

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Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions =

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The State Register is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the State Register. Published every Monday, the State Register makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific Minnesota Rule chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the Minnesota Rules are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the State Register.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the Official Notices section of the State Register. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as Proposed Rules, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the State Register. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the State Register as Adopted Rules. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the State Register, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the State Register, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services.

The State Register features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. 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Proposed Rules

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §14.22, an agency may propose to adopt, amend, suspend or repeal rules without first holding a public hearing, as long as the agency determines that the rules will be noncontroversial in nature. The agency must first publish a notice of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing, together with the proposed rules, in the State Register. The notice must advise the public:

- 1. that they have 30 days in which to submit comment on the proposed rules;
- 2. that no public hearing will be held unless 25 or more persons make a written request for a hearing within the 30-day comment period:
- 3. of the manner in which persons shall request a hearing on the proposed rules; and
- 4. that the rule may be modified if the modifications are supported by the data and views submitted

If, during the 30-day comment period, 25 or more persons submit to the agency a written request for a hearing of the proposed rules, the agency must proceed under the provisions of §§14.14-14.20, which state that if an agency decides to hold a public hearing, it must publish a notice of intent in the State Register.

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§14.29 and 14.30, agencies may propose emergency rules under certain circumstances. Proposed emergency rules are published in the *State Register* and, for at least 25 days thereafter, interested persons may submit data and views in writing to the proposing agency.

Department of Labor and Industry

Proposed Exempt Rules Relating to Federal Occupational Safety and Health Standards; Adoption by Reference

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Department of Labor and Industry, Occupational Safety and Health Division (Minnesota OSHA) proposes to adopt the following revisions to the Department of Labor and Industry, Occupational Safety and Health Rules, as authorized under *Minnesota Statutes* § 182.655 (1994). This notice proposes the adoption by reference of corrections and amendments to Occupational Safety and Health Standards that have already been proposed and adopted by the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (Federal OSHA).

All interested or affected persons have 30 days from the date this notice is published in the *State Register* to submit, in writing, data and views on the proposed amendments to the rule. Comments in support of or in opposition to the proposed amendments are encouraged. Each comment should identify the portion of the proposed amendment addressed, the reason for the comment, and any proposed change.

Any person may file with the Commissioner written objections to the proposed amendments stating the grounds for those objections and may request a public hearing. A public hearing will be held if 25 or more persons submit written requests for a public hearing on the proposed amendments within the 30-day comment period. Requests for hearing must include the name and address of the person submitting the request, define the reasons for the request, and discuss any proposed changes. If a public hearing is required, the Department will proceed according to the provisions of *Minnesota Statutes* § 182.655 and *Minnesota Rules* 5210.0010 to 5210.0100.

Summary of Changes

The following is a brief summary of the proposed amendments. Persons interested in reviewing the complete Federal Register notices referenced below may obtain copies from the above address.

(A) "Personal Protective Equipment for General Industry; Final Rule, Technical Amendment." On May 2, 1996, Federal OSHA published technical amendments to Subpart I, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). Following publication of the final rule on PPE for general industry on April 6, 1994, Federal OSHA's compliance staff encountered difficulties in using §§ 1910.133, 1910.135, and 1910.136 because they do not explicitly assign the employer the responsibility for assuring that employees wear the designated equipment. The introductory phrase "the employer shall ensure" was removed from various proposed requirements for employees to wear different types of protective equipment (final rule §§ 1910.133, 1910.135, and 1910.136). The general requirement for the employer to select and have the employees wear appropriate PPE, including any PPE described in these specific provisions, was retained in § 1910.132. The employer's obligation to assure compliance with the individual requirements for particular types of PPE was intended to remain the same as if the words "the employer shall ensure" or similar language were affixed to each substantive PPE provision in the final rule. Therefore, this technical amendment is necessary to restate that obligation within the text of these requirements.

By this notice. Minnesota OSHA proposes to adopt the technical amendments to Subpart I, as published in the Federal Register on May 2, 1996.

