CHAPTER II.

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS.

The state is divided into two congressional 1862-p.134, Sect. 1. C 64 Section 1. 2 districts, each of which is entitled to elect one representa-3 tive to the congress of the United States.

SECT. 2. The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, 2 Olmsted, Mower, Dodge, Freeborn, Steele, Waseca, Rice, 1862-p.125, Sect. 2. 644

CHAPTER III.

THE LEGISLATURE.

TITLE I.

APPORTIONMENT.

Section 1. The senate of the state is composed of twen-2 ty-one members, and the house of representatives of forty-3 two members.

SECT. 2. The representation in the senate and house of 2 representatives is apportioned throughout the state in 3 twenty-one senatorial and representative districts, as fol-4 lows, to wit:
