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PREFACE.

THE difficulties which have been encountered in preparing this compilation of the Statute Laws of the state have been many. The legislation of the state has been so unsettled, so much confusion and uncertainty surrounds many of the general laws enacted during the three years subsequent to the passage of the General Statutes, that it has been a matter of no little concern to get at the evident intention of the legislature. For these, prominent among other reasons, the plan of the work has undergone a change. The purpose of the compiler, at the outset, was to include within the first volume nothing save the General Statutes just as the legislature should have left them at the date of this publication, and to group together in the volume which was to follow all legislation of a general and independent nature not enacted by the legislature, as amendments or parts of the General Statutes. It was found impossible to do so because of the reasons above stated.

In the present plan I have divided the work into six parts or grand divisions, the first four embracing the General Statutes and all the General Acts which, relating to the same subjects, could be classified; the fifth containing the Curative and Legalizing Acts passed since the admission of the state into the Union, including those left unrepealed by chapter one hundred and twenty-two of the General Statutes; and the sixth part embracing a few acts of a general nature which do not relate to any of the subjects contained in the chapters of the Statutes of 1866, and hence could not be classified.

The arrangement is as symmetrical and methodical as I could devise, and while I have been obliged to disturb somewhat the order of the chapters and the original numbering of the sections of the General Statutes, I have yet endeavored to preserve them as far as was possible and consistent with this present plan.

The subject-matter of the sections of the Statutes of 1866 which

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have been repealed are omitted, but the number retained and in brackets at the right hand, the date of the repealing act, and the page of the Session Laws upon which it may be found. Where a section has been amended by subsequent legislation, the section as amended is inserted, and at the right hand, also in brackets, the date (or dates, if more than once amended) of the law amending, and at the end of the section reference is made to the year and page of the Session Laws.

The acts of a public nature, passed since the revision of 1866, are placed under the chapters wherein the same or similar subjects are contained. Wherever the nature of the subject would permit of it, they have been incorporated into the body of the chapter and sectioned with it, but reference made to the time of their enactment as in the case of amended or repealed sections. This has necessitated, in many instances, the changing of the old numbers; but in order to avoid as much as possible the inconvenience which this re-numbering must give rise to, the number of the section, as found in the chapter of the Statutes of 1866, is placed next the new number at the right hand in brackets, or a note following the section explains what parts of the same are identical with the present chapter. In some instances I have not been able to preserve this form, so that at the end of titles or chapters will be found a few acts retaining the same appearance as in the Session Laws.

Under the arrangement of this work, separate chapters of the General Statutes have been brought together where they have related to the same general subject, and made title of chapters. This has necessitated in some instances a change in the text, the words chapter, title, or act giving way to the words title or article, but the original designation has been retained enclosed in brackets next to the new term used. Such errors as occurred in the text of the General Statutes of 1866, or in the Session Laws of subsequent years, have been noted, and the omitted or erroneous words also enclosed in brackets.

To aid the profession, the endeavor has been made to cite every case to be found in our state reports bearing in any way upon the statutes. References are also given to the judicial decisions of the state of Wisconsin, where the statutes are similar, and in a few instances to the decisions in other states, where, although the statutes are alike, the interpretation of them has been different. This, however, has not been done in Parts III. and IV., as from the great number of adjudications

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upon the subjects embraced in them, it would have required the addition of another volume to this work. References have also been made to a large number of decisions of the courts of our own state and Wisconsin, relating to subjects of general interest which do not involve the construction of the statute law of the state. To the constitution of the United States have been appended citations of cases not only of the Federal courts but of the several state courts.

The compiler has bestowed much care and labor upon the Index, and he earnestly hopes that it may be found sufficiently copious, correct, and intelligible to meet the wants of the profession.

Owing to unforeseen circumstances, the Curative Acts, prior to the year 1858, are not included in Part V., nor are those of the year 1861, The work was printed in Edinburgh, Scotland, and the Session Laws of those years were lost in transit, and the loss not discovered until the work was wellnigh printed. The distance then precluded any attempt to replace them. Should a second edition, however, be demanded, they will be included in it.

The compiler is conscious that in a work of so much magnitude errors will unavoidably creep in, but he trusts that they may be found to be few, and not of such a nature as to impair the correctness of the work.

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CONSTITUTION

OF

THE UNITED STATES.

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Preamble.—We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, ensure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defence, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution of the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

OF THE LEGISLATIVE POWER.

SECTION 1. *Legislative powers, in whom vested.*—All legislative powers herein granted, shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. *Of the house of representatives.*—The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the legislature.

Qualifications of the members.—No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Apportionment of representatives and direct taxes.—Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union, according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons: The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three; Massachusetts eight; Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one; Connecticut five; New York six; New Jersey four; Pennsylvania eight; Delaware one; Maryland six; Virginia ten; North Carolina five; South Carolina five; and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. *Of the senate.*—The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class at the

expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year ; and if vacancies happen by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state, the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their own officers, and also a president *pro tempore*, in the absence of the vice-president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside ; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust, or profit, under the United States ; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. *Manner of electing members of congress.*—The times, places, and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives, shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof ; but the congress may, at any time, by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meetings shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. *Powers of each house.*—Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns, and qualifications of its own members ; and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business ; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy ; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question, shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. *Compensation ; privileges of the members from arrest, and of speech.*—The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same ; and for any speech or debate in either house, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

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No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States, shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. *Revenue bills.*—All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives; but the senate may propose or concur with amendments as on other bills.

Manner of passing bills, etc.—Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsiderations, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill, shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted), after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote, to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment), shall be presented to the president of the United States; and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. *General powers of congress.*—The congress shall have power,

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts, and excises, shall be uniform throughout the United States:

To make laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. *Limitations of powers of congress.*—The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear, or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States, and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them, shall, without the consent of congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince, or foreign state.

SEC. 10. *Limitations of the powers of individual states.*—No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance, or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts; or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States, and

all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the congress. No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

THE EXECUTIVE POWER.

SEC. 1. *Of the executive power, etc.*—The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and together with the vice-president, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows :

Each state shall appoint in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress ; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

[The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each ; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed ; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president ; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote ; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors, shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them by ballot, the vice-president.*]

The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes, which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person except a natural-born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president ;

neither shall any person be eligible to that office, who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may, by law, provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly, until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased or diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enters on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. *Powers and duties of the president.*—The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offences against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper, in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

SEC. 3. *President shall communicate to congress; may convene and adjourn congress, etc.*—He shall, from time to time, give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may on extraordinary occasions convene both houses, or either of them, and in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public officers; he shall take care

that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. *Of removal of officers by impeachment.*—The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

OF THE JUDICIARY.

SEC. 1. *Judicial power, tenure, and compensation.*—The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges both of the supreme and inferior courts shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. *Jurisdiction.*—The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens, or subjects.*

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress shall make.

SEC. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason; but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

SEC. 1. *Of state records.*—Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records, and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records, and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice, and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

SEC. 3. *Of new states.*—New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the congress.

The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States, or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. *Republican form of government guarantied to the several states.*—The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

Amendments to the constitution.—The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution; or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided*, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

Of the public debt.—All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution, as under the confederation.

Of the supreme law of the land.—This constitution, and the laws of the United States, which shall be made in pursuance thereof; and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby; any thing in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

Of the constitutional oath and religious test.—The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by an oath or affirmation, to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

Ratification.—The ratification of the conventions of nine states, shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

ARTICLES

IN ADDITION TO, AND AMENDMENT OF, THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,—PROPOSED BY THE CONGRESS, HELD IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK ON THE 4TH OF MARCH A.D. 1789, AND RATIFIED BY THE LEGISLATURES OF THE SEVERAL STATES, PURSUANT TO THE FIFTH ARTICLE OF THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

Rights of conscience; speech; press; petition.—Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

Of the right to bear arms.—A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

Of quartering troops.—No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

Of the right of search; seizure; and general warrants.—The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

Concerning prosecutions, trials, and punishment; private property not to be taken without, etc.—No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

Of trial in criminal cases, and the rights of a defendant.—In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

Of trials in civil cases.—In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Of bail and fines.—Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Of rights reserved.—The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Of powers reserved to the states.—The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.*

ARTICLE XI.

Of the judicial power ; rule of construction.—The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.†

ARTICLE XII.

Manner of electing the president and vice-president.—The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot, for president and vice-president, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves ; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president ; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate ; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted ; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed ; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote ; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president, shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed ; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president ; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president, shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.*

ARTICLE XIII.

SEC. 1. *Slavery abolished.*—Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. *Power of congress.*—Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.†

ARTICLE XIV.

SEC. 1. *Who are citizens.*—All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States ; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. *Representatives, how apportioned.*—Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. *Eligibility to office, &c.*—No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president or vice-president, or hold any office civil or military under the United States or under any state, who having previously taken an oath as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each house remove such disability.

SEC. 4. *Validity of public debt not to be questioned.*—The validity of the public debt of the United States authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion against the United States shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States or any claim for the loss or emancipation of

any slave; but all such debts, obligations, and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. That congress shall have power to enforce by appropriate legislation the provisions of this article.*

ARTICLE XV.

SEC. 1. *In regard to suffrage.*—The rights of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or any state, on account of race or color or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by the appropriate legislation.†

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ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA.

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An act to establish the territorial government of Minnesota.

[Passed March 3, 1849.]

SECTION 1. *Temporary government for territory of Minnesota established.*—*Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled,* That, from and after the passage of this act, all that part of the territory of the United States which lies within the following limits, to wit: Beginning in the Mississippi river, at the point where the line of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes of north latitude crosses the same, thence running due west on said line, which is the northern boundary of the state of Iowa, to the north-west corner of the said state of Iowa, thence southerly along the western boundary of said state to the point where said boundary strikes the Missouri river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river to the mouth of White-earth river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the White-earth river to the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain;

thence east and south of east along the boundary line between the possessions of the United States and Great Britain to Lake Superior ; thence in a straight line to the northernmost point of the state of Wisconsin in Lake Superior ; thence along the western boundary line of said state of Wisconsin to the Mississippi river ; thence down the main channel of said river to the place of beginning, be, and the same is hereby erected into a temporary government by the name of the territory of Minnesota : *provided*, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to inhibit the Government of the United States from dividing said territory into two or more territories, in such manner and at such times as congress shall deem convenient and proper, or from attaching any portion of said territory to any other state or territory of the United States.

