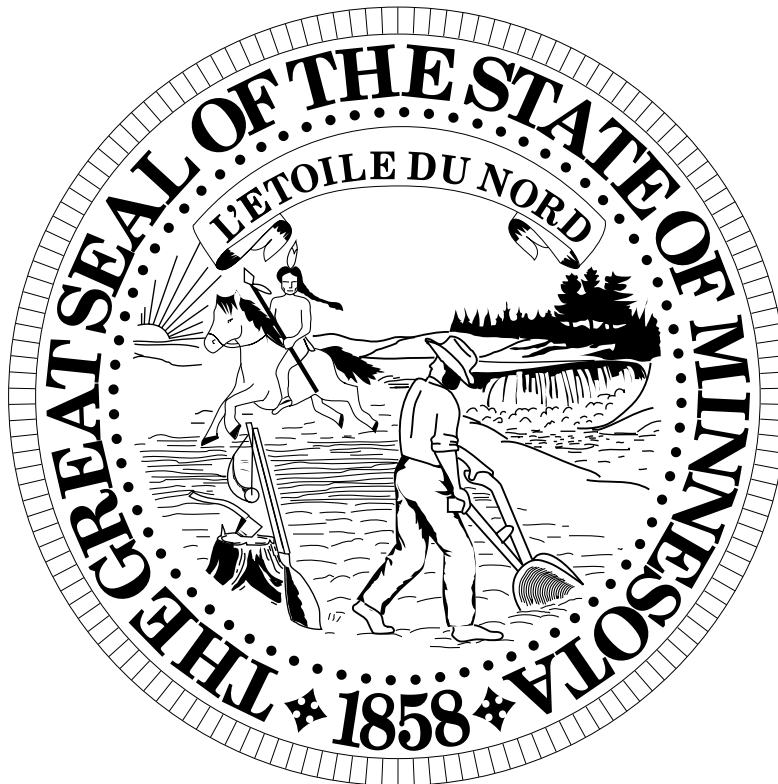

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Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 80 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific **Minnesota Rule** chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the **Minnesota Rules** are published. The current 1999 set is a 13-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Generally speaking, proposed and adopted exempt rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

An agency must first solicit **Comments on Planned Rules** or **Comments on Planned Rule Amendments** from the public on the subject matter of a possible rulemaking proposal under active consideration within the agency (*Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.101). It does this by publishing a notice in the *State Register* at least 60 days before publication of a notice to adopt or a notice of hearing, or within 60 days of the effective date of any new statutory grant of required rulemaking.

When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or a notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the most current edition of the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues #1-13 inclusive; issues #14-25 inclusive; issue #26 cumulative for issues #1-26; issues #27-38 inclusive; issue #39, cumulative for issues #1-39; issues #40-51 inclusive; and issues #1-52 (or 53 in some years), cumulative for issues #1-52 (or 53). An annual subject matter index for rules was separately printed usually in August, but starting with Volume 19 now appears in the final issue of each volume. 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A rule becomes effective after the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes* §§14.05-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in the *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule.

If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed.

If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

Expedited and Emergency Expedited Rules

Provisions for the Commissioner of Natural Resources to adopt emergency expedited Game and Fish Rules are specified in *Minnesota Statutes* §§ 84.027. The commissioner may adopt emergency expedited rules when conditions exist that do not allow the Commissioner to comply with the requirements for emergency rules. The Commissioner must submit the rule to the attorney general for review and must publish a notice of adoption that includes a copy of the rule and the emergency conditions. Emergency expedited rules are effective upon publication in the *State Register*, and may be effective up to seven days before publication under certain emergency conditions. Emergency expedited rules are effective for the period stated or up to 18 months.