(B) "Consolidation of Repetitive Provisions in 29 CFR 1910, 1915, and 1926; Final Rule, Technical Amendments and Recodification." On June 20, 1996, Federal OSHA published its final rule, technical amendments, and recodifications for 29 CFR Parts 1910, 1915, and 1926. This consolidation by Federal OSHA is continuing action of the initiative begun in March 1995 by President Clinton to streamline Federal regulatory efforts. Most of the changes being made in the final rule issued on this date, involve eliminating duplicate health standards from the shipyard and construction part of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) and replacing them with cross references to the identical text in the general industry part. Also in the rule, OSHA is moving two standards currently in Subpart C and Subpart G of the general industry standards (Part 1910) to Subpart Z of those standards in order to place most all OSHA health standards in one subpart and one volume of the CFR. The two standards are, "Access to Employee Exposure and Medical Records" (formerly 1910.20, renumbered 1910.1020), and "Ionizing Radiation" (formerly 1910.96, renumbered 1910.1096). In response to industry representatives' requests, OSHA's commercial diving standard, currently in both the general industry and construction standards, will be placed in the general industry part only. OSHA is also removing some fire protection standards from the safety and health regulations that had been inadvertently identified as applicable to construction work. The new final rule makes no substantive changes to the requirements of the OSHA standards.

By this notice, Minnesota OSHA proposes to adopt the final rule, technical amendments, and recodifications, as published in the Federal Register on June 20, 1996.

(C) "Personal Protective Equipment for Shipyard Employment (PPE); Final Rule." On May 24, 1996, the final rule for Personal Protective Equipment for Shipyard Employment (PPE) was published in the *Federal Register*. This final rule updates, reorganizes, and simplifies shipyard employment PPE standards into a comprehensive framework that encompasses the shipbuilding, ship repair, and shipbreaking industries. Where appropriate, the final rule deletes existing specification-oriented provisions that limit employer innovation, and incorporates performance-oriented language. The original voluntary consensus standards were adopted in the early 1970s; the new rules reflect improvements in equipment, such as recently designed equipment that is more comfortable and effective in protecting employees, but out of sync with outdated OSHA standards. The updated rules include new provisions on selecting equipment, handling defective and damaged equipment and training employees. The revised rules also require employers to phase out body belts used for fall protection and non-locking snaphooks by January 1, 1998. Under the new standard, shipyard employers will assess hazards, by trade rather than by work area, to determine the need for protective equipment. Then employers will select appropriate equipment and train employees in using and caring for it.

By this notice, Minnesota OSHA proposes to adopt the final rule for Personal Protective Equipment for Shipyard Employment (PPE), as published in the *Federal Register* on May 24, 1996.

On June 13, 1996, the *Federal Register* published a correction to the final rule for Personal Protective Equipment for Shipyard Employment (PPE), that was published on May 24. There was a placement error involving Note 1 to 1915.152(b). Minnesota OSHA proposes to adopt this correction as well.

Adopted Rules

The adoption of a rule becomes effective after the requirements of Minn. Stat. §§14.14-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule.

If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and citation to its previous State Register publication will be printed.

If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous State Register publication will be cited.

An emergency rule becomes effective five working days after the approval of the Attorney General as specified in Minn. Stat. §14.33 and upon the approval of the Revisor of Statutes as specified in §14.36. Notice of approval by the Attorney General will be published as soon as practicable, and the adopted emergency rule will be published in the manner provided for adopted rules under §14.18.

Adopted Permanent Exempt Rules Relating to Workers' Compensation Medical Services and Fees; Conversion Factor

5221.4020 FORMULA FOR DETERMINING FEE SCHEDULE PAYMENT LIMITS; CONVERSION FACTOR.

- Subp 2. Conversion factor. The conversion factor shall be updated annually, pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 176.136, subdivision 1a. The conversion factor for services included in parts 5221.4030 to 5221.4060 provided after October 1, 1993, is 552.05. This initial conversion factor is annually adjusted as follows:
 - A. for dates of service from October 1, 1994 to September 30, 1995; \$52.91;
 - B. for dates of service from October 1, 1995 to September 30, 1996; \$54.31; and
 - C for dates of service from October 1, 1996 to September 30, 1997. \$56.35.

As a sample calculation, the maximum fee for a new patient office examination by a physician, procedure code 99201, is 0.80 (relative value unit). This is multiplied by 52.05 (conversion factor for 1993). The total payment, excluding any applicable adjustment, would be equal to \$41.64 for the service.

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
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
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