SEC. 2. *The executive power vested in a governor ; his tenure of office, powers, duties, and emoluments.*—*And be it further enacted*, That the executive power and authority in and over said territory of Minnesota shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States. The governor shall reside within said territory, shall be commander-in-chief of the militia thereof, shall perform the duties and receive the emoluments of superintendent of Indian affairs ; he may grant pardons for offences against the laws of said territory, and reprieves for offences against the laws of the United States until the decision of the president can be made known thereon ; he shall commission all officers who shall be appointed to office under the laws of the said territory, and shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

SEC. 3. *Secretary, his powers and duties.*—*And be it further enacted*, That there shall be a secretary of said territory, who shall reside therein, and hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president of the United States ; he shall record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly hereinafter constituted, and all the acts and proceedings of the governor in his executive department ; he shall transmit one copy of the laws and one copy of the executive proceedings, on or before the first day of December in each year, to the president of the United States, and at the same time, two copies of the laws to the speaker of the house of representatives, and the president of the senate, for the use of congress. And in case of the death, removal, resignation, or necessary absence of the governor from the territory, the secretary shall be, and he is hereby, authorized and required to execute and perform all the powers and duties of the governor during such vacancy or necessary absence, or until another governor shall be duly appointed to fill such vacancy.

SEC. 4. *Legislative power, how vested.*—*And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power and authority of said territory shall be vested in the governor and a legislative assembly. The legislative assembly shall consist of a council and house of representatives. The council shall consist of nine members, having the qualifications of voters as hereinafter prescribed, whose term of service shall continue two years. The house of representatives shall, at its first session, consist of eighteen members, possessing the same qualifications as prescribed for members of the council, and whose term of service shall continue one year. The number of councillors and representatives may be increased by the legislative assembly, from time to time, in proportion to the increase of population : *provided*, that the whole number shall never exceed fifteen councillors and thirty-nine representatives. An

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apportionment shall be made, as nearly equal as practicable, among the several counties, or districts, for the election of the council and representatives, giving to each section of the territory representation in the ratio of its population, Indians excepted, as nearly as may be. And the members of the council and of the house of representatives shall reside in and be inhabitants of the district for which they may be elected respectively. Previous to the first election, the governor shall cause a census or enumeration of the inhabitants of the several counties and districts of the territory to be taken, and the first election shall be held at such time and places, and be conducted in such manner as the governor shall appoint and direct; and he shall, at the same time, declare the number of members of the council and house of representatives to which each of the counties or districts shall be entitled under this act.

The number of persons authorized to be elected having the highest number of votes in each of said council districts for members of the council, shall be declared, by the governor, to be duly elected to the council; and the person or persons authorized to be elected, having the greatest number of votes for the house of representatives, equal to the number to which each county or district shall be entitled, shall also be declared, by the governor, to be duly elected members of the house of representatives: *provided*, that in case of a tie between two or more persons voted for, the governor shall order a new election to supply the vacancy made by such tie. And the persons thus elected to the legislative assembly shall meet at such place on such day as the governor shall appoint; but thereafter the time, place, and manner of holding and conducting all elections by the people, and the apportioning of the representation in the several counties or districts to the council and house of representatives according to the population, shall be prescribed by law, as well as the day of the commencement of the regular sessions of the legislative assembly: *provided*, that no one session shall exceed the term of sixty days.

SEC. 5. *Qualification of voters.*—*And be it further enacted*, That every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said territory at the time of the passage of this act, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to any office within the said territory; but the qualifications of voters, and of holding office, at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the legislative assembly: *provided*, that the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States, and those who shall have declared, on oath, their intention to become such, and shall have taken an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act.

SEC. 6. *Extent of legislative powers.*—*And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power of the territory shall extend to all rightful subjects of legislation, consistent with the constitution of the United States and the provisions of this act; but no law shall be passed interfering with the primary disposal of the soil; no tax shall be imposed upon the property of the United States; nor shall the lands or other property of non-residents be taxed higher than the lands or other property of residents. All the laws passed by the legislative assembly and governor shall be submitted to the congress of the United States, and if disapproved, shall be null and of no effect.

SEC. 7. *How township, district, and county officers shall be appointed.*—*And be*

it further enacted, That all township, district, and county officers, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, in such manner as shall be provided by the governor and legislative assembly of the territory of Minnesota. The governor shall nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council, appoint all officers not herein otherwise provided for; and in the first instance the governor alone may appoint all said officers, who shall hold their offices until the end of the next session of the legislative assembly.

SEC. 8. *No member of the legislative assembly to hold office created while he was a member, or for one year thereafter.*—*And be it further enacted*, That no member of the legislative assembly shall hold or be appointed to any office which shall have been created, or the salary or emoluments of which shall have been increased, while he was a member, during the term for which he was elected, and for one year after the expiration of such term; and no person holding a commission or appointment under the United States, except postmasters, shall be a member of the legislative assembly, or shall hold any office under the government of said territory.

SEC. 9. *Judicial power, how vested.*—*And be it further enacted*, That the judicial power of said territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold a term at the seat of government of said territory annually, and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such times and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and of justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law: *provided*, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judge thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals, shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court, or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as

shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive, in all such cases, the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin territory received for similar services.

SEC. 10. *Attorney and marshal, their fees and emoluments.*—*And be it further enacted*, That there shall be appointed an attorney for said territory, who shall continue in office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall receive the same fees and salary as the attorney of the United States for the late territory of Wisconsin received. There shall also be a marshal for the territory appointed, who shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the president, and who shall execute all processes issuing from the said courts, when exercising their jurisdiction as circuit and district courts of the United States; he shall perform the duties, be subject to the same regulations and penalties, and be entitled to the same fees, as the marshal of the district court of the United States for the late territory of Wisconsin; and shall, in addition, be paid two hundred dollars annually as a compensation for extra services.

SEC. 11. *Governor, secretary, chief and associate justices, attorney and marshal, how to be appointed.*—*And be it further enacted*, That the governor, secretary, chief justice and associate justices, attorney and marshal, shall be nominated, and, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the president of the United States. The governor and secretary to be appointed as aforesaid, shall, before they act as such, respectively take an oath or affirmation, before the district judge, or some justice of the peace in the limits of said territory, duly authorized to administer oaths and affirmations by the laws now in force therein, or before the chief justice or some associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, to support the constitution of the United States, and faithfully to discharge the duties of their respective offices; which said oaths, when so taken, shall be certified by the person by whom the same shall have been taken, and such certificates shall be received and recorded by the said secretary among the executive proceedings; and the chief justice and associate justices, and all other civil officers in said territory, before they act as such, shall take a like oath or affirmation, before the said governor or secretary, or some judge or justice of the peace of the territory, who may be duly commissioned and qualified, which said oath or affirmation shall be certified and transmitted by the person taking the same, to the secretary, to be by him recorded as aforesaid; and afterwards, the like oath or affirmation shall be taken, certified, and recorded in such manner and form as may be prescribed by law. The governor shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars as governor, and one thousand dollars as superintendent of Indian affairs. The chief justice and the associate justices shall each receive an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars. The secretary shall receive an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars. The said salaries shall be paid quarter-yearly, at the treasury of the United States. The members of the legislative assembly shall be entitled to receive three dollars each per day during their attendance at the session thereof, and three dollars each for every twenty miles travel in going to and returning from the said sessions, estimated according to the nearest usually travelled route. There shall

be appropriated, annually, the sum of one thousand dollars, to be expended by the governor to defray the contingent expenses of the territory; and there shall also be appropriated, annually, a sufficient sum, to be expended by the secretary of the territory, and upon an estimate to be made by the secretary of the treasury of the United States, to defray the expenses of the legislative assembly, the printing of the laws, and other incidental expenses; and the secretary of the territory shall annually account to the secretary of the treasury of the United States for the manner in which the aforesaid sum shall have been expended.

SEC. 12. *Inhabitants to be entitled to all the rights and privileges secured to inhabitants of Wisconsin.*—*And be it further enacted,* That the inhabitants of the said territory shall be entitled to all the rights, privileges, and immunities heretofore granted and secured to the territory of Wisconsin and to its inhabitants; and the laws in force in the territory of Wisconsin at the date of the admission of the state of Wisconsin shall continue to be valid and operative therein, so far as the same be not incompatible with the provisions of this act, subject, nevertheless, to be altered, modified, or repealed, by the governor and legislative assembly of the said territory of Minnesota; and the laws of the United States are hereby extended over and declared to be in force in said territory, so far as the same, or any provision thereof, may be applicable.

SEC. 13. *Seat of government for said territory.*—*And be it further enacted,* That the legislative assembly of the territory of Minnesota shall hold its first session at St Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of government for said territory, at such place as they may deem eligible; and shall, at such time as they shall see proper, prescribe by law the manner of locating the permanent seat of government of said territory by a vote of the people. And the sum of twenty thousand dollars, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated and granted to said territory of Minnesota, to be applied, by the governor and legislative assembly, to the erection of suitable public buildings at the seat of government.

SEC. 14. *Delegate to congress of the United States to be elected.*—*And be it further enacted,* That a delegate to the house of representatives of the United States, to serve for the term of two years, may be elected by the voters qualified to elect members of the legislative assembly, who shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges as are exercised and enjoyed by the delegates from the several other territories of the United States to the said house of representatives. The first election shall be held at such times and places, and be conducted in such manner, as the governor shall appoint and direct; and at all subsequent elections, the times, places, and manner of holding the elections shall be prescribed by law. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be declared by the governor to be duly elected, and a certificate thereof shall be given accordingly.

SEC. 15. *All suits, process, and proceedings at law, etc., pending in the courts of Wisconsin, within the limits of said territory, transferred to district courts of said territory.*—*And be it further enacted,* That all suits, process, and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law and in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect,

shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted, and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws in force within said limits may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions, and causes of action may be recovered under this act, the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

SEC. 16. *Justices of the peace, constables, etc., continued in office till others are appointed to succeed them.*—*And be it further enacted,* That all justices of the peace, constables, sheriffs, and all other judicial and ministerial officers, who shall be in office within the limits of said territory when this act shall take effect, shall be, and they are hereby authorized and required to continue to exercise and perform the duties of their respective offices as officers of the territory of Minnesota, temporarily, and until they, or others, shall be duly appointed and qualified to fill their places in the manner herein directed, or until their offices shall be abolished.

SEC. 17. *Appropriation of \$5000 for library.*—*And be it further enacted,* That the sum of five thousand dollars be, and the same is hereby, appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorney of said territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 18. *Reservation of lands for use of schools.*—*And be it further enacted,* That when the lands in the said territory shall be surveyed under the direction of the government of the United States, preparatory to bringing the same into market, sections, numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in said territory, shall be, and the same are hereby, reserved, for the purpose of being applied to schools in said territory, and in the state and territories hereafter to be created out of the same.

SEC. 19. *Until otherwise provided by law, the governor may define the judicial districts, and assign the judges to them, etc.*—*And be it further enacted,* That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said territory may define the judicial districts of said territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter, or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

SEC. 20. *How laws shall be enacted by legislative assembly and approved by the governor.*—*And be it further enacted,* That every bill which shall or may pass the council and house of representatives shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the territory; if he approve, he shall sign it, but if not, he shall return it with his objections to the house in which it originated; which shall cause

the objections to be entered at large upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall also be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law; but in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislative assembly, by adjournment, prevent it; in which case it shall not become a law.

ACT AUTHORIZING A STATE GOVERNMENT.

SEC.

1. Inhabitants of part of Minnesota authorized to form a constitution and state government—boundaries designated.
2. Jurisdiction over bordering waters, which are declared to be common highways.
3. Convention of delegates to be held—mode of election—meeting of convention.

An act to authorize the people of Minnesota to form a Constitution and State Government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states.

[Passed February 26, 1857.]

SECTION 1. *Inhabitants of part of Minnesota authorized to form a constitution and state government.*—*Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled,* That the inhabitants of that portion of the territory of Minnesota which is embraced within the following limits, to wit: Beginning at the point in the centre of the main channel of the Red river of the north, where the boundary line between the United States and the British possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to Lake Traverse; thence up the centre of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its centre to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the state of Iowa; thence along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river, and following the boundary line of the state of Wisconsin until the same intersects the Saint Louis river; thence down the said river to and through Lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and the British possessions; thence up Pigeon river, and following said dividing line to the place of beginning, be, and they hereby are authorized to form for themselves a constitution and state government, by the name of the state of Minnesota, and to come into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, according to the federal constitution.

SEC. 2. *Jurisdiction over bordering waters which are declared to be common highways.*—*And be it further enacted,* That the state of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and all other rivers and waters bordering on the said state of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state, and any state or states now or hereafter to be formed or bounded by the same; and said river or waters leading into the same shall be common high-

ways, and for ever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to all other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost, or toll therefor.

SEC. 3. *Convention of delegates to be held.*—And be it further enacted, That on the first Monday in June next, the legal voters in each representative district, then existing within the limits of the proposed state, are hereby authorized to elect two delegates for each representative to which said district may be entitled according to the apportionment for representatives to the territorial legislature, which election for delegates shall be held and conducted, and the returns made, in all respects in conformity with the laws of said territory regulating the election of representatives; and the delegates so elected shall assemble at the capitol of said territory, on the second Monday in July next, and first determine, by a vote, whether it is the wish of the people of the proposed state to be admitted into the Union at that time; and if so, shall proceed to form a constitution, and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a state government, in conformity with the federal constitution, subject to the approval and ratification of the people of the proposed state.

SEC. 4. *Census; representative in congress.*—And be it further enacted, That in the event said convention shall decide in favor of the immediate admission of the proposed state into the Union, it shall be the duty of the United States marshal for said territory to proceed to take a census or enumeration of the inhabitants within the limits of the proposed state, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, with the view of ascertaining the number of representatives to which said state may be entitled in the congress of the United States; and said state shall be entitled to one representative and such additional representatives as the population of the state shall, according to the census, show it would be entitled to according to the present ratio of representation.

SEC. 5. *Propositions to be acted on by the convention.*—And be it further enacted, That the following propositions be, and the same are hereby, offered to the said convention of the people of Minnesota for their free acceptance or rejection, which, if accepted by the convention, shall be obligatory on the United States and upon the said state of Minnesota, to wit:

First. School lands.—That sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in every township of public lands in said state, and where either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been sold or otherwise been disposed of, other lands, equivalent thereto and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to said state for the use of schools.

Second. Land for a university.—That seventy-two sections of land shall be set apart and reserved for the use and support of a state university, to be selected by the governor of said state, subject to the approval of the commissioner at the general land office, and to be appropriated and applied in such manner as the legislature of said state may prescribe for the purpose aforesaid, but for no other purpose.

Third. Land for public buildings.—That ten entire sections of land, to be selected by the governor of said state, in legal subdivisions, shall be granted to said state for the purpose of completing the public buildings, or for the erection of others at the seat of government, under the direction of the legislature thereof.

Fourth. Salt springs.—That all salt springs within said state, not exceeding twelve in number, with six sections of land adjoining, or as contiguous as may be

to each, shall be granted to said state for its use; the same to be selected by the governor thereof within one year after the admission of said state, and when so selected, to be used or disposed of on such terms, conditions, and regulations as the legislature shall direct: *provided*, that no salt spring or land, the right whereof is now vested in any individual or individuals, or which may be hereafter confirmed or adjudged to any individual or individuals, shall by this article be granted to said state.

Fifth. Percentage on land sales.—That five per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands lying within said state, which shall be sold by congress after the admission of said state into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said state for the purpose of making public roads and internal improvements, as the legislature shall direct: *provided*, the foregoing propositions herein offered are on the condition that the said convention which shall form the constitution of said state shall provide by a clause in said constitution, or an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said state shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and that no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and that in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ACT OF ADMISSION INTO THE UNION.

An act for the admission of Minnesota into the Union.

[Passed May 11, 1858.]

Preamble.—Whereas an act of congress was passed February twenty-six, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, entitled “An act to authorize the people of the territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states;” and whereas the people of said territory did, on the twenty-ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by delegates elected for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and state government, which is republican in form, and was ratified and adopted by the people at an election, held on the thirteenth day of October, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, for that purpose: therefore

SECTION 1. *Minnesota admitted.*—*Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled,* That the state of Minnesota shall be one, and is hereby declared to be one of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, in all respects whatever.

SEC. 2. *Shall have two representatives.*—*And be it further enacted,* That said state shall be entitled to two representatives in congress until the next apportionment of representatives amongst the several states.

SEC. 3. *Laws of the United States extended over it.*—*And be it further enacted,* That from and after the admission of the state of Minnesota, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within that state as in other states of the Union; and the said state is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with the like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Iowa, shall be established: the judge, attorney, and marshal of the United States for the said district of Minnesota shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney, and marshal of the district of Iowa: and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the supreme court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Minnesota territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the supreme court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Minnesota, or to the supreme court of the state of Minnesota, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require; and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Minnesota territory, as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same and to award mesne or final process therein.

Preamble.—We, the people of the state of Minnesota, grateful to God for our civil and religious liberty, and desiring to perpetuate its blessings, and secure the same to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution :

ARTICLE I.

BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. *Object of government.*—Government is instituted for the security, benefit, and protection of the people, in whom all political power is inherent, together with the right to alter, modify, or reform such government, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 2. *Rights and privileges of citizens.*—No member of this state shall be disfranchised, or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land, or the judgment of his peers. There shall

be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the state, otherwise than in the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted.

SEC. 3. *Liberty of the press secured.*—The liberty of the press shall for ever remain inviolate, and all persons may freely speak, write, and publish their sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of such right.

SEC. 4. *Right of trial by jury.*—The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, and shall extend to all cases at law without regard to the amount in controversy, but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all cases, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. *Excessive bail for crime—cruel punishments.*—Excessive bail shall not be required, nor shall excessive fines be imposed; nor shall cruel or unusual punishments be inflicted.

SEC. 6. *Criminal prosecutions—rights of accused.*—In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the county or district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which county or district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him, to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel in his defense.

SEC. 7. *Criminal prosecutions—rights of accused.*—No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense unless on the presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases of impeachment, or in cases cognizable by justices of the peace, or serving in the army or navy, or in the militia when in actual service in time of war or public danger; and no person for the same offense shall be put twice in jeopardy of punishment, nor shall he be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident and the presumption great; and the privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended, unless, when in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require.

SEC. 8. *Redress of injuries and wrongs.*—Every person is entitled to a certain remedy in the laws for all injuries or wrongs which he may receive in his person, property, or character; he ought to obtain justice freely and without purchase; completely and without denial; promptly and without delay, conformably to the laws.

SEC. 9. *Treason against the state.*—Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against the same, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

SEC. 10. *Rights of the people against unreasonable searches and seizures.*—The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the person or things to be seized.

SEC. 11. *Ex post facto laws or laws impairing contracts prohibited.*—No bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, nor any law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed, and no conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

SEC. 12. *Imprisonment for debt prohibited—exemption of property from seizure for debt.*—No person shall be imprisoned for debt in this state, but this shall not prevent the legislature from providing for imprisonment, or holding to bail persons charged with fraud in contracting said debt. A reasonable amount of property shall be exempt from seizure or sale, for the payment of any debt or liability; the amount of such exemption shall be determined by law.

SEC. 13. *Private property for public use.*—Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation therefor first paid or secured.

SEC. 14. *Standing army prohibited.*—The military shall be subordinate to the civil power, and no standing army shall be kept up in this state in time of peace.

SEC. 15. *Lands declared allodial—leases when void.*—All lands within this state are declared to be allodial, and feudal tenures of every description, with all their incidents, are prohibited. Leases and grants of agricultural land for a longer period than twenty-one years, hereafter made, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be void.

SEC. 16. *Freedom of religious belief acknowledged.*—The enumeration of rights in this constitution shall not be construed to deny or impair others retained by and inherent in the people. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience shall never be infringed, nor shall any man be compelled to attend, erect, or support any place of worship, or to maintain any religious or ecclesiastical ministry against his consent, nor shall any control of, or interference with the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured, shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the state, nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

SEC. 17. *No religious test or property qualification for office to be required.*—No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of public trust under the state. No religious test or amount of property shall ever be required as a qualification of any voter at any election in this state; nor shall any person be rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity in consequence of his opinion upon the subject of religion.

ARTICLE II.

ON NAME AND BOUNDARIES.

SEC. 1. *Name and boundaries of the state.*—This state shall be called and known by the name of the State of Minnesota, and shall consist of and have jurisdiction over the territory embraced in the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the point in the center of the main channel of the Red river of the north, where the boundary line between the United States and the British possessions crosses the same; thence up the main channel of said river to that of the Bois des Sioux river; thence up the main channel of said river to lake Traverse; thence up the center of said lake to the southern extremity thereof; thence in a direct line to the head of Big Stone lake; thence through its center to its outlet; thence by a due south line to the north line of the state of Iowa; thence east along the northern boundary of said state to the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence up the main channel of said river and following the boundary line of the state of Wisconsin, until the same intersects the St Louis river; thence down the said river to and through lake Superior, on the boundary line of Wisconsin and Michigan, until it intersects the dividing line between the United States and British possessions; thence up Pigeon river and following said dividing line to the place of beginning.

SEC. 2. *Jurisdiction on rivers.*—The state of Minnesota shall have concurrent jurisdiction on the Mississippi and on all other rivers and waters bordering on the said state of Minnesota, so far as the same shall form a common boundary to said state, and any other state or states now or hereafter to be formed by the same, and said rivers and waters, and navigable waters leading into the same, shall be common highways, and for ever free, as well to the inhabitants of said state as to other citizens of the United States, without any tax, duty, impost or toll therefor.

SEC. 3. *Acceptance of the propositions contained in enabling act of congress.*—The propositions contained in the act of congress entitled “An act to authorize the people of the territory of Minnesota to form a constitution and state government preparatory to their admission into the Union on an equal footing with the original states,” are hereby accepted, ratified, and confirmed, and shall remain irrevocable without the consent of the United States; and it is hereby ordained that this state shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same, by the United States, or with any regulations congress may find necessary for securing the title to said soil to *bona fide* purchasers thereof; and no tax shall be imposed on lands belonging to the United States, and in no case shall non-resident proprietors be taxed higher than residents.

ARTICLE III.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE POWERS OF GOVERNMENT.

Powers of government.—The powers of the government shall be divided into three distinct departments, legislative, executive, and judicial; and no person or persons belonging to or constituting one of these departments, shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the instances expressly provided in this constitution.

ARTICLE IV.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SEC. 1. *Legislature of the state.*—The legislature of the state shall consist of a senate and house of representatives, who shall meet at the seat of government of the state, at such times as shall be prescribed by law: [but no session shall exceed the term of sixty days.]*

SEC. 2. *Number of members.*—The number of members who compose the senate and house of representatives shall be prescribed by law, but the representation in the senate shall never exceed one member for every five thousand inhabitants, and in the house of representatives one member for every two thousand inhabitants. The representation in both houses shall be apportioned equally throughout the different sections of the state, in proportion to the population thereof, exclusive of Indians not taxable under the provisions of law.

SEC. 3. *Election of members.*—Each house shall be the judge of the election returns, and eligibility of its own members; a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as it may provide.

SEC. 4. *Rules for the government of each house.*—Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, sit upon its own adjournment, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member, but no member shall be expelled a second time for the same offense.

SEC. 5. *Election of presiding officers.*—The house of representatives shall elect its presiding officer, and the senate and house of representatives shall elect such other officers as may be provided by law; they shall keep journals of their proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays, when taken on any question, shall be entered on such journals.

SEC. 6. *Concerning adjournments.*—Neither house shall, during a session of the legislature, adjourn for more than three days (Sunday excepted), nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be assembled, without the consent of the other house.

SEC. 7. *Compensation of members.*—The compensation of senators and representatives shall be three dollars per diem, during the first session, but may afterwards be prescribed by law. But no increase of compensation shall be prescribed which shall take effect during the period for which the members of the existing house of representatives may have been elected.

SEC. 8. *Privileges of members.*—The members of each house shall in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session of their respective houses, and in going to or returning from the same. For any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

SEC. 9. *Restrictions as to members holding office.*—No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he is elected, hold any office under the authority of the United States, or the state of Minnesota, except that of postmaster; and no senator or representative shall hold an office under the state, which had been

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created, or the emoluments of which had been increased, during the session of the legislature of which he was a member, until one year after the expiration of his term of office in the legislature.

SEC. 10. *Bills for revenue, where to originate.*—All bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose and concur with amendments, as on other bills.

SEC. 11. *Concerning the passage of bills, approval by governor or exercise of veto.*—Every bill which shall have passed the senate and house of representatives, in conformity to the rules of each house and the joint rules of the two houses, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor of the state. If he approve, he shall sign and deposit it in the office of secretary of state for preservation, and notify the house where it originated of the fact. But if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it shall have originated, when such objections shall be entered at large on the journal of the same, and the house shall proceed to re-consider the bill. If, after such re-consideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be re-considered, and if it be approved by two-thirds of that house it shall become a law. But in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within three days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by adjournment within that time, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law. The governor may approve, sign, and file in the office of the secretary of state, within three days after the adjournment of the legislature, any act passed during the last three days of the session, and the same shall become a law.

SEC. 12. *Appropriations of money, how made.*—No money shall be appropriated except by bill. Every order, resolution, or vote requiring the concurrence of the two houses (except such as relate to the business or adjournment of the same), shall be presented to the governor for his signature, and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being returned by him with his objections, shall be re-passed by two-thirds of the members of the two houses, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

SEC. 13. *Enacting clause of laws.*—The style of all laws of this state shall be: "Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Minnesota." No law shall be passed unless voted for by a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature, and the vote entered upon the journal of each house.

SEC. 14. *Impeachment.*—The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, through a concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to seats therein. All impeachments shall be tried by the senate; and when sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 15. *Exclusion of criminals from civil rights.*—The legislature shall have

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full power to exclude from the privilege of electing or being elected, any person convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime.

SEC. 16. *Protest of members.*—Two or more members of either house shall have liberty to dissent and protest against any act or resolution which they may think injurious to the public or to any individual, and have the reason of their dissent entered on the journal.

SEC. 17. *Vacancies in legislature.*—The governor shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies as may occur in either house of the legislature. The legislature shall prescribe by law the manner in which evidence in cases of contested seats in either house shall be taken.

SEC. 18. *Punishment for breach of order, etc.*—Each house may punish by imprisonment, during its session, any person not a member who shall be guilty of any disorderly or contemptuous behaviour in their presence, but no such imprisonment shall at any time exceed twenty-four hours.

SEC. 19. *Sessions to be open to public.*—Each house shall be open to the public during the sessions thereof, except in such cases as in their opinion may require secrecy.

SEC. 20. *Reading of bills.*—Every bill shall be read on three different days in each separate house, unless in case of urgency two-thirds of the house where such bill is depending, shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule, and no bill shall be passed by either house until it shall have been previously read twice at length.

SEC. 21. *Enrolling and signing of bills.*—Every bill having passed both houses, shall be carefully enrolled, and shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house. Any presiding officer refusing to sign a bill which shall have previously passed both houses, shall thereafter be incapable of holding a seat in either branch of the legislature, or hold any other office of honor or profit in the state, and in case of such refusal, each house shall, by rule, provide the manner in which such bill shall be properly certified for presentation to the governor.

SEC. 22. *Passage of bills on last day of session prohibited.*—No bill shall be passed by either house of the legislature upon the day prescribed for the adjournment of the two houses. But this section shall not be so construed as to preclude the enrolment of a bill, or the signature and passage from one house to the other, or the reports thereon from committees, or its transmission to the executive for his signature.

SEC. 23. *Census when to be provided for—apportionment.*—The legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants of this state in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and every tenth year thereafter. At their first session after each enumeration so made, and also at their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall have the power to prescribe the bounds of congressional, senatorial, and representative districts, and to apportion anew the senators and representatives among the several districts, according to the provisions of section second of this article.

SEC. 24. *Election of senators.*—The senators shall also be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time that the members of the house of representatives are required to be chosen, and in the same manner, and

no representative district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in regular series, and the senators chosen by the districts designated by odd numbers, shall go out of office at the expiration of the first year, and the senators chosen by the district designated by even numbers, shall go out of office at the expiration of the second year; and thereafter the senators shall be chosen for the term of two years, except there shall be an entire new election of all the senators at the election next succeeding each new apportionment provided for in this article.

SEC. 25. *Qualification of members.*—Senators and representatives shall be qualified voters of the state, and shall have resided one year in the state, and six months immediately preceding the election in the district from which they are elected.

SEC. 26. *U. S. Senators.*—Members of the senate of the United States from this state shall be elected by the two houses of the legislature in joint convention, at such times and in such manner as may be provided by law.

SEC. 27. *Laws to embrace only one subject.*—No law shall embrace more than one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.

SEC. 28. *Divorces.*—Divorces shall not be granted by the legislature.

SEC. 29. *Oath of office.*—All members and officers of both branches of the legislature shall, before entering upon the duties of their respective trusts, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, the constitution of the state of Minnesota, and faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties devolving upon him as such member or officer.

SEC. 30. *Manner of voting.*—In all elections to be made by the legislature, the members thereof shall vote *viva voce*, and their votes shall be entered on the journal.

SEC. 31. *Sale of lottery tickets.*—The legislature shall never authorize any lottery, or the sale of lottery tickets.

SEC. 32A. *Certain provisions of law to be submitted to vote of people.**—Any law providing for the repeal or amendment of any law or laws heretofore or hereafter enacted, which provides that any railroad company now existing in this state, or operating its road therein, or which may be hereafter organized, shall in lieu of all other taxes and assessments upon their real estate, roads, rolling stock, and other personal property at and during the time and periods therein specified, pay into the treasury of this state a certain percentage therein mentioned of the gross earnings of such railroad companies now existing or hereafter organized, shall before the same shall take effect or be in force, be submitted to a vote of the people of the state, and be adopted and ratified by a majority of the electors of the state voting at the election at which the same shall be submitted to them.

SEC. 32B. *Internal improvement lands to be sold in the same manner as school lands, and invested in stocks.*†—All lands donated to the state of Minnesota for the purpose of internal improvement, under the eighth section of the act of congress,

approved September fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-one, being "an act to appropriate the proceeds of the sales of the public lands, and to grant pre-emption rights," shall be appraised and sold, in the same manner and by the same officers, and the minimum price shall be the same as is provided by law for the appraisal and sale of the school lands, under the provisions of title one (1), of chapter thirty-eight (38), of the general statutes, except the modifications hereinafter mentioned. All moneys derived from the sales of the said lands shall be invested in the bonds of the United States, or of the state of Minnesota, issued since 1860, and the moneys so invested shall constitute the internal improvement land fund of the state. All moneys received by the county treasurer under the provisions of title one (1), chapter thirty-eight aforesaid, derived from the sale of the internal improvement lands, shall be held at all times subject to the order and direction of the state treasurer, for the benefit of the fund to which it belongs, and on the fifteenth day of June in each year, and at such other times as he may be requested so to do by the state treasurer, he shall pay over to the said state treasurer all moneys received on account of such fund.

