application to sloping, frozen soils.
- 6. Credit second year N contributions from alfalfa and manure.
- 7. Do not apply N fertilizer above recommended rates.
- 8. Nitrogen applications should be timed to achieve high nitrogen-use efficiency.

B. Regional BMPs

1. Southeastern Minnesota: Counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Fillmore, Houston, Olmsted, Wabasha, and Winona.

(a) Do not apply fertilizer N in the fall.

(b) Anhydrous ammonia or urea sources of N should be used in spring preplant applications. Broadcast urea should be incorporated within three days of application. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

- (c) Sidedress applications to corn should be applied prior to the V4 stage of development.
- (d) Sidedress applications of urea and UAN-28 should be injected or incorporated to a minimal depth of four inches.

(e) A nitrification inhibitor should be used with preplant N applications if soils are poorly drained and soil moisture levels are high in the upper portion of the profile. Check label for registered crops.

(f) Minimize direct movement of surface water runoff to sinkholes.

2. South Central Minnesota: Counties of Blue Earth, Brown, Carver, Dodge, Faribault, Freeborn, Le Sueur, Martin, McLeon, Meeker, Mower, Nicollet, Rice, Scott, Sibley, Steele, Waseca and Watonwan.

(a) Spring preplant applications of N are highly recommended over fall applications.

(b) If the N is fall applied, delay application until the soil temperature is below 50° F at a six inch depth. Anhydrous ammonia should be used for fall applications.

(c) Anhydrous ammonia or urea sources of N should be used in spring preplant applications. Broadcast urea should be incorporated within three days of application. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

(d) Sidedress applications to corn should be applied prior to the V4 stage of development.

(e) Sidedress applications of urea and UAN-28 should be injected or incorporated to a minimal depth of four inches.

(f) A nitrification inhibitor should be used with fall or preplant N applications in poorly drained soils that have high soil moisture levels in the upper portion of the profile.

(g) Carefully manage N applications on soils characterized by a high leaching potential.

Official Notices 2

(1) Do not apply fertilizer N in the fall to coarse textured soils.

(2) When soils have a high leaching potential, application of N in a sidedress or split application program is preferred. Use a nitrification inhibitor with early sidedressed N on labeled crops.

3. Southwest and West-Central Minnesota: Counties of Big Stone, Chippewa, Cottonwood, Douglas, Grant, Kandiyohi, Jackson, Lac Qui Parle, Lincoln, Lyon, Murray, Nobles, Pipestone, Pope, Redwood, Renville, Rock, Stevens, Swift, Traverse, and Yellow Medicine.

(a) Use a soil nitrate test with a two to four foot depth to determine N needs. Soil samples should be taken in the fall, after the soil temperature is below 50° F at the six inch depth, or in early spring.

(b) Anhydrous ammonia or urea are recommended in spring preplant applications. Broadcast urea and preplant applications of UAN-28 should be incorporated within three days of application. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

(c) In situations where fall N applications are used, delay application until the soil temperature is below 50° F at a six inch depth. Use anhydrous ammonia or urea sources of N; UAN-28 should not be fall applied.

(d) Sidedress N to corn should be applied prior to the V4 stage of development.

(e) Sidedress applications of urea and UAN-28 should be injected or incorporated to a minimal depth of 4 inches.

4. East-Central and Central Minnesota: Counties of Aitkin, Anoka, Becker, Beltrami, Benton, Carlton, Cass, Chisago, Cook, Crow Wing, Hennepin, Hubbard, Itasca, Kanabec, Koochiching, Isanti, Lake, Lake of the Woods, Mille Lacs, Morrison, Ottertail, Pine, Ramsey, St. Louis, Sherburne, Stearns, Todd, Wadena, Washington, and Wright.

(a) Carefully manage N applications on soils that have a high leaching potential.

(b) Anhydrous ammonia or urea sources of N should be used in spring preplant applications on fine and medium-textured soils. Broadcast urea should be incorporated within three days of application. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

(c) Sidedress applications of urea and UAN-28 should be injected or incorporated to a minimal depth of four inches.

5. Northwest Minnesota: Counties of Clearwater, Clay, Kittson, Mahnomen, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, Roseau, and Wilkin.

(a) Use a soil nitrate test to a two or four foot depth to determine N needs. Soil samples should be taken in the fall after the soil temperature is below 50° F at the six inch depth or early spring.

(b) Delay fall N application until the soil temperature is below 50° F at a six inch depth. Anhydrous ammonia or urea sources of N should be used for fall applications. UAN-28 should not be fall applied. Broadcast urea and spring preplant applications of UAN-28 should be incorporated within three days of application. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

(c) Nitrification inhibitors are not recommended on fine-textured soils but are recommended on coarse-textured soils with high leaching potential.

C. Special Situation BMPs

1. Irrigated Soils.

(a) Do not fall apply fertilizer N to soils in the following textural classes: sandy loams, loamy sands, and sands.

(b) Follow proven water management strategies to provide effective irrigation and minimize leaching.

(c) Test irrigation water for N content and adjust N fertilizer rates accordingly.

(d) Use sidedress or split applications of N on irrigated soils. Do not rely on fertigation for delivering more than one-third of the required N. (Fertilizer chemigation rules are being developed by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture at this time. Backflow prevention, well head safety and other techniques are recommended until rules are adopted.)

(e) Use a nitrification inhibitor when the bulk of the N is applied in a single preplant or early sidedress application. For corn, N treated with a nitrification inhibitor should be applied prior to the V4 growth stage. Check label for registered crops.

(f) Include a small amount of N in starter fertilizer in most situations (10-20 pounds/acre).

(g) Do not delay N applications past optimum uptake period.

(h) Establish a cover crop following early harvest of crops. Consult the Soil Conservation Service for further information if soils are highly erosive.

2. Coarse-Textured (non-irrigated soils) which include the following textural classes: sandy loams, loamy sands, and sands.

(a) Do not apply N fertilizer in the fall to coarse-textured soils.

- (b) Apply N in a sidedress or split application program.
- (c) Use a nitrification inhibitor with early sidedressed N.

3. Turf.

(a) Avoid off-target applications.

(b) Apply the majority of the N during late summer to mid-fall. Spring applications should be reduced or discontinued. Light applications of N may be applied in mid-summer to high traffic areas.

(c) Utilize a soil test to determine organic matter content which can be used to aid in determination of N needs; use the results of this test to adjust applications to the individual lawn.

(d) Leave grass clippings on mowed lawns and account for residue N content in determining N load rates for subsequent applications.

(e) Use slow release fertilizer formulations when possible.

- (f) Account for soil type in determining appropriate N application rate and frequency.
- (g) Select low-maintenance turf varieties which require less fertilizer and water.
- (h) Do not apply insurance N to turf. Apply only the amount of N necessary to maintain plant nutrition.

4. Areas near surface water bodies.

(a) Filter strips should be developed and maintained between open bodies of water and agricultural fields.

(b) Establish tillage and erosion control techniques, such as conservation tillage systems and terraces, where erosion contributes to surface water contamination.

(c) For lawns located adjacent to surface water bodies, construct a berm (roughly six inches high) between the lawn and water body. The berm may also be covered in grass or turf. In addition to berms, an unmanaged fringe of natural vegetation may be utilized as a filter strip.

(d) For all urban turf, avoid stray application of any fertilizer to sidewalks, streets or directly into water bodies that abut lawn areas.

Outside Opinion Sought Regarding the Proposed Permit Program for Stormwater Dischargers and Public Meeting to be Held

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (agency) is seeking information and opinions from the public on the program being proposed for issuing permits to industrial and municipal stormwater dischargers. Minnesota is required by regulations adopted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in November 1990 to develop this program. Stormwater regulations were designed to help improve the quality of the nation's surface waters by reducing pollution from storm drains.

NOTICE IS ALSO GIVEN that a public meeting will be held on May 31, 1991, to present the stormwater discharge permit program being proposed by the agency and the corresponding permit conditions, application process and tentative implementation schedule to interested parties. The meeting will be held from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the Boardrooms on the lower level at 520 Lafayette Road, St. Paul.

The program being proposed by the agency has been developed within the framework of the EPA regulations. These regulations require that National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits be issued to stormwater dischargers and specify which municipalities and industries must apply, application deadlines and general permit conditions.