Adopted Permanent Rules Relating to Electrical Code

The rules proposed and published at *State Register*, Volume 26, Number 52, pages 1714-1715, June 17, 2002 (26 SR 1714), are adopted with the following modifications:

1315.0200 SCOPE.

Subpart 1. **Electrical code.** All new electrical wiring, apparatus, and equipment for electric light, heat, power, technology circuits and systems, and alarm and communication systems must comply with the regulations contained in the 2002 edition of the National Electrical Code (NEC) as approved by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI/NFPA 70-2002), *Minnesota Statutes*, section 326.243, and the Minnesota State Building Code as adopted by the commissioner of administration. The 2002 edition of the National Electrical Code, developed and published by the National Fire Protection Association, Inc., is incorporated by reference and made part of the Minnesota State Building Code. The National Electrical Code is not subject to frequent change and is available in the office of the commissioner of administration, from the State Board of Electricity, 1821 University Avenue, Suite S-128, St. Paul, MN 55104-2993, through public libraries, or from National Fire Protection Association, Inc., One Battery March Park, Post Office Box 9101, Quincy, MA 02269-9101. ~~This subpart is effective five days after the date of adoption.~~

Expedited Emergency Rules

Provisions exist for the Commissioners of some state agencies to adopt emergency expedited rules when conditions exist that do not allow the Commissioner to comply with the requirements for emergency rules. The Commissioner must submit the rule to the attorney general for review and must publish a notice of adoption that includes a copy of the rule and the emergency conditions. Emergency expedited rules are effective upon publication in the *State Register*, and may be effective up to seven days before publication under certain emergency conditions. Emergency expedited rules are effective for the period stated or up to 18 months. Specific *Minnesota Statutes* citations accompanying these emergency expedited rules detail the agency's rulemaking authority.

Subp. 3a. Antlerless permit. "Antlerless permit" means a permit to take an antlerless deer with a regular firearms or all season deer license in an antlerless permit or special permit area.

6232.0300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING DEER.

Subp. 8. **Bag limit.** A person may not tag more than one deer during a license year by any method, except as authorized in items A to D.

D. In no case may a person tag more than five deer per year by firearms, archery, or both methods combined, except a sixth deer may be tagged if the person takes a deer with a free landowner permit.

6232.0800 ARCHERY SPECIAL HUNT AREAS AND PROCEDURES.

Subp. 2. **Areas.** Special bow and arrow permits are valid in areas designated by the commissioner and published in the annual hunting regulations booklet. The following archery special hunt areas are established for the 2002 season:

A. Crow-Hassan park reserve in Hennepin county is open November 15 to November 17 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 130 permits shall be issued. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used by permittees to take deer. Applications must be sent to Three Rivers Parks Bow Hunt, 3800 County Road 24, Maple Plain, MN 55359;

B. Murphy-Hanrehan park reserve in Scott county is open November 15 to November 17 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 185 permits shall be issued. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used by permittees to take deer. Applications must be sent to Three Rivers Parks Bow Hunt, 3800 County Road 24, Maple Plain, MN 55359;

C. Cleary Lake regional park in Scott county is open November 15 to November 17 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 55 permits shall be issued. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used by permittees to take deer. Applications must be sent to Three Rivers Parks Bow Hunt, 3800 County Road 24, Maple Plain, MN 55359;

D. portions of the city of New Ulm are open October 12 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 50 permits shall be issued by the city of New Ulm. A regular archery license and an archery deer management permit must be purchased to qualify for the hunt. A proficiency test is required. Intensive harvest permits may also be used by permittees to take

deer. Applications must be sent to New Ulm City Deer Hunt, City Manager's Office, 100 N. Broadway, New Ulm, MN 56073. Applications must be postmarked by September 3; and

E. portions of the city of Red Wing as shown on maps available from the city are open September 14 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer. A proficiency test is required and hunters must wear back tags during the hunt. A regular archery license and an archery deer management permit must be purchased to qualify for the hunt. Up to three intensive harvest permits may be used by permittees to take deer. Applications must be submitted to City of Red Wing Deer Hunt, Red Wing Public Works, 229 Tyler Road S., Red Wing, MN 55066.