The bonds purchased in accordance with this amendment shall be transferable only upon the order of the governor, and on each bond shall be written, "Minnesota internal improvement land fund of the state, transferable only on the order of the governor."

The principal sum from all sales of internal improvement lands, shall not be reduced by any charges or costs of officers, by fees, or by any other means whatever; and section fifty (50), of title one (1), of chapter thirty-eight (38), of the general statutes, shall not be applicable to the provisions of this amendment, and wherever the words "school lands," are used in said title, it shall read as applicable to this amendment, "internal improvement lands."

The future disposition of the fund to be voted upon by the people.—The moneys belonging to the internal improvement land fund shall not be appropriated for any purpose whatever until the enactment for that purpose shall have been approved by a majority of the electors of the state, voting at the annual general election following the passage of the act.

The force of this amendment shall be to authorize the sale of the internal improvement lands, without further legislative enactment.

ARTICLE V.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SEC. 1. *Executive department.*—The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and attorney-general, who shall be chosen by the electors of the state.

SEC. 2. *Returns of elections.*—The returns of every election, for the officers named in the foregoing section, shall be made to the secretary of state, and by him transmitted to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall cause the same to be opened and canvassed before both houses of the legislature, and the result declared within three days after each house shall be organized.

SEC. 3. *Term of office of governor and lieutenant-governor.*—The term of office for the governor and lieutenant-governor shall be two years, and until their successors are chosen and qualified. Each shall have attained the age of twenty-five (25)

years, and shall have been a *bona fide* resident of the state for one year next preceding his election. Both shall be citizens of the United States.

SEC. 4. *Governor—his duties.*—The governor shall communicate by message to each session of the legislature such information touching the state and condition of the country as he may deem expedient. He shall be commander-in-chief of the military and naval forces, and may call out such forces to execute the laws, suppress insurrection, and repel invasion. He may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons, after conviction, for offences against the state, except in cases of impeachment. He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to appoint a state librarian and notaries public; and such other officers as may be provided by law. He shall have power to appoint commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds, or other instruments in writing, to be used in the state. He shall have a negative upon all laws passed by the legislature, under such rules and limitations as are in this constitution prescribed. He may on extraordinary occasions convene both houses of the legislature. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, fill any vacancy that may occur in the office of secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney-general, and such other state and district offices as may be hereafter created by law, until the next annual election, and until their successors are chosen and qualified.

SEC. 5. *Term of office of the secretary of state and attorney-general—salaries of executive officers.*—The official term of the secretary of state, treasurer, and attorney-general shall be two years. The official term of the auditor shall be three years, and each shall continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The governor's salary for the first term under this constitution shall be two thousand five hundred dollars per annum. The salary of the secretary of state for the first term shall be fifteen hundred dollars per annum. The auditor, treasurer, and attorney-general shall, each, for the first term, receive a salary of one thousand dollars per annum. And the further duties and salaries of said executive officers shall each thereafter be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. *Lieutenant-governor—his duties.*—The lieutenant-governor shall be *ex officio* president of the senate; and in case a vacancy should occur, from any cause whatever, in the office of governor, he shall be governor during such vacancy. The compensation of lieutenant-governor shall be double the compensation of a state senator. Before the close of each session of the senate, they shall elect a president *pro tempore*, who shall be lieutenant-governor in case a vacancy should occur in that office.

SEC. 7.* *Commencement of term of office.*—The term of each of the executive offices named in this article shall commence upon taking the oath of office, on or after the first day of May, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, and continue until the first Monday in January, eighteen hundred and sixty, except the auditor, who shall continue in office until the first Monday in January, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified: and the same above-mentioned time for qualification and entry upon the duties of their respective offices shall extend and apply to all other officers elected under the state

constitution, who have not already taken the oath of office, and commenced the performance of their official duties.

SEC. 8. *Oath of office.*—Each officer created by this article shall, before entering upon his duties, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and faithfully discharge the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

SEC. 9. *Duties of legislature.*—Laws shall be passed at the first session of the legislature after the state is admitted into the Union, to carry out the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE VI.

JUDICIARY.

SEC. 1. *Judicial power of the state.*—The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds' vote.

SEC. 2. *Supreme court.*—The supreme court shall consist of one chief justice and two associate justices, but the number of associate justices may be increased to a number not exceeding four, by the legislature, by a two-thirds' vote, when it shall be deemed necessary. It shall have original jurisdiction in such remedial cases as may be prescribed by law, and appellate jurisdiction in all cases, both in law and equity, but there shall be no trial by jury in said court. It shall hold one or more terms in each year, as the legislature may direct, at the seat of government, and the legislature may provide by a two-thirds' vote that one term in each year shall be held in each or any judicial district. It shall be the duty of such court to appoint a reporter of its decisions. There shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the state one clerk of the supreme court, who shall hold his office for the term of three years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified, and the judges of the supreme court, or a majority of them, shall have the power to fill any vacancy in the office of clerk of the supreme court until an election can be regularly had.

SEC. 3. *Judges of the supreme court.*—The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the state at large, and their term of office shall be seven years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 4. *Judicial districts.*—The state shall be divided by the legislature into six judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district one judge shall be elected by the electors thereof, who shall constitute said court, and whose term of office shall be seven years. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance in office.

SEC. 5. *District courts.*—The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one

hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of the judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

SEC. 6. *Qualifications of the judges of the supreme and district courts.*—The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation, at stated times, as may be prescribed by the legislature, which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

SEC. 7. *Probate court.*—There shall be established in each organized county in the state a probate court, which shall be a court of record, and be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law. It shall be held by one judge, who shall be elected by the voters of the county for the term of two years. He shall be a resident of such county at the time of his election, and reside therein during his continuance in office, and his compensation shall be provided by law. He may appoint his own clerk, where none has been elected, but the legislature may authorize the election by the electors of any county, of one clerk or register of probate for such county, whose powers, duties, term of office, and compensation shall be prescribed by law. A probate court shall have jurisdiction over the estates of deceased persons and persons under guardianship, but no other jurisdiction, except as prescribed by this constitution.

SEC. 8. *Justices of the peace.*—The legislature shall provide for the election of a sufficient number of justices of the peace in each county, whose term of office shall be two years, and whose duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law: *provided*, that no justice of the peace shall have jurisdiction of any civil cause where the amount in controversy shall exceed one hundred dollars, nor in a criminal cause where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment, or a fine of over one hundred dollars, nor in any cause involving the title to real estate.

SEC. 9. *Judges, other than those provided for by the constitution.*—All judges other than those provided for in this constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

SEC. 10. *Vacancy in judgeship.*—In case the office of any judge shall become vacant before the expiration of the regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

SEC. 11. *Prohibition to justices of the supreme and district courts.*—The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this state. And all votes for either of them for

any elective office under this constitution, except a judicial office, given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

SEC. 12. *Change of judicial districts.*—The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries when it shall be deemed expedient, but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

SEC. 13. *Clerk of district courts.*—There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties, and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

SEC. 14. *Legal pleadings and proceedings.*—Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this state shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be "The state of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude "against the peace and dignity of the state of Minnesota."

SEC. 15. *Court commissioners.*—The legislature may provide for the election of one person in each organized county in this state, to be called a court commissioner, with judicial power and jurisdiction not exceeding the power and jurisdiction of a judge of the district court at Chambers; or the legislature may, instead of such election, confer such power and jurisdiction upon judges of probate in the state.

ARTICLE VII.

ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.

SEC. 1.* *Elective franchise.*—Every male person of the age of twenty-one (21) years or upwards, belonging to either of the following classes, who shall have resided in the United States one year, and in this state for four months next preceding any election, shall be entitled to vote at such election, in the election district of which he shall at the time have been for ten days a resident, for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elected by the people.

First. Citizens of the United States.

Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization.

Third. Persons of mixed white and Indian blood who have adopted the customs and habits of civilization.

Fourth. Persons of Indian blood residing in this state who have adopted the language, customs, and habits of civilization, after an examination before any district court of this state, in such manner as may be provided by law, and shall have been pronounced by said court capable of exercising the right of citizenship within the state.

SEC. 2. *Persons not entitled to vote.*—No person not belonging to one of the classes specified in the preceding section; no person who has been convicted of

treason or any felony, unless restored to civil rights, and no person under guardianship, or who may be *non compos mentis*, or insane, shall be entitled or permitted to vote at any election in this state.

SEC. 3. *Residence shall not be lost in certain cases.*—For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have lost a residence by reason of his absence while employed in the service of the United States; nor while engaged upon the waters of this state or of the United States; nor while a student of any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any alms-house or asylum; nor while confined in any public prison.

SEC. 4. *Persons, in army and navy not to acquire residence.*—No soldier, seaman, or marine in the army or navy of the United States, shall be deemed a resident of this state in consequence of being stationed within the same.

SEC. 5. *On election day freedom from arrest on civil process.*—During the day on which any election shall be held, no person shall be arrested by virtue of any civil process.

SEC. 6. *Elections to be by ballot.*—All elections shall be by ballot, except for such town officers as may be directed by law to be otherwise chosen.

SEC. 7. *Eligibility to office.*—Every person who, by the provisions of this article, shall be entitled to vote at any election, shall be eligible to any office which now is, or hereafter shall be, elective by the people in the district wherein he shall have resided thirty days previous to such election, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, or the constitution and laws of the United States.

ARTICLE VIII.

SCHOOL FUNDS, EDUCATION AND SCIENCE.

SEC. 1. *Uniform system of public schools.*—The stability of a republican form of government depending mainly upon the intelligence of the people, it shall be the duty of the legislature to establish a general and uniform system of public schools.

SEC. 2. *Proceeds of sales of school lands.*—The proceeds of such lands as are or hereafter may be granted by the United States for the use of schools within each township in this state, shall remain a perpetual school fund to the state, and not more than one-third (1-3) of said lands may be sold in two (2) years, one-third (1-3) in five (5) years, and one-third (1-3) in ten (10) years; but the lands of the greatest valuation shall be sold first, provided that no portion of said lands shall be sold otherwise than at public sale. The principal of all funds arising from sales, or other disposition of lands, or other property, granted or intrusted to this state in each township for educational purposes, shall for ever be preserved inviolate and undiminished; and the income arising from the lease or sale of said school lands, shall be distributed to the different townships throughout the state, in proportion to the number of scholars in each township between the ages of five and twenty-one years, and shall be faithfully applied to the specific objects of the original grants or appropriations.