The regulations identify stormwater as rain or snow runoff that comes into contact with an industrial facility or is contaminated by industrial raw material, products, or wastes; and surface runoff, such as water used for street cleaning. Stormwater pollution is typically released directly into rivers, streams, lakes, wetlands, and coastal waters. Industries and municipalities with 100,000 or more populations that contribute to these contaminated discharges are required to apply for a permit.

The agency will conduct a three phase process for acquiring public opinion on the permit program being proposed. First, a public meeting will be held on May 31. Second, written and oral comments about the information discussed at the meeting will be accepted until 4:30 p.m. on June 28, 1991. Third, a task force of affected parties will be developed to assist agency staff with the continued development of the stormwater permit conditions and application process. Comments will be taken continuously from task force members as long as the task force meets.

I. General Instructions

A. Background

Northern States Power, Electric Utility (NSP), is applying for a Certificate of Need to construct an Independent Spent Fuel Storage Installation (ISFSI). NSP's current spent fuel storage capacity at its Prairie Island Nuclear Power generating plant will be exhausted by 1994. A Certificate of Need must be issued by the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) before a utility can construct a nuclear waste storage or disposal facility. The Minnesota Department of Public Service (DPS or Department) is an intervenor representing the public interest in the Certificate of Need petition. The PUC will evaluate the need for the facility using criteria delineated by statute (see *Minnesota Rules*, Chapter 7855 attached). This criteria includes the relationship of the proposed facility to overall state energy needs; socially beneficial uses of the facility, including its ability to protect or enhance environmental quality: and, possible alternatives for satisfying the energy demand including, energy conservation improvements that can replace part or all of the energy produced by the generating plant and can compete with it economically. A contested case hearing will be conducted by the state's Office of Administrative Hearings to develop a complete evidentiary record on which the PUC will base its decision to grant or deny NSP's Certificate of Need petition.

B. Objectives

The purpose of this Request for Proposal is to secure a contractor with the expertise to determine the energy conservation potential within NSP's service territory, determine the cost and effectiveness of the specific conservation measures possible, and calculate the extent to which these conservation measures could replace part or all of the electricity generated by the Prairie Island plant. II. Statement of Work

A. Contractor's Duties

The Contractor shall complete the following tasks.

1. Develop research agenda; at a minimum, research should include analyses of the following as it effects conservation measures selected for consideration:

- a. Evaluate the following generic and NSP-specific data:

 - load shape data with load and diversity factors;

 - current NSP conservation program data, and DSM potentials studies prepared for NSP;

1991 Moose Hunt Applications Now Available: Information booklets and applications for the 1991 Minnesota moose hunt are now

available, according to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). A total of 365 licenses are available for 13 zones in northwestern Minnesota. As previously announced, moose hunting zones in northeastern Minnesota will be closed in 1991 because of a significant moose population decline thought to be related to the effects of high tick populations in that part of the state. Season dates for northwestern Minnesota are Oct. 12-20, except that Zone 2 (Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge) will be open from Nov. 30 to Dec. 8. As in previous seasons, applications for the \$275 license must be made in hunting parties of four. Those individuals who were issued moose hunting licenses for the 1981, 1983, 1985, 1987 or 1989 seasons may not apply for this year's hunt; however, hunters who took part in moose hunts prior to 1981 are eligible for the 1991 drawing. Only Minnesota residents who are 16 years of age or older prior to Oct. 12, 1991, are eligible for the computer drawing. Application forms and instructions are available from the DNR's License Bureau at 500 Lafayette Road in St. Paul and from DNR Wildlife Section field offices. A \$12 application fee must accompany each application of four hunters. A driver's license number, Minnesota Department of Public Safety identification number, or a 13-digit firearms safety certificate number (only on those certificates issued since Jan. 1, 1991) is required on moose hunt applications. By law, up to 20 percent of the permits will be allotted to owners or operators of agricultural or grazing lands in the northwest moose hunting zones. The deadline to apply for the drawing is Friday, June 14. Applicants should read the instructions carefully, said DNR spokesperson Dave Schad, because improperly completed applications will be disqualified without notice.