6232.1200 ARCHERY DEER MANAGEMENT PERMITS.

The purchase of an archery deer management permit is authorized for any person who has purchased and presents a valid archery deer license from the current year. Archery deer management permits may be purchased from county auditors' offices, the license bureau, and other authorized agents. The archery deer management permit authorizes taking an antlerless deer in the following areas:

A. special hunt areas by permittees where deer management permits are valid. In 2002, antlerless deer may be taken under an archery deer management permit in the Crow-Hassan park reserve, Murphy-Hanrehan park reserve, Cleary Lake regional park, city of New Ulm, and city of Red Wing archery special hunt areas; and

B. designated antlerless permit areas, which consist of antlerless permit areas that the commissioner anticipates will be under-subscribed. In 2002, antlerless deer may be taken under an archery deer management permit in the following antlerless permit areas: 104, 107, 110, 115, 154, 156, 157, 159, 167, 168, 172, 175, 178, 181, 183, 201, 202, 204 to 211, 221 to 225, 227, 228, 236, 242 to 249, 283 to 285, 337, 339 to 343, 345 to 349, 401 to 415, 418 to 423, 429, 452, 462, and 467.

6232.1250 TAKING DEER BY ARCHERY UNDER INTENSIVE HARVEST PERMITS.

Subp. 2. **Restrictions.** Intensive harvest permits may be used to take antlerless deer only ~~or antlerless deer and adult bucks~~ in antlerless permit areas and special hunt areas prescribed by the commissioner.

Subp. 3. **2002 archery intensive harvest permit areas.** Intensive harvest permits may be used to take up to three antlerless deer by archery in the following areas in 2002:

A. antlerless permit areas 157, 159, 202, 205, 206, 209, 210, 222, 223, 225, 227, 228, 236, 242 to 245, 337, 339, 341 to 343, 345 to 349, 401 to 411, 413, and 429; and

B. the Crow-Hassan park reserve, Murphy-Hanrehan park reserve, Cleary Lake regional park, city of New Ulm, and city of Red Wing archery special hunt areas.

6232.1600 SPECIAL HUNT PROCEDURES.

Subp. 6. **2002 firearms special hunt areas.** The following firearms special hunt areas are authorized for the 2002 season:

A. Rice Lake national wildlife refuge in Aitkin county is open November 16 to November 24 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 40 permits shall be issued to Zone 1 licensees only. This is special hunt area 901;

B. St. Croix state park in Pine county is open November 16 and November 17 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 650 permits shall be issued to Zone 1 licensees only. Management permits are available and three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a fourth and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 902;

C. Gooseberry Falls state park in Lake county is open November 9 to November 24 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 20 permits shall be issued to Zone 1 licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 904;

D. Split Rock Lighthouse state park in Lake county is open November 9 to November 24 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 20 permits shall be issued to Zone 1 licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 905;

E. Tettegouche state park in Lake county is open November 9 to November 24 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 125 permits shall be issued to Zone 1 licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 906;

F. Lake Bronson state park in Kittson county is open November 9 to November 11 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 30 permits shall be issued to Zone 2 licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 907;

G. William O'Brien state park in Washington county is open November 9, 10, 16, and 17 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks on park land north of County Road 4. Park land south of County Road 4 is open to permit holders November 9 to November

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17. No more than 60 permits shall be issued to Zone 2 licensees only. Management permits are available and three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 908;

H. Zippel Bay state park in Lake of the Woods county is open November 9 to November 17 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 55 permits shall be issued to Zone 2 licensees only. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 909;

I. Wild River state park in Chisago county is open November 9 and November 10 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 100 permits shall be issued to Zone 2 licensees only. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 910;

J. Lake Bemidji state park in Beltrami county is open November 9 to November 12 for taking antlerless deer only. Only shot-guns and muzzleloading rifles may be used. No more than 40 permits shall be issued to Zone 2 licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 911;

K. the orchard subpermit area in Winona and Houston counties is open November 9 to November 17 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 125 permits shall be issued to Zone 3A licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 912;

L. Frontenac state park in Goodhue county is open November 23 to November 25 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 50 permits shall be issued to Zone 3B licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 913;

M. Elm Creek park reserve in Hennepin county is open November 23 and November 24 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 150 permits shall be issued to Zone 3B licensees only. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 914;

N. Forestville/Mystery Cave state park in Fillmore county is open November 16 to November 24 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 110 permits shall be issued to Zone 3B licensees only. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 916;

O. Zumbro Falls Woods scientific and natural area in Wabasha county is open November 23 to November 29 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 12 permits shall be issued to Zone 3B licensees only. Management permits are available and up to three intensive harvest permits may be used to take a third, fourth, and fifth deer. This is special hunt area 917;

P. Whitewater state game refuge in Winona county is open November 23 to November 29 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 75 permits shall be issued to Zone 3B licensees only. This is special hunt area 918; and

Q. Maplewood state park in Otter Tail county is open November 9 and November 10 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 100 permits shall be issued to Zone 4B licensees only. Management permits are available. This is special hunt area 919.