SEC. 3. *Public schools in each township in the state.*—The legislature shall make such provisions, by taxation or otherwise, as, with the income arising from the school fund, will secure a thorough and efficient system of public schools in each township in the state.

SEC. 4. *Location of the state university confirmed.*—The location of the university of Minnesota, as established by existing laws, is hereby confirmed, and said institution is hereby declared to be the university of the state of Minnesota. All the rights, immunities, franchises, and endowments heretofore granted or conferred; are hereby perpetuated unto the said university, and all lands which may be granted hereafter by congress, or other donations for said university purposes, shall vest in the institution referred to in this section.

ARTICLE IX.

FINANCES OF THE STATE, THE BANKS AND BANKING.

SEC. 1.* *Equalization of taxes.*—All taxes to be raised in this state shall be as nearly equal as may be, and all property on which taxes are to be levied shall have a cash valuation, and be equalized and uniform throughout the state: *provided*, that the legislature may by general law or special act, authorize municipal corporations to levy assessments for local improvements upon the property fronting upon such improvements, or upon the property to be benefited by such improvements, without regard to a cash valuation and in such manner as the legislature may prescribe.

SEC. 2. The legislature shall provide for an annual tax sufficient to defray the estimated [ordinary]† expenses of the state for each year, and whenever it shall happen that such ordinary expenses of the state for any year shall exceed the income of the state for such year, the legislature shall provide for levying a tax for the ensuing year sufficient, with other sources of income, to pay the deficiency of the preceding year, together with the estimated expenses of such ensuing year.

[But no law levying a tax, or making other provisions for the payment of interest or principal of the bonds denominated “Minnesota State Railroad Bonds,” shall take effect or be in force until such law shall have been submitted to a vote of the people of the state, and adopted by a majority of the electors of the state voting upon the same.]†

SEC. 3. *Property subject to taxation.*—Laws shall be passed taxing all moneys, credits, investments in bonds, stocks, joint-stock companies, or otherwise, and also all real and personal property, according to its true value in money; but public burying-grounds, public school-houses, public hospitals, academies, colleges, universities, and all seminaries of learning, all churches, church property used for religious purposes, and houses of worship, institutions of purely public charity, public property used exclusively for any public purpose, and personal property to an amount not exceeding in value two hundred dollars for each individual, shall, by general laws, be exempt from taxation.

SEC. 4. *Property of banks subject to taxation.*—Laws shall be passed for taxing the notes and bills discounted or purchased, moneys loaned, and all other property, effects or dues of every description, of all banks, and of all bankers; so that all

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property employed in banking shall always be subject to a taxation equal to that imposed on the property of individuals.

SEC. 5. *Public debt may be contracted.*—For the purpose of defraying extraordinary expenditures, the state may contract public debts, but such debts shall never, in the aggregate, exceed two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; every such debt shall be authorized by law, for some single object, to be distinctly specified therein; and no such law shall take effect until it shall have been passed by the vote of two-thirds of the members of each branch of the legislature, to be recorded by yeas and nays on the journals of each house respectively; and every such law shall levy a tax annually sufficient to pay the annual interest of such debt, and also a tax sufficient to pay the principal of such debt within ten years from the final passage of such law, and shall specially appropriate the proceeds of such taxes to the payment of such principal and interest; and such appropriation and taxes shall not be repealed, postponed, or diminished until the principal and interest of such debt shall have been wholly paid. The state shall never contract any debts for works of internal improvement, or be a party in carrying on such works, except in cases where grants of land, or other property, shall have been made to the state, especially dedicated by the grant to specific purposes, and in such cases the state shall devote thereto the avails of such grants, and may pledge or appropriate the revenues derived from such works in aid of their completion.

SEC. 6. *Public debt, how contracted.*—All debts authorized by the preceding section shall be contracted by loan on state bonds of amounts not less than five hundred dollars each, on interest, payable within ten years after the final passage of the law authorizing such debt; and such bonds shall not be sold by the state under par. A correct registry of all such bonds shall be kept by the treasurer, in numerical order, so as always to exhibit the number and amount unpaid, and to whom severally made payable.

SEC. 7. The state shall never contract any public debt, unless in time of war, to repel invasion or suppress insurrection, except in the cases and in the manner provided in the fifth and sixth sections of this article.

SEC. 8. *Appropriation of money received from loan of state bonds.*—The money arising from any loan made or debt or liability contracted, shall be applied to the object specified in the act authorizing such debt or liability, or to the repayment of such debt or liability, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 9. *Payment of money out of the treasury.*—No money shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this state, except in pursuance of an appropriation by law.

SEC. 10. *State credit prohibited, when.*—The credit of the state shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual association or corporation: [Nor shall there be any further issue of bonds denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," under what purports to be an amendment to section ten (10) of article nine (9) of the constitution, adopted April fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, which is hereby expunged from the constitution, saving, excepting, and reserving to the state, nevertheless, all rights, remedies, and forfeitures accruing under said amendment.]*

SEC. 11. *Receipts and expenditures of the state.*—There shall be published by

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the treasurer, in at least one newspaper printed at the seat of government, during the first week of January in each year, and in the next volume of the acts of the legislature, detailed statements of all moneys drawn from the treasury during the preceding year, for what purposes and to whom paid, and by what law authorized, and also of all moneys received, and by what authority, and from whom.

SEC. 12. *Disbursements of the state and school funds.*—Suitable laws shall be passed by the legislature for the safe keeping, transfer, and disbursement of the state and school funds, and all officers and other persons charged with the same shall be required to give ample security for all moneys and funds of any kind, to keep an accurate entry of each sum received, and of each payment and transfer, and if any of said officers or other persons shall convert to his own use in any form, or shall loan with or without interest, contrary to law, or shall deposit in banks, or exchange for other funds, any portion of the funds of the state, every such act shall be adjudged to be an embezzlement of so much of the state funds as shall be thus taken, and shall be declared a felony; and any failure to pay over or produce the state or school funds intrusted to such person, on demand, shall be held and taken to be *prima facie* evidence of such embezzlement.

SEC. 13. *Provisions and restrictions for a banking law.*—The legislature may, by a two-thirds' vote, pass a general banking law, with the following restrictions and requirements, viz.:

First. The legislature shall have no power to pass any law sanctioning in any manner, directly or indirectly, the suspension of specie payments by any person, association, or corporation issuing bank notes of any description.

Second. The legislature shall provide by law for the registry of all bills or notes issued or put in circulation as money, and shall require ample security in United States stock or state stocks for the redemption of the same in specie, and in case of a depreciation of said stocks, or any part thereof, to the amount of ten per cent. or more on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by additional stocks.

Third. The stockholders in any corporation and joint association for banking purposes issuing bank notes, shall be individually liable in an amount equal to double the amount of stock owned by them for all the debts of such corporation or association, and such individual liability shall continue for one year after any transfer or sale of stock by any stockholder or stockholders.

Fourth. In case of the insolvency of any bank or banking association, the bill-holders thereof shall be entitled to preference in payment over all other creditors of such bank or association.

Fifth. Any general banking law which may be passed in accordance with this article, shall provide for recording the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of transfer, and to whom transferred.

SEC. 14A.* *Public debt for buildings for insane, deaf, dumb, and blind, and state prison.*—For the purpose of erecting and completing buildings for an hospital for the insane; a deaf, dumb, and blind asylum, and state prison, the legislature may, by law, increase the public debt of the state to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, in addition to the public debt already hereto-

fore authorized by the constitution, and for that purpose may provide by law for issuing and negotiating the bonds of the state, and appropriate the money only for the purpose aforesaid, which bonds shall be payable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years, from the date of the same, at the option of the state.

SEC. 14B.* *Limitation of taxing powers of the legislature.*—The legislature shall not authorize any county, township, city, or other municipal corporation to issue bonds or to become indebted in any manner to aid in the construction or equipment of any or all railroads to any amount that shall exceed ten per centum of the value of the taxable property within such county, township, city, or other municipal corporation. The amount of such taxable property to be ascertained and determined by the last assessment of said property made for the purpose of state and county taxation previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

ARTICLE X.

OF CORPORATIONS HAVING NO BANKING PRIVILEGES.

SEC. 1. *Of corporations and their powers.*—The term “corporations,” as used in this article, shall be construed to include all associations and joint-stock companies having any of the powers and privileges not possessed by individuals or partnerships, except such as embrace banking privileges, and all corporations shall have the right to sue, and shall be liable to be sued in all courts in like manner as natural persons.

SEC. 2. No corporation shall be formed under special acts, except for municipal purposes.

SEC. 3.† Each stockholder in any corporation (excepting those organized for the purpose of carrying on any kind of manufacturing or mechanical business) shall be liable to the amount of the stock held or owned by him.

SEC. 4. *Lands, when may be taken for public way.*—Lands may be taken for public way for the purpose of granting to any corporation the franchise of way for public use. In all cases, however, a fair and equitable compensation shall be paid for such land, and the damages arising from the taking of the same; but all corporations being common carriers, enjoying the right of way in pursuance of the provisions of this section, shall be bound to carry the mineral, agricultural, and other productions or manufactures on equal and reasonable terms.

ARTICLE XI.

COUNTIES AND TOWNSHIPS.

SEC. 1. *Counties, establishment and organization of.*—The legislature may, from time to time, establish and organize new counties, but no new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any county be reduced below that amount; and all laws changing county lines in counties already organized,

or for removing county seats, shall, before taking effect, be submitted to the electors of the county or counties to be affected thereby, at the next general election after the passage thereof, and be adopted by a majority of such electors. Counties now established may be enlarged, but not reduced below four hundred (400) square miles.

Taylor v. Taylor, 10 Minn. 107; *Bayard v. Klingle*, 16 Minn. 249.

SEC. 2. *Organization of cities and separate districts.*—The legislature may organize any city into a separate county when it has attained a population of twenty thousand inhabitants, without reference to geographical extent, when a majority of the electors of the county in which such city may be situated, voting thereon, shall be in favor of a separate organization.

SEC. 3. *Organization of townships.*—Laws may be passed providing for the organization, for municipal and other town purposes, of any congressional or fractional townships in the several counties in the state, provided that when a township is divided by county lines, or does not contain one hundred inhabitants, it may be attached to one or more adjoining townships or parts of townships, for the purposes aforesaid.

SEC. 4. *Election of county and township officers.*—Provision shall be made by law for the election of such county or township officers as may be necessary.

SEC. 5. *Local taxation.*—Any county and township organization shall have such powers of local taxation as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. *Money in county or township treasuries.*—No money shall be drawn from any county or township treasury except by authority of law.

SEC. 7.* *To abolish county of Manomin.*—The county of Manomin is hereby abolished, and the territory heretofore comprising the same shall constitute and be a part of the county of Anoka.

ARTICLE XII

OF THE MILITIA.

SEC. 1. *Militia organization.*—It shall be the duty of the legislature to pass such laws for the organization, discipline, and service of the militia of the state as may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XIII

IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVAL FROM OFFICE.

SEC. 1. *Impeachment and removal from office.*—The governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney-general, and the judges of the supreme and district courts may be impeached for corrupt conduct in office, or for crimes and misdemeanors; but judgment in such case shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust, or profit in this state. The party convicted thereof shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 2. *Removal from office.*—The legislature of this state may provide for the removal of inferior officers from office, for malfeasance or nonfeasance in the performance of their duties.

SEC. 3. No officer shall exercise the duties of his office after he shall have been impeached and before his acquittal.

SEC. 4. On the trial of an impeachment against the governor, the lieutenant-governor shall not act as a member of the court.

SEC. 5. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been served with a copy thereof, at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

ARTICLE XIV.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SEC. 1. *Amendments to the constitution.*—Whenever a majority of both houses of the legislature shall deem it necessary to alter or amend this constitution, they may propose such alterations or amendments, which proposed amendments shall be published with the laws which have been passed at the same session, and said amendments shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection; and if it shall appear in a manner to be provided by law, that a majority of voters present and voting shall have ratified such alterations or amendments, the same shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as a part of this constitution. If two or more alterations or amendments shall be submitted at the same time, it shall be so regulated that the voters shall vote for or against each separately.

SEC. 2. Whenever two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the legislature shall think it necessary to call a convention to revise this constitution, they shall recommend to the electors to vote, at the next election, for members of the legislature, for or against a convention; and if a majority of all the electors voting at said election shall have voted for a convention, the legislature shall, at their next session, provide by law for calling the same. The convention shall consist of as many members as the house of representatives, who shall be chosen in the same manner, and shall meet within three months after their election for the purpose aforesaid.

ARTICLE XV.

MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.

SEC. 1. *Seat of government.*—The seat of government of the state shall be at the city of St Paul, but the legislature, at their first or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by congress, for a seat of government to the state; and in the event of the seat of government being removed from the city of St Paul to any other place in the state, the capitol building and grounds shall be dedicated to an institution for the promotion of science, literature, and the arts, to be organized by the legislature of the state, and of which institution the Minnesota historical society shall always be a department.

SEC. 2. *Residence on Indian lands.*—Persons residing on Indian lands within the state shall enjoy all the rights and privileges of citizens as though they lived in any other portion of the state, and shall be subject to taxation.

SEC. 3. *Uniform oath.*—The legislature shall provide for a uniform oath or affirmation to be administered at elections, and no person shall be compelled to take any other or different form of oath to entitle him to vote.

SEC. 4. *Seal of the state.*—There shall be a seal of the state, which shall be kept by the secretary of state, and be used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the state of Minnesota, and shall be attached to all official acts of the governor (his signature to acts and resolves of the legislature excepted) requiring authentication. The legislature shall provide for an appropriate device and motto for said seal.

SEC. 5. *State prison.*—The territorial prison, as located under existing laws, shall, after the adoption of this constitution, be and remain one of the state prisons of the state of Minnesota.

SCHEDULE.

SEC. 1. *Territorial laws recognized as valid in the change of state organization.*—That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a territorial to a permanent state government, it is declared that all rights, actions, prosecutions, judgments, claims, and contracts, as well of individuals as of bodies corporate, shall continue as if no change had taken place; and all process which may be issued under the authority of the territory of Minnesota previous to its admission into the Union of the United States, shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the state.

SEC. 2. *Laws not repugnant to the constitution to remain in force.*—All laws now in force in the territory of Minnesota not repugnant to this constitution, shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or be altered or repealed by the legislature.

SEC. 3. *Fines, penalties, and forfeitures.*—All fines, penalties, or forfeitures accruing to the territory of Minnesota, shall inure to the state.

SEC. 4. *All civil rights under territorial laws to be of the same effect in the change to state government.*—All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a territorial to a permanent state government, shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the state, and all bonds executed to the governor of the territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority, and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly; and all the estate of property, real, personal, or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims and debts of whatsoever description, of the territory of Minnesota, shall inure to and vest in the state of Minnesota, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the state of Minnesota as the same could have been by the territory of Minnesota. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the state. All offenses committed against the laws of the territory of Minnesota before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the state of Minnesota, with like effect as though such change had not taken place, and all penalties incurred shall remain the same

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as if this constitution had not been adopted. All actions at law and suits in equity which may be pending in any of the courts of the territory of Minnesota at the time of a change from a territorial to a state government, may be continued and transferred to any court of the state which shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof.

SEC. 5. *Territorial officers continued until superseded by authority of state.*—All territorial officers, civil and military, now holding their offices under the authority of the United States or of the territory of Minnesota, shall continue to hold and exercise their respective offices until they shall be superseded by the authority of the state.

SEC. 6. *First session of legislature.*—The first session of the legislature of the state of Minnesota shall commence on the first Wednesday of December next, and shall be held at the capitol in the city of St Paul.

SEC. 7. The laws regulating the election and qualification of all district, county, and precinct officers, shall continue and be in force until the legislature shall otherwise provide by law.

SEC. 8. *Constitution submitted to a vote of the people.*—The president of this convention shall, immediately after the adjournment thereof, cause this constitution to be deposited in the office of the governor of the territory, and if after the submission of the same to a vote of the people, as hereinafter provided, it shall appear that it has been adopted by a vote of the people of the state, then the governor shall forward a certified copy of the same, together with an abstract of the votes polled for and against said constitution, to the president of the United States, to be by him laid before the congress of the United States.

SEC. 9. *Representative districts.*—For the purposes of the first election, the state shall constitute one district, and shall elect three members to the house of representatives of the United States.

SEC. 10. *Apportionment of counties into districts.*—For the purposes of the first election for members of the state senate and house of representatives, the state shall be divided into senatorial and representative districts as follows, viz.: first district, Washington county; second district, Ramsey county; third district, Dakota county; fourth district, so much of Hennepin county as lies west of the Mississippi; fifth district, Rice county; sixth district, Goodhue county; seventh district, Scott county; eighth district, Olmsted county; ninth district, Fillmore county; tenth district, Houston county; eleventh district, Winona county; twelfth district, Wabashaw county; thirteenth district, Mower and Dodge counties; fourteenth district, Freeborn and Faribault counties; fifteenth district, Steele and Waseca counties; sixteenth district, Blue Earth and Le Sueur counties; seventeenth district, Nicollet and Brown counties; eighteenth district, Sibley, Renville, and McLeod counties; nineteenth district, Carver and Wright counties; twentieth district, Benton, Stearns, and Meeker counties; twenty-first district, Morrison, Crow Wing, and Mille Lac counties; twenty-second district, Cass, Pembina, and Todd counties; twenty-third district, so much of Hennepin county as lies east of the Mississippi; twenty-fourth district, Sherburne, Anoka, and Manomin counties; twenty-fifth district, Chisago, Pine, and Isanti counties; twenty-sixth district, Buchanan, Carlton, St Louis, Lake, and Itasca counties.

SEC. 11. The counties of Brown, Stearns, Todd, Cass, Pembina, and Renville, as applied in the preceding section, shall not be deemed to include any territory

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west of the state line, but shall be deemed to include all counties and parts of counties east of said line as were created out of the territory of either, at the last session of the legislature.

SEC. 12. *Apportionment of members of the legislature.*—The senators and representatives at the first election shall be apportioned among the several senatorial and representative districts as follows, to wit :

1st district,	2 senators,	3 representatives.

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SEC. 13. The returns from the 22d district shall be made to, and canvassed by, the judges of election at the precinct of Otter Tail City.

SEC. 14. *Judicial districts.*—Until the legislature shall otherwise provide, the state shall be divided into judicial districts as follows, viz :

The counties of Washington, Chisago, Manomin, Anoka, Isanti, Pine, Buchanan, Carlton, St Louis, and Lake, shall constitute the first judicial district.

The county of Ramsey shall constitute the second judicial district.

The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, Olmsted, and Wabashaw, shall constitute the third judicial district.

The counties of Hennepin, Carver, Wright, Meeker, Sherburne, Benton, Stearns, Morrison, Crow Wing, Mille Lac, Itasca, Pembina, Todd, and Cass, shall constitute the fourth judicial district.

The counties of Dakota, Goodhue, Scott, Rice, Steele, Waseca, Dodge, Mower, and Freeborn, shall constitute the fifth judicial district.

The counties of Le Sueur, Sibley, Nicollet, Blue Earth, Faribault, McLeod, Renville, Brown, and all other counties in the state not included within the other districts, shall constitute the sixth judicial district.

SEC. 15. Each of the foregoing enumerated judicial districts may, at the first election, elect one prosecuting attorney for the district.

SEC. 16. *First election.*—Upon the second Tuesday, 13th day of October 1857, an election shall be held for members of the house of representatives of the United States, governor, lieutenant-governor, supreme and district judges, members of the legislature, and all other officers designated in this constitution, and also for the submission of this constitution to the people for their adoption or rejection.

SEC. 17. *Voters at the first election.*—Upon the day so designated as aforesaid, every free white male inhabitant over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within the limits of the state for ten days previous to the day of said election, may vote for all officers to be elected under this constitution at such election, and also for or against the adoption of this constitution.

SEC. 18. *Vote on the constitution.*—In voting for or against the adoption of this constitution, the words "for constitution," or "against constitution," may be written or printed on the ticket of each voter, but no voter shall vote for or against this constitution on a separate ballot from that cast by him for officers to be elected at said election under this constitution; and if upon the canvass of the votes so polled it shall appear that there was a greater number of votes polled for than against said constitution, then this constitution shall be deemed to be adopted as the constitution of the state of Minnesota; and all the provisions and obligations of this constitution, and of the schedule thereunto attached, shall thereafter be valid to all intents and purposes as the constitution of said state.