Subp. 7. Firearms special hunt area quota adjustments. The commissioner may reduce the permit quota for the St. Croix and Wild River state parks firearms special hunts at the time the computerized drawing is conducted to accommodate tribal declarations for antlerless deer harvest in the 1837 ceded territory in compliance with Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa v. Minnesota, 119 S. Ct. 1187 (1999).

Revenue Notices

The Department of Revenue began issuing revenue notices in July of 1991. Revenue notices are statements of policy made by the department that provide interpretation, detail, or supplementary information concerning a particular statute, rule, or departmental practice. The authority to issue revenue notices is found in *Minnesota Statutes* § 270.0604.

Revenue Notice # 02-12: Sales and Use Tax - Taxable Delivery Charges - Aggregate Materials

Background

Effective July 1, 2002, *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.61, subdivision 3, was amended to provide that delivery of aggregate materials and concrete block is a taxable service. Between December 31, 2001, and July 1, 2002, charges for delivery of aggregate materials and concrete block were only taxable when billed by the seller of the aggregate or blocks. Effective July 1, delivery charges made by either a seller or a third party deliverer of aggregate or blocks are taxable. However, sellers of aggregate materials or concrete block are not required to collect sales tax on the delivery charges if the aggregate or block are sold under a contract entered into prior to January 1, 2002, and delivered prior to January 1, 2005.

Issue

For purposes of Chapter 297A, what materials will be treated as “aggregate materials”?

Revenue Notices

Department Position

The definition of “aggregate material” found in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 298.75, which imposes a production tax on aggregate material removal, is the definition that will also be used for sales tax purposes. *Minnesota Statutes*, section 298.75, subdivision 1 defines aggregate material as “nonmetallic natural mineral aggregate including, but not limited to sand, silica sand, gravel, crushed rock, limestone, granite, and borrow, but only if the borrow is transported on a public road, street, or highway.” Stone, boulders, uncrushed rock, rip-rap, crushed granite and crushed limestone would also be considered to be aggregate material. Coarse tailings from taconite plants that are being marketed as aggregate would also be considered to be aggregate materials. Subdivision 1 also provides that aggregate material does not include dimension stone and dimension granite. Aggregate material would also not include agricultural lime or limestone used in taconite production of flux pellets.

Revenue Notice # 02-13: Sales and Use Tax - Game Farms, Shooting Preserves and Hunting Clubs - Game Release Charges

Background

Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.61, subdivision 3(g)(1), includes within the definition of a taxable sale charges for admission to places of amusement and recreational areas. A taxable sale also includes, under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.61, subdivision 3(g)(4), memberships in an organization when a membership is required to use the organization’s sports facilities. Consequently, all admission or membership fees charged by game farms, shooting preserves and hunting clubs for the privilege of entering onto the premises for recreational hunting are subject to the Minnesota sales and use tax.

Game farms, shooting preserves and hunting clubs may also impose game release charges. Game release charges include, but are not limited to, (1) charges to have a certain number of birds or animals available to hunt, (2) charges to have birds or animals released prior to hunting, or (3) charges for birds or animals taken over the limit allowed in the base charge for admission or membership.

Issue

Are separately stated game release charges considered part of the admission or membership fee that is subject to Minnesota sales and use tax?