SEC. 19. *Election, how conducted.*—At said election the polls shall be opened, the election held, returns made, and certificates issued in all respects as provided by law for opening, closing, and conducting elections and making returns of the same, except as hereinbefore specified, and excepting also that polls may be opened and elections held at any point or points, in any of the counties where precincts may be established as provided by law, ten days previous to the day of election, not less than ten miles from the place of voting in any established precinct.

SEC. 20. It shall be the duty of the judges and clerks of election, in addition to the returns required by law for each precinct, to forward to the secretary of the territory by mail, immediately after the close of the election, a certified copy of the poll book containing the name of each person who has voted in the precinct, and the number of votes polled for and against the adoption of this constitution.

SEC. 21. *Returns of election, how made.*—The returns of said election for and against this constitution, and for all state officers and members of the house of representatives of the United States, shall be made and certificates issued in the manner now prescribed by law for returning votes given for delegate to congress, and the returns for all district officers, judicial, legislative, or otherwise, shall be made to the register of deeds of the senior county in each district, in the manner prescribed by law, except as otherwise provided. The returns for all officers elected at large shall be canvassed by the governor of the territory, assisted by Joseph R. Brown and Thomas J. Galbraith, at the time designated by law for canvassing the vote for delegate to congress.

SEC. 22. If upon canvassing the votes for and against the adoption of this constitution, it shall appear that there has been polled a greater number of votes against than for it, then no certificate of election shall be issued for any state or district officer provided for in this constitution, and no state organization shall have validity within the limits of the territory until otherwise provided for, and until a constitution for a state government shall have been adopted by the people.

AMENDMENT TO SECTION TEN, ARTICLE NINE OF
THE CONSTITUTION.*

[Adopted April 15, 1858.]

SEC. 10. *Loan of state credit for railroad purpose.*—The credit of this state shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association, or corporation, except that for the purpose of expediting the construction of the lines of railroads, in aid of which the congress of the United States has granted lands to the territory of Minnesota, the governor shall cause to be issued and delivered to each of the companies in which said grants are vested by the legislative assembly of Minnesota, the special bonds of the state, bearing an interest of seven per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually in the city of New York, as a loan of public credit, to an amount not exceeding twelve hundred and fifty thousand dollars, or an aggregate amount to all of said companies not exceeding five millions of dollars, in manner following, to wit:

Whenever either of the said companies shall produce to the governor satisfactory evidence, verified by the affidavits of the chief engineer, treasurer, and two directors of said company, that any ten miles of the road of said company has been actually constructed and completed, ready for placing the superstructure thereon, the governor shall cause to be issued and delivered to such company bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars; and whenever thereafter, and as often as either of said companies shall produce to the governor, like evidence of a further construction of ten miles of its road, as aforesaid, then the governor shall cause to be issued to such company further like bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars for each and every ten miles of road thus constructed; and whenever such company shall furnish like evidence that any ten miles of its road is actually completed, and cars running thereon, the governor shall cause to be issued to such company like bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars; and whenever thereafter, and as often as either of said companies shall produce to the governor like evidence that any further ten miles of said road is in operation as aforesaid, the governor shall cause to be issued to such company further like bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars until the full amount of the bonds hereby authorized shall be issued: *provided*, that two-fifths, and no more, of all bonds issued to the Southern Minnesota railroad company, shall be expended in the construction and equipment of the line of road from La Crescent to the point of junction with the Transit Road, as provided by law. And further provided, that the Minneapolis and Cedar Valley railroad company shall commence the construction

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of their road at Faribault and Minneapolis, and shall grade an equal number of miles from each of said places.

Minnesota and Pacific R. R. Co. v. Sibley, 2 Minn. 13; Chamberlain v. Sibley, 4 Minn. 309.

The said bonds thus issued shall be denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds," and the faith and credit of this state are hereby pledged for the payment of the interest and the redemption of the principal thereof. They shall be signed by the governor, countersigned and registered by the treasurer, sealed with the seal of the state, of denominations not exceeding one thousand dollars, payable to the order of the company to whom issued, transferable by the endorsement of the president of the said company, and redeemable at any time after ten, and before the expiration of twenty-five years from the date thereof. Within thirty days after the governor shall proclaim that the people have voted for a loan of state credit to railroads, any of said companies proposing to avail themselves of the loan herein provided for, and to accept the conditions of the same, shall notify the governor thereof, and shall, within sixty days, commence the construction of their roads, and shall, within two years thereafter, construct ready for the superstructure, at least fifty (50) miles of their road. Each company shall make provision for the punctual payment and redemption of all bonds issued and delivered as aforesaid, to said company, and for the punctual payment of the interest which shall accrue thereon, in such manner as to exonerate the treasury of this state from any advances of money for that purpose; and as security therefor, the governor shall demand and receive from each of said companies, before any of said bonds are issued, an instrument pledging the net profits of its road, for the payment of said interest, and a conveyance to the state of the first two hundred and forty sections of land, free from prior incumbrances, which such company is or may be authorized to sell in trust for the better security of the treasury of the state from loss on said bonds, which said deed of trust shall authorize the governor and secretary of state to make conveyances of title to all or any of such lands, to purchasers agreeing with the respective railroad companies therefor. *Provided*, that before releasing the interest of the state to such lands, such sale shall be approved by the governor, but the proceeds of all such sales shall be applied to the payment of interest accruing upon the bonds in case of default of the payment of the same, and as a sinking fund to meet any future default in the payment of interest and the principal thereof when due; and as further security, an amount of first mortgage bonds on the roads, lands, and franchises of the respective companies, corresponding to the state bond issued, shall be transferred to the treasurer of the state at the time of the issue of state bonds, and in case either of said companies shall make default in payment of either the interest or principal of the bonds issued to said companies by the governor, no more state bonds shall thereafter be issued to said company, and the governor shall proceed, in such manner as may be prescribed by law, to sell the bonds of the defaulting company or companies, or the lands held in trust as above, or may require a foreclosure of the mortgage executed to secure the same: *provided*, that if any company so in default, before the day of sale, shall pay all interest and principal then due, and all expenses incurred by the state, no sale shall take place, and the right of said company shall not be impaired to a further loan of state credit: *provided*, if any of said companies shall at any time offer to pay the principal, together with the interest that may then be due upon any of the Minnesota state railroad bonds, which may have been issued under the provisions of this section,

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then the treasurer of state shall receive the same ; and the liabilities of said company or companies, in respect to said bonds, shall cease upon such payment into the state treasury of principal, together with the interest as aforesaid : *provided further*, that in consideration of the loan of state credit herein provided, that the company or companies which may accept the bonds of the state in the manner herein specified, shall, as a condition thereof, each complete not less than fifty miles of its road on or before the expiration of the year 1861, and not less than one hundred miles before the year 1864, and complete four-fifths of the entire length of its road before the year 1866 ; and any failure on the part of any such company to complete the number of miles of its road or roads, in the manner and within the several times herein prescribed, shall forfeit to the state all the right, title, and interest of any kind whatsoever in and to any lands, together with the franchises connected with the same not pertaining or applicable to the portion of the road by them constructed, and a fee simple to which has not accrued to either of said companies, by reason of such construction, which was granted to the company or companies, thus failing to comply with the provisions hereof, by act of the legislature of the territory of Minnesota, vesting said land in said companies respectively.

AMENDMENT TO SECTION TEN, ARTICLE NINE.

- Bonds*, special, of state, to be issued to each company as a loan of credit. \$1,250,000 each. Aggregate \$5,000,000. To bear interest at seven per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually in New York city. How issued. Evidence that any ten miles have been completed ready for superstructure, satisfactory to governor to entitle road to receive \$100,000 in bonds. Same for every ten miles. Every ten miles completed and cars running thereon, company entitled to additional \$100,000 of bonds, etc., until full amount are issued. Two-fifths of bonds issued to S. M. R. R. Co., to be expended on line of road from La Crescent to junction with Transit roads. Bonds to be denominated "Minnesota State Railroad Bonds." Faith and credit of state pledged for payment of interest and redemption of principal of said bonds. To be signed by governor. Countersigned and registered by treasurer under the seal of the state. Not to exceed \$1000 each. Payable to order of company to whom issued, and transferable by indorsement of president of company to which issued. Redeemable after ten and before expiration of twenty-five years from their date.
- of railroads (see title *Security* below).
- Completion* of road, each company to complete not less than fifty miles by expiration of 1861. Not less than one hundred by expiration of 1864, and full four-fifths of each entire road before 1866. A failure to complete road as aforesaid to work forfeiture of lands, franchises, etc., to state.
- Construction*, Minnesota and Cedar Valley R. R. Company to commence at Faribault and Minneapolis, and to grade equal distances. To be commenced by each company within sixty days after proclamation by governor that the people have voted for loan, etc. Fifty miles to be ready for superstructure in two years thereafter on each road.
- Credit*, of state, not to be loaned to individuals or corporations, *except* to expedite construction of land grant railroads, in which lands granted by congress have been vested by legislative assembly of Minnesota.
- Loan*, conditions of, companies to notify governor of acceptance of loan within thirty days after proclamation by the governor, that the people have voted for said loan, etc.
- Payment*, each company to provide for payment of interest and principal of bonds as the same shall accrue, so as to exonerate the state treasury from any advances of money.
- Security*. 1. Net profits of each road for payment of interest on bonds issued by the state.
2. A conveyance of the first two hundred and forty sections of land, free from any incumbrance to save the state from loss on state bonds, which shall authorize the governor and secretary of the state to convey title to purchasers from the companies: *proviso*, the governor shall approve of said sale before releasing interest of state to said land. Proceeds of sale to be applied to payment, in case of default, and as a sinking fund for payment of principal when due, if unpaid.
3. First mortgage bonds on the roads, lands, and franchises of the companies, in an equal amount to the state bonds issued, to be transferred to state treasurer. In default of payment of principal and interest of state bonds by either company, no more state bonds shall be issued to such company, and bonds of company may be sold by governor; but if company, before day of sale, pay principal and interest, no sale shall take place.

AMENDMENT TO SECTION SEVEN, ARTICLE FIVE.

- Executive* officers, term of, to commence on taking oath of office, on or after May 1, 1858.
- Term to continue until first Monday of January 1860, except auditor, whose term extends to first Monday of January 1861.
- Above provision, as to qualification and entry into office, extended to all officers elected under state constitution.