Department Position

All gross receipts, including separately stated game release charges, are taxable as part of the admission or membership fees. Accordingly, the entire charge for the privilege of hunting at game farms, shooting preserves or hunting clubs is subject to the Minnesota sales and use tax including per bird or animal; additional bird or animal; or released bird or animal charges. Game farms, shooting preserves and hunting clubs are required to pay sales tax on their purchases of items that are used or consumed in the process of providing taxable services under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.61, subdivision 4(h), including purchases of live birds or animals. However, retail sales of slaughtered, dressed and wrapped birds or animals by game farms, shooting preserves or hunting clubs, that are not sold as part of an admission or membership fee, are not subject to the Minnesota sales and use tax.

Revenue Notice # 02-14: Sales and Use Tax - Exemption for Purchases of Telecommunications Equipment - Internet Service Providers

Background

Minnesota Statutes, section 297A.68, subdivision 35, provides a sales tax exemption for purchases of machinery and equipment to be used directly by a telecommunications service provider in providing telecommunications services for sale at retail. The statute provides that the exemption only applies to machinery and equipment used to provide telecommunications services as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.61, subdivision 24, paragraph (a).

Issue

Does the exemption found in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.68, subdivision 35, apply to the purchase of machinery and equipment by an Internet Service Provider (ISP)?

Department Position

An ISP does not provide a telecommunications service as defined in *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.61, subdivision 24, paragraph (a), and therefore cannot use the exemption to purchase machinery and equipment exempt from the sales tax. Subdivision 24, paragraph (a), provides a comprehensive definition as to what constitutes a telecommunications service but specifically provides that the furnishing of information services is not included within the definition. Subdivision 24, paragraph (d) defines information services as “the offering of the capability for generating, acquiring, storing, transforming, processing, retrieving, utilizing, or making available information”. It is the department’s position that an ISP is providing an information service and therefore does not qualify for the telecommunications equipment exemption found under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 297A.68, subdivision 35.

When machinery and equipment is purchased that can be used in providing both telecommunications services and internet services, the exemption will apply only if the taxpayer can document that the machinery and equipment is to be used principally in the providing of telecommunications services.

Revenue Notice # 02-15: Sales and Use Tax - Copies of Scanned Documents

Issue

Is the charge for the scanning of documents subject to the sales tax?

Department Position

A charge for the scanning of documents (photos, records or other printed materials) is subject to the sales tax if the scanning process results in the transfer of tangible personal property. If the seller of the scanning service scans a document and transfers the information on to a tape, disc, or another printed document, which is then transferred to the customer, the charge to the customer is subject to the sales tax.

A charge for the scanning of documents is not subject to the sales tax if the scanning process result in information being transmitted to the customer electronically and no tangible personal property is transferred to the customer. If the seller of the scanning service transfers information to the customer’s computer electronically via a satellite or communications data line, no sales tax would be due on the scanning charge or the charge to the customer for transmitting the information contained in the document.

Notice of Public Hearing and Public Comment Period on Amendments to the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport Zoning Ordinance

The Joint Airport Zoning Board for the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport (Airport) is considering amendments to the *Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport (Wold-Chamberlain Field) Zoning Ordinance* originally adopted by the Board in 1984. The 1984 Ordinance limits the height of structures and vegetation and prohibits certain land uses in an area extending approximately 2 miles from the outer boundaries of the Airport. Amendments to the 1984 Ordinance must be considered due to the construction of new Runway 17-35, the planned 1,000-foot extension to the northeast of existing Runway 4-22 and other changes at the Airport since 1984. Maps which are part of the proposed amendments show the precise boundaries for application of the 1984 Ordinance and the proposed amendments.

The proposed amendments would (1) limit the height of structures and vegetation in the north (Minneapolis) approach and the south (Bloomington) approach to new Runway 17-35, (2) extend to the northeast the height limitations on the northeast (St. Paul and Minneapolis) approach to existing Runway 4-22, and (3) change the land use restrictions applicable to property in the approaches to all runways at the Airport by reducing the length of Safety Zone A, increasing the length of Safety Zone B, increasing the number of uses and density of development permitted in Safety Zone B, and prohibiting in Safety Zone B the future construction of amphitheaters, hospitals, nursing homes, residential uses, schools, stadiums and ponds or other features which might attract waterfowl or other birds. The proposed amendments do **NOT** affect additions to existing residences, residential redevelopment or future residential development in established residential neighborhoods around or near the Airport.
